

Court seeks applicants for Emergency Services District

During the regular meeting of the Bell County Commissioners Court last week, commissioners officially announced the formation of the Bell County Emergency Services District #1 in Salado, as voted on during the General Election.

The court will now begin accepting applications to serve on the new five member board, which the court hopes to install before the end of the year.

The new emergency services district will serve an area in South Bell County comprised mostly of Salado

and the surrounding region. Emergency service districts generally support and provide reliable, local emergency services, including fire and EMS, within the established area. The new district will have the power to impose taxes on residents of the area served by the district.

In order to serve as a board member for Bell County Emergency Services District #1, applicants must be at least 18 years of age, a resident of the State of Texas, and be either qualified to vote within the area served by the district or the owner

of land subject to taxation by the district.

When evaluating applications, commissioners will consider an applicant's knowledge in relation to fire prevention or emergency medical services, as well as applicable common policies and practices that will be relevant to this board.

Interested individuals should email their letter of interest, biography and/or resume to april.metcalf@bellcounty.texas.gov no later than 5 p.m. Nov. 27.

Two Bell County offices close due to COVID-19

The Bell County Vehicle Registration Office in Belton will be closed through Nov. 30 to in-person, walk-in services due to additional employees in the office testing positive for COVID-19. The office will continue to provide services online and by phone. In addition, the Vehicle Registration Offices in Temple, Killeen, and Ft. Hood remain open for in-person, walk-in services by appointment.

Bell County Tax Assessor-Collector Shay Luedeke closed the Belton office last week after two employees tested positive for the virus. At the time, two other

employees reported symptoms and were encouraged to get tested. When those tests came back positive, Luedeke made the decision to close the office through the Thanksgiving holiday.

Appointments can still be made with the Temple and Killeen offices by visiting the Bell County Tax Assessor-Collector website.

Additionally, the Bell County Elections Department will close its doors to the public for walk-in services through Nov. 30. This is the result of two employees testing positive for COVID-19.

Interim Elections Ad-

ministrator Matthew Dutton stressed that, while his staff is not scheduled to be in the office during regular hours, Election Department services will continue to be provided online, by phone, and by appointment.

In addition, and out of an abundance of caution, the Elections Division is in the process of notifying members of the Early Vote Ballot Board (who were in the building last week) of the confirmed COVID-19 cases.

Per State Health Department protocols, contact tracing is being conducted as it relates to these cases.

BoA approves annexation of 86-acre Eagle Heights

Salado aldermen unanimously approved the voluntary annexation of 86.678 acres at the southwest corner of Williams Rd. and West Village Rd. after conducting a public hearing Nov. 19 during which no one spoke.

The Eagle Heights development will include 171 Single Family homes and 15-16 acres of commercial development. The residential section will be built in the first phase of development. It will include a private park for the residents. The Village will provide sewer service to the development.

Alderman John Cole expressed concern that with three major residential developments and an apartment development all scheduled to come into development in the next year, if a burden on the Police force might be a result. "Will we have to add officers to meet the need for these areas," he asked.

Village administrator Don Ferguson said that there would not be "a demand for more officers. We will monitor and address this."

Mayor Pro Tem Rodney Bell echoed Cole's concerns of additional demand on municipal police services, but added, "It is appropriate when talking about this development (Eagle Heights) and the Bearmond development (170 lots off of Royal), we will at least be getting tax revenue from these areas. Prior negotiations on Sanctuary allow those tax

revenues to walk out the door.... We need to keep that in mind."

Amber Preston Dankert expressed concern about sewer capacity, although the Village is at less than 20% of the 200,000 gallon per day capacity of the sewer treatment plant.

Ferguson told aldermen that the plant has plenty of capacity for the three developments on the books. He added that the current plant was built with the ability to expand to 300,000 gallon per day capacity. "But that may not be the best approach to have everything going uphill to the plant," he said. He said the Village may want to have a plant on the west side of I-35 in the future.

