Board examines answers to fund balance troubles

"It's not life-threatening, but it's scary," consultant Dr. Paul Fleming told Salado ISD Trustees during their regular meeting Dec. 15, discussing the state of the district's finances as information concerning state and local funding has come to light.

Trustees were informed of shortfalls in both state and local revenues in recent days. Paul Fleming and Becky Bunte, financial consultants to Salado ISD were frank in their discussion of the district's financial status.

The causes for this depletion are numerous and difficult to explain: "You are not the only ones to get into this boat, because state funding has gotten so complicated in the last few years," Dr. Fleming said.

State and Local **Funding Overestimated**

The school district received \$303,408 more in state funds for Average Daily Attendance than it should have.

The Texas Education Agency distributes state funds to schools based on ADA figures estimated two years in advance.

After actual ADA figures are reported to the state by the school, the difference in funds is corrected at the end of the

"Had the board known of the significant loss of income from the state it is likely that a far different budget and tax rate would have been passed in order to take into account the fact that the district had to repay the money during this fiscal year," school board president Sara Mackie stated.

The budget was approved based on \$2.08 million in state funds. However, SISD trustees were informed last month that the district would receive \$1.76 million in state funds this school year.

"Although the board was told two years ago of this overestimation and ultimate repayment, it was also told that the money had been set aside for the repayment," Mackie stated to the Salado Village Voice. "The board was never informed of the impending payback this fiscal year nor the need to take this into account when setting this year's tax rate and passing the budget."

"The district has money in the fund balance to cover most of this, but using it could put the district in a difficult position in future months because the fund balance would be almost depleted," Mackie stated

Bunte reported to the board that the 1997-98 budget miscalculated the amount of local revenues. The school district current year and prior year property tax balance to be collected is \$2,296,870, but the district adopted a budget allocating \$2,363,141 in local property taxes to be collected, a difference of \$66,271.

The budget was adopted at 100 percent collection of taxes in the district. A more realistic collection rate of 95 percent for current year and 50 percent for prior year will result in collection of \$2,144,423 in local revenues, about \$218,718 less than budgeted for the year.

Of this potential deficit in local tax revenues, \$184,658 comes from the general fund. Another \$34,060 would come from the debt service budget. However, the deficit in the debt service budget is offset by \$71,755 in revenues for the Instructional Facilities Grant the district qualified for after passing the recent bond issue.

These deficits in funding may bring the district's fund balance to \$95,078. Add to this the cost of searching for a new superintendent, employing an interim superintendent and a partial-year salary for a new superintendent, the fund bal-

His father was a mechanic and his mother was a house-wife. He had an older brother that died early in World War 11, and four sisters, two older and two younger. "We were poor, in the thirties and forties when I was growing up, but so was everyone else. It was no big thing." says Fox.

"We always lived like Country folks even if we were living where there were sidewalks and paved streets. We had a milk cow, vegetable gardens, chickens, and a wood heating stove even when we lived for awhile within six blocks of the Kemp Public Library. I spent a lot of time at the Library when I wasn't doing chores, because the books were free. I learned to read books and enjoy them as much

as going to the movies. In the books I could do or be anything I was reading about. It was great fun." A cowboy, a commercial artist, a pilot were all things he wanted to be at one time or another.

Fox became a pilot in 1947, by working around his college class schedule at the local airport. He finished two years of college before getting his first real job. He was hired by the Humble Oil & Refining Company as an Engineering Draftsman, based on his two years of college work toward engineering. Thirty-eight years later he retired early, as a Corporate Executive Pilot from the same

The Salado Eagles took second place in the Salado Merchants Tournament Dec. 11-13.

They capped the roundrobin tournament Dec. 13 with a 44-39 win over defending champ Rosebud-Lott.

Killeen's JV won the tournament, winning all four of its games. Salado won three of four games.

Killeen's Danielle Brannon was named the tournament's MVP. Salado's Chris Michna, David Kirk and Shawn Mitchell were named to the alltournament team.

Salado's only loss was to Killeen. Both teams played a rematch Dec. 15. Results were unavailable at press time.

The Eagles' next game is Dec. 19 at home against Milano.

Salado's three tournament wins improved its record to 4-8. "I think we matured a month's worth in these four (tournament) games," Coach Alan Haire said. "It took us 12 games, but we're finally starting to play like we need to play."

Salado 44, Rosebud-Lott 39

The Eagles outscored the Cougars 31-26 in the second half to break a 13-13 halftime score.

Mitchell led all scorers with 16 points. He gave the Eagles a 37-31 lead with 2:30 left to play, with a great move along the baseline for a layup.

But it was Ryan Gillespie's three-pointer with 4:07 left to play, that gave the Eagles a 35-29 lead and momentum down the stretch.

Kirk aided the cause with 12 points, and Micha had eight.







