Eldridge says that after he met Jean Shine, a founder and President of Wreaths for Vets, he realized that other central Texas communities like Killeen, Harker Heights and Copperas Cove have sections of the Veterans Cemetery that they collectively take responsibility for each Christmas holiday to put wreaths at the gravesite of each veteran buried there.

Eldridge reminds high school students that volunteering for Wreaths for Vets qualifies toward community service hours required for graduation and for scholarship applications.


He asks that all Salado volunteers wear Salado shirts so that others will see that there is a Salado presence for this important

BoA gets updates on Sanctuary, 2020 Scottish Gathering Salado Heights developments

Utility and street work is in full swing on Sanctuary Phase I residential development that will have 190 residential lots as small as 1/12th of an acre feeding into Royal Street at the Salado United Methodist Church.

"If you have not seen an aerial shot of it, they have vastly changed the landscape in that area," Village administrator Don Ferguson told aldermen on Nov. 5.

"They are cutting streets and installing utilities and making good progress," Ferguson said, adding that the Village is "inspecting their work on a regular basis."

The second phase of Sanctuary will be the development of the properties on the south side of FM 2268 (Wildfire Ranch) and the north side of FM 2268 (The

"The apartment complex will hug the lake system on the north side of FM 2268,"

Ferguson said. It will include 300 apartments, a small 10-house subdivision on the northeast corner of the property and 40 townhouses. The and 90 in Phase 2.

"They will be as tall as three stories," Ferguson said. "Some will have covered garage parking, others will have covered parking and some will have open parking.

"They are working to maintain as much of the tree structures on the land as possible," he added

Work is expected to begin early next year on this project and will take 18 months to complete.

"They are talking with us about dedicating park space with access to one of the lakes," Ferguson said.

"The development agreement as a whole sets out the standard of how they (apartments) are going to look," he added.

The developers are also in the process of putting to-

gether the request to form a Pace Park to downtown Sal-Public Improvement District (PID). "This is not going to cost the village anything. We will be in charge of how apartments will be built in it works. The developers will two phases: 210 in phase 1 be responsible for the assessments," Ferguson said.

Eagle Heights Ferguson also reported that developers have submitted construction plans for Village review for Eagle Heights, a mixed use development with 175 residential lots and 16 acres of commercial property at Williams Rd. and West Village Road. The process of voluntary annexation of the property began last week, according to Ferguson. A public hearing on the annexation of the property is planned for Nov. 19 at the Village Municipal

Salado aldermen got a surprise when they learned Nov. 5 of the costs of a proposed walking bridge over Salado Creek that will link

The total cost, including permits, engineering and construction will be about \$580,000. Of that, \$284,000 will be for construction, \$32,000 for engineering and \$289,000 for permitting

The largest part of the construction cost is \$157,500 for anchoring the stepping stones that will cross Salado

Ferguson told aldermen that "I would question floating the study (a biological study required by US Fish and Wildlife Service (US-FWS) because the work will take place within the proposed critical habitat area of the Salado salamander, which would be a further, unknown cost.

"Permitting costs will be extensive," Ferguson said, "Construction will have to be monitored by these federal agencies."

Divided government, less change is good news for markets

The Markets

dex (SPX) rose a whopping 7.32% for the week to close at 3509.44. That astounding weekly rise leaves it a mere 1.99% from its high point at the beginning of September and up 8.92% year to date. The word on the street was that a Biden presidency and a Republican majority in the Senate was the ideal situation for stocks as a divided government meant that there was little likelihood of major tax or regulatory changes. There were also elements of a relief rally in the gains as the specter of an unknown outcome to the presidential election receded. The SPX continues to be driven by about ten large-cap growth stocks priced at extraordinarily high prices so a correction at some point is not out of the question.

The S&P 500 Stock In-


The ten-year U.S. Treasury note yield slipped a bit, falling 6.83% to 0.819% as the prospects for a major stimulus bill seemed to slip further away but the yield remained well above where it has been the past several months while the yield curve remained decidedly positive. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) rose over 5% to \$37.41 but remained below the critical \$40 level as economic prospects seemed to brighten.

Another surprising number was released during the week. A Stanford University survey found that 42% of currently employed workers in the United States are working from home. Counterintuitively, that high level of home-based workforce may be a big contributor to the jump in productivity. How much of that productivity gain and work from home percentage will be retained after the pandemic passes by is anyone's guess but at least some of the gains are likely to linger.

