Tai Ji master to lecture before Institute for Humanities

Chungliang Ai Huang, one of the most internationally respected Tai Ji masters and authorities of East/West cultural synthesis, will present a seminar and lecture in Salado, Oct. 25-26. This program will be the second event in the fall series on "The Person and the Collective" sponsored by the Institute for the Humanities.

Huang's seminar "Living Tao: Ancient Wisdom for Modern Living," will be held 10 a.m.-3:30 p.m. Oct. 25 at Allan Hall. His lecture, scheduled for 4 p.m. Oct. 26 at Mill Creek Country Club, is titled "Thinking Body, Dancing Mind: New Ways of Being for Self-Cultivation." The lecture will be followed by an hour of discussion and a buffet dinner.

Huang is the founder-president of the Living Tao Foundation, a non-profit global network of friends and associates who share the belief that inner harmony and potential are found intrinsically in nature and within the body itself, waiting to be rekindled through creative awareness and supportive human relationships.

The Foundation cosponsors with the Chinese government the Lan Ting Institute, a unique cross-cultural study center located amid the ruins of mountain top Taoist monasteries at one of China's most spectacular spots, the Wu Yi Mountain Scenic Reserve. The center was founded in 1985 to influence a change in China's religious repression and to restore the classic texts *I Ching* and *Tao Te Ching* to the people.

Born in China, Huang fled the Communists with his family to live in Taiwan. He came to the States as a teenager to study architecture but after completing his university studies was drawn into the world of dance and American theatre. He is credited with introducing the original Tai Ji to the performing arts. He conducts workshops on Taoist philosophy and dance throughout the world.

Huang is the author of numerous books, including, with philosopher Alan Watts, *The Watercourse Way*. His best-selling book of Eastern tradition and the essentials of Tai Ji, *Embrace Tiger, Return to Mountain*, has been printed in nine languages. His most recent book, *Mentoring: The Tao of Giving and Receiving Wisdom*, co-authored with Jerry Lynch, introduces the perennial wisdom of mentoring, illustrated with classic parables, contemporary anecdotes, and practical meditations.

The Institute for the Humanities at Salado is a non-profit educational institution dedicated to serving the general public with lifelong learning opportunities. The fall series is supported in part by the Texas Council for the Humanities, the Potts and Sibley Foundation, RGK Foundation, Rockwell Fund, Inc., and the contributions of the Institute's members.

An Open Exchange of Ideas

Writer examines slate of proposed amendments

Absentee voting is under way for the Tuesday, November 4, vote on 14 amendments to the Texas Constitution. For Saladoans this means either a trip to the second floor of the county courthouse between now and October 31, or wait until election day where voting will take place at the Salado Civic Center.

Starting today with the first seven amendments and concluding in the October 29, issue, this column will attempt to outline the proposed changes to our state constitution as presented by the 75th Legislative Session.

An opinion as to the value of each amendment will be added - for whatever that might be worth!

As previously noted, our state's highest law was put in place by a constitutional convention in 1876, (after the carpetbaggers were dethroned and had decamped presumably for Washington on the Potomac)

Since that time our unwieldy "corpus juris" or body of law has been amended 365 times. Lawmakers actually thought up 550 changes over the years but voters thankfully rejected a third of these offerings proving once again the superiority of a watchdog public over a less than brilliant political class.

AMENDMENT ONE

The first amendment on the November 4, ballot is fairly straightforward. Today, municipal judges are permitted to hold one, and only one, elected "civil office of emolument" at a time.

This means, in plain English, that a municipal judge who is elected and paid a salary cannot hold a second elected judgeship.

This amendment deals only with municipal judges and would, if approved, allow these magistrates to hold any number of municipal judicial positions at the same time and receive a salary for each assignment.

Value of this change in the law would be to allow qualified judges to be elected or appointed to work for several small incorporated communities at the same time thus holding down costs for

each town.

This appears to be a worthwhile amendment and should be approved.

AMENDMENT TWO

There are two parts to this amendment. First section would, if approved, allow the state legislature to set a ten percent cap on increases in the appraised value of a homestead, by a school district, in any given year.

