Dr. Ervin resigns as SISD superintendent

Salado ISD Superintendent Steven Ervin resigned his position effective June 30, 1998, after receiving a three-year contract extension and \$5,000 per year increase from the board of trustees Nov. 4.

"I am requesting that you accept my resignation as Superintendent effective June 30, 1998, and that you allow me to take paid leave beginning December 1, 1997," Supt. Ervin stated in his Nov. 4 letter to the SISD Board President Sara Mackie. "I will be available to the Board and the administration as needed and will continue my positive support for the Salado Independent School District."

"I have enjoyed working for the Salado Independent School istrict. The last seven years have passed quickly. Our community, our school and everything we love about Salado has grown. We have been able to retain outstanding teachers and administrators and have the finest group of students in the state. I encourage you and other trustees to continue to put the students first in your decisions," Ervin stated in his letter.

Following a short executive session Nov. 4, the board voted unanimously on a motion by Juana K. Preston to extend the superintendent's contract three years to June 30, 2001 and to increase superintendent's pay by \$5,000 annually beginning Nov. 5. The motion received a second by Mike Gunter.

After awarding the contract extension, the board accepted Ervin's resignation.

On a motion from Rita Brown, the board voted to approve an agreement between the board and the superintendent, accepted Ervin's resignation, granted Ervin vacation Nov. 5-30 and paid leave of absence beginning Dec. 1. The motion received a second from Preston and carried unanimously.

"The board supports him in his decision to resign and move on in his career," said Salado ISD Board President Sara Mackie. "We appreciate his years of service to the district

and the community and commend him for the many positive things accomplished during his tenure. We wish him well in his new endeavors. We also appreciate his willingness and graciousness to make this a smooth transition and to be available to the board and district as needed."

Thomas Arnold Elementary principal Rod Stockstill will serve as acting superintendent until an interim superintendent can be found by the board.

"Mr. Stockstill was persuaded by the board to serve as acting superintendent." Mackie said. "He iterated to us that he is not interested in applying for the position and wants to remain elementary principal."

The board may conduct interviews for an interim superintendent as early as this week.

We hope to have an interim superintendent in place before the end of the year so that the search can continue for a permanent superintendent," Mackie said.

In the search for a permanent superintendent, Mackie said that the board plans to "involve the community and faculty in finding their opinions of what they want in a superintendent."

Mackie said that she feels that the situation will have no effect on the current building program.

"All of the major principals in the building program are already in place," she said. "We will sell the bonds this week and open the bids on replacing the elementary roof Wednesday (Nov. 12). Next week, we will approve the construction design. Between now and April, the architects will be busy drawing plans so that construction can begin in the late Spring. There should not be much interaction involving the superintendent during this time. It's conceivable that we may have a permanent superintendent in place before major construction begins."

Ervin told the Salado Village Voice that he plans on remaining in Salado. "We hope to stay involved in all the community activities, including the \$5 per person, will include schools," he said.

Pulitzer Prize-winning poet Wilbur giving presentation here Nov. 15-16

U.S. Poet Laureate and the winner of two Pulitzer Prizes, will make two presentations in Salado Nov. 15-16.

Wilbur will lead a seminar at the Allen House, 10 a.m.-3:30 p.m. Nov. 15 on "The Use of Poetry: What it May Do for the Poet, the Reader, and Their Society."

At 4 p.m. Nov. 16, he will read poetry and provide informal commentary at the Mill Creek Country Club. His presentation will be followed by discussion and a buffet dinner.

The weekend program will conclude the fall series on "The Person and the Collective" sponsored by the Institute for the Humanities at Salado.

Wilbur is also a translator, a teacher, a Broadway lyricist, an editor and an author of children's books.

In the five decades since the publication of his first volume, "The Beautiful Changes" (1947), Wilbur's poetry has won many honors. In addition to the two Pulitzer Prizes (1957, 1989), he has received

Richard Wilbur, the second the National Book Award. His other poetry titles include "Ceremony," "Things of This World," "Advice to a Prophet," "Walking to Sleep," "The Mind Reader," and "New and Collected Poems."