New mayor Michael Coggin and aldermen Paul Cox and Jason Howard were given their oaths of office. Rodney Bell was elected Mayor Pro Tem.



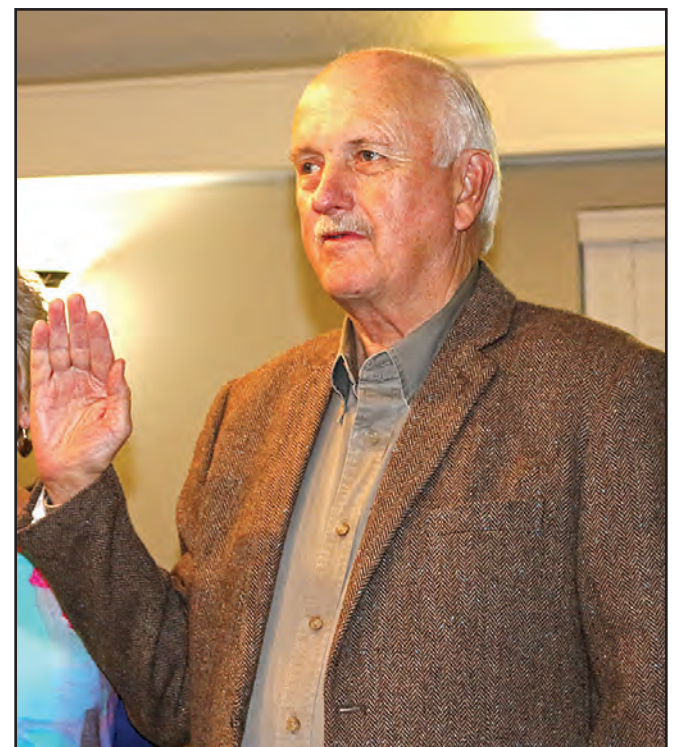

Risk of economic slowdown if no stimulus by year-end

The Markets

The S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) our preferred, if flawed measure of the U.S. stock market, sagged 0.77% for the week ending November 20 to close at 3557.54. That small but significant decline was credited to a combination of the Secretary of the Treasury announcing that he planned to end several emergency loan provisions at the end of December, the continued absence of Congressional action on a new relief bill, and the record-breaking resurgence of COVID-19 across the country. The Index is now up a very respectable 10.11% year to date but down 0.65% from its high at the beginning of September. As evidence that the rotation from large-cap growth stocks to smaller value stocks is continuing, the CRSP U.S. Mid Cap Value Index rose 0.42% for the week. That roughly 1% differential between the SPX and the mid-cap val-

ue index is small, but when extended over a year or so, quite significant.

The yield on the 10-year U.S. Treasury note suggested the bond market was even more unhappy with the fiscal situation than the stock market as the yield fell almost 7% to 0.829%, down 57% year to date. The good news is that the yield curve remains solidly positive, if muted in rate. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) bucked the trend, rising 5.11% to \$42.17 as the Chinese economy rebounded and with it, demand for U.S. oil.

The Economy

The coronavirus pandemic continues to cast a long shadow over the econo-

my. The U.S. daily infection rate rose to over 187,000 on Thursday as nearly 2,000 new deaths were reported. With a total death count of over 252,000, the U.S. continues to lead the world in new infections, hospitalizations, and deaths. Texas has passed California for the state lead in total deaths at 20,689. As the infection and death rate continue to accelerate, it is having a profound economic effect. Moody's Back to Normal Index fell from last month's 83.4 to 81.6 as the economy gradually slips backward.

Economists have been warning for several weeks that the record-breaking surge in COVID-19 infections and hospitalizations

The Failure of Black Lives Matter

Black Lives Matter came up with the single most effective political slogan of the year.

While no one was likely to be overly impressed with Joe Biden's line, "Build Back Better," and Donald Trump's "Keep America Great" or "Make America Great Again, Again" didn't have the resonance of the original 2016 version, BLM broke through the clutter with a catchphrase that was memorable, pungent -- and utterly devastating to Democrats.