The labor market appeared to be in near equilibrium as official unemployment declined to 6.9% but new unemployment claims for the week held steady at 751,000. million jobs since April, just over half the 22.2 million lost in the spring. The official unemployment figures, which do not include self-employed or contract workers remain at roughly twice that of a year ago. Service industries in the U.S. constitute the bulk of employment and the data indicate that service hiring virtually stopped in the month of October. Survey and anecdotal information suggest that the record-breaking number of new COVID infections combined with colder weather may result in recent labor gains reversing as new layoffs hit. The labor recovery continues to be "K" shaped as factories and professions are hiring while services are continu-

The COVID-19 pandemic remains with us as the U.S. recorded a record 126,403 new cases and 1,248 deaths on November 6. That takes the death toll in America to 235,601 in eight months and a cumulative 2.4% mortality rate for those confirmed infected. Here in Bell County, the cases and deaths continue to rise with 6,770 confirmed infections and 103 deaths. Over 19,000 people have now died in Texas from the

ing to lay off workers.

We continue to foresee a dramatic rebound in the economy once we have an effective vaccine in widespread use, but we are apparently in the second wave of the pandemic and there are likely some surprises and bumps to come. We also continue to advise investors to hold fast to a well-diversified portfolio and a good cash reserve. The crisis is neither over nor likely to wreck us. Be patient. Wear your masks. Keep your dis-

Anyone who has played bridge for any length of time has had the unhappy experience as declarer of seeing an apparently certain contract disintegrate right in front of his eyes. Usually, the cause is freakish distribution of the opposing cards, in which case declarer is probably not to blame. But when declarer himself is responsible for turning a sure thing into a losing proposition, that's another story.

Take this case where West led a heart

against South's three-notrump contract. Declarer put up dummy's queen, which held, and then set about establishing the club suit. However, East declined to cooperate, refusing to take his ace on either the first or second round.

This left declarer with no recourse. He could go ahead and establish the clubs by playing a third round, but there would then be no way to reach the dummy. In practice, he turned his attention to spades and wound up

down one, scoring two tricks each suit. Considering that South had a sure thing going from the opening bell, it is difficult to muster any sympathy for him. The plain fact is that after the opening heart lead, nine tricks were there for the taking.

Declarer's error came when he played the queen of hearts from dummy at trick one, a momentary victory that eventually cost him the contract. Instead, he should have played dummy's deuce and taken whatever card East produced with the ace. This would have assured a later entry to dummy

with either the queen or jack of hearts. In the actual deal, after taking East's nine (or six) with the ace, declarer plays three rounds of clubs. East can then return a heart or shift to another suit, as he likes, but nothing can stop South from scoring a spade, two hearts, two diamonds and four clubs for his contract.





As a result, this was the first time our school board members' three year terms were adjusted. This past three year term was increased to three and a half years and this upcoming term will only be two and a half years.

This was also the first time our school board election was conducted along with a presidential election. As a result, we had by far the highest participation ever in a school board election.

The highest number of votes a school board candidate ever received prior to this year was 877 votes. This year, all four candidates received approximately three to four times that number.

When Kim Bird com-

pletes this term, she will tie both Darrell Street and Jeff Kelley for the longest time spent on the school board with 15 years of service each.

Savannah Hennig has become the youngest Salado ISD school board member ever elected at 33 years of age. She is also now the fourth member of her family to serve on the Salado ISD school board. The program will provide students the opportunity to design, develop and architect cloud computing environments and prepare them for AWS most in-demand certifica-

Students looking to jump start or change careers can take advantage of the recently initiated quick career training programs. Short-term credit certificates of completion and non-credit programs in a variety of fields of study are offered and many can be completed in less than one year.

Both online and inperson training options are available in a variety of areas in six career clusters: arts and humanities; construction, manufacturing and transportation; business and business technology; health care; public service; and science, technology, engineering and math (STEM).

Life of a Dyslexic

Here we go yet again. "Sydney, say and put the alphabet together." "Now, put the numbers in order from 0-10." I was 8 and struggled with the most simple tasks that a 3/4-year-old could do. Embarrassed is an understatement. But dyslexia isn't all about getting letters or numbers mixed up. It's not about being illiterate. It's not about the level of intelligence.