The second part of this proposal tries to clarify last August's amendment that increased the homestead deduction for school tax payers and also now allows taxpayers, over the age of 65, whose school taxes were "frozen" to take their "freeze" with them should they move to a new homestead.

Folks who moved during the 1997 tax year were not eligible for the "take-along" tax freeze since one's tax liability is set on the first day of each year. This adjustment would allow school districts to make a retroactive "freeze" allowance for those who did in fact change addresses between the time the amendment was approved and the January 1, 1998, effective date.

This is an equitable plan to help taxpayers who are caught in the interim period between passage and implementation of a law. Should be approved.

AMENDMENT THREE

Under this proposed amendment, the legislature would be authorized to give local taxing units permission to grant a tax exemption for property on which a water conservation initiative has been implemented.

The size and scope of the local water conservation plan as well as the amount of exemption would be approved and granted on a voluntary basis by schools, cities, counties and other taxing entities.

Two sides to this matter. First, it must be understood

FILING A CONSUMER COMPLAINT

October is Consumer Protection Month, and once again this year, I want to remind you that the Office of the Attorney General is here to enforce Texas' consumer protection laws.

In fiscal year 1997, we received almost 30,000 consumer complaints. More than 9,100 of these were successfully resolved by our complaint mediation process. If you have a consumer complaint, please read on to learn more about how my office might be able to help.

Let the business know what your problem is

Most legitimate business are concerned about customer satisfaction and are only too happy to resolve a complaint, once they have been made aware of the problem. Your first and most immediate line of defense is your direct complaint made in person, by telephone or letter to the business involved.

Consider filing a complaint with the Better Business Bureau or with us if the merchant's response is unsatisfactory. Sometimes another

state, federal or local agency will have more authority or expertise than our office to handle a particular consumer problem. In such a case, we refer the complaint to the agency best able to help.

State law does prohibit us from representing any private individual. Please be aware, therefore, that we cannot offer you legal advice or act as your attorney. We can, however, provide a framework within which many disputes are successfully resolved.

The mediation process

In filling out the consumer complaint form, you will explain in detail what the problem is, who it is with, what you have done and what you want. You will need to identify the business by name and provide its current address.

Were you told something that was untrue? We will ask you what you were told and how it was untrue. Is a product defective? We will ask you to explain what is wrong. Did the business refuse to honor a warranty? We will ask you to explain what needs repair and to produce a photocopy of the warranty.

You will also need to explain what you want the business to do: how much money should be re-

funded or exactly how you want a product fixed or a service performed. We will need photocopies of documents relevant to your complaint: receipts, warranties, both sides of canceled checks, contracts, etc. Do not send originals. Keep the originals and send copies.

If your complaint is appropriate for mediation, we will ask the business to respond to your allegations and to make you a settlement offer.

You will receive written notice of the decision as well as the response from the business.

Will the Attorney General sue the company?

We cannot file a lawsuit for the purpose of recovering money or property for an individual. Our office does file suits against companies that violate state laws protecting consumers. However, by law, we file these lawsuits primarily to protect the public interest, not private interests.

Even if we sue a business against which you have made a complaint, we may not be able to recover any money. A company facing a lawsuit may go out of business. The owners may not be found, or they may not be held legally responsible.

Sometimes a company will have spent all the money by the time they are caught. In these cases, we may file suit to stop illegal practices even though we know we will be unable to recover consumers' money.

that any tax exemption erodes the tax base and forces others to make up the difference.

On the other hand, water conservation is essential to the growth of the state and more importantly for the well being of all citizens.

Voters will just have to make up their minds as to what is more important - a larger tax base or sufficient water for our future.

Recommend passage.

AMENDMENT FOUR

Amendment Four is designed to remove several obsolete statutes as well as correcting the number-assignment of a variety of sections within the constitution.

All this thanks to the many times the document has been amended; errors by clerks when assigning placement of new laws and old laws killed off by overriding federal and state statutes.

Some of the archaic items to be knocked out include several in the area of who gets to vote. No longer do we exclude those who do not own property nor citizens who are paupers supported by the county. The rule requiring Texans to secure a poll tax would also be deleted. All these outlawed requirements are still on the books for some reason!

This proposal would also change the term "idiot and/or lunatic" to "a person determined mentally incompetent by a court" in the class prohibited from voting.