> As a translator, Wilbur's major work has been the rendition of the plays of Moliere and Racine into rhymed couplets. These plays -- the most popular being Moliere's "Misanthrope" and "Tartuffe" have won the Bollingen and PEN translation prizes, and have been widely produced in New York, London and regional theaters.

> In 1956, Wilbur collaborated with Lillian Hellman and Leonard Bernstein, writing the lyrics of the comic opera "Candide." His books for children include "Loudmouse," "Opposites," and "More Oppo-

> Wilbur was born in New York City. He grew up on a farm in New Jersey, attended Amherst College and served in Africa, Southern France and Italy as a cryptographer in the

TEXAS POINTS THE WAY TOWARD MEETING ENVIRONMENTAL CHALLENGES

hen it comes to the environment, an ounce of prevention turns out to be worth more than a pound of cure.

They're the marketone helder impossible laws that have been

That's the message behind innovative laws that have been approved by Texas and 22 other states. These environmental audit laws encourage cooperation and incentives for business to protect the environment.

Under Texas' environmental audit law, companies are given incentives to assess their own environmental compliance and take corrective action. Rather than playing a waiting game for state regulators to find environmental violations, companies will find — and stop — violations.

This arrangement is based on the common sense assumption that everyone, including business and industry, has a vested interest in clear skies, clean water and a safe environment. Instead of a game of "gotcha," the private and public sectors in our state are working together to strengthen environmental protection efforts.

I have introduced legislation, the Environmental Protection Partnership Act, that will apply this environmental audit system to federal regulation efforts. Under my bill, if a company voluntarily completes an environmental audit — a thorough review of its compliance with environmental law — government may not turn around and use the audit report against that company in court. This will encourage companies to look for, find and remedy problems, rather than wait for the heavy hand of the regulator to descend upon them.

In addition, if a company performs an audit, promptly corrects any violations and reports this to the Environmental Protection Agency, that company will not be penalized for its violations. By ensuring companies that they will not be dragged into court for being honest, the bill encourages both compliance and reporting.

Environmental audits do not mean companies that pollute will go scotfree. My bill in no way protects willful violators, those that do not promptly address violations or those trying to evade investigation. But the cooperative approach will free the EPA to target enforcement dollars on the "bad actors" — those who intentionally pollute.

The bill also directs federal agencies to assist small businesses (which typically have fewer resources) to develop in-house compliance systems for performing voluntary self evaluations.

Businesses need to play an active role in environmental protection. This legislation will make companies active partners with the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in assuring compliance with the law.

The EPA itself has acknowledged the necessity of such an approach. In a recent policy statement, the EPA pointed out that, "because government resources are limited, maximum compliance cannot be achieved without active efforts by the regulated community to police themselves."

Texas and the 22 other states which have passed environmental audit laws are encouraging companies to be "good actors" and play a positive role in environmental protection. In the Lone Star state, hundreds of companies have carried out voluntary environmental audits, correcting countless violations in the process. These are corrected violations that the EPA and state regulatory officials may or may not have discovered. Other states tell similar success stories.

We have made monumental strides in cleaning up the environment over the past 30 years. Our air, water and soil are far cleaner now than they were when we first rolled up our sleeves and went to work. The Environmental Protection Partnership Act will allow us to build on those gains, and engage industry more fully in protecting the environment.

317 Saladoans vote on amendments

A total of 317 Saladoans went to the polls last week and approved all 14 of the proposed amendments to the state constitution. This number represented a less than modest 14 percent of the registered voters in the Salado voting precinct while at the same time comparing favorably with the dismal 10 percent showing across the state.

Despite the low turnout, local voters showed a major interest in two of the big pocketbook issues on the ballot including amendment two that will give the legislature authority to pass laws requiring tax appraisal districts to cap annual increases in homestead values at 10 percent.

Saladoans cast 249 yes votes out of 299 cast (83 percent) for this constitutional change, which was slightly higher than the 76 percent approval statewide.

Another big-buck issue, approved by a tight margin here in Salado (156 to 148), was the home equity lending amendment. This controversial plan was OK¹d by a wide 60-40 percent when all state returns were tabulated.