After a surprising Tory victory in the British parliamentary election in 1992, the pro-Tory tabloid The Sun famously boasted, "It's the Sun Wot Won It." In the same spirit, it could be said that in this year's congressional election, "It's 'Defund the Police' Wot Lost It."

Democrats have an uphill battle to take the U.S. Senate -- pending two Georgia run-offs -- and suffered shocking setbacks in the House that drastically diminished their majority. All over the map, Democrats got hammered on defunding the police, which couldn't have been better designed to extract maximum political pain with zero upside.

Black Lives Matter has been a stunning success in the elite culture. It won the obeisance of almost every major institution, from corporate America to sports

leagues to colleges. It created a powerful, if dishonest, narrative of systemic police racism. It got invested with nearly a holy significance, such that criticizing it is considered at least a sin and perhaps a firing offense.

Much more importantly, at least for a time after the death of George Floyd in police custody in Minneapolis, it won the goodwill of a clear majority of Americans.

To take this position of strength and use it primarily to associate your allies with a politically radioactive position requires extraordinary strategic folly and heedless ideological fanaticism. BLM had both, in ample supply.

The notion of defunding the police had been rattling around the left for a long time, but the George Floyd protests took it mainstream. BLM pushed municipalities to actually act on the proposal.

Whenever someone tried to take the edge off defunding the police by redefining it as simply reallocating some law-enforcement dollars, defenders piped up to say, No, we really mean it. The New York Times ran an op-ed against incremen-

talist interpretations, "Yes, We Mean Literally Abolish the Police."

Predictably, Republicans took the weapon handed to them and used it, as Democrats would have done if a voluble faction on the right called for, say, abolishing child welfare agencies.

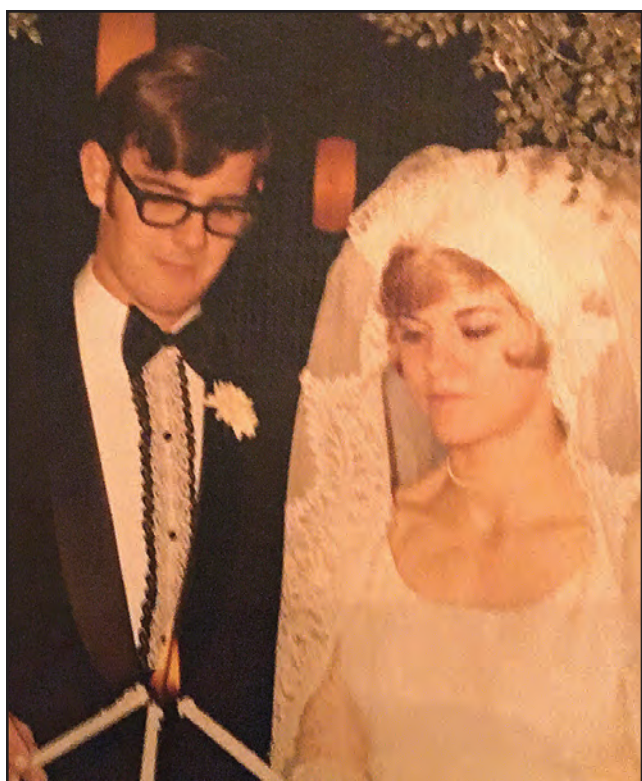
The effectiveness of the attack now has Democrats who are otherwise loath to speak ill of BLM complaining about what its catchy slogan did to the party.

After support for BLM surged last spring, positive feelings for it have been declining. A Pew Research report showed support for BLM dropping from 67% in June to 55% in September. Only 45% of white people expressed support for the movement.

Given that BLM elevated the dumbest, most self-destructive slogan in American politics in a very long time, and an even more atrocious policy, its numbers deserve to fall further. Advocates of defunding the police argued that setting out an extreme position could have a political effect even if it had no chance of enactment.

They proved exactly right -- just not how they expected.