Voting age dropped from 21 to 18 some years ago but was never corrected in the constitution. Also to be deleted from our body of law is a 50 year old, one time appropriation to John Tarleton Agricultural College.

Also the superconducting super collider fund that is now moot since the entire project has been deep-sixed by the feds.

There is no question that this amendment needs our attention as well as hope that someone next session will go through the rest of our revered and oft changed constitution and dig out the rest of the duplications, errors and obsolete items remaining.

Strongly recommend passage.

AMENDMENT FIVE

Amendment five, if approved, would allow the State Supreme Court to conduct business at any location within the boundaries of the State of Texas rather than operating solely in Austin.

This is a good idea since it would allow citizens from the far flung corners of the State to see the Supremes in action

without having to travel all the way to the state capitol.

Oral arguments held around the State would be educational for students as well as attorneys and the general public.

Final decisions by the court would continue to be pronounced only from the supreme court building in Austin.

Good idea. Recommend approval.

AMENDMENT SIX

This amendment deals with the Texas Growth Fund that was set up in 1988. Money for this fund comes in large part from the Permanent University Fund as well as the state employee's and teacher's retirement systems. The money is invested in new businesses in Texas as a state financed loan.

These new business ventures are currently required to certify any dealings they might have with South Africa or Namibia due to their former policy of apartheid.

The matter of apartheid is over in the new South African government and Namibia is now an independent democratic nation that also has denounced apartheid so, **on that basis the amendment should be approved.**

But what is more important here is that the entire matter of the Texas Growth Fund should be revisited by lawmakers, since this is no place to put money taken from the permanent university fund nor the retirement systems.

Much more dangerous since a vast majority of new businesses have a history of failure which in turn could put state funds at risk.

AMENDMENT SEVEN

This is a tricky sort of amendment in that it would, if passed, allow the Texas Water Development Board to transfer existing bond authorization from one category to another as they see fit.

Problem here is that voters, through constitutional amendments in the past, approved bonds for certain activities such as water supply, water quality or flood control. To shift bonds from one activity to another, without new voter approval, could in some cases defy the wishes of the electorate.

It is conceivable that voters approving a bond issue for flood control might not want this money used for a water supply project.

On the other hand, it would allow the water board to solve immediate problems with money that is on hand without having to wait years for voter approval through a constitutional amendment.

On this one, we will have to have faith in our elected and appointed officials and say: **"alright, go ahead"** - but at the same time be ever watchful as to what is done in the future to be sure we are not led down the primrose path as so many government officials have done in the past.

Recommend approval. While keeping our fingers crossed!

NEXT WEEK

Amendments eight through fourteen will be outlined in the next edition of "Off The Record". **Included will be Amendment Eight, the most controversial of this year's crop of proposed changes, since it deals with the matter of permitting folks to take out equity loans on their homestead.**

Eagles herd Buffaloes 29-6 for homecoming



Homecoming turned out just the way it's supposed to be, as the Salado Eagles defeated the Florence Buffaloes 29-6 Oct. 17 on a great night for football.

The Eagles are now 4-3 overall and 1-1 in District 26-2A. Their next game is Oct. 24 at Hutto, which is coming off a 42-16 loss to league-leading Rogers.

Game time is 7:30 p.m. "They're pretty strong," Coach Joe Mullins said of the Hippos, 3-4 overall and 1-1 in district. "They've got some good athletes. I think we're pretty evenly matched. If we cut out our mistakes and penalties ..."

Coach Joe Mullins singled out the defense for its effort against Florence, which managed but 10 yards of total offense despite taking a 6-0 lead on the third play from scrimmage

Mitch Lindley, credited with eight tackles, was singled out as defensive player of the week.

Tackle David Kirk was named offensive player of the week. He led a line that helped the Eagles rush for 265 yards on 36 attempts, an average of more than seven yards per carry.

Taylor Hutton rushed for 151 yards on 16 carries to go over the 1,000-yard mark in rushing. He now has 1,107 yards on 152 carries, an average of 7.2 yards per carry.

His two touchdowns against Florence give him 16 for the season. He leads the team in scoring with 98 points.

John McLaughlin scored Salado's other two touchdowns. He gained 54 yards on eight carries and now has 569 yards rushing for the season on just 74 carries.

