# Sanctuary seeks solution to finance water infrastructure

Sanctuary Development hit another roadblock in its development and turned to the Salado Water Supply Corporation seeking help.

Mark Ramseur and Tony Corbett met with the SWSC Board of Directors at the Salado Civic Center Jan. 7 to discuss two alternatives that would allow the funding of \$4.5 million in off-site infrastructure improvements to the SWSC to allow the water company to serve the Sanctuary developer's request for 1,547 Living UNit Equivalents (LUEs) of retail water service.

According to a document presented to the board members, "SWSC's existing water system is not adequate to provide service to the proposed project, and the provision of service will require SWSC to acquire additional water supplies, and will necessitate the construction of elevated and ground storage tanks, booster pumps, transmission facilities and distribution facilities."

The document states that "SWSC has proposed that the Developer of Sanctuary fund and construct all improvements to SWSC's water system required for the provision of service to the project.... it is not viable for the Developer to fund the water infrastructure without some cost recovering or funding mechanism."

More than five years ago, when Sanctuary and the Village of Salado signed a series of documents consisting of a Development Agreement, Wastewater Service Agreement and Annexation Agreement, Robert Sulaski told the board of aldermen that the Developer would pursue the formation of a Public Improvement District to fund the infrastructure for the Sanctuary development, which ultimately will include 515,000 sq. ft. of commercial development, 40,000 sq. ft. of entertainment venues, 355 rooms of lodging, 575 units multiple family housing (multi-story senior living and rental properties), 130 multi-family units (condos and townhomes), 364 single family residential units and 500 covered parking spaces.

Infrastructure work on the first phase of the singlefamily residential units off of Royal St. began last year. The first phase will include about 180 units.

According to the Development Agreement, the Village "consents to a Public Improvement District subject to the filing requirements stipulated by the State of Texas."

Those requirements include presentation of a petition calling for the formation of the PID.

Section 372.005 of the Local Government Code requires "A petition for the establishment of a public improvement district must state:

- (1) the general nature of the proposed improvement;
- (2) the estimated cost of the improvement;
- (3) the boundaries of the proposed assessment district;

(4) the proposed method of assessment, which may specify included or excluded classes of assessable prop-

(5) the proposed apportionment of cost between the public improvement district and the municipality or county as a whole;

(6) whether the management of the district is to be by the municipality or county, the private sector, or a partnership between the municipality or county and the private sector;

(7) that the persons signing the petition request or concur with the establishment of the district; and

(8) that an advisory body may be established to develop and recommend an improvement plan to the governing body of the municipality or county."

The Village has received two petitions for the creation of PIDs on the Sanctuary properties. The Village is currently reviewing those petitions and is working on a timeline for consideration.

The petition for Sanctuary East Public Improvement District Petition calls for \$25 million in PID bonds for improvements, to be paid out over 30 years at a tax rate assessment of no more than \$0.50 per \$100 valuation.

The petition for Sanctuary Public Improvement District Petition calls for \$35 million in PID bonds for improvements, to be paid out over 30 years at a tax rate assessment of no more than \$050 per \$100 valuation.

The Village, after receiving the PID petitions, will be required to conduct a public hearing on the formation of the PID.

According to Sec. 372.009: "The hearing may be adjourned from time to time until the governing body makes findings by resolution as to:

- (1) the advisability of the improvement;
- (2) the nature of the improvement;
- (3) the estimated cost of
- the improvement;

(4) the boundaries of the

- public improvement district; (5) the method of assess-
- ment; and (6) the apportionment of costs between the district and the municipality or county as

a whole." PID funds can only be spent on public infrastructure costs, according to the developer. SWSC is a private corporation, so improvements to its infrastructure would not

Sanctuary developers have offered two alternatives to address this issue.

be eligible for PID funding.

The first is to fund the improvements through PID funding. To be eligible, however, the water infrastructure must be owned by a public entity, i.e. the Village of Salado, which would hold the improvements for the term of the PID bonds (20-25 years), after which time the infrastructure would become the property of the SWSC. The infrastructure would be leased by the SWSC and during that time, the SWSC would have all rights to the infrastructure without interference from the Village of

This proposal has not been presented to the Village Board of Aldermen.

