I don't know how it happened, but this film starring Andrew McCarthy and Sharon Stone slipped by me this year. Early in the year, I saw previews for this thriller, and intended to see it. I missed it at the theaters and later when it was released on videocassette.

But, there it sat at the IGA Video, surrounded by big budget blockbusters like Basic Instinct, Patriot Games, etc.

Let me say this: Year of the Gun is not a movie to be missed. Throughout the 110 minutes, it is an exciting, intelligent rollercoaster ride as good as Patriot Games and better than Basic Instinct.

McCarthy stars as David Raybourne, an American writer in Italy during the violent 1970s, writing a "novel" about the Red Brigade. He meets photojournalist Alison King (Sharon Stone) and the two are drawn into a web of danger and deceit.

If you liked Patriot Games, then Year of the Gun is a movie that you should not miss.

Just what you might expect from a political junkie who is politely called a "Political Commentator" by the publishers of this weekly newspaper.

Salado

The big news in 1992 was the start-up of the renovation of the old red brick school house on Main Street. Our hope, therefore, is that during 1993, funds will becavailable to complete the entire project, top and bottom and that the ual chamber of commerce banquet can be held in January 1994, in the assembly hall on the second floor of the

building and that the entire civic and cultural center will be busy from daylight until dark each day. No doubt the long awaited public restrooms will fit that description from opening day forward.

Second hope is that we develop, as was recently suggested, a group formed by our ministers to act as our agents in seeking out those in our midst who need help so that prompt assistance can be given before desperation sets in and hope is lost.

Final hope is that the spectre of incorporation remains comatose for yet another year. Regretably, this costly move will come to haunt us soon enough. Later rather than sooneris our hope!

State Politics

Two hopes come immediately to mind when we think of state level politics. First, the deeply sincere hope that Governor Richards will find an outstanding Texan to appoint as interim senator to replace Lloyd Bentsen who is

headed for the Clinton cabinet. Guv. Ann's record of appointments, thus far, has left a lot to be desired and another poor choice at this juncture wil most certainly spell a Republican victory in May and a resulting "two-gramm" type GOPers representing Texas. Two Gram(m)s is well above the recommended daily allowance and need for bipartisanism so greatly needed in the State and at the high altar of the federal senate. Especially for those souls who have a hard time stomaching one gram -Phil, that is - even on a good day.

A second hope is that the next legislative session slated to open early in January can somehow come to gring with the budget crisis; school crisis; prison construction crisis and all the other critical crises that have stumped our elected Pooh-Bahs for years. We doubt this new group will succeed without huge infusions of new taxes and the interference by federal judges - but as we have reported from the start - we get what we deserve when we don't send our best to Austin!

A renewal course for the general public in basic life support will be offered at Scott and White in Temple 5:30-9:30 p.m. Jan. 6.

The four-hour class will renew the participants CPR skills for one year in one-man cardioplumonary resuscitation (CPR) adult airway obstruction and pediatric CPR and pediatric airway obstruction.

The renewal course is for lay persons who have not renewed the CPR skills within 12-15 months.

Registration and a \$15 course fee are requried by Dec. 31. Enrollment for the course is limited to 24 participants 14 years of age or older.





New Year's resolutions are not made to be broken: Here's how to keep them

Contrary to the way it usually happens, New Year's resolutions are not made to be broken.

"Resolutions can work any time of the year if you go slowly and realize you may not succeed on the first try," said Dr. Michael Cox, a psychologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Successful New Year's resolutions begin as reasonable goals with reasonable expectations.

"Make the first step a small one, and take your time," Cox said. "Pick something at which you can be successful, and build on that success."

Cox encourages people to ask, "how can I take better care of myself next year?"

"It may sound self-centered, but working on personal growth makes you more able to take care of relationships," he said.

After choosing a resolution or two, write them down

Cox says that it will not make the resolutions a reality, but it does indicate that you are serious.

Once New Year's Day arrives, it is time to review the list and to get support.

"Whatever change you want to make, tell other people," Cox said. "Give them your sense of direction, so they can help."

It may be a friend's encouragement to stick with that new walking program or a co-worker's positive comments that make the difference.

"Take credit for positive changes and accomplishments," Cox said. "As you begin to see yourself making changes, the attitude truly begins to change."

And, if you do break your resolution?

Try again. There is nothing magical about New Year's. Cox says it is seldom, if ever, too late to make a change.