Steady quarterback Paul Mashburn completed three of seven passes for 43 yards. He threw two interceptions, matching the total he threw in the first six games.

Paul Lucas caught two passes for 18 yards, giving him a team-high 11 receptions worth 146 yards for the year.

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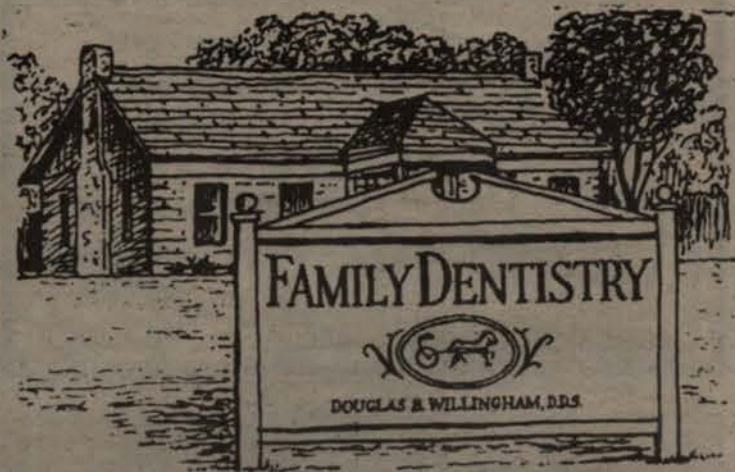
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Grace Baptist Church to celebrate fall with 'Radical Harvest' concert Nov. 1

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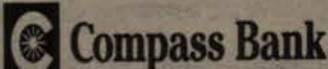
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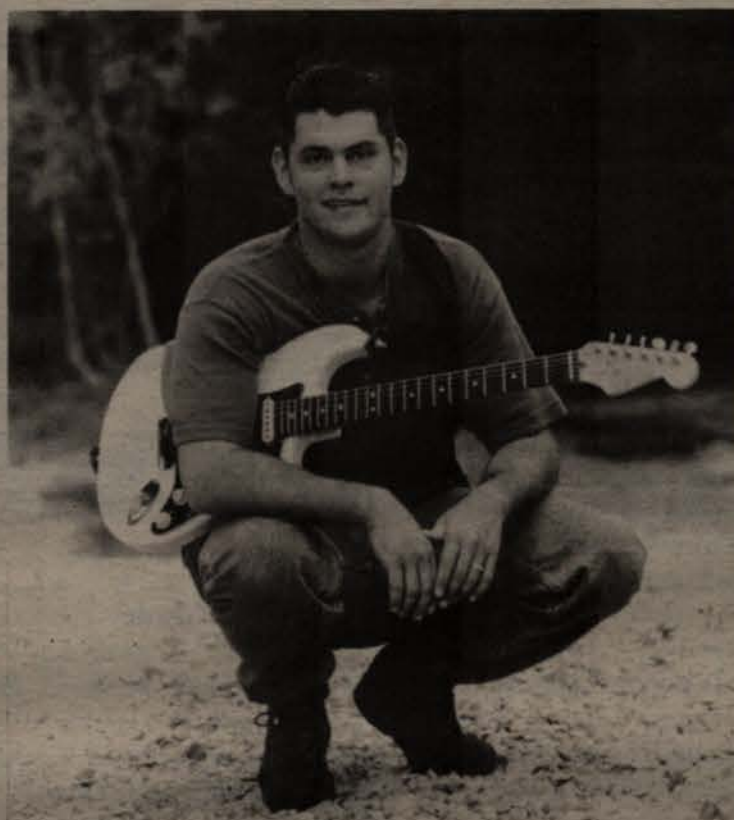

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Wildlife personnel with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department recently completed annual deer population surveys here in Bell County. The counts resulted in an estimate of 65 deer per 1,000 acres or about 14,400 deer county wide.

