In face of COVID, **USDA** extends WIC flexibilities

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) announced Sept. 21 the extension of more than a dozen flexibilities ensuring participants in the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC) continue receiving the food and health support they need during the COVID-19 pandemic.

USDA's extension of these waivers throughout the national public health emergency will ensure nutritionally at-risk mothers, babies, and children receive the critical nutrition benefits and services they count on in a safe manner while allowing the program to operate based on local conditions throughout the pandemic.

WIC provides supplemental foods, nutrition education, breastfeeding promotion and support, and health care referrals to low-income pregnant, postpartum, and breastfeeding women, infants and children under five who are determined by health professionals to be at nutritional risk.

USDA's Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) has made maximum use of existing program flexibilities and the waiver authority provided by Congress to make it as easy as possible for children and families to participate in WIC- and all of the department's nutrition assistance programs – during the CO--19 health emergency.

The WIC waivers being extended allow for:

- Participants to be approved for WIC without being physically present in a local office;
- Remote issuance of benefits to any participant;
- Flexibility in food package requirements, including dairy, grains, vegetables, and infant foods; and
- Additional options for pick-up of food packages.

The extension comes shortly after the announcement by the Texas Workforce Commission reported a decrease in the state seasonally adjusted unemployment rate to 6.8%. This is the fourth consecutive monthly decrease and the lowest rate since March 2020 when the Texas economy was initially impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. Texas is below the national seasonally adjusted rate of 8.4 percent.

"The Texas unemployment rate continues to move in a positive direction as job seekers and employers adjust to current challenges," said TWC Chairman Bryan Daniel. "TWC will continue our efforts to implement strategies designed to help strengthen the Texas econo-

In August, the Professional and Business Services sector added 33,200 jobs, Trade, Transportation and Utilities added 28,800 jobs and Government added 25,000 jobs.

In August, Texas saw 996,000 unemployed in a Civilian Labor Force of 14.3 million. The Temple-Killeen metro area reports an unemployment rate of . There are 10,900 unemployed in the Temple-Killeen metro area which is lower than either the state or national unemployment rates. The national unemployment rate is 8.5% with more than 13.7 million Americans unemployed from a labor force of 161 million.

As of Sept. 22, there have been 6.9 million cases of COVID-19 diagnosed in the United States with more than 200,000 deaths. Texas has the second-highest number of diagnoses among the states with 698,387 cases diagnosed and 14,917 deaths. Bell county has 5,221 diagnosed cases with 77 deaths.

Housing market cools in August, sales remain higher than 2019

COLLEGE STATION, third consecutive month on that rely on a younger work-Tex. (Real Estate Center) Texas' housing market slowed in August after a surge of pent-up demand inflated sales numbers the previous month.

"Sales activity is no longer catching up from the economic shutdown that hindered the showing of homes and closings at the beginning of the spring buying season," said Dr. James Gaines, chief economist for the Real Estate Center at Texas A&M University.

According to the National Association of Realtors, existing-home sales at the national level increased for the

a seasonally adjusted basis and maintained double-digit year-over-year growth. They attribute the gains to robust demand but note rising supply-side constraints.

Center Research Economist Dr. Luis Torres highlighted the supply-demand imbalances that will challenge the housing market over the next year.

"While sales surged during the summer, the number of new listings hitting the market has not matched that recovery, worsening the state's housing shortages, particularly for homes priced less than \$300,000," said Torres. "This mismatch has pulled the months of inventory to record lows of fewer than 2.5 months."

Diverging trends between the upper and lower price ranges have led to large increases in the median sale price for existing homes, which increased by more than 10 percent year over year for the second consecutive month, according to Center research.

"The initial economic shock from COVID-19 was concentrated in the service sector and other industries

force," according to Torres. "These households are more likely in the market for lower-priced homes, and we've seen that market suffer disproportionately. The relative strength in upper price ranges is inflating the median sale price. The Center's Texas Repeat Sales Index, however, accounts for this bias and revealed more moderate growth at 5 percent."

According to data published by the Temple-Belton Board of Realtors®, August saw an uptick in Bell County closed sales over 2019. Last ings in Salado, up 11.8% month, 630 houses sold, an increase of 4.3% over Aug 2019. Compared to July, however, it is a drastic decline as TBBOR reported 724 homes sold in July 2020, which was 21.3% higher than July 2019.

