Petition calls for election to abolish Village

Organizers are circulating a petition calling for an election to abolish the Village of Salado government. They will need 400 signatures of registered voters living within the municipality of the Village of Salado before the 5 p.m. Aug. 17 deadline to order the special election.

Elections to abolish municipalities are held on the same general election day as Mayoral elections. The mayoral election is set for Nov. 3, moved from its usual first Saturday in May by the Village under the order of Governor Greg Abbott due to COVID-19 concerns.

The petition will be filed with the Mayor, who will have to verify signatures. It is unclear at this time how long the Mayor may take to verify those signatures before calling for the election to be placed on the November ballot.

The abolishment of Sal-

ado government is being called for by John Newman and others. Newman was spokesman for the disannexation election effort in 2017, which was turned down 707 against to 116 in favor. The signature requirement to put the disannexation election on the ballot was much lower than that required for calling for an election to abolish the Salado government.

Newman stated in a social media post that a letter was mailed to more than

1,000 households in Salado, hitting mailboxes earlier this week.

"Salado incorporated in 2000," the message from Salado Citizens for Economic Freedom & Limited Self-Rule proclaimed. "After two decades, it is clear this experiment has failed our community. The time has come to dissolve the incorporation and return Salado to the economic freedom and self-rule that made the village prosper for 150 years prior to incorporation."

The letter stated that in 2000, "community leaders instilled fear that the prosperous village would be annexed by Belton, which would collect municipal property taxes, franchise fees and sales taxes."

Immediately after incorporation, "Citizens no longer worried about annexation by Belton," the letter stated, adding "Civic-minded Saladoans created small village government with lean staffing, a conservative budget and limited power."

Leap forward 20 years, "the ad valorem property tax has skyrocketed to 57.52 cents per \$100 valuation," the group stated.

"An astonishing 20% of

the entire village budget is allocated to the salaries of the city manager and village secretary," it adds.

Meanwhile, "mismanagement has resulted in poor roads and crumbling infrastructure," the group stated.

SISD trustees discuss issues with opening school

Salado ISD sent a survey to parents this week about their preferences for students returning to school on Sept. 8. In an earlier survey last month, about 15% of parents preferred remote learning for the return to school. This survey was sent when the start date for school was still Aug. 24 and the case counts for COVID-19 in Bell County were much lower.

Superintendent Michael Novotny told school trustees during an Aug. 3 special meeting on the topic of starting back to school that he felt the number of parents who would prefer remote attendance for their child is likely to increase with the spike in COVID-19 cases.

He said that he knew of only one case of a Salado ISD student being diagnosed with COVID-19.

School trustees asked Dr. Novotny several questions about the plan for the start of school. Dr. Novotny reported that he sent a draft of the plan to parents and community members via email the week before. He said that the committee is finalizing the plan, which will be presented to the Bell County Health authorities.

Despite a legal opinion by Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton last week that local health authorities cannot preemptively close schools, Salado will not start classes until Sept. 8. Attorney General Paxton stated that local health authorities can close schools only in the case of an outbreak. Paxton's opinion came out July 27, the day that Salado school trustees adopted a new school calendar with the Sept. 8 start date.

Salado will offer faceto-face or remote on-line learning to students in pre-k through eighth grade beginning Sept. 8.

If a parent chooses remote for their student, they should wait until the end of the nineweeks grading period to request to make the switch to face-to-face learning.

Salado High School will offer a hybrid model for the start of school in which students can either attend 100% remotely or attend school face-to-face every other day with remote learning on the off days. The district will have the hybrid model for the first four weeks of school. Depending upon the

COVID-19 situation, at that time, administrators may request the school board allow the district to file a waiver with the Texas Education Agency to extend the hybrid model of face-to-face attendance

"They will be divided by student ID, odds and evens, rather than alphabetically," Dr. Novotny said.

Half of the High School students who choose to attend face-to-face classes will attend face-to-face classes Monday, Wednesday, Friday on one week and Tuesday and Thursday the following week and will take part in remote learning on the off-days. The other half of students will alternate.

This will reduce the congestion of Salado High by a considerable amount during the first few weeks of school. "It will help with the common areas, the cafeteria, hallways, library and classrooms," Dr. Novotny said.

Students who are active in extra-curricular activities will have to attend daily practices (either before or after the school day, depending upon the sport). They will be required to attend the extra-curricular class period (athletics, band, etc.) on the classroom days and can remote on the off-days. If they choose, they can also attend the extra-curricular class period on the remote days.

