Don Owens, manager of Peoples National Bank of Salado and Gerry Gamble, president of Salado National Bank expressed great interest in the case and promptly put the accounts into motion on a fast track. They are under the name of "The Moses Guajardo Fund" and deposits can be made as of right now!

Several of the Churches in town are collecting food and other items for this worthy family and the parents are going to be put in touch with agencies designed to help in just such cases.



- 9. Encourage family activities; outings, vacations, picnics, projects, rec-

10. Spend time playing with, talking to and teaching your child.

11. Gradually allow the parent child relationship to change into a relationship of two friends.


12 Offer your guidance, suggestions and advice only when asked for as your child grows into young adulthood.



Should you use a Money Manager?

Managing a growing portfolio in today's complex financial environment isn't easy. You have to commit a large portion of your time, energy and resources just to keep up. Is entrusting investment decisions to a professional money manager the answer? The idea may seem a bit frightening at first.

Not every investor should use a money manager. But before you decide whether professional management is right for you, you should understand a money manager's role compared to that of your financial planner or investment broker.

In general, a money manager will free you from the difficult and often time-consuming task of managing your portfolio. He or she is given the authority to decide what investments to buy and when to sell. The manager will continuously monitor the contents and performance of your portfolio. You also gain the advantage of the many manager's expertise and full-time research.

This role is much different than that of a financial planner or broker. Unlike a financial planner, who only makes recommendations about investment moves, a money manager actively manages a portion of your assets and creates a portfolio that best meets your objectives. And unlike a broker, who typically must consult you before making trade, a money manager is solely responsible for trade decisions, based on guidelines agreed upon at the start of your relationship.

Money managers are also compensated differently. Instead of receiving a commission based on trades, like a broker, money managers are generally paid on a fee basis. This fee is often based on the amount of assets he or she manages for you.

The decision to use a money managers is obviously an individual choice. You must first decide whether you feel comfortable giving another individual discretionary power to direct your account, or whether you want to maintain the control over authorizing individual transactions. You should determine if your portfolio is large enough to meet most managed account minimums. You also may be very satisfied with your relationship with your planner or broker. If you decide to consider a money manager, however, your next step is to select the manager that will best help you fulfill your investment goals.

First, clearly define your investment objectives. Within these objectives, outline your expectations regarding the investment return you're seeking, how much risk you're willing to accept and the style of manager you prefer. The more specific you are, the easier it will be for you

to find a money manager that can help you achieve your goals. Compare the manager's investment philosophies with your own. Ask each money manager to describe the strengths and weaknesses of his or her firm's investment style. This is especially important for newer firms that lack extensive performance records. You can narrow your choices by investigating only those firms whose philosophies are in line with your objectives.

Request promotional materials and performance records from different money managers. Compare each manager's past performance against a standard index, such as the Standard & Poor's (an unmanaged index). Be sure to look at performance annually and over a full market cycle rather than trade by trade. This will give you an idea of how well the money manager does during up and down markets.

Many brokerage firms offer services that assist you with the difficult and time-consuming task of selecting and monitoring a money manager. These services can help you through the process of selecting the right manager. In addition, they can monitor the performance of your manager as compared to other similar money managers. Whether you select a money manager on your own or though a selection service, give the manager an adequate amount of time with your portfolio (about three years) to see how he or she fares against the stock market's fluctuations.

The fifth and sixth grade students chose different countries are d the world to report e the bazaar. They and elaborate displays that included videos, music, food and toys of their country.