The median house price in August 2020 was 200,000 in Bell County, which is 14.4% more than last August. It is also higher than the median house price of \$198,000 in July 2020.

Bell County shows 696 active listings, which is down considerably (47.9%) from last August. In July 2020, there were 762 active

listings, which is also down considerably (41.5%) from the previous year.

Houses spent 82 days on the market on average in August 2020, compared to 88 days on the market in July 2020.

In the Salado market, the median home price in August 2020 was \$389,700, down 4.8% compared to the previous year. It is also a dip in the median price compared to July's \$402,500, which was a large increase compared to the previous July.

There are 19 active listover last August and just one less than July 2020. July was 25% more in terms of active listings than the previous

Salado saw 8 closed sales in August, which is an increase of 33.3% over the previous year. It is also higher than the five listings closed in July 2020.

TBBOR reports that there is approximately 4.5 months of inventory on the market with houses sold in August spending 96 days on the market. In July, there was five months of inventory, yet houses sold in July were on the market for 67 days.

Unemployment numbers show businesses laying off, furloughing their best

The Markets

The S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX), the more or less industry standard for measuring the value of U.S. Stocks, fell 0.64% for the week, closing at 3319.47. The index has now fallen for the last three weeks, is now back where it was about six weeks ago and is near where it began August. The SPX remains up just over 3% year-to-date. Ironically, the S&P 500 Value Index (SPV) rose 0.56% for the same period although it remains down over 12% from where it started the year. The fall in the SPX was driven by the highest flying large-cap growth stocks and was attributed to a declining enthusiasm by individual amateur investors as they get back to work and school combined with the weekly employment reports.

The ten-year U.S. Treasury note yield eked out a 4.5% gain at the end of the day on Friday, closing at 0.701%, maintaining an optimistically positive yield curve with the 90-day T-Bill at 0.94% and the 30-year bond at 1.44%. Last year at this time the yield curve was pointedly negative, forecasting a looming recession. That suggests that even without a COVID pandemic, we likely would be in a recession at this point anyway. Domestic crude oil futures (WTI) joined with value stocks and interest rates and rose nearly 10% to \$40.97, although the price of oil remains down about 33% for the year.

The Economy

Probably the biggest economic news of the week was that new unemployment claims have changed little over the past three weeks. According to Labor Department reports, they remain extremely elevated at about 860,000 this week, still well above the worst seen in past recessions. This indicates that a lot of businesses which have managed to hang on to valued employees are running out of options and furloughing or just laying off a host of workers. Over the last four weeks the number of workers drawing

continuing unemployment benefits from the states has fallen from about 14 million to about 13.5 million, but anecdotal evidence suggests that the drop in those drawing continuing benefits may largely be because many are hitting the six-month benefit

The Moody's Analytics Back to Normal index continues to indicate that overall economic activity in the U.S. is still running at about 80% of January's level despite widespread relaxation of governmental pandemic restrictions. That analysis is supported by the report from the Energy Information Administration that domestic petroleum products supplied are running about 17 million barrels per day compared with an average of about 22 million barrels last year, a roughly 20% decline in petroleum usage from 2019.

The coronavirus contagion and death rates seem to have leveled off with the deaths in the U.S. now at 198,306. 77 of those are now confirmed in Bell County with the contagion still rising in the county at about 2.5% per day compared with 0.61% nationally. There have been 5,255 confirmed infections in the county and reportedly 90% have completely or largely recovered. While those numbers are still staggeringly large, the objective of keeping the numbers manageable seems to be on track as the mortality rate in the county is about 1.5% of confirmed cases. Nationally, the morality rate is not so good with about 3% of those diagnosed dying of COVID-19.

In a bit of good news, retail spending by consumers in August was reported by the Commerce Department to be 2.6% higher than in August 2019, although strikingly in different areas. Clothing sales are down 20% from last year while home improvement and electronics soared. Another surprising data point is that spending on prepared food from retail establishments was actually higher than in August of 2019, just not for dining in. We spent the early part of this pandemic event cooking a lot at home, but we seem to be growing tired of home-cooked food!