Salado merchants to meet Jan. 7

The Salado Merchants Committee will meet 9 a.m. Jan. 7 at the Stagecoach Inn garden room for its first meeting of 1993.

A number of goals have been discussed for 1993, including these: more active merchant participation and increase membership; cooperative involvement with other organizations for beautification and landscaping of village; encourage and promote a more friendly atmosphere in shops; consider an ap-

propriate fundraiser for 1993 Stroll; consider designs and replacement ideas for north billboard; reinforce communication between merchants and Chamber.

The executive committee has set a budget of \$8,720 for the coming year. Expected income includes \$8,400 for members and \$320 for associate members. Expenses include \$5,000 for the shopping guide, \$2,500 for the Stroll, \$1,000 for publicity and administration and \$220 for contingency.

Dues are payable by Jan. 1 and must be paid in full to be included in the Spring Shopping Guide with a printing deadline of Feb. 10, 1993. You may include Chamber of Commerce dues which will be forwarded to the Chamber.

Road to Recovery program needs volunteer drivers

The local "Road to Recovery," a transportation program for cancer patients sponsored by the American Cancer Society, is in need of volunteers. The organization has recently been flooded with requests for transportation to cancer treatments, and the existing volunteers can't keep up with the new load. "We've had to turn people away be-

cause we just don't have enough drivers to get everyone everywhere they need to be on time. We are really looking for more helpers," said Charls Ballard, local organizer and contact person for the group.

Many people would like to do some type of volunteer work, but they don't think they are qualified to help cancer patients. The only thing required of a Road to Recovery driver is a drivers license and attendance of a two hour training. Many people drive patients even though they work full-time because of the patients' schedules. Still others have more flexible schedules themselves.

Last year in Texas 14,000 rides were given to over 1,000 patients who needed help. In the Bell County area, over 130 rides were given to area hospitals and treatment centers. This year the American Cancer Society is hoping to be able to serve more.

Jan Pickett, RN, MS, CS cancer care coordinator at Scott and White functions as a liaison between the American Cancer Society and Scott and White Hospital. Pickett encourages anyone who needs help with transportation to call the Road to Recovery group, and she also helps recruit new drivers. Anyone interested in helping should call Picket at 774-2772 or Ballard at 773-5323.

The American Cancer Society is the nationwide community-based voluntary health organization dedicated to controlling cancer throught research, education and service.

Economic and Investment Outlook Will 1993 Bring Dramatic Change?

As we bid farewell to 1992, a year of financial difficulty for many Americans, it's time to turn our thoughts to the new year. At the top of nearly everyone's list of concerns is the economy. After feeling the effects of recession, our nation's economy finally appears to be in recovery. At A.G. Edwards, we believe this recovery will continue and that 1993 will produce a stronger and expanded economy with many opportunities for investors.

A Slow Expansion

The economy started to show real signs of improvement in the third quarter of 1992. Leading economic indicators suggest that the economy is not merely recovering, but is also expanding. Currently, there are few signs that this expansion will end any time soon, but economic growth will continue to be slow.

Downward trend for inflation

At A.G. Edwards, we believe the inflation rate is likely to continue to decline in 1993. Restrained monetary growth and sluggish economies world-wide have kept inflationary pressures low. The long-term trend for inflation continues to point downward. With the infaltionary rate expected to decline to less than 3% in 1993.

Interest Rate Activity

As the economy expands, we believe short-term interest rates could increase in 1993. Market forces will probably cause this increase, rather than a major policy shift by the Federal Reserve, as the strength of the econ-

omy grows and consumer demand for credit increases. What changes will occur under the Clinton Administration?

It appears that Americans are feeling more comfortable about the economy's health, but they remain concerned about the political outlook. Now that the basic

the political outlook. Now that the basic question has been answered,—that is, who will lead the country in 1993—the question that remains is, "What will the new administration do?"

After endiess months of campaign rhetoric, the word "change" seems to be on everyone's minds as President-elect Clinton prepares to move into the Oval Office. The change that appears most likely concerns tax changes, although the magnitude and total mix of tax policy shifts may not be known for a long time. However, an increase in the top marginal income tax rate—probably to 36% or 37%-appears likely. Although investors in the higher tax brackets might consider investing differently to reduce taxes, investment decisions should not be made exclusively in anticipation of the tax

What about Investing?