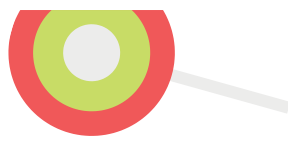

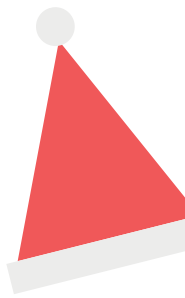

across the country were likely to have a depressing effect on jobs, but the evidence did not show up until this last week. Applications for unemployment insurance rose to a seasonally adjusted 742,000, up sharply from the 711,000 the week before. As a point of reference, prior to the pandemic, new weekly unemployment claims averaged about 210,000. While the week's higher number is minor compared with the avalanche of claims that hit in March, it is still significantly higher than the U.S. has seen in any prior recession since unemployment claims have been tracked. The total number of people collecting state unemployment benefits continued to fall but evidence suggests that the fall was primarily a result of unemployed workers exceeding the 26-week limit on state benefits.

In a potentially bright side to the pandemic, existing home sales rose to the highest level since 2006, up 4.3% in October from September. The trend appears to be generated by families fleeing high property-tax rates and the coronavirus threat in large cities and moving to suburbs and

smaller communities as work-from-home becomes the norm in many sectors of the economy. Amplifying the movement are record-low mortgage rates that tend to both make purchasing a home less expensive in terms of monthly payments and tend to ramp up the market values of homes. With many older potential sellers choosing to sit out the pandemic, the supply of homes for sale is limited and with the demand high, the median existing-home price has risen 15.5% in the last twelve months to \$313,000, a new record.

U.S. industrial production continues to recover. Although production is still down 5.6% from February, it rose 1.1% in October as consumers upped their purchases of recreational vehicles, houses, and cars. Borrowing for those large, durable items soared even as, on average, families are paying down their credit cards according to the Federal Reserve. Household debt, again generally for longer-use durable goods and mortgages, rose \$87 billion, six-tenths of a percent in the third quarter, even as credit card balances fell by \$10 billion.

In another bit of bright news, a different kind of virus is benefiting American farmers. An African swine fever outbreak was contained in China in 2019 as millions of hogs were culled. Now pig farmers in China are racing to repopulate their herds and need a record amount of grain for feed. To get the grain they need they have largely turned to the American farmer as drought conditions have limited supply from Brazil and Russia. At the same time, Americans have gone on a bread-baking binge. The result is that bread wheat has risen by about one-third since August while soft winter wheat, used in animal feed, is up 20%.

The bottom line though remains unchanged. There is a significant risk of an economic slowdown around the end of the year if no fiscal stimulus bill clears Congress and is signed by the President. In the longer-term it looks like widespread vaccination may be available by mid-2021 and with it a surge in pent up demand could be released, triggering an economic boom.

