Be sure you're properly registered to vote in Jan. incorporation election

You must live within the boundaries proposed for incorporation in order to vote in the incorporation election set for January 1996. A two square mile area has been drawn by the Central Texas Council of Governments as part of their contract to prepare the plat and census for the election.

The map was shown to those attending the Annual Salado Historical Society General Membership meeting last week and will be displayed in public places throughout the village.

Also, in order to v the election, those living within the proposed boundaries must show their residence address on their voter's registration cards.

Those persons whose voter's registration cards show a P.O. box number

will not be allowed to vote, unless they re-register at least 30 days before the election.

"Please examine your card," said MaryBelle Brown, who is a deputy voter registrar for Bell County. "If it does not list your residence address, you must re-register in order to vote in the incorporation election."

Also, new residents are encouraged to re-register to be eligible to vote in the incorporation.

The incorporation election will likely be set for Jan. 20, 1996. In order to vote in that election, residents must be registered by Dec. 19, 1995.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK: When all non-essential federal workers were furloughed last week during the budget battle - how come Congress stayed in ses-

ANSWER: They have to keep practicing (day and night) whatever it is they do- until they get it right!

The above was overheard at a recent meeting of the local "Do-No-Gooders" who were having coffee and discussing the state of our national politics. None of these observers of obfuscation could tell the difference between having the government open or closed but certainly wondered why there are so many "non-essential" workers on the payroll.

HIGHWAYS IN TROUBLE

December 18, a scant 26 days away, is the deadline given to the federal government to come up with rules and regulations that will govern truck traffic coming out of Mexico and Canada as a result of the North American Free a 30 year life span - now Trade Agreement.

The NAFTA treaty stipulates that on that December date, trucks from Mexico will have complete access to Texas and federal roadways thus allowing these mostly unsafe

and over-weight vehicles freedom to travel through our towns and major cities at all hours of the day and

Big problem is the weight limit on these foreign haulers. Mexican trucks can carry up to 170,000 pounds of cargo while the American capacity is 80,000 pounds on interstate lanes (84,000 on Texas roads). The potential road damage that can be done by these overweight carriers is expected to be huge and costly.

Local District Highway Engineer Kirby Pickett told this column last week that even though our current highways have 60 percent more reinforced concrete than in previous years (up to 14 inches today) our roadway system cannot hold up to the heavier Mexican and some Canadian

Roads that used to have face replacement in eight years!

Figuring the cost of highay construction at \$350,000 per mile for replacement-repair-it is easy to see that the new NAFTA plan is going to cost someone a pile of dough.

Just who that "someone" is going to be, is not hard to fathom. The federal government - under current congressional direction, plans to eventually send fewer highway dollars to the States, but will require the same (current) degree of safety, repair and maintenance - thus mandating States to cough up the added dollars to "keep 'em

Texas will have to eventually add billions more to its' biennial budget for highway construction and maintenance. All coming from Lone Startaxpayers who in turn will see little if any financial return from trucks roaring through the State at an average speed of 77 miles per hour!

AG WARNS OF BIGGER PROBLEMS

Texas Attorney General Dan Morales spoke and wrote on this very same subject in recent days noting that above and beyond the deterioration to our highways there is an even greater danger to life and limb looming, as unregulated foreign trucks hit our roads at high speeds.


Many of the heavy carriers will be loaded with dangerous material including corrosives, chemicals, explosives, jet fuel, toxic waste, pesticides and of course illegal drugs of all

If, and when, Congress gets around to passing some rules and regulations concerning these foreign carriers, they will face plenty of pressure from domestic industrial importers and profiteers as well as international lenders who have a high stakes interest and investment in the forthcoming Mexican adventure called "free

Too many stringent transit rules might cut into the profit margin say observers of this international free-for-all.

Aside from profits and pressure - tough rules will be needed since foreign trucks are not as safely maintained nor are their drivers as well trained, insured or controlled insofar as hours they may drive, training they must have and licensing they must secure in order to handle the giant behemoths that will be a common sight as they roar through Salado and other areas of the State.

Even if the Congress does pass regulations that will force foreign truckers to abide by the same rules as domestic carriers there is the problem of enforcement.

The Department of Public Safety has the manpower, right now, to stop and inspect a handful of trucks each day at our Tex-Mex border crossings.

Do you have any idea how many trucks will be heading north after December 18? Ten thousand per day!

Today, the DPS has only enough troopers to inspect incoming short haul trucks at the rate of 150 per day (out of some 5000 crossing the border during that same time period).

These inspectors have discovered that only five percent of trucks checked can pass a minimum safety test related to brakes, tires, shocks with none of the drivers coming even close to meeting state or federal long haul standards.

SPEED AND SUPER CORRIDORS

There are two additionally important highway items currently in the mill at State level.