STATE VOTE

Unlike Salado, Texans turned down Amendment One that dealt with allowing municipal judges to hold more than one elective job at a time. Observers of the election opined that most folks felt this had the smell of "double dipping" that would unduly enrich full time large city judges when in fact it was designed to allow small towns to share qualified jurists who work on a part time basis only.

Just a matter of not getting the message out to folks across the state. Saladoans appeared to have had a good handle on this and the other

part of villagers far in excess of the public in general.

Amendment Six also went down the statewide tube by less than one percent of the million-plus votes cast on November 4. This scant margin indicates one of two things either folks didn't know what the measure was all about or they were sending a message to lawmakers to take another look at the wisdom of creating the Texas Growth Fund in the first place.

The proposed change would have deleted a restriction relating to trade with South Africa and Namibia over apartheid.

This is the second time in two years that Texans have dropped this idea in the soup, so it cannot just be ignorance on the part of the electorate.

This writer thinks it was a renunciation of allowing money from the permanent school fund and the two state retirement systems to be invested in small start-up businesses that cannot get their hands on money through normal lending sources.

New small business entities in Texas have a current failure rate of 80 percent.

Not much to recommend them for investments of state retirement and education dollars. This entire Growth Fund needs to be deep-sixed before we get in a financial mess that only mass infusions of tax dollars can resolve. Sooner the better





Eagles win final game of year, 37-0

Running back Taylor Hutton rushed for 344 yards and four touchdowns as the Salado Eagles wrapped up the 1997 football season Nov. 7 with a 37-0 road win over the Holland Hornets.

The Eagles end the season with a 6-4 record and finish third in District 26-2A with a 3-2 mark. Holland (7-3) finished fourth at 2-3.

Rogers (5-0) and Hutto (4-1) will represent the district in the state playoffs.

Hutton's performance earned him the Offensive Player of the Week award. The 200-pound junior scored on runs of 35, 72, 6 and 68 yards.

He finished the season with 1,717 yards rushing and 23 touchdowns.

First-year Coach Joe Mullins didn't know if those totals were school records, but they were certainly the best in his approximately five years at the school.

"He had a great game. He's played like that all year. He had some excellent blocking," Mullins said, noting that lineman John Woolard made a good block on a sweep that went for a long touchdown against Holland.

Woolard was also named Defensive Player of the Week after being credited with nine tackles. The 6-4, 265-pound nose guard finished the season with nearly 130 tackles.

"I bet there's not another noseguard in the state with more (tackles)," Mullins said.

Mullins said he wasn't surprised by the Eagles' dominating effort against the Hornets.

"I had no doubt they would play hard and have a good game, and they did," he said. "They played a great game, played hard and gave a hundred percent effort for four quarters."

Nine months have passed since the Salado High Lady Eagles ended their basketball season on a low note.

This season, the Lady Eagles hope to avoid the key of D(efeat) as much as possible by hitting the high notes.

Not hitting their shots was the reason for the past season ending on a downer. Salado couldn't lease a bucket (much less buy one) during the second half of a 42-36 loss to the state playoffs.

Matthews was the team's No. 4 scorer, averaging 7.4 points a game. She was also third in assists (68) and third in steals (56).



Writer hikes to 'most beautiful spot in Texas'

We did it again.

For about the fourth time we hiked McKittrrick Canyon in the Guadalupe Mountains National Park. It was the second time we walked all the way to "the notch," on McKittrick Ridge, which gives the climber a view into an area called "the bowl." It's like looking into another world.

Most people do the sensible thing: hike to the Pratt cabin or the grotto, take a nice break, then return to the visitors center. Not us. We have to go all the way. The hike to the notch takes nearly four hours one way. The last mile or so is nearly straight up.

But it's worth the trip. McKittrick Canyon has been called "the most beautiful spot in Texas."

Guadalupe Mountains National Park is celebrating its 25th anniversary this year. The park's name comes from a legend that says a beautiful Spanish girl was taken from her village by raiding Indians who hid her deep in the mountains. According to the tale, her name was Guadalupe.

There are stories of gold in the mountains told by Indians and early explorers.