The second alternative would require the de-certification of the Sanctuary property from the SWSC Certificate of Convenience and Necessity. According to the Public Utility Commission, a CCN grant the "holder the exclusive right to provide retail water and/or sewer utility service to an identified geographic area. Chapter 13 of the Texas Water Code requires a CCN holder to provide continuous and adequate service to the area within its CCN boundary."

Once the area is released from SWSC CCN, the Village or an alternate public entity would be the retail water service provider to the project.

Under this proposal, SWSC would provide wholesale water service to the public retail service provider (either the PID or a Municipal Utility District).

Under this proposal, the retail service provider would own the infrastructure and be responsible for the operation and maintenance thereof.

The SWSC Board took no action on the proposals. The proposals have not been brought before the Board of Aldermen. However, aldermen discussed the proposals and will consider at their next meeting hiring outside counsel to examine the entire Agreement with Sanctuary.

State law authorizes public improvement projects to include the following:

landscaping;

erection of fountains tinctive lighting, and signs; acquiring, constructing, improving, widening, narrowing, closing or rerouting of sidewalks or of streets, any other roadways or rightsof-way;

construction or improvement of pedestrian malls;

acquisition and installation of pieces of art;

acquisition, construction or improvement of libraries; acquisition, construction or improvement of off-street parking facilities;

acquisition, construction, improvement or rerouting of mass transportation facili-

acquisition, construction or improvement of water, wastewater or drainage facilities or improvements;

the establishment or improvement of parks;

projects similar to those listed in Subdivisions (1)-

acquisition, by purchase or otherwise, of real property in connection with an authorized improvement;

special supplemental service for improvement and promotion of the district, including services relating to advertising, promotion, health and sanitation, water and wastewater, public safety, security, business recruitment, development, recreation, and cultural enhancement:

payment of expenses incurred in the establishment, administration, and operation of the district;

the development, rehabilitation or expansion of affordable housing.

# 87th Texas Legislature convenes in Austin

AUSTIN - Texas Secretary of State Ruth R. Hughs convened the 87th Legislature's regular session on Jan. 12, presiding over the opening ceremonies for the Texas House of Representatives and conducting the election of the new Speaker of the House, Representative Dade

"Our legislators have been entrusted by the people of Texas to confront the challenges and issues that our state faces and to do so in a way that is reflective of what it means to be a Texan-to approach adversity with unyielding determination, grit, honor, integrity, strength, and of course-with our Texas pride. Working collaboratively, we will help to build a brighter future for all Texans, and keep the Lone Star State the greatest state in the nation."

The Texas Legislature operates under a biennial system and convenes at noon on the second Tuesday in January of odd-numbered years for a maximum of 140 days. The 87th Legislature's regular session begins January 12th, 2021, and will conclude May 31st, 2021.

Meanwhile, amid masks and newly erected Plexiglas barriers in the Senate chamber, Governor Greg Abbott called on legislators to work together to address the unprecedented challenges facing them as the 87th Legislative Session began Tuesday. With the pandemic still raging and a nation facing uncertain economic future, Abbott said the country needs Texas to lead. "That means tackling COVID challenges and ensuring better access to healthcare for all Texans," he said. "It means supporting our law enforcement officers and keeping our communities safe. It means

Texans and it means getting Texans back to work."

Normally a bustling, boisterous day with thousands of constituents, family members and well-wishers packing the Capitol building to mark the beginning of a new 140-day session, this year saw a far more muted occasion. COVID-19 precautions mean empty hallways and vacant galleries in both the House and Senate chambers. Rather than their entire families, Senators were limited to a single guest on the floor. Despite the pandemic, Lt. Governor Dan Patrick told members he was committed to providing access to citizens while protecting all who enter the Capitol. "We want our Capitol open this session," he said. "We want the public to be here, to be able to testify, and have your voice heard in committees, to visit your representatives...We're going to be open to the best of our ability this session." The Senate is expected to vote on rules, which will include COVID mitigation protocols, later this week.