Dr. Novotny addressed some of the concerns brought up by parents during the public forum of the meeting.

He said that the plan for elementary classes was to have one teacher for each grade dedicated to remote learning, with the other grade level teachers in the classroom environment.

"This is much easier at the elementary level than the junior high or high school where you have subject matter teachers," Dr. Novotny said. "Good news for those upper levels is that junior high and high school teachers have two conference periods so they will have extra time to work on the remote classes."

Remote classes will be asynchronous to the face-to-face classes, Dr. Novotny said. He said that in addition to being able to log in and participate during the live portion of the on-line content, the content will be recorded for viewing at any time afterward during the day.

Dr. Novotny told trustees

that there will be "higher accountability" for students to record attendance for remote learning this fall. "They will be required to log-in and check-in and their attendance will count toward our average that we send to the state," he said.

He told trustees that the district has plans for going low-tech (paper copies) for instances when internet issues may be widespread or prolonged. "Hopefully any of these issues will be short lived," he said.

Jeff Kelley asked if the hybrid and remote models could be extended further if the COVID-19 case counts continue to increase.

"We could go all year with board approval and TEA waivers," Dr. Novotny said, "but we also can go back at any point."

Dr. Novotny addressed school closures due to a high number of positive COV-ID-19 cases. He said that the local health authority could close a campus if 2% of the total campus population (students and staff) tested positive for COVID-19 during any one-week period.

Campus closure would mean remote learning for all the students for the 10-14 calendar days that the school campus might be closed.

If a student tests positive for COVID-19, he will immediately go to the remote learning during their quarantine period, Dr. Novotny

Students who are remote learners may participate in extra-curricular activities but will be required to attend practices as required by coaches and sponsors.

Dr. Novotny told trustees that the district is using Google Classroom to provide a uniform learning experience for students throughout the district. "This is what staff is being trained in using," he said.

Parent Chance Goodin said that the initial response to the parent survey was that only 15 percent preferred remote learning. "Based on the numbers from the parent survey," Goodin said, "every teacher is setting up curriculum for both environs of learning. It is like double duty for a small number of remote students."

Goodin also asked about the face-to-face environment: "What will that look like?," he asked. "Will they

Cornerstone ceremony marks opening of Salado Middle School

The cornerstone of Salado Middle School will be dedicated by State officers of Grand Lodge of Texas, A.F. & A.M. and local members of Salado Masonic Lodge No. 296 in Salado. The ceremony will take place at 10 a.m. Aug. 15 at Salado Middle School located at 1189 Williams Rd. in Salado.

Superintendent Michael Novotny will act as emcee for the ceremony. Huckabee, Inc., the architectural firm that designed the 130,000 sq. foot Salado Middle School, will have Will Smith on hand at the ceremony. Lee Lewis Construction is the general contractor on the project and will also have representation on-hand for the ceremony. Salado Middle School principal Ted Smith will make remarks during the ceremo-

Walter S. Rogers, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Texas A.F. & A.M. will act as Grand Master for the ceremony of dedicating the cornerstone.

The entire ceremony will be held within the Salado Middle School cafeteria. While the public is invited to come to the ceremony, social distancing and mask requirements will be enforced.

Following the ceremony, manual groups may tour the Salado Middle School facility for an early look at the school which will open to students on Sept. 8.

Salado Middle School is approximately 130,000

square feet. It has 24 academic classrooms which include four science labs, and two multipurpose lab spaces.

The building also contains four fine arts classrooms to include a band hall, a choir room, and two art classrooms. The cafeteria has the capacity to seat 500 people for performances and the capacity of 350 students with cafeteria tables for lunches. For lunches, we will also include the outdoor patio as an option for students which will increase our cafeteria capacity to 400.

In the athletic wing of the building, there are two gyms, a weight room, three boys locker rooms, and three girls locker rooms. The competition gym will seat approximately 700 people and the secondary gym will seat approximately 200 people.

The cornerstone laying ceremony is an ancient tradition popular in the United States since the Colonial days. The Freemasons, whose origins are the medieval stonemasons, continue this tradition as a public service.

The cornerstone laying ceremony symbolically uses the tools of the operative Mason to bring a special message of faith in the craftsmanship of a new building. This tradition is a wonderful way to begin the life of a new building.

The oldest cornerstone ceremony in Salado was conducted by the Grand

Lodge of Texas and Belton Masonic Lodge #166 on July 4, 1860 for Salado College on South Main St. That cornerstone was "re-leveled" by the Grand Lodge of Texas on July 4, 1990 when the ruins were restored by Salado Historical Society by Tim Brown on behalf of the Robertson Colony-Salado College Foundation.