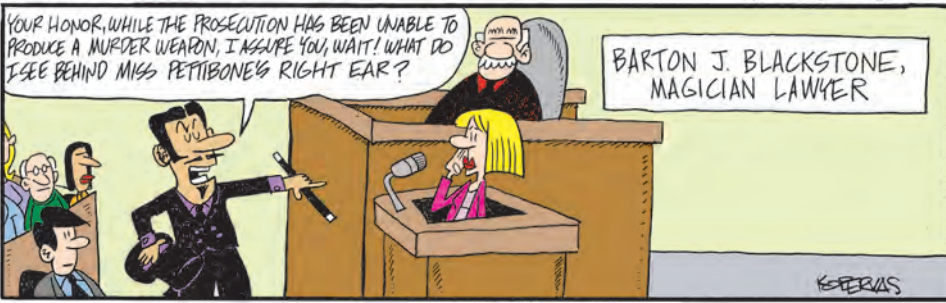

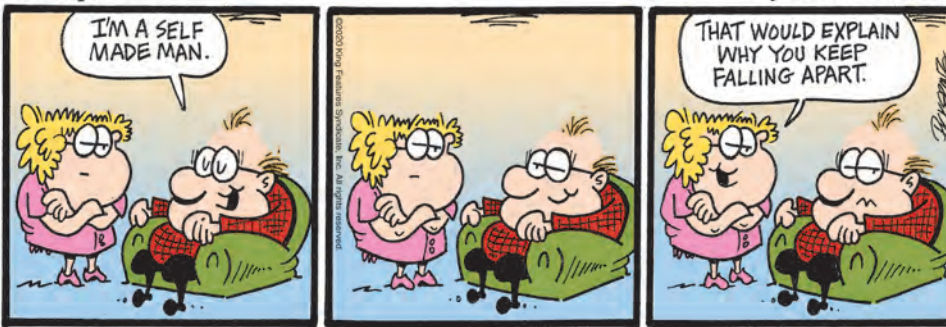

Opening lead — ten of spades.

At several tables, however, West led a spade, giving declarer an opportunity for a bit of chicanery. At the table where the bidding went as shown, South knew where the missing high cards were located, thanks to East's takeout double on the second round.

Declarer won the spade lead with the ace and drew trump in two rounds. He then crossed to the king of spades and led the deuce of clubs toward his hand!

This placed East squarely on the horns of a dilemma. If South had the singleton or doubleton jack of clubs, playing low would cost a trick — an important consideration at matchpoint scoring. After much soul-searching, East decided to go up with the king, and from that point on, he was a dead duck.

In practice, East returned a diamond to declarer's queen, whereupon South played the ace and another diamond, putting East back on lead. East had to return a spade or a diamond — either one yielding a ruff-and-discard — or cash the ace of clubs. Whatever he chose to do, declarer could not lose more than two clubs and a diamond, and the contract was home.

Note that East would have done no better by returning a club or a spade after he took the club king. Once he fell into South's trap, all roads led to 10 tricks for declarer.