Because of the twin crises of COVID and a collapse in the price of oil, lawmakers arrive in Austin facing a \$950 million budget shortfall, much less than the \$4.8 billion beginning balance they expected. State Comptroller Glenn Hegar laid out the situation during his biennial revenue estimate press conference Monday, telling legislators how much revenue they have to work with as they prepare to pay for state services in 2022 and 2023. "The pandemic, which resulted in steep declines in key sources of revenue in the later half of fiscal [year] 2020 and has continued to drag down collections

safeguarding freedom for all in fiscal [year] 2021 wiped out a projective positive ending balance and has turned it into a currently projected deficit of nearly \$1 billion," said Hegar. His office estimates that the state will collect \$112.53 billion in generyears, down slightly from the current biennium.

Hegar said the state could see a robust recovery in the back half of the calendar year. "The prospect of effective and widely administered vaccines generates hope for a return to pre-pandemic levels of economic activity in the next year," he said. Though the recent resurgence of infections in Texas could slow economic activity in the near term, Hegar said he does not anticipate an economic contraction similar to the one that happened this spring. As Texans spent less during the pandemic, they put more in savings and paid down more debt. "These and other factors suggest there may be capacity for a substantial surge in consumer spending once pandemic concerns have receded," said Hegar.

Last session, the state invested about \$4.5 billion in new education funding, but the economic downturn has raised concerns that Texas won't be able to maintain that level of spending. Hegar said that he has had many meetings with state lawmakers worried they wouldn't be able to hold to the commitments made in 2019. "I think the position that we're in today...they'll be able to continue to maintain those commitments this legislative session," he said.

# Despite loss of 140,000 jobs, stocks hit new records

The Markets

The S&P 500 Stock Index started off the year with a bang, shooting up an amazing 2.08% for the week to close at 3824.68, rising over 17% from one year ago. The rise for the week and on Friday continued into record territory despite of, or perhaps in some strange way, because of the events occurring in the real economic and political world. In fact, the rise on Friday, taking the index to a new record, was despite the Labor Department's report that the economy lost 140,000 jobs in December and the disturbing news of the week. More on that below. The stock market value revival continued as well with the CRSP U.S. Mid-Cap Value Index shedding its laggard reputation and rising 2.83% for the week to close at 2116.80.


The yield on the ten-year U.S. Treasury note not only joined in the party but led the band during the week as it rose an astounding 21.87%, busting through the 1% barrier as if it were not there, to end the week with a yield of 1.120%! The 30year Treasury bond, not to be outdone by its shorter maturity cousin, jumped up to an annual yield of about 1.87%, possibly signaling the end of record-low mortgage rates. Crude oil obviously got an invitation to the party as well, as West Texas Intermediate soared 8.7% to end the week at \$52.73, about where it was a year ago, before the pandemic hit!

#### The Economy

As has happened so often in this most unusual of times, the immediate economic news and the markets' behavior were as if they were in different universes, because they are. The headline economic news was that for the month of December, the Labor Department reported that the U.S. economy ended seven consecutive months of job gains and lost 140,000 jobs.

bleak, why did the stock, bond, and oil markets throw a party that seemed to celebrate the end of bad times? In a short answer, help appears to be on the way. As the new Congress convened and the President-elect laid out his priorities, it became clear that the joint focus was to be on keeping struggling businesses and families afloat until the vaccines could be distributed, and to accelerate those vaccinations. The announced longer-term strategy was to fund the infrastructure improvements and innovation that has been talked about for a decade or more but on which little has been accomplished. In a nutshell, the markets got excited about the business and economic

boost those actions seemed likely to produce. Combine all of that with an absolute record high level of liquid assets in households and businesses, all waiting to be spent as soon as the pandemic is whipped, and the picture is of an economic boom beginning in the second half of the year that well may be one of the biggest in American history. The future is always uncertain, but even as the darkness seems to be deepening, there is ample evidence that the dawn is near at hand.