The Masons of Texas also leveled the cornerstone for the Old Red Schoolhouse on Main St. in 1924. In 1995, when the schoolhouse was restored, the Masons of Texas re-leveled the cornerstone there as well.

In 2008, the cornerstone of Salado High School was leveled, as the most recent ceremony in Salado.

Freemasonry is the oldest, largest and most widely recognized fraternal organization in the world. Today, there are more than 2 million Freemasons in North America alone.

Charity is an important tenet of the Masonic fraternity. Each year, Salado Masonic Lodge provides more than \$5,000 in college scholarships to Salado graduates. The local Lodge also adopts the second grade at Thomas Arnold Elementary, providing more than \$1,000 in back-to-school supplies to economically disadvantage children here. The Lodge also buys bikes and helmets for economically disadvantaged children in Salado each year.

Despite economic bad news, S&P index rises to end week

Our favorite but sometimes strangely behaving stock index, the S&P 500 (SPX), turned in another good week even as the economic bad news piled up. It rose 1.73% to close out the week at 3271.12. A sudden surge upward late Friday saved the week's numbers and left the Index up 1.25% year-to-date. The increases were all concentrated in the growth side of the index with several tech firms reporting higher than expected earnings, fueling a rush to buy those stocks. That further increased the concentration in a few tech stocks that now are a large portion of the SPX's total capitalization. Recently, five largecap, tech, growth stocks, Microsoft, Apple, Amazon, Alphabet, and Facebook, made up over 20% of the total index. Meanwhile, the value side of the Index has continued to lag, down 13.65% year-to-date.

The 10-year U.S. Treasury note yield did not join in the party, declining over 8% for the week to close at 0.535%. In our over 37 years of observing and participating in the markets, had anyone told us before now that a ten-year Treasury note would only pay a half percent a year in interest, we would have thought them insane, but here we are. The only glimmer of good news in the bond market is that the anemic yield curve is still positively sloped, suggesting better times are out there somewhere in the future. That future may be a couple of years out as interest rates remain near zero for maturities out to about three years. The oil markets joined in the gloom party with West Texas Intermediate crude oil declining 2.15% to \$40.44.

The Economy

We wish there was a lot of good news to report this week, but, sadly, there is not. The big economic news this week was expected but still shocking. The official first estimate from the Commerce Department was that the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) of the United States

Consumer spending, making up two thirds of our GDP, was the largest source of the decline as it dropped at a 34.6% annualized rate in the quarter, but the business spending was not far behind at a negative 27%. While things rebounded in June, the near-term future does not look good. The Conference Board reported that consumer confidence dropped from a reading of 98.3 in June to 92.6 in July. Worse, that report also noted that only 31% of consumers expected business conditions to improve in the next few months. Declining confidence numbers and low expectations for a near-term recovery have historically been predictive of depressed

consumer spending. In a separate report from the Labor Department, applications for unemployment rose in the last week by 12,000 to 1.43 million with the total number of persons receiving unemployment benefits up by 867,000 to 17 million. That the economy is in a funk is no surprise given that the Census Bureau reported that over 51% of households have experienced a significant decrease in income as of mid-July.

That number parallels the report in the Wall Street Journal that 54% of U.S. small businesses are experiencing financial difficulty and about half that number believe they may not survive the current crisis.

Meanwhile the corona-

virus continues to spread, breaking new records on a weekly basis with the U.S. death toll now up to nearly 153,000. Back in early June when Bell County only had about 700 confirmed cases. we wrote that at the rate of growth reported, by the end of July the cases would rise to about 3,000. As of July 31, there were 3,375 confirmed cases of Covid-19 in Bell County. We did miss the mark on deaths as instead of 40 as the growth rate suggested, we now stand at 29, but our infection growth rate has not slowed and is still running at about 4% per day equating to a doubling about every three weeks. Unless we change our behavior, by mid-August that number will be around 13,000 and deaths will be around 120.

There is good news. Several vaccines in development have shown promise and one by Johnson & Johnson has officially shown a "robust response" in antibody production in primate tests. Indications are that an approved, effective vaccine may be available by the end of this year or the beginning of 2021. Unfortunately, that means that it will be probably mid-2021 before an effective vaccination is in place in the population and we can begin to emerge and resume normal activities. This pandemic will be with us at least through next year. Once it is behind us, we continue to believe that the economic expansion that is to come will be more than impressive. For now, what we can do is to change our behavior and limit the spread of the infection.

