Should you invest in stocks?

If you're an investor, you may have heard that stocks usually outperform other types of investments over time. But if you've never invested in stocks, or If you're not a regular investor, perhaps you're reluctant to invest because you don't really understand the benefits and risks of stock ownership. The following questions and answers might help you better understand why you might want to invest some of your money in stocks

Why do people buy stocks?

Some people buy stocks for an extra source of income. Others buy stocks hoping that their investments will grow. Many other investors buy stocks hoping that their investments will grow. Many other investors buy stocks because they want to participate in the growth and prosperity of American business, and, over time, stocks have proven to be a wise choice for the long-

Should you buy stocks?

If you believe in the future prosper-ity of American business and are willing and able to share the risks as well as the potential rewards of stock ownership, then you should consider buying stock. However, before you buy, be certain that you have a steady income, adequate insurance and ample savings-including cash in the bank-to take care of family emergencies. Earmark a portion of your "discretionary" funds to invest in stocks.

What common mistakes do new

Many people who buy stocks for the first time simply expect too much too soon. They expect stocks to pay a big dividend, increase rapidly in value and have no risk attached. This is far too much to expect from one investment. New investors also often buy stocks with the notion that they will get rick quick. This isn't investing, it's speculat-

Which stocks should you choose? You should choose stocks based on your financial objectives. Thousands of

different stocks are listed on the New York Stock Exchange, the American Stock Exchange and the over-the-

counter market. They range from con-servative to speculative. The amount of dividends these stocks pay varies as well. But before you buy, determine your objectives, then invest accordingly. As with any investment, different stocks are accompanied by varying degrees of risk. You should consider the risks when choosing your investments. When is the best time to buy?

There isn't a "best" time to buy stocks. Normally, an investor thinks a stock is a good "buy" when it reaches the price he or she is willing to pay for it; but only the future performance of the stock will verify this judgment. Not even the most experienced market analysts know what will happen in tomorrow's

One of the best ways to avoid guessing the future is to invest in stocks through "dollar cost averaging." With this method, you invest a constant dollar amount at regular intervals (usually monthly or quarterly). Through this strategy, you buy more of your investment when prices are low and less when prices are high. Thus, your average share price is lower than it would be if you bought the stocks at random times.

Of course, dollar cost averaging does not guarantee that the stocks you buy will increase in value or protect against loss in a declining market. Investors contemplating such a strategy should consider their ability to continue to make purchases through periods of low

If you think you might want to invest in stocks, your first task is to identify your financial goals. Then ask ques-tions and read as much as you can about the risks and rewards of stock investing, Your best strategy is know as much as possible about an investment before you buy it.