In other news, the U.S. trade deficit hit an all-time high in December, which ironically was a good thing as those imported goods were contributing to record retail product sales. At the same time, IHS Markit reported that purchasing managers were indicating that U.S. manufacturers continued a vigorous recovery. Manufactures also reported they are having difficulty finding qualified, skilled workers, suggesting they are approaching capacity. At least some of the money not being spent by consumers in restaurants and on travel appears to be going into buying products.

The bottom line is that we are going through a rough patch, but the cavalry can be seen coming over the hill to our rescue. Be patient, be careful with your health and we can get through this.

A Suggestion

If you don't have a need for income from your IRA and skipped the required minimum distribution (RMD) in 2020 under the provisions of the CARES Act, we suggest you don't get in a rush to take the 2021 RMD. A new relief act is in the works and it may allow deferral for yet another year.


### The Trump legacy of Phoniness

# Trump's shameful Georgia call

President Donald Trump has turned a narrow electoral defeat into a bid for infamy.

His goal in the post-election interlude has been more and more explicitly to overturn the results of the election. Indeed, a couple of weeks ago he tweeted simply, "#OVERTURN."

We now know, thanks to a recording of his phone conversation with Georgia Secretary of State Brad Raffensperger from over the weekend, how far he's gone to pressure state officials to join him in this reprehensible goal. His hour-long lobbying of Raffensperger to declare him the winner in the state is among the worst things an American president has ever been caught saying on the record.

There is now no doubt that Trump lost Georgia. Both machine and hand recounts have confirmed a Biden victory of fewer than 12,000 votes. Trump has been agitating for a signature audit, and state officials examined a statistically significant sample of 15,000 absentee ballot envelopes in Cobb County. They found 10 mismatched signatures, but the voters in question all vouchsafed for the legitimacy of the ballots when contacted by investigators.

Georgia has certified its results multiple times and appointed its electors in time to meet the "safe harbor" deadline under federal law, when they are supposed to be considered final and conclusive by the federal government.

Yet, here comes Trump with an LBJ-style bout of arm-twisting to get Raffensperger to declare all of that a grievous mistake.





The power differential between a president of the United States and a state secretary of state is vast -- Trump is the most powerful man on the planet whereas Raffensperger isn't even the most powerful man in Georgia.

Trump put Raffensperger in the inherently awkward position of having to tell him "no" over and over -- snowing him with a variety of numbers for supposed illegal votes, making him parry wild accusations, mocking him and threatening him with vague legal repercussions and, implicitly, with the end of his political

There is a reason that Raffensperger didn't take any of the reported prior 18 attempted calls from the White House.

Still, to his great credit, he did indeed tell Trump "no" politely and firmly. Of the two elected officials on the call, only one was calm, reasonable and cogent -- and it wasn't the president.

Trump was repetitive and ill-informed. He had no idea what charges had been debunked weeks ago. He didn't, or couldn't, distinguish between true and false information. He was fuzzy on the details of his own legal case. He retailed conspiracy theories about ballots being burned and voting machines being removed that would be embarrassing if your uncle shared them on Facebook.

The only thing that mattered to him was getting

Raffensperger to pronounce him the winner -- legal process and facts be damned. The problem with Trump has always been his highly personal view of the presi-

dency, wherein institutions, constitutional principles and sheer propriety take a backseat to the felt needs of his ego.

At times in his pres-

idency, this failing has been made to serve worthy ends, e.g., stoking economic growth and confirming record numbers of conservative judges as bragging points.

Since the election,

Since the election, though, this tendency has been particularly stark and unredeemed. His personal inability to accept the sting of defeat has led him, shamefully, to wage war on a legitimate election.

If he were to somehow succeed in his goal of overturning the result, he would subvert American democracy and irreparably harm our governing institutions, while stoking a constitutional crisis of a magnitude we've only experienced rarely in our history.

And for what? To avoid admitting that he lost.

Trump has gotten nowhere, except in convincing some Republican senators and members of Congress to indulge his insistence he really won. Every time the president hoped someone with authority over the election would bend his way, whether an elected official or judge, he's found someone like Raffensperger, dutiful and conscientious enough to say "no."