The Salado Eagles took second place in the Salado Merchants Tournament Dec. 11-

They capped the roundrobin tournament Dec. 13 with a 44-39 win over defending champ Rosebud-Lott.

Killeen's JV won the tournament, winning all four of its games. Salado won three of four games.

Killeen's Danielle Brannon was named the tournament's MVP. Salado's Chris Michna, David Kirk and Shawn Mitchell were named to the alltournament team.

Salado's only loss was to Killeen. Both teams played a rematch Dec. 15. Results were unavailable at press time.

The Eagles' next game is Dec. 19 at home against Milano.

Salado's three tournament wins improved its record to 4-8. "I think we matured a month's worth in these four (tournament) games," Coach Alan Haire said. "It took us 12 games, but we're finally starting to play like we need to play.

Salado 44, Rosebud-Lott 39

The Eagles outscored the Cougars 31-26 in the second half to break a 13-13 halftime

Mitchell led all scorers with 16 points. He gave the Eagles a 37-31 lead with 2:30 left to play, with a great move along the baseline for a layup.

But it was Ryan Gillespie's three-pointer with 4:07 left to play, that gave the Eagles a 35-29 lead and momentum down the stretch.

Kirk aided the cause with 12 points, and Micha had eight. Salado 49, Taylor JV 38

The Eagles opened the tour-

nament Dec. 11 with a 49-38 win over Taylor's junior varsity.

Salado outscored the Ducks 28-18 in the second half to pull away from a 21-20 halftime lead.

Chris Michna's three-point shot with just under five seconds left in the third period gave the Eagles a 36-31 lead entering the final period.

Ryan Gillespie and Michna hit back-to-back three-pointers in the first two minutes of the fourth period to extend the lead to 42-34.

voted into use on December 10, 1836. It didn't last very long. The current Texas flag was worked out and approved by President Mirabeau B. Lamar and was adopted by the Third Congress of the Republic on January 25, 1839.

The flag consisted of "a blue perpendicular stripe of the width of one-third of the whole length of the flag with a white star of five points in the center thereof, and two horizontal stripes of equal breadth, the upper stripe white, the lower red, of the length of two-thirds of the whole flag."

The Lone Star Flag of the Republic of Texas later became the state flag. It is generally accepted that the Texas flag's colors represent the same virtues as they do in the United States flag: red means courage, blue means loyalty and white means purity and

Some uses of the flag were adopted by the state legislature in 1933. The Texas flag should not be displayed earlier than sunrise or later than sunset unless properly illuminated. It should not be left out in inclement weather unless it is a weatherproof flag. It should be flown with the white stripe uppermost except in case of distress. The blue field should be to the observer's left.

The Texas flag should be underneath the national flag when the two are flown from the same pole. When flown from separate, adjacent flagpoles, the United States flag and the Texas flag should be of the same size and on flagpoles of equal length. The United States flag should be to the observer's left.

On April 3, 1965, Governor John Connally signed an act of the 59th legislature officially designating the pledge to the Texas flag as follows:

"Honor the Texas Flag. 1 pledge allegiance to thee, Texas, one and indivisible." The pledge to the Texas flag can be recited at all public events after the pledge to the US flag is recited.

Flying for someone else also allows me the time to do another thing I love to do = write my stories, what a fortunate guy I am."


If a TDA license expired February 28, 1997, the licensee has until February 28, 1998 (not just this calendar year), to make up CEUs and pay fees to renew the license. Even though the applicator may still own restricted-use pesticides. applications are illegal until the license is renewed or replaced.

After the one-year late renewal period ends on February 28, an applicator may repeat license exams (and training, for private applicators) in order to obtain a new license.

TDA can send a duplicate renewal form, upon request, to replace lost forms. However, the duplicate will not list pre-1996 CEUs for private applicators. That information is best requested by telephone, so ary is a busy month with a lot TDA staff can do a computer

Of course, this time of the Central Texas farmers and year we start thinking about taxes. There has been a lot of interest this year about the new wildlife management qualification. - H.B. 1358 implemented a constitutional amendment by adding wildlife management as an agricultural use that qualifies the land for agriculture (productivity) appraisal in the Property Tax Code. It requires the Comptroller, with help of TPWD and TAEX, to issue guidelines to county appraisal districts on how to qualify and appraise land used to manage wildlife. There are qualification restrictions such as the property owner must have qualified the land for agricultural appraisal the prior year at the time the owner changes the land's use to wildlife management. The owner must currently use the land to propagate a sustaining breeding, migrating or wintering population of indigenous animals. The law requires propagation for human use: food, medicine, active recreation (hunting, fishing) or passive recreation (hiking, photography, bed and breakfast). It is revenue neutral in that the owner must initially pay the same amount of property taxes that would have been paid if the land had remained in its former Ag use category. The land should have the same appraised value as before conversion to wildlife management

The landowner must be engaged in three of the seven to the degree of intensity typical for the area: habitat control, erosion control, predator management, supplemental water, supplemental food, providing shelter, and/or making census

A common problem faced by catfish anglers in not getting a high percentage of hook ups verses actual bites. Anyone who has ever watched their rod tip move or bobber go under and then set the hook on catfish, knows that getting good hook penetration is tough.