This year in Bell County the deer season opens on Saturday, November 1, and runs through Sunday, January 4. All Bell County hunters and landowners need to make special note of the restricted deer bag limit that is in place again this year. Hunters and landowners west of IH-35 are limited to 3 deer, with no more than 1 deer with hardened antlers and no more than 2 antlerless deer in the bag for the entire hunting season. Special attention must be given to using the proper tag off of the hunting license on any deer harvested in Bell County this year. Doe permits or special doe tags will not be issued nor required to harvest antlerless deer west of IH-35. Hunters will need only the appropriate tag off of their hunting license, and landowner permission, to bag doe or antlerless deer west of IH-35.

East of IH-35 new deer

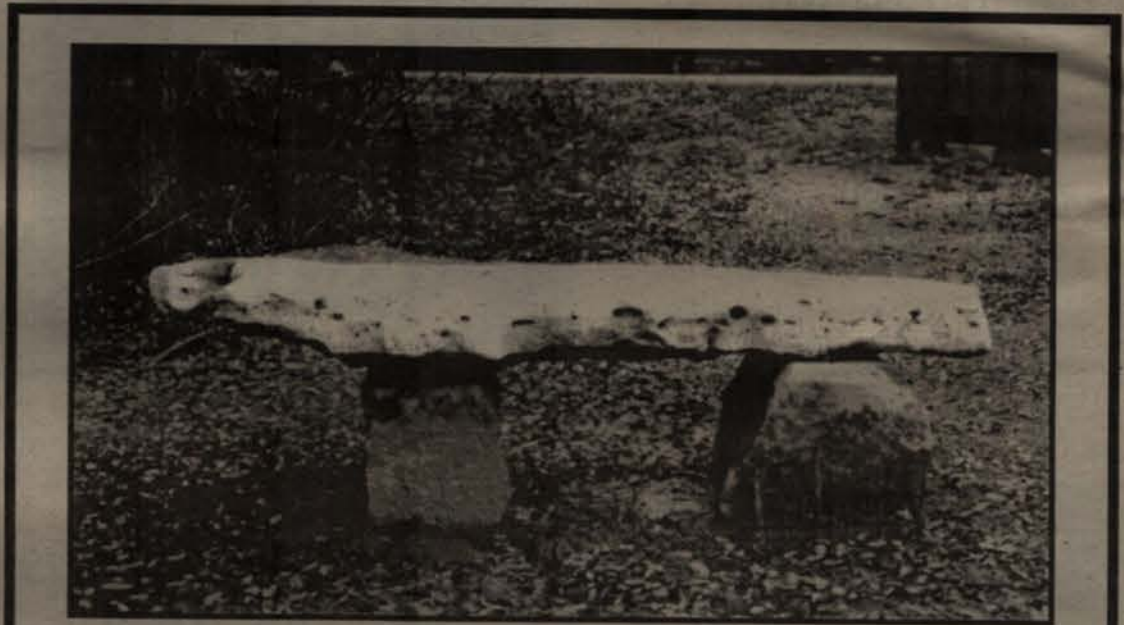
hunting regulations are in place. Hunters are limited to one deer with hardened antlers (one buck). Antlerless deer can be taken only with Managed Lands Deer Permits issued to the landowner. Landowners east of IH-35 that do have well established pockets of deer should contact local wildlife personnel (Dale Schmidt, 254/793-3979) or the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department main office in Austin, 1-800-792-1112, for assistance or for information on the Managed Lands Deer Permits program.

After reviewing the results of the recent deer population surveys, local wildlife personnel are recommending that Bell County landowners located west of IH-35 try for a harvest of one doe or antlerless deer for every 100 acres and one buck for every 500 acres. The recommended rates result from the need to better balance the sex ratio observed in the herd and from a desire to produce a healthier deer population that is properly matched to the existing supply of deer foods in the county.

These harvest rates are based on compartment aver-

ages derived from survey lines located in this and several other surrounding counties. Therefore, the recommended rates may not be completely suitable for each individual ranch in the county. In general, if your acreage shows signs of overpopulation (a lack of brush and weeds available at and just above ground level, less than optimal deer weights and poor quality buck antler development within each age class, low fawn survival, etc.), then you probably need to harvest your deer population at a higher rate and/or reduce live-stock grazing pressure by reducing numbers or rotating your stock. On the other hand, if you have good deer habitat and an adequate supply of quality deer foods available, but seem to be short on deer numbers, then possibly, you should harvest at a lighter rate than that recommended for the county.