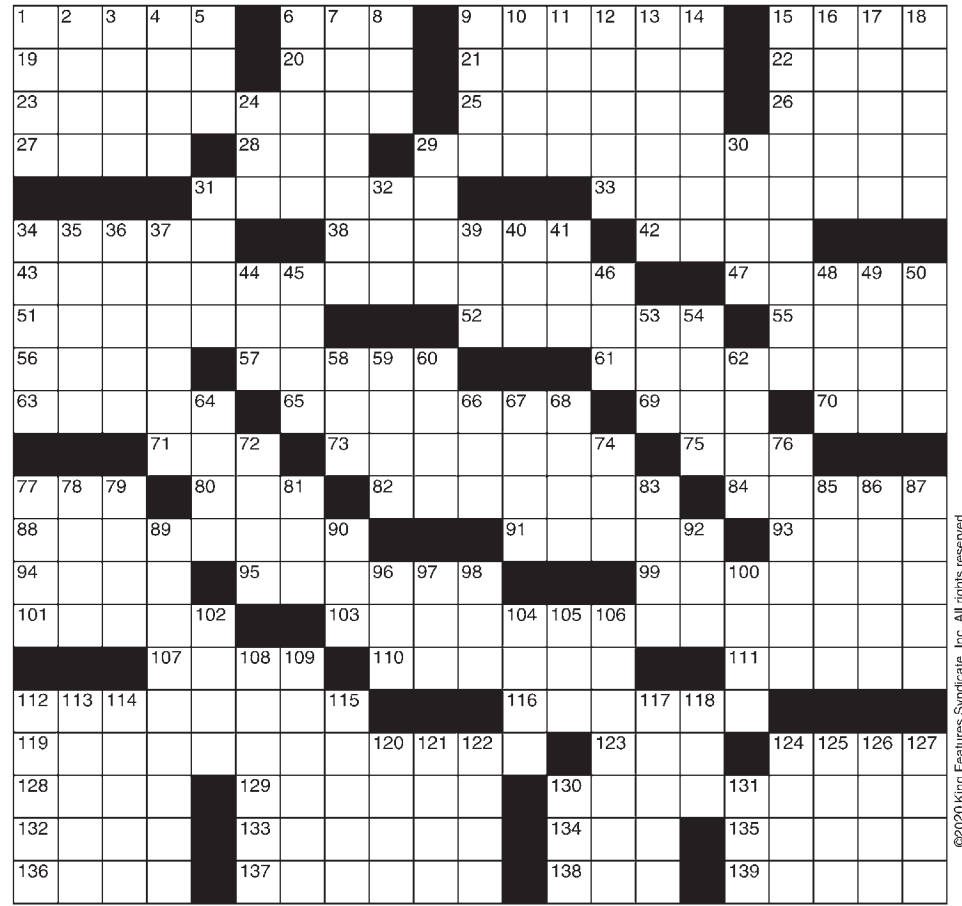

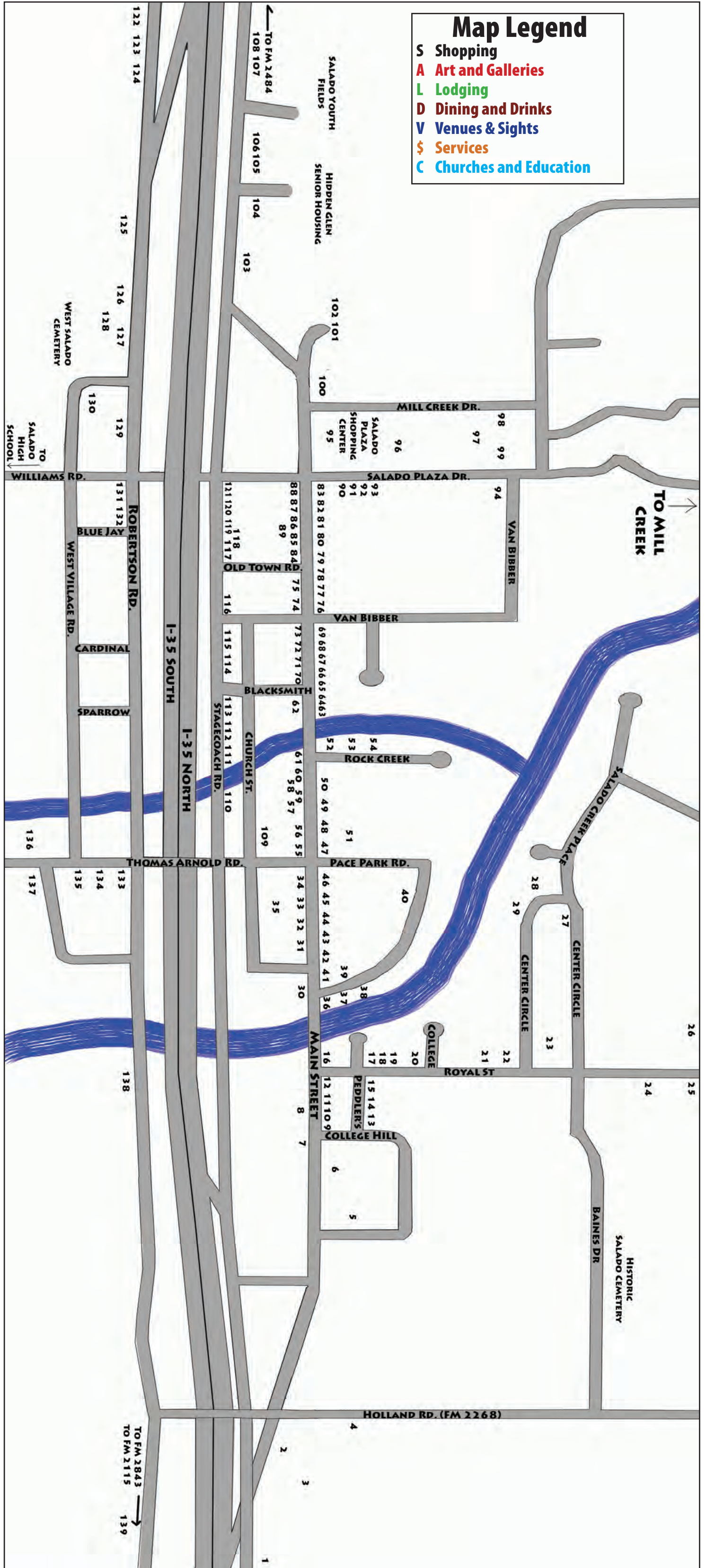

Eagles beat Bellville, face #1 Carthage

Salado Eagles controlled the clock with their ground game and relied on its stiff defense to keep the powerful Bellville Brahmas from scoring in the final minute to win the Area round of the 4A-2 playoff match 28-23.

The Eagles ate five minutes off the clock on its opening drive, to set the standard for Coach Alan Haire's slot-T offensive approach of "if the other team doesn't get the ball a lot, they can't score a lot."

Workhorse fullback Noah Mescher capped a 56-yard drive with a 6-yard TD run at 7:19 in the first. Wrook Brown toed the extra point for the 7-0 lead.

Bellville answered, driving 79 yards in 12 plays. Running back Robert Briggs got past the Eagle defense for a 31-yard touchdown run with 2:27 left in the first. Benito Florencio kicked the point after to tie the game at 7-7.

Salado answered quickly with Reid Vincent scoring on the first play from scrimmage of the second quarter on a 56-yard jaunt through the Brahma defense. Brown made it 14-7 with 11:51 left in the first half.

Bellville's Richard Reese pounded the Eagle defense on a 13-play drive. The Brahmas set up for a first down at the Eagle 14-yard line, but the Salado defense stiffened and Peyton Miller flushed Brahma quarterback Jake Lischka out of the pocket and tackled him short of the first down marker to force Bellville to settle for a 25-yard field Florencio goal to bring the score to 14-10 with 5:52 left in the half.

Bellville took the second half kickoff and went for it on a 4th and 1, but Miller had different ideas, snuffing Reese at the line of scrimmage to give Salado the ball at the Brahma 42 yard line on downs.

Five plays later, Wrook Brown scored from the 10. He added the kick for a 21-10 lead with 7:42 left in the third.