Another landmark declaration was made this week as BP declared the era of ever-growing demand for petroleum is behind us. That announcement came as in the U.S., according to the Energy Department, for the first time since 1880, the total consumption of renewable energy passed the use of coal for all purposes.

Our prognosis remains unchanged. The recovery is likely to continue, albeit at a slowing rate with some bumps, but a return to normal economic behavior will not truly begin to occur until at least half the population has been effectively vaccinated. That date looks more and more to be sometime in mid-2021. Several of the more promising vaccines require two separate injections, separated by weeks and also require very low temperature refrigeration. The infrastructure needed to distribute those more sensitive vaccines is simply not there in sufficient quantity to rapidly provide for a nation of 330 million people. Additionally, even though show great promise, until a test run on 30,000 or more people is completed to ascertain if the vaccinations first, do not cause unacceptable side effects, and second, do indeed provide a high degree of immunity from the virus, they will not be approved and go into full production. Be patient. These things need time to be proven both effective and safe.





Emergency Services Districts and their economic benefits

Eight million Texans are served by an emergency services district (ESD) when they have fire or EMS needs. If you live in an ESD, when the fire truck or ambulance shows up, it is likely the ESD that is providing the service -- not the city, county or state. For many reasons, this is good news for Texans.

Texas is quickly outgrowing the abilities of cities and rural volunteer fire departments. As a result, emergency services districts are becoming increasingly important to ensure the safety and protection of communities throughout Texas, and voters continue to approve the creation of ESDs for that purpose.

`ESDs are designed to ensure adequate and stable funding for local emergency services for all residents in the district. Because ESDs are solely dedicated to protecting life and personal property in the communities they serve, they can offer cutting edge fire and EMS services while spending less than municipalities that offer services of similar scope and scale.

My company, the Perryman Group, recently undertook an analysis of the cost savings associated with ESDs as compared to other options such as municipal-

ities. Our assessment quantified four key measures of business activity including:

ing hands as a result of economic stimulus. Gross product – this is

the production of goods and services that come about in each district. Personal income – this is

the dollars that end up in the hands of the people in the district.

Job Gains - these are expressed as "jobs" or "jobyears." A "job-year" is one person working a full year, though it could be multiple people working partial years.

By comparing the median costs for comparable municipal services with the costs to operate an ESD, The Perryman Group found that ESDs generate estimated benefits between \$300 million and \$528.2 million in annual gross product and the creation of between 2,947 and 5,188 jobs.

The study also examined Insurance Services Office (ISO) ratings. ISO ratings are often used by insurance companies when setting insurance premiums. In short, a better ISO rating can create lower premiums for businesses and homeowners district. The presence and use of ESDs can result in all-around savings for residents of the district, as well as local businesses.

Based on the study, The Perryman Group found that, with an assumption of a 3% Total expenditures – this rate reduction, which is conmeasures the dollars chang- sistent with available information, the establishment of an ESD would generate economic benefits including \$26.6 million in annual gross product and 261 jobs within the district.

These numbers are of major significance, especially during current economic and budget scenarios brought on by the impact of COVID-19. ESDs offer meaningful economic impact and provide jobs for local communities. Texans approve of ESDs and continue to create and support them at the ballot box.

ESDs are a great example of how local control works. They know what is best for the communities they serve and use their limited taxing authority to save lives and protect property. Many areas of Texas depend on ESDs to provide adequate protective services. With the formal funding structure provided by ESDs, they provide a stable source of funds for fire protection and other protective services, cost savings, and economic benefits.

Any Texan who receives a suspicious text message should take the following steps:

Do not click on any links. Do not respond to the message, share the message, or give out any personal, financial or identifying in-

Delete the message and block the number that sent the message.

Report the phone number and message contents to the Office of the Attorney General or the Federal Trade Commission.

Shipping companies such as DHL, UPS, FedEx and Amazon will not contact consumers about issues with a package via

text message. Unsolicited text messages, particularly those containing unfamiliar links or purporting to come from a company you have not contacted first, should always be treated with cau




SISD offers free meals for remote students

"In this time of great uncertainty, one thing children and their families can count on is the availability of healthy school meals that ensure students are nourished and ready to learn," Children Nutrition Director Brenda Hodges stated. "That is why the USDA and school nutrition professionals are working to ensure every child continues to have access to safe, nutritious school meals, regardless of whether students are attending class in person or remotely."