Readers on so-called peaceful protests, removal of art (statues)

What has happened to

While flipping through my wife's Facebook site for Salado People, I read where an alleged ambassador of peace, love, racial equality, etc. made a presentation/protest on the old red schoolhouse grounds. As validation of his sincerity he apparently felt it necessary to bring an entourage of commando wannabees decked out in protective vests and armed to the teeth with assault weapons. Don't get me wrong, I like guns, and I have been known to shoot one when necessary. But I get nervous when strangers are carrying them around in a crowd that is attending what should be a peaceful meeting. Sounds like this was a potential for proving Murphy's law. Fortunately a car did not backfire.

Maybe they heard Salado was a violent place. In the 1800s an ex-resident, Barney Riggs, became a notorious gunfighter and killer, and in the 1970s a Salado school board member and his brother-in-law got in a fist fight. Not much later two school board members got in a fist fight at a football game. In the last two, no weapons were used, although tensions had been building for months. A few years later, school controversies allegedly caused the break up of churches, but no known physical casualties resulted.

Concurrently, I was surprised at the "People" site's hints of racism - Salado must have really changed. In those 1970s I served two terms on the school board. Since community attitudes are generally manifested in student populations, the state had sent an investigator to Texas schools to look for evidence of prejudice. I recall three Black Salado high school students. One had been voted most likely to succeed; his sister was voted class favorite; and another was very popular. The investigator, a Black lady, told the superintendent, "Salado doesn't have a prejudice problem." Years later, after

graduation, a popular Black classmate of my younger son was killed in an auto accident. Salado kids went to his mother's house and kept her yard mowed - for compassion, not money. Over the years, Hispanic students have been a constant, and it has been my experience that the Anglo-Hispanic academic-established friendships have persisted for decades. If the posts I read affiliated with the meeting were true, things have really gone downhill, and if there is truly racism or prejudice in Salado, one can only wonder if new arrivals brought it with them when they moved in.

It seems that nowadays folks are just looking for things to offend them - even if nothing was done to them individually. Locally, offense has focused on an inanimate bronze figure and the name of a park and ride. I'm glad that I did not go to that meeting at the old school. I would have been offended by the militant display the ambassador (or instigator?) brought with him, and, since my kids say that with age I have lost my filter, I would have doubtlessly said something. (My wife says I never had a filter.)

One only has to look at the daily news to see how militant displays and belligerence can escalate to actual violence, or at the least generate hard feelings. I don't recall Dale Carnegie listing armed incursion as a way to win friends and influence people. Hopefully this is the last time the "People" page signing petitions and activewill incorporate reports of ly speak at council meetings this nature and instead continue to consist primarily of lost pet and food service notices.

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Sales tax holiday is Aug. 7-9

Texas economy slowly awakening from effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, Comptroller Glenn Hegar reminds shoppers they can save money on clothes and school supplies during the state's sales tax holiday on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 7-9.

The law exempts sales tax on qualified items such as clothing, footwear, school supplies and backpacks — priced below \$100, saving shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend. The date of the sales tax holiday and list of tax-exempt items are set by the Texas Legislature.

"Even though significant uncertainty remains for our public and private schools as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, the sales tax holiday is a perfect opportunity to save money on school supplies and other tax-free

(AUSTIN) — With the items at a time when many Texans are carefully monitoring their family finances," Hegar said. "Online shopping is covered, so I encourage all Texans to shop online or practice social distancing when making in-store purchases. We want folks to stay safe while saving money."

> Apparel and school supplies that may be purchased tax-free are listed on the Comptroller's website at TexasTaxHoliday.org.

> To promote social distancing, the Comptroller's office wants all taxpayers to know that during the annual sales tax holiday, qualifying items can be purchased online or by telephone, mail, custom order or any other means (including in-store purchases) tax free, when either:

• the item is both delivered to, and paid for by, the customer during the exemption period; or

• the customer orders and pays for the item, and the seller accepts the order during the exemption period for immediate shipment, even if delivery is made after the exemption period

Texas' sales tax holiday weekend has been an annual event since 1999, allowing Texans to save millions of dollars in state and local sales taxes each year. Uncertainty surrounding consumer activity in the retail sector coupled with a lack of clarity regarding the timing and nature of schools reopening prevents the agency from producing an estimate for dollars saved by taxpayers during this year's holiday. Last year's holiday generated an estimated \$102.2 million in savings for Texas taxpayers.