Landowners interested in closely managing their local deer herd need to conduct own on-site fall population surveys, with resulting harvest recommendations that meet their specific management objectives.

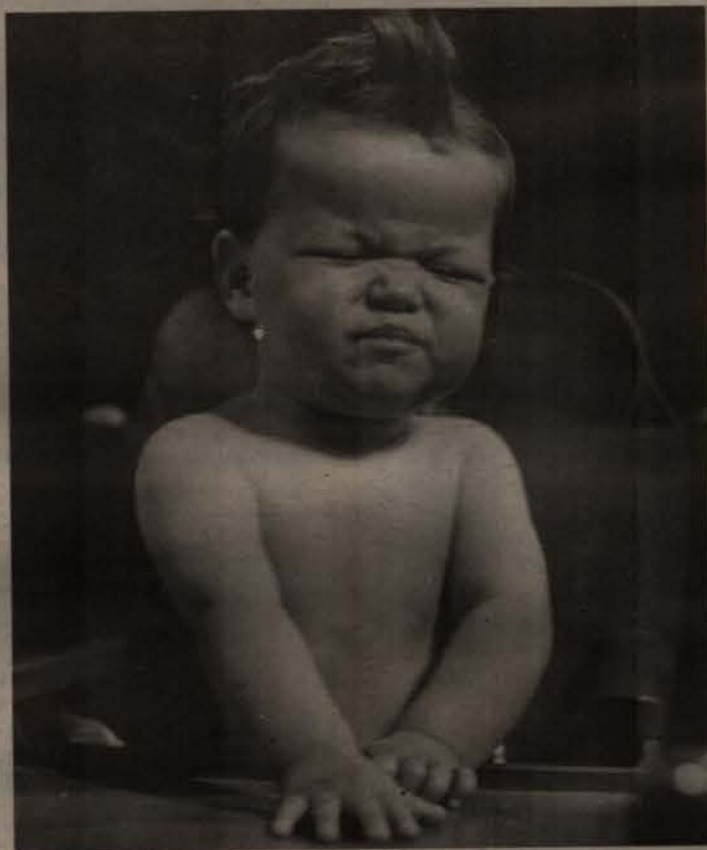

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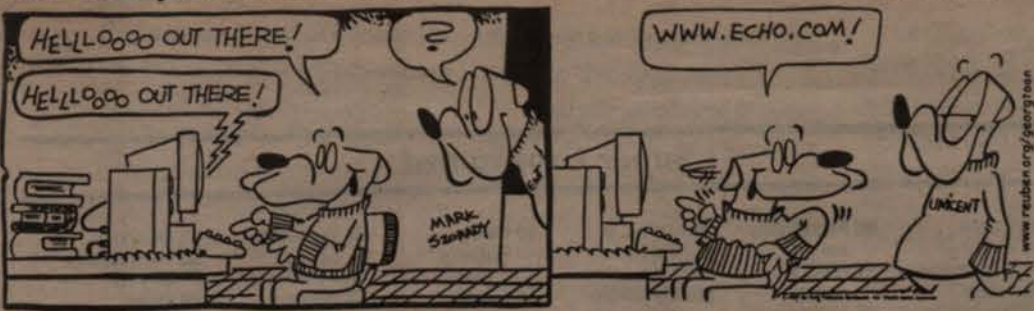