In addition to providing meals to students on campus, the district will also provide meals for students who are learning remotely with a remote pickup program. Dodd's Creek bridge was moved to Salado in 1997

Did you know that one of the most historic bridges in Texas is located right here in Salado and that it is over 130 years old?

This historic bridge, commonly referred to as the green bridge on Main Street, was built by the Berlin Iron Bridge Company of East Berlin, Connecticut. It was placed over Cowhouse Creek in Coryell County, Texas in 1889, and then later moved to Dodd's Creek on CR-133 west of Gatesville. In 1955, the bridge was declared functionally obsolete for vehicular traffic. The bridge was replaced but the historic lenticular pony truss bridge was not demolished. Instead, the Texas Department of Transportation decided to renovate and utilize the structure as a pedestrian bridge to be placed over area and in New York state. Campbell's Branch in Salado. It was moved to this location on July 29, 1997, as a part of the Salado Walking Path project.

In 1990 the Texas Historical Commission and the Texas Department of Transportation identified eight lenticular truss bridges surviving in Texas. Four of

those bridges were located in San Antonio; the other four were on out-of-service roads. These bridges are recognized as historically significant engineering structures, and are the only remaining examples of this rare bridge type west of the Mississippi.

This 87-foot truss bridge represents an unusual truss type in the United States. The lenticular design features a curved top and bottom chord which forms a lens shape. This type of bridge combines an arch type bridge and suspension type bridge into a single design requiring less steel than more conventional bridges.

The patent, issued to William O. Douglas of Connecticut in 1878, was the only one given for a lenticular truss bridge in the United States. Most were constructed in the New England Through the efforts of William Payson, a salesman for the Berlin Iron Bridge Company, Texas acquired at least a dozen truss bridges in the late 19th century.


It was an exciting day in Salado when this big green structure was brought down Main Street on an "oversize load" truck. A huge

heavy-duty crane followed the truck. Those who had an interest in historic bridges and those who were just curious stood along the street to watch the unfolding of

this historic event. Cameras clicked as the crane lifted the bridge gently off the truck and carefully swung the structure toward its destination. Onlookers stood quietly as workers pushed and pulled and carefully guided the bridge to its final resting place over Campbell's Branch, giving walkers a functional and beautiful place to walk.

The Salado Walking Path project was a joint effort between the Salado Chamber of Commerce and the Texas Department of Transportation. In 1998 the Waco District of TXDOT received the Environmental Achievement Award for the Dodd's Creek Bridge Preservation Project.

When approaching the bridge from the south, be aware of the troll who has made the green bridge his home. The "Troll and Billy Goat Gruff" sculpture, by local artist Troy Kelley, sits at the southernmost end of the bridge, placed there by the Public Arts League of Salado in October 2005.

The ideal goal in bridge is to establish a "heads I win, tails you lose" position. Consider this deal played by Bruce Bell, New Zealand star. He got to four spades and ordinarily would have made the contract easily. However, since East happened to have all three missing spades and the guarded queen of clubs as well, it might seem that the contract was doomed. But Bell made

his game anyway, and, what's more, there was nothing the defenders could do to stop him.

West led the king of diamonds, which Bell allowed to hold. If West had now shifted to a club, declarer, after discovering the 3-0 trump division, could have avoided a second diamond loser

But West led another diamond at trick two, taken by the ace, and when Bell next cashed the ace of trump, he learned that East had a trump trick coming. It looked as though the contract would now depend on winning a club finesse, but Bell found a way to

He began by playing the ace of hearts and ruffing a heart in dummy. He then exited with a diamond, won by West with the jack.

West could do no better than return a club, taken with the ace. Bell then played the king and another trump, saddling East with the lead and rendering him helpless. East had no choice but to return a club or yield a ruff-and-discard, either of which gave

typical "heads I win, tails you lose" position. No matter how East-West defended, Bell had a countermeasure available that would get him home safely.
