# **Bell County launches new vaccine waitlist**

Bell County health officials launched a new waitlist this week to help ensure that no dose of the county's Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine goes to waste. This new waitlist is available on the Bell County Public Health District website https://www.bellcountyhealth.org.

This new waitlist is separate from the county's appointment system. Instead of guaranteeing those on the list a specific dose on a specific day, it qualifies individuals to be contacted about unused doses that would otherwise be expiring after a vaccination center closes.

Local health officials estimate that, as centers approach the end of the day, there may be between 1 and 12 unclaimed vaccine doses that need to be administered. To date, those doses have been distributed through a list of direct-care providers

managed by the Bell County Public Health District. Moving forward, site managers will contact potential recipients from the waitlist.

"We will simply go down the list and try to find individuals who can be at the vaccine center within a certain amount of time," Bell County Judge David Blackburn said. "The idea is to continue the process of not wasting any vaccines, as, once a vial is opened, we only have a certain amount of time to get that vaccine into an arm and this waitlist will help ensure that we continue to get that done."

Residents are still encouraged to make vaccination appointments as they become available through the Bell County Public Health District. Getting on the waitlist does not place an individual on the appointment/booking list

"Those appointments will undoubtably fill up quickly, as we continue to anticipate that supply will not meet demand," Blackburn said, "and that is not just at the local level. That is at the state level and at the national level, so please continue to be both patient and vigilant."

As with making appointments, in order to be included on the new waitlist, residents are required to be eligible to receive the CO-VID-19 vaccine under the current 1A or 1B guidelines from Texas Department of State Health Services.

"Texas has done better than any state in the nation in vaccinating its population, and Bell County has contributed to that success," Blackburn said. "We'll continue to do our part in vaccinating as we have vaccines made available to us."

# Filing to run in local elections will end Feb. 12

Filing for a place on the ballot in local elections began Jan. 13 and will continue through Feb. 12. The Village of Salado, Salado Independent School District and Salado Public Library District will hold joint elections on May 1.

The last day to file as a write-in candidate in any of these races is Feb. 16.

Candidate packets are available at each of the political subdivision offices.

Requirements/qualifications to serve on a local political subdivision governing body are residence in the state for one year prior to the filing deadline and six months in the territory prior to election day, age 18 and must be a registered voter in the territory elected from by the filing deadline.

The Village of Salado will elect three aldermen for twoyear terms. Those terms are currently filled by Dr. Amber Preston-Dankert, Rodney Bell and John Cole. As of presstime, Bell has filed an application to run for reelection and D. Jasen Graham has filed for election. Preston-Dankert has moved outside the boundaries of the Village and cannot run for reelection. Cole stated that he has not yet decided whether to file for re-election.

Two three-year terms on the Salado ISD Board of Trustees will be decided in the May 1 election. Dr. BA White and Jim Hodgin currently fill those terms and both have filed for re-election

Three two-year terms on the Salado Public Library District Board of Directors will be decided in the May 1 election. They are currently filled by Joycelyn Miller, Barbara Morris and Emmy Alvarez. No one has filed for election.

The last day to register to

vote in the May 1 election is April 1.

The Village's General Election will be part of a joint election held with the Salado ISD and the Salado Public Library District.

Election Day will be Saturday, May 1, 2021. The election day polling place will be the Salado Civic Center where the polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Early voting by personal appearance will also be con-

ducted at the Salado Civic Center.

# **Village to bring in outside counsel on Sanctuary**

Salado aldermen at their Jan. 21 meeting unanimously authorized Village Administrator Don Ferguson to draft a scope of work for outside legal counsel to review Sanctuary documents that were signed by Billie Hanks and then-mayor Skip Blancett on Nov. 25, 2015.

The scope of work, according to Ferguson would be for "independent legal counsel to perform a forensic autopsy of the agreements. There are more than 200 pages of those agreements, which outline tax rebates, design concessions and other incentives for the 297-acre mixed use property.