A modest rise in short-term interest rates should not be viewed as a signal that

the stock market is going to decline significantly. A stronger economy means corporate earnings growth, while low inflation means no major threat to price/ earnings multiples for stocks. All of these are positive signs for investors, and the rising short-term interest rates should not be a major concern. Currently, the stock market is reasonably valued and we expect this condition to continue in 1993.

In the bond market, we believe the outlook for municipal bonds will remain very attractive under the Clinton Administration. Clinton is a strong supporter of municipal bonds and has promised to relieve many of the constraints placed on municipal bond issuance under the Tax Reform Act of 1986. Additionally, the municipal market could benefit from the expected increase in personal income taxes. The higher your tax rate, the more attractive are municipal bonds, as they offer a steady stream of income free from federal and sometimes state and local

At A.G. Edwards, we remain positive about the future of the stock market, the economy and the American business. In some areas, the Clinton Administration should have very little impact on your long-term investment strategy; in other areas, the trends will become clearer with time. If your investments have been in a holding pattern as you walt to see what happens under Clinton, we believe that now is the time to act.

Nutrition News

Americans might be better off eating Mediterranean style, according to The Bertolli Nutrition Center. A recent medical journal editorial pointed out that people in the Mediterranean area have a lower incidence of heart disease than Americans, mainly because of their diet.

One reason: The Mediterranean diet includes monounsaturated fats, such as olive oil, that can reduce the "bad" cholesterol (LDL's) and protect the "good" variety (HDL's). Olive oil contains 77 percent monounsaturated fats.





Attorney General works to snare senior scams

Texas Attorney General Dan Morales and the American Association of Retired Persons have announced the creation of the Senior Service Program within the Office of Attorney General.

The program will enlist the services and experience of senior citizens in

the Attorney General's fight against consumer fraud perpetrated against the elderly. It also will educate senior Texans on ways they can protect themselves from becoming victims of criminal acts.

The Senior Service Program has three components: the Senior

Sleuths; the Senior efforts we make today to Sting; and the Senior Crime Alert. The programs will be coordinated by the Attorney General's Elder Law Section.

The "Senior Sleuths" will be volunteers from across Texas who will assist the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division in the processing and investigation of complaints against con-artists, telemarketers and unscrupulous businesses that prey on the elderly.

The "Senior Sting" operations will collect mail and otherwise record solicitations aimed at the elderly in an effort to identify illegal businesses.

Morales said program's "Senior Crime Alert" will conduct crime awareness workshops across the state to inform senior citizens on how to protect themselves from crime, including violent crime as well as consumer fraud. The workshops will be conducted by the senior volunteers with the participation of the Office of Attorney General and local police departments.

'As our elderly population expands, it will create a bigger and bigger target for unscrupulous operators," Morales said. "Many elderly persons live alone. They are forced to sustain themselves and cope with increasing health-care costs on meager fixed incomes. All of this makes them more vulnerable to slick, snake-oil salesmen.

"Senior citizens deserve much better than they have been getting. The protect our parents, we hope will be there tomorrow to protect us when we reach senior status, and there for our children also."

In regard to the Senior Sting operation, Morales said the AARP recruited senior citizens in the Dallas area to save all mail they recieved during the month of October from unfamiliar organizations that solicited contributions, offered awards or prizes or any deal that sounded too good to be true.

The seniors collected more than 100 pounds of fraudulent mail solicitations targeted at senior citizens. The Office of Attorney General is conducting follow-up investigations of the suspicious offers and solicitations. The seniors who received the mail may be asked to be witnesses during the prosecution of illegal operators.

"This is an opportunity for seniors to help our office and to help themselves by using their years of experience and knowledge to help stop those who seek to exploit the vulnerability of our senior citizens." Morales said.

Assistant Attorney General Clyde Farrell, chiefofMorales'Elder Law Section will direct the Senior Service Program. The Elder Law Section was established by Morales more than a year ago to enforce laws protecting the elderly.

several lawsuits, including three against telemarketers who defrauded the elderly of thousands of dollars in life savings by using hard-sell tactics and offering prizes for the purchase of vitamins, cosmetics and water purification systems. None of the elderly consumers received the prizes they were prom-

Another lawsuit was filed against a Dallas area man who tricked at least 16 elderly persons into buying expensive medical equipment they did not need. He falsely told the seniors he was representing their doctors and the equipment was recomended by the doctors and the cost would be reimbursed by Medicare. An estate planning service was sued for taking thousands of dollars from the elderly without providing any service.