I've tried changing rods. Also, I've tried changing angles on which I set the hook making more of a horizontal hookset than a vertical one.

I've also tried many different hooks helping to increase my hook up ratio. From circle hooks to wide gap hooks to long shank to treble hooks, I've tried them all. It's been tough to tell when I have found the

right hook because I kept missing fish no matter what I used.

Treble hooks worked well but didn't hold the bait as I wanted. Long shank and wide gap hooks tend to be too weak and don't hold the bait as well.

There is a new catfish hook on the market that has performed great for me. It's called the "Triple Sticker." It looks like a combination of a wide gap and circle hook due to its bend. It has three barbs on the shank to help hold even the softest of bait. Plus, its strong and most importantly extremely sharp. I am now using it not only on all my catfish trips but saltwater fishing trips also.

The hook is made by Mustard and is being marketed by Line Buster Products. It's brand new and the demand is

expected to be high this spring. Whether you fish Amistad for channel cats with a rod and reel, Choke Canyon for blue cats using jug lines or for giant yellow cats with live bait on a trot line, you will find the Triple Sticker hook a great hook to use.

My suggestion is to try the Triple Sticker out with Line Busters new "Cut Bait." It will increase you odds at catching



Antibiotics have proven to be a "mixed blessing." On one hand, they have helped cure many diseases that were once killers. But their use, or should we say, their abuse or overuse has resulted in mutated microbes that are proving increasingly resistant to antibiotics. We may one day be facing epidemics with no way to treat

As serious as this situation is, it's especially dangerous in hospital ICUs (Intensive Care Units) where, according to a release from the American Lung Association, the extensive use of antibiotics in a confined area provide key locations for the emergence and spread of infec-tions caused by antibiotic-resistant germs. The release noted that hospital-acquired pneumonia and blood infections are the leading causes of death from hospital infection among critically ill patients.

But there is a positive development in the use of antibiotics which could help reduce the problem. It's called "Antibiotic Crop Rotation."

Crop rotation is an agricultural term referring to what good farmers do when they plant different crops from year to year to prevent the depletion of soil nutrients. What one p takes out of the soil, another may put back in. (An example is how peanuts return soil nitrates that are used up by cotton.)

In antibiotic crop rotation where a different class of antibiotics replaces one that has been used for long periods — the bacteria that have become resistant to the first drugs may respond to the second.

But we're still facing a crisis as more resistant microbes evolve and antibiotics become increasingly ineffective against them. More on this in future columns.

NOTE: Salmonella, botulism, and other food-related infections occur most often during the holiday periods. One simple way to reduce the risk is to get rid of your wood chopping blocks no matter how much you love them. Unless cleaned properly, microbes will find their way into hiding places in the wood that you may not even be aware of. Plastic chopping blocks do not have these microbe-friendly nooks and crannies, and can also be washed in very hot soapy water.

Is it the flu?

With all the "bugs" going around during winter, many sick people mistakenly think they have influenza. That may lead them to think the flu shots they got are not working.

"Lots of people get colds in the winter and mistakenly think they have influenza," said Dr. Wendy Keitel of the Influenza Research Center at Houston's Baylor College of Medicine.

Cold-like symptoms can be produced by many viruses circulating this time of year, such as rhino-, corona-, parainfluenza-, respiratory syncytial-, adeno- and other viruses.

Any of these can cause typical upper-respiratory symptoms such as runny nose, sore throat, sneezing, watery eyes and nasal obstruction, Keitel said. In fact, a mild case of influenza can also produce such symptoms.

Although other infections can be associated with flu-like illness, few if any have the same impact in the community as influenza. Not only can symptoms of influenza be severe, making you feel much worse than a cold ever could, but influenza complications can lead to death. As many as 20,000 people, most of them elderly, die each year in the U.S. from flu complications, chiefly pneumonia.

"Sometimes people will avoid getting flu shots," Keitel said, "because they are convinced that they caught influenza from the shot last year."

Actually, they are likely associating the flu shot with a coincidental illness caused by some other infection.

"The danger in such thinking is that people who really need flu shots will not get them," Keitel said. "The elderly and people with heart and lung disease, in particular, should get flu shots annually because they are among the people most at risk for possibly deadly complications."

Keitel cautioned that the flu vaccine is not 100 percent effective, "but your chances of avoiding the flu and its complications are significantly higher with the shot than without it."




Youth choirs offer opportunity