# **Contract Bridge**

EXACTLY THE RIGHT MEDICINE its value increases tremendously when



The value of a 4-3-3-3 hand is usually not hard to determine. The high-card point count generally tells the story.

The real difficulty in evaluating a hand properly rises in proportion to its freakishness. Hands with wild distribution do not lend themselves well to accurate evaluation. The excellence of a fit with partner's hand, or the absence of it, becomes the determining factor.

For example, North's hand, with only 11 high-card points, has a very imprecise value when the auction begins. But

partner responds one spade. Whether it's worth a jump to three spades is debatable, but the slam contract turns out to be quite reasonable.

East won the diamond lead and returned a trump, taken by South. One possible line of play was to ruff three hearts in dummy and discard a heart and the jack of clubs on dummy's two high diamonds. But this would require a 2-2 club division.

Alternatively, South could draw the missing trumps and, if they did not break 2-2, rely on the clubs to be divided favorably. But another method of play, the one chosen by South, had a much better chance to succeed.

He cashed the ace of clubs, led a spade to the nine and then discarded the J-K of clubs on the K-Q of diamonds! Next he ruffed a club, led a third round of trump to the jack and ruffed another club with his last trump.

By this time, dummy had the only remaining trump together with three good clubs, so South had the rest of the tricks.

Just about all declarer's plan required for success was a normal 3-1 or 2-2 trump division, together with a normal 3-1 or 2-2 club division. Discarding the K-J of clubs may appear to be overly fancy, but it was the right thing to do under the circumstances.