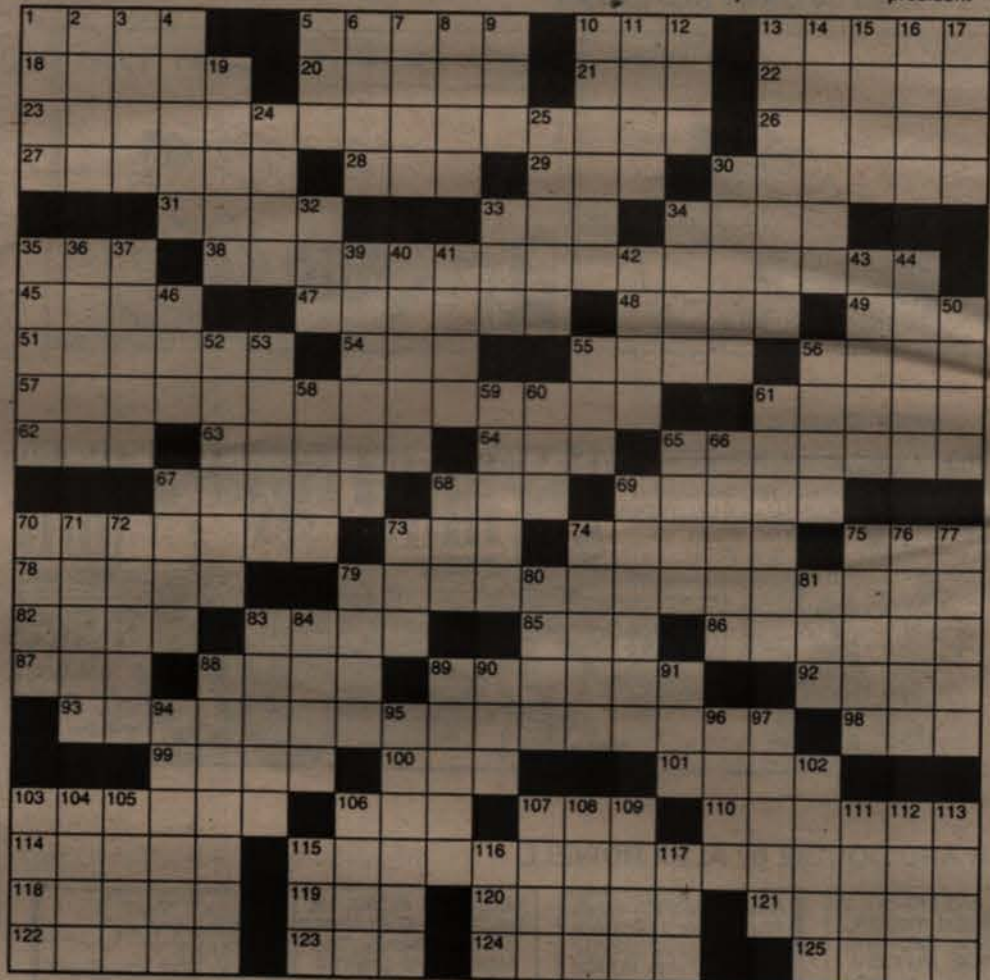

The JV (8-8, 2-1) lost to Academy 11-15, 15-11, 15-8, after beating Holland.



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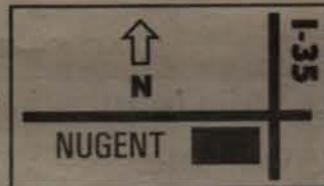

Village Potter's story was a Dunn deal from the start

Once upon a time in the village of Salado lived a family that pulled together for the sake of survival.

It is a story about pursuing a dream, starting a business and ultimately, wishing for a happy ending.

It is a story of a pastor, a potter and their precious children.

Four years ago, the Dunn family of Salado gave up the security that comes with being a pastor's family and chucked it for the uncertainty of a potter's clan.

Husband Rick and wife Titia (Tee'sha) had four children to raise: Emily, now 7, Joshua, who's 12, and twins Amie and Jocelyn, who are now 19-year-old students at Temple College.

If four kids weren't enough motivation to succeed, what was? As Rick explained, "A suspension bridge has to have tension or it collapses. A father of four has automatic tension."

If now wasn't the time to throw caution to the wind, when would it be?

Next week? Next month? Next year? Never?

They knew of a building in a prime spot on Main Street that was for sale -- at a price that made their head spin. But when their offer for a lesser amount was accepted, they couldn't believe their luck.

If ever there was a "Dunn deal," this was it.

Thus was born the Village Potter, located a stone's throw from the walk bridge on Main Street between Village Boutique and Dr. Doug Willingham's Family Dentistry office.

"This was a tremendous leap of faith," Rick said, sitting on one of the benches outside the business on a gorgeous fall day recently.

The business opened its front door on Sept. 29, 1993. Then the fun began.

Their first mortgage payment was due the following month, and they didn't have the money to pay it.

That's when friends -- and even strangers -- came through in the clutch. People would come to the shop with \$100 in their hands and drive off with-

out so much as a name attached to the money.