First - Texas Highway Department Commissioners have already approved and issued the "Minute Order" to hike the speed limit to 70 mph immediately after Congress says larly IH 35. okay.

Needless to say this will have little effect on current truck speeds, since they travel right now, on average, 77 miles per hour with apparent immunity.

The actual speed limit for trucks in the Texas is 55 mph during the day and 50 at night. (How's that for a joke - trucks traveling at a posted speed limit!)

This, of course, flies in the face of a statewide survey of Texas drivers indicating that over 70 percent do not want the speed limit raised!

This higher speed limit will have an impact not only on roadway destruction but also on the carnage that will no doubt take place after the NAFTA traffic gets in full, and high speed, swing.

Engineer Pickett also mentioned that there is a study underway to see what the costs and other problems might surround construction of a parallel supercorridor near the current interstates - particu-

Few, if any, highway experts doubt that it would be cheaper to build "truck only" super highways, compared to doubling the current interstate lanes. And certainly would give passenger cars a bit of a break when everything else breaks lose after highspeed, overweight, unsafe foreign trucks are added to our domestic carriers as they race up and down our crumbling high-

We might want to recall what our old jug-eared friend from Dallas - Ross Perot -had to say about NAFTA: "Jobs will be lost. Highways will be destroyed. Taxpayers will pay the same price for goods while footing the cleanup bill with no resulting gain to anyone in America, other than those profiting from cheap Mexican labor."

That's -30-

Food safety tips given to make holidays merry

by Ilene C. Miller

To make your holidays merry and safe, follow these food safety tips.

Q. Whatshould I do? I put a 20-pound turkey in a 200 degree oven before I went to bed last night, and the pop-up timer says it's already done at 7:30 this morning. We won't be eating until 3 p.m.

A. You have two problems here. First, overnight cooking of meat low temperature isn't a safe method so we don't recommend using this turkey. It's not safe to cook any meat or poultry in an oven set lower than 325 degrees. At 200 degrees meat remains in the "Danger Zone" (between 40 degrees and 140 degrees.) where bacteria multiply rapidly and can form toxins.

Secondly, holding a properly cooked turkey at a safe temperature (140 degrees or above) for more than a couple of hours will dry it out and ruin the quality. If a safely cooked turkey must be held from 7:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., it should be carved and refrigerated in shallow, loosely covered containers and served cold or reheated at mealtime.

Q. Ibaked some pumpkin pies over the weekend to serve for Thanksgiving. They've just been sitting on the counter. Should I have refrigerated them?

A. Yes. Foods made with eggs and milk such as pumpkin or custard pies and cheesecake must first be safely baked to at least 160 degrees. Then, they must be refrigerated after

baking. Eggs and milk have high protein and moisture content and when these baked products are left at room temperature, conditions are ripe for bacteria to multiply. It's not necessary to refrigerate most other holiday cakes, cookies or breads unless they have perishable filling or frosting.

Q. I roasted my holiday turkey yesterday and putitin the refrigerator. It isn't stuffed so I thought it was safe. Then my daughter said I shouldn't have refrigerated it whole. Is it safe to eat today?

A. We do not recommend you refrigerate a cooked turkey whole - it could take too long to cool down to a safe temperature. For optimal safety, you should have carved all the meat from the bones first. It's okay to leave the drumsticks, thighs and wings intact, if you prefer. Divide the meat into shallow containers. This is very important to ensure rapid, even cooling and quick reheating.







"You can lower the fat centent of gravy by spooning off all but a little of the drippings in the pan before starting to make the gravy,"said McAlister. She offers a simple preparation tip: Pour all the drippings into a container and put it in the freezer for 20 minutes while you let your turkey rest before carving. The solid fat that forms at the top can then be skimmed away, leaving only the lean goodies in the gravy. This process virtually eliminates fats from the gravy. You can then thicken with a little cornstarch, if you

Dessert- What's a holiday meal without pumpkin pie? Pumpkin pie contributes 75 percent of the adult daily requirement of vitamin A, 20 percent of fiber and 10 percent of iron and potassium. "In terms of nutrition, it's a standout," said McAlister. "However, be sure that your recipe goes light on the eggs and whipped

Cooking your food like the founding forefathers and foremothers may also reduce that modern-dayhorror--holiday weight gain. "Many people gain about six or seven extra pounds between Halloween and Super Bowl Sunday. Using these sensible guidlines for holiday meals can help you offset those added pounds," added Dr. Joseph.

Members of the Club, which celebrates its 15th anniversary in 1995, have also raised hundreds of thousands of dollars for the National Easter Seal Society.

While millions of Americans have collected the porcelain bisque figurines

for their inspirational mes-sages and collectibility, some people collect for investment reasons. Ac-cording to Kirkwood, a \$35 figurine can increase up to ten-times its original value on the secondary market.


