Patriot Games is an exciting rollercoaster ride through the halls of the CIA, down Ireland's battleweary streets and into secret war games camps in the

Based on Tom Clancy's novel of the same name, Patriot Games is the follow-up to his highly successful novel and movie The Hunt for Red October. Harrison Ford stars as Jack Ryan, a former Marine officer and CIA agent caught in a web of terrorist attacks and counterintelligence when he thwarts a kidnapping attempt while on vacation in England.

Ford is terrific in his role as an older and wiser Jack Ryan. But, then again, Ford is terrific in every movie in which he appears. Like fine wine, Ford has definitely become better with age. 


Dear Editor,

The Legislature has been meeting for almost one month and nothing has happened. Representatives from the House and Senate have overlooked a common problem, i.e. failure to communicate with school boards and superintendents. Two weeks ago state auditor Lawrence F. Alwin reported to the Legislative Audit Committee concerning 55 school districts throughout Texas. After reviewing the results of the school management audit, the gorvernor, lieutenant governor and house speaker directed Mr. Alwin to expand the project to all school districts in Texas. The timing of the news release will cause the current special session to fail.

Much has been made about administrative costs of various districts and if schools were consolidated almost \$650 million dollars would be saved. The audit reported a Goal for 93-94 school year was to have administrative costs of 23 percent of the instructional budget. If half of the school districts in Texas reduced their administrative budget next year the state would save \$99 million. However, in the Salado ISD the ratio of administrative costs to the instrucional budget is \$75,251 below average or only 18 percent. Yet when you look at the school districts that receive recognition it is because of good football or basketball programs, not on sound business practices. Salado continues to have the highest test scores in the county and will above the state averages. Since the beginning of TAAS testing the SISD has maintained an 86 percent mastery while the state average is 52 percent. Why is it that only low performing school districts are recognized for their gains in achievement?

Salado ISD continues to grow at a rate of 10 percent per year. Our enrollment has increased from 450 students five years ago to 629 students today. The village of Salado should be proud of the accomplishments of your schools. The next time you talk to a teacher, tell them how proud you are of a job well done.

Understanding Investment Risk

If you're searching for highervielding alternatives to today's CDs, be aware that to find such investments you will probably have to take on some additional investment risks. Taking risks means accepting the prospect that your investment results could be either greater than you expected or less than you anticipated.

Some degree of risk is inherent in every investment, but you shouldn't allow that to scare you away from investing. Rather, by understanding the types of potential risk you face, you can select the investments that are right for you. Here are definitions for common types of investment risk:

Credit Risk

The possibility that the entity issuing a security (e.g., a municipality or a corporation that issues a bond) may be incapable of meeting interest payments on a timely basis, or may fail to return the original investment amount on the stated maturiy

Market Risk

The possibility that the price of a security could rise or fall over time. For instance, when the entire stock market performs poorly, an individual stock may not perform well, despite the performance of the issuing company. Even when the entire market performs well, an individual stock may not necessarily perform well.

Interest Rate Risk

This is a form of market risk tied to interest rate movements. If the interest rate atmosphere significantly changes after you've purchased a bond, shares in a bond mutual fund or an interest ratesensitive stock, the resale value of the security will generally vary for this reason alone.

The value of such investments oves in an opposite direction from interest rate changes. For example, if interest rates rise, the value of a bond falls. This relationship occurs partly because when interest rates increase, the value of an existing, lower yielding bond becomes less attractive to new investors.

Generally, values of interest rate-sensitive stocks (specifically utility stocks) react in a similar manner, moving opposite to changes in overall interest rates. Reinvestment Risk

The possibility that the rate you will be offered when a CD or bond matures is markedly different--high er or lower -- than the rate you may receive today. For instance, three years ago you might have purchased a CD paying more than 9%; if you must renew that CD today for a three-year term, you might be offered less than 5%. Inflation risk

Inflation occurs when the general level of prices increases, causing your dollars to be worth less. When this happens, the original value of an investment, even if returned in full to the investor, won't buy as many goods as when the investment was purchased.

As stated earlier, you shouldn't allow risk to frighten you away from investing. Once you understand the different types of risk you face and know how much risk you can tolerate, you are in a good position to choose investments that meet your

And that's -30-

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
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