Salado defense again stiffened, with passes broken up by Brown and LaTrell Jenkins and Kory Walker on third down to force Bellville to a three-and-out series. Salado drove 71 yards in six plays, with Brown scoring from the Brahma 6 yard line. Mescher had the big carry of the drive for 38 yards before being brought down from behind. Brown booted the

PAT for a 28-10 with 4:09 left in the third.

Bellville answered, scoring with 28 seconds left in the third on a 32-yard pass from Lischka to Kyle Peshel. Florencio added the PAT for Bellville to trail Salado 28-17 going into the final 12 minutes of play.

Salado was plagued with calls, including a sideline infraction and a personal foul to kill a drive at the Brahma 42 yard line.

Bellville drove from their own 14 yard line to score in six plays, scoring on a 26-yard pass from Lischka to Trevon Green with 5:49 left to play in the game. Salado stopped the Brahmas on their two-point try to leave the score at 28-23.

Salado took the ensuing kick off at their own 27 yard line. A third down false start put the Eagles in a long yardage hole, but Reid Vincent pounded out 8 yards and Noah Mescher went for 9 yards on a gutsy call by Haire to go for it on fourth and 3 to go at Salado's own 34 yard line. Salado pushed the ball across midfield and Vincent dashed through the Brahm defense for a 37-yard TD that was called back for a hold with 2:34. The score would have put the game out of reach, but instead left Salado with a second and 18 to go from the Brahma 47 yard line.

Salado punted for a short 21 yards to give Bellville the ball at their own 21 yard line with 1:27 left to play.

A hold against Bellville, only the third penalty of the game against the Brahmas, pushed the ball back to the 11 yard line. The Salado defense was able to keep the scrambling Bellville offense on their side of the midfield marker as time ran out on the Brahma season.