The serpentine route of McKittrick Creek creates conditions for an unusual variety

of plants: wildflowers, agave, prickly pear, alligator juniper, madrone, ponderosa pine, oak and maple trees. That's right. Maple. Toward the end of October the canyon is ablaze with every color you find in a

New England autumn. Wildlife includes coyote, mule deer, elk, cougar, golden eagles, peregrine falcons and rainbow trout.

McKittrick has been home to many species which are now extinct. It was once home to the saber-tooth tiger, the mastodon and the giant ground sloth. Prehistoric hunters preyed on pronghorn and camel. Grizzly bears, wolves and the mighty bison roamed the area.

McKittrick is named for Felix McKittrick, who raised cattle in the area in the 1870's. It has been inhabited by humans for 12,000 years. Indians hunted and grazed in the area until Army troops began to explore the area in 1849.

In the summer of 1921, Wallace Pratt, a young geologist for Humble Oil Company, was anxious to find a place to settle down after traveling the world searching for oil. He went to McKittrick because he had heard of its beauty. He established a ranch in the canyon and stayed there 50 years. He built a stone cabin that today serves as a rest area for hikers. Smooth, flat rocks found in the mountains provided material not only for the walls but for the roof as well. Local cowboys helped build the cabin. With ropes tied on the horns of their saddles, they pulled the rock slabs up wooden ramps and put them into place.

In 1957 the Pratt family donated more than 5,000 acres of the ranch to the US Government for the beginnings of the park. That land, along with 70,000 acres purchased from the J. C. Hunter Ranch, make up most of the park.





doors and outer shutter doors.

Brick was manufactured in Virginia, utilizing the same clay employed in the 18th Century.

The interior is contemporary classical with cornice, chair-rails and balusters. Much of the mill work replicates that found in historic restorations in Williamsburg and colors are true to colonial times.

Children quite suspectible to dangers of secondhand smoke

Children are the most susceptible to, and the innocent victims of, secondhand smoke.

Secondhand smoke is defined as a mixture of the smoke given off by the burning end of a cigarette, pipe or cigar, and the smoke exhaled from the lungs of a smoker.

Smoking, or frequenting establishments that permit smoking, means exposing your children to many of the 4,000 chemicals found in cigarette, pipe or cigar smoke.

Here are some facts on secondhand smoke:

-- The Environmental Pro-

tection Agency has classified secondhand smoke as a Group A carcinogen (known to cause cancer in humans). There are at least 43 chemicals in seccause cancer.

-- Forty-three percent of U.S. children aged 2 months to 11 years live in homes with at least one smoker.

-- Every time a child inhales smoke-filled air he draws chemicals such as cadmium (a cancer-causing metallic element), ammonia (used in toilet cleaners), benzene (used in

etone (a powerful solvent), formaldehyde (a component of embalming fluid), and carbon monoxide.

-- Each year, mothers who ondhand smoke known to smoke at least 10 cigarettes a day can cause between 8,000 and 26,000 new cases of asthma among their children.

> - Each year, exposure to secondhand smoke causes 150,000 to 300,000 lower respiratory tract infections such as pneumonia and bronchitis in infants and children younger than 18 months. These infections result in 7,500 to 15,000 hospitalizations yearly.

-- Secondhand smoke also can irritate the lungs, leading to coughing, excess phlegm, chest discomfort and reduced lung capacity.

- About 6,200 children die each year in the U.S. as a result of parental smoking; 2,800 deaths are linked to low birth weights caused by smoking while pregnant; 2,000 deaths are attributed to Sudden Death Infant Syndrome (SIDS): 1,100 deaths are caused by respiratory infections; 250 deaths are caused by burns from fires caused by cigarettes, matches or lighters; and 14 deaths are caused by asthma.

- A recent two-year study of over 350,000 live births in England found that Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS) could be reduced by as much as two-thirds if parents did not smoke. For every hour an infant spends each day in a room where people smoke, the risk of SIDS doubles compared to infants who are in smoke-free environments. An infant exposed to outdoor environmental tobacco smoke for four hours each day is four times as likely to die of SIDS as a nonexposed child.

-- Each year, secondhand smoke kills approximately 53,000, the same number of Americans killed in the Vietnam War.