To say they've come a long way during the past four years would be an understatement.

"To see where it has come to where it is now ..." Rick said, sounding somewhat amazed.

Two years after opening the business, the family made about 20,000 pieces of pottery. This year, the business will make about 35,000 pieces and go through 24 tons of clay.

Two years ago, the family was living at the shop, squeezing into a 500-square-foot room and sharing a single bathroom. They have since bought a home in Mill Creek.

They are also paying back those who helped them -- although some have declined to be paid back, considering their help a gift.

"I'm thankful our friends helped us achieve our dream," Titia said.

It was her lifelong ambition to open a pottery shop, and she and Rick were encouraged to do so by George Holland, the former owner of Salado Pottery (next to the Stagecoach

Inn restaurant).

Titia had received a B.S. degree in art from Harding University, in Searcy Ark. That's where she met Rick, who was attending the School of Religion and Ministry.

They made their way to Texas when Rick came to Temple to pastor a church.

Had you told him that he would eventually leave the church to form clay with his hands, he might have given you that funny look of his.

But he enjoys the challenge and "instant gratification" that comes with taking five pounds of clay, slapping it down on a potter's wheel and creating something useful and beautiful in a matter of minutes.

"I enjoy that," he said.

Village Potter offers high quality stoneware pottery and gift items. There are candles, wine racks, a full line of Telavera earthenware pottery, handmade herbal soups, Raku pottery, hand burnished and pit-fired pottery.

They also specialize in pottery "custom made to order."

MREs: Battlefield Gourmets

I made a speech at the Fort Hood Officers' Wives Club the other day. It was a great occasion. All sorts of prizes were given out for different reasons and everybody got a bag full of goodies. One of those goodies was a little booklet called THE UNOFFICIAL MRE RECIPE BOOKLET.

MRE stands for Meal Ready to Eat. Some of the enticing recipes include Mail Call Stew, Camouflaged Franks, Assault 'N' Pepper Creamed Turkey, Foxhole Hash, Battlefield Beans, Firing Line Fruitcake, Ham Grenades, Victory Pot Pie and Peanut Butter Cannon Balls. A supplement called the Desert Storm Edition includes these: At Ease Omelet, Scud Buster Stew, Stealth Bomber Tuna and Hash Mark Ham.

Throughout military history, savvy commanders have known that an army marches on its stomach. Just as the tools of battle have changed over the centuries, so have the means of feeding the troops.

A Roman legionnaire "worth his salt" received a portion of the precious condiment as part of his pay. If he was more interested in gold-bricking than conquering, his salt ration was withheld.

In medieval times, a knight-at-arms was expected to provide men and equipment for the king's quests out of his own pocket. If he were stingy with food, grumbling peasant conscripts, unhappy with the menu, simply laid down their arms and went home to the farm.

Napoleon's bold campaign strategies called for his soldiers to forage for themselves while staying close enough to come running if things heated up. When he was nearly defeated while his troops were out raiding chicken coops, he decided something had to be done about feeding the fighting men.

He put up 100,000 francs as

a prize for the solution to the problem. That led to the invention of canning. A French confectioner, Nicholas Appert, preserved food in champagne bottles, using heat to sterilize the food so it would keep for long periods. Englishman John Gamble took the idea a step further and preserved foods in tin cans, which were much handier for military use.

For the American soldier from the Revolutionary War through the Civil War, the basic ration was simple and unchanging: meat, bread and beans. By World War One, canned foods were in general use by America's doughboys. Improvements led to the famed C-Ration so familiar to American Armed Forces from W.W.II to the present. With his steel helmet for a saucepan, the foxhole chef concocted

highly imaginable meals.

The Space Age has changed the way the American GI dines in the field. The steel pot has been replaced with lighter, safer headgear and C-Rations have been replaced by the nutrition-rich, highly versatile MRE. They can be eaten just as they are or combined with water and heated in a canteen cup. Some can be heated right in the pouch.

The American soldier is the best trained, best equipped, best fed trooper in the world. Although the supplies he carries may change with the times, he'll always bring his native GI ingenuity to mealtime. He recones the area, appropriating goods such as bird eggs, ripe fruits, wild vegetables or edible critters to spice up his menu. Some Tabasco sauce helps.