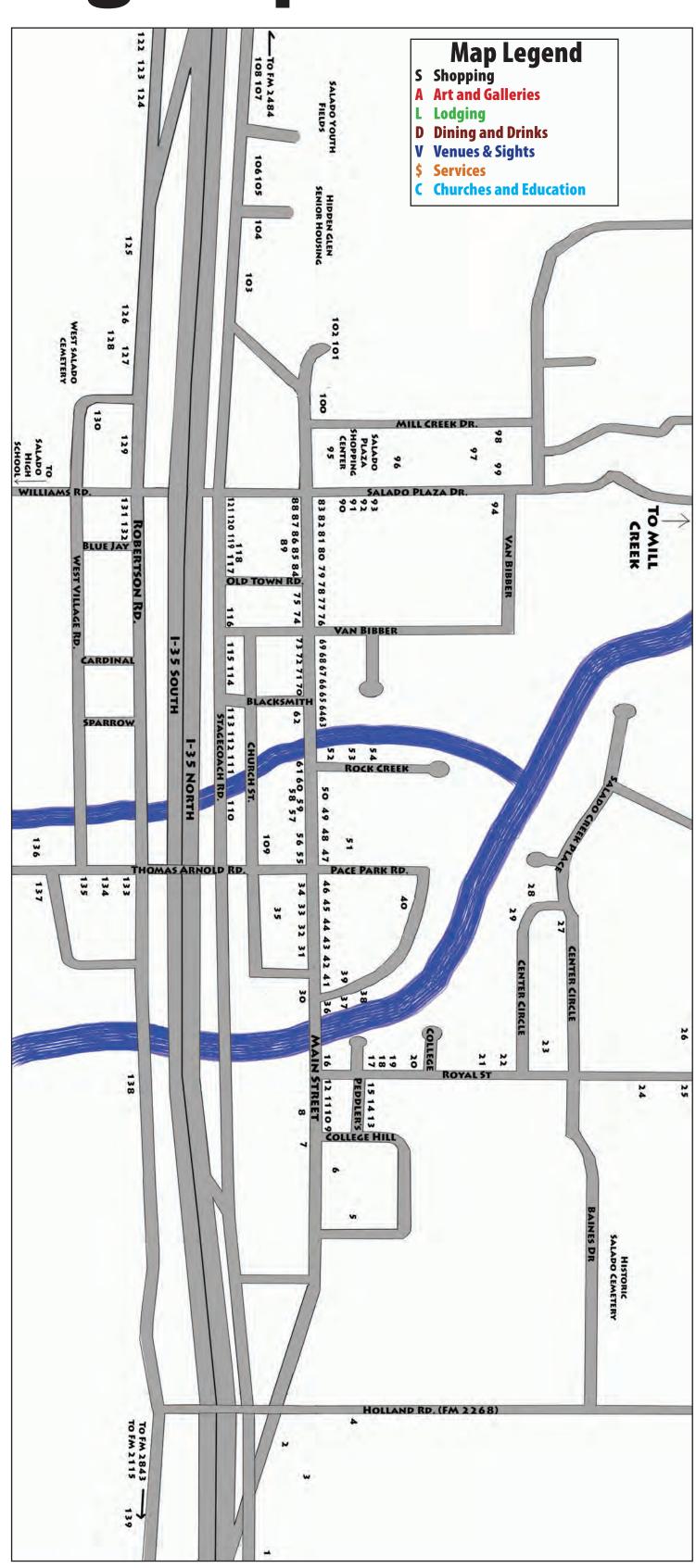



If you are tested and test positive, your quarantine would be 10 days from symptom onset or positive test date.

• Re-exposed during quarantine: If you are in quarantine and are exposed by another positive person or re-exposed to positive person during their isolation period, your quarantine time will start over from date of last exposure to positive COVID case.

# **CTC Police Academy accepting** applications for peace officer training

The Central Texas College (CTC) Police Academy is accepting applications for admission to its evening Basic Peace Officer academy course. While primarily open for agency-sponsored cadets, there are several non-sponsored spots available for applicants not currently affiliated with a law enforcement agency. The 23-week course will run Feb.1-Nov. 19, Monday through Thursday, from 6 to 10 p.m. and every other Saturday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The Basic Peace Officer course is a 720-hour-course encompassing all aspects of law enforcement. It is designed to prepare cadets to take the licensing exam to become a peace officer in

The CTC Protective Service department requires applicants to be at least 21 years of age before completing the course unless they meet the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement (TCOLE) requirements to attend between the ages of 18 and 21.

Applicants must also pass a physical fitness test prior to acceptance and meet the TCOLE minimum requirements for licensing. These include no Class B misdemeanor conviction in the past 10 years, no Class A misdemeanor convictions in the past 10 years, no felony convictions, no conviction of any family violence offense and no controlled substance use for 24 months prior to application without a valid prescription.

Other requirements include applicants must be a U.S. citizen, possess a high school diploma, GED or home school diploma, must not be prohibited from operating a motor vehicle, must not be prohibited by state or federal law from possessing firearms or ammunition and must not have been discharged from military service under dishonorable or bad conduct conditions.

Also required are a copy of high school diploma, GED or home school diploma, official college transcript (if any), photo copy of college degree (if any) and a copy of current proof of automobile liability insurance. Former military service members are also required


to provide a copy of DD-214 (member 4 copy) form or military discharge papers.

Applicants must complete an application packet from the CTC Protective Service department. The online packet is available on the CTC website by clicking the Students tab, then the Protective Services link under Instructional Departments and then clicking the Police Academy link.

Questions about the CTC Police Academy, application process or turning in paperwork can be directed to the CTC Police Academy at 254-526-1275 or by emailing police.academy@ ctcd.edu. Application deadline is Jan. 15.





# January sales tax payment to Village up 19%

The Village of Salado January sales tax payment is 19% more than the previous

The Village received a payment of \$58,336.20, compared to \$49,164.00 for January 2020.

Every Bell County city that collects sales tax, saw sizeable increases, except Troy, which saw a dip of 4%. Most saw increases of 15-20% but Nolanville had the largest increase, 46%, receiving \$115,661.28 compared to \$79,201.67 in 2020.

Salado Public Library District received its January sales tax check of \$44,279.88, which was 24% more than last year's \$35,799.04.

Bell County had an increase of 18% in its January payment. The County received \$2.0 million for the half-cent sales tax it levies, compared to \$1.7 million in January 2020.

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar sent cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$783.2 million in local sales tax allocations for January, 2.6 percent more than in January 2020. These allocations are based on sales made in November by businesses that report tax monthly.