Salado will face the #1 Carthage Bulldogs in the Regional Semis round at 5:30 p.m. Nov. 27 at New Caney ISD Randall Reed Stadium. Tickets are available at the gate for \$7 per person, or online for \$6 per person.

While the 4A, Div. 1 Champion is heavily favored in the Regional Semi contest, District 9-4A has proven particularly resilient in the playoffs. China Spring beat West Orange Stark easily last week 35-22, even though the Mustangs were ranked #3 in state and were favored to win. The week before, the Cougars beat Jasper, ranked #5 just ahead of Salado and China Spring by Dave Campbell's Texas Football by a score of 45-19.

Jasper was the second place team in District 10-4A, losing to Carthage 35-18.

Carthage hasn't lost a game since their state semifinal loss in 2018 to eventual 4A Div. 1 Champion Liberty Hill. Last year, they were 16-0, beating Waco Lavega in the state championship 42-28. Carthage was 4A, Div. 1 Champions in 2018, beating Kennedale 49-21 and 2017 Champions, beating Abilene Wylie 31-17. The Bulldogs have been in the state finals eight times, and have won seven state championships.

They returned six offensive starters from last year's championship team, including quarterback Kai Horton who threw for 3,746 yards last year and running back Mason Courtney, who carried for 1,679 yards in 2019.

The Bulldogs returned just two starters from last year's defense, including defensive lineman Kylon Liston, who had 97 tackles, 10 TFL and three sacks in 2019.

The Bulldogs have outscored their opponents 400-67 this year. Salado has outscored their opponents 457-172. Both have faced tough competition this year with state-ranked opponents.

The Bulldogs beat Gilmer, Pleasant Grove and Kilgore, all of which remain in the playoffs. Salado beat Waco Connally and China Spring, which were both in the top 10 in state during the year, but lost to the two-time champion Grandview Zebras 21-7 for the only blemish on the Eagles' record.

The Eagles beat Waco Connally on the road 20-15 and followed it up with a 28-14 home win over China Spring to seal the District Championship for Salado.

For the Eagles to win, they will need to do what they have done all year, keep their opponents offense off of the field. "We're gonna need to get first downs," Coach Alan Haire said.

Salado will also need a little luck on the defensive side of the ball. The Eagles secondary will need to keep the receivers in front of them while the line and linebackers find a way to harass Horton. If the Eagles can get a turnover or two, it could give Salado what it needs to knock the king of his throne.

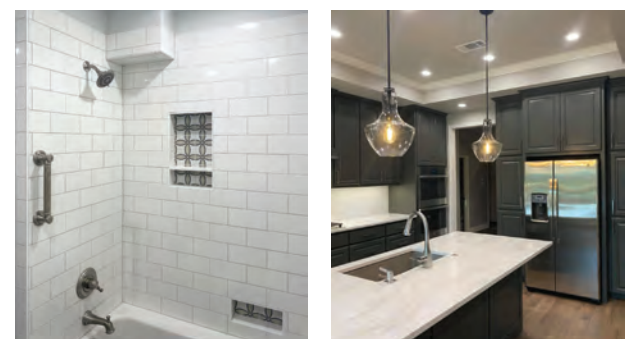

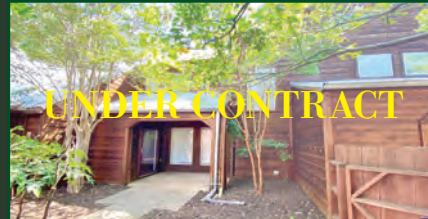

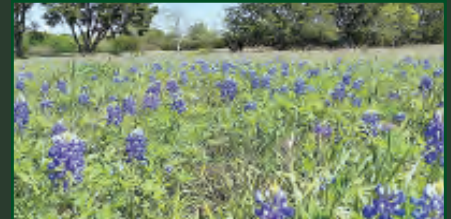