Simply put it is learning in a different way. We like visuals. We like to have the hands-on experience to understand things. We like math but have a difficult time explaining it or showing work. We HATE to read! We get frustrated easily no matter the situation. For me I get frustrated because I do my best to explain things but it never comes out the right way or I know a word and it's meaning but don't know how to pronounce it....I am 25...frustrating. Therefore, most people just give me that look..."like what are you even talking about?" We like everything to be PERFECT and get so upset when it's not. Everyone that knows me knows this is an extreme FACT about me. I don't know how many times I sat at the table at my great uncle's house rewriting in a general ledger page after page because my handwriting wasn't straight on the line. It was for an accounting project my first semester and wanted to make a good impression and wanted mine to be the best. About 7 hours later I was finally finished.

Being a dyslexic, no day is the same. Am I going to have a good day or a bad

day? Am I going to be able to make a decision about breakfast or am I going to get frustrated and just skip out? Literally that is an EV-ERYDAY battle. Am I going to be social today or will I let low-self-esteem get the best of me? Will I be able to talk in complete sentences or am I just going to give up and not talk at all? This one is probably the biggest one I struggle with. Still to this day if I am called on in class or even talking to friends/family I get very overwhelmed and anxious and will literally just shut down. What dyslexics need most is patience. Not to feel rushed. Most of us talk slow but once we know we are surrounded by people who don't mind being patient with us, letting us gather our thoughts and then being able

to say them, makes everything more comfortable and easier for everyone.

I am very fortunate and so blessed to have a mother who did everything she could to try to understand. She researched, reached out to people, got the best tutors for me and made sure I was surrounded by people who cared and understood what I was going through. Before I actually even knew what life was going to be like for me even in adulthood.

K-12 there is one way and one way only the "normal" way. If a student does not comprehend the "normal" way we are put into small classrooms away from peers. Giving us the feeling that "there is something wrong with us" or "we just aren't all there." Growing up I was tested for many different things because the teachers couldn't understand why I could do difficult tasks but fail at the simpler ones. In my momma's words, "we didn't know if you were a genius or what was going on." I am not ashamed to say that I literally failed every TAKS test until my high school years. And I am not ashamed to say that I literally cried when the teachers told me I got either a perfect score or commended or all 4 parts of the TAKS. To some of y'all, that standardized test might have been really easy, but for me, my family knew how much I would stress over that stupid thing. So, when we got the scores back my mother always threw me and my sister a big celebration.


Dyslexia is labeled as a learning disability. Having that and ADD has not been easy in my educational journey, but I have learned to work with it. I know each assignment is going to take me 3-4 hours. I know that I cannot have any background noise when completing assignments. I know it's going to take me At least 1 hour to get focused before even opening the textbook or laptop.

But guess what has hap-

pened to me learning all those things about myself throughout the years....I am now a part of National Honor Societies. I have been granted academic awards. I have been offered jobs with some of the top major companies in the world. I have had the chance to speak to people that I once only thought Ivy League students

could speak to. I have been presented with opportunities to not only further my career choice but also the opportunity to talk to and help children who have dyslexia or trouble reading.

Salado faces Rusk in first round of playoffs

Salado Eagles face the Rusk Eagles in the bi-district round of the 4A, Div. 2 football playoffs with kick off at A&M Consolidated High School stadium 7:30 p.m. Nov. 13.

Rusk is the fourth place team out of District 10, while Salado is the District Champ of District 9, with a 9-1 record. Salado has outscored its opponents, 427-149 with a single mar to its record in a 21-7 second week loss to the repeating champions of 3A football, the Grandview Zebras.

Rusk is 5-5 on the year, 2-3 in district. They have a balanced offense that has 927 yards passing and 1,305 yards rushing. The ball is spread out between several running backs, but Alex Jones leads the pack with 593 yards on 88 carries and nine

touchdowns.Junior quarterback Owen McCown handles most of the duties, passing for 883 yards and eight TDs.

Rusk will face a daunting defense in Salado, which has allowed only 2,395 yards total offense this season, including 1,762 yards rushing and 633 passing. Kofi Stoglin anchors the defense with 44 tackles on the year.

Salado has a relentless offensive attack all three running backs as threats to break big runs. Noah Mescher leads the offense with 1,335 yards on 151 carries and 19 TDs. Reid Vincent had 1,065 yards on 98 carries and 9 TDs. Wrook Brown has 520 yards on 47 carries and 10 TDs.

The Eagles are on a trajectory to face top-ranked Carthage, but will first have to get past their District 10 opponent Rusk this week.