"These were adopted years ago," Ferguson said. "None of us were part of that process. Others were on that board that are no longer on this board. There are certain obligations from those agreements that are going to come before this board in the coming months. It makes good business sense" to examine the agreements.

Ferguson said he has solicited three law firms that specialize in development and municipal law and has received proposals from two of them.

Ferguson told aldermen that Sanctuary developers were in contact with the Village "to get going." He added that the developers wanted to meet the new mayor. "It was a good and very frank discussion, a good starting point," Ferguson said.

Mayor Michael Coggin said that his goal in the meeting was to "make sure that Sanctuary knows that their lack of pursuit of starting work when they were supposed to has dramatically impacted our status and taxes, because we had to shoulder these expenses. At this point, we want this development to be treated the way every other development has been. It has to be good for Salado and good for the developer."

"I was here. Look at the way I voted," Alderman Amber Preston-Dankert said. "We were guided by people who aren't here anymore. There are a bunch of issues. It was a one-sided argument and one-sided agreement. What can the Village do if they have not started and have not gotten things done. We haven't had the opportunity to go back and look at it."

"The Mayor at the time said he was not interested in looking at it," Ferguson said, "I don't know why."

"This was so one-sided. I can't believe anyone would vote for it, but maybe that is just me," Alderman Paul Cox

Alderman Cole gave the motion for the expenditure and scope of work that passed unanimously.

Salado mayor Skip Blancett and landowner Billie Hanks, Jr. signed into effect on Nov. 25, 2015 more than 200 pages of agreements and

a 12 page Warranty Deed. The board of aldermen approved the agreements following a two-hour executive session on Nov. 19.

The agreements form the basis for a partnership of sorts between the Village and the Sanctuary in which the developers and property owners of the proposed 297 acre mixed use development agree to have all of their properties brought into the Village limits in return for concessions on property and hotel motel taxes as well as guarantees for sewer service.

As part of the agreements, property owner Billy Hanks donated six acres of property on the northeastern portion of the 297 acres to the village to house the wastewater plant.

The Village also constructed the collection system for the plant, except for the collection system on the property that will become the Sanctuary Development.

The Village will provide the treated effluent to the Sanctuary through a Chapter 380 Economic Development grant. The Developer will have to apply for beneficial reuse of the effluent and will do so at its sole cost, according to the Wastewater agreement. The period for the reuse of the effluent is 15 years from the "from the date of recordation of the last Subdivision Plat for the Property," according to the Wastewater Agreement.

Annexation is referenced in the Master Development

and Wastewater Agreements. The properties were annexed into the Village in 2016. The property owners will continue to claim the agricultural use exemptions for property tax until "such time as they are developed," with the exception of the 53-acre tract of land on I-35 that included the Wildfire Ranch Arena (since torn down), which are taxed as commercial property.

By approving the Master Development Agreement, the Village confirmed "its approval of the Conceptual Master Plan and specifically approves the land uses, densities, exceptions, utility and roadway alignments and width of rights-of-way shown in the Conceptual Master Plan, Land Use Chart and the Exceptions and Minimum Specifications. The Exceptions and Minimum Specifications comprise 14 pages of the 68 page Master Development Agreement.

One of the exceptions to the local ordinances includes an exception concerning the dedication of parkland as required by the Subdivision Ordinance because Sanctuary will have private parks, private trails and private green-space.

The Land Uses Master Plan outlines the following general use categories and specifications, which can be amended by as much as 20 percent without further approval:

• Commercial (e.g. office, retail, restaurants, etc.): 515,000 heated sq. ft.

• Entertainment Venue: 40,000 heated sq. ft.

• Lodging: 355 rooms.

• Multi-family (multi- story including senior housing and rental): 575 units.

• Multi-Family (for sale including condos, townhouse and duplexes): 130 units.

Single Family (for sale):364 units.

• Parking Garage: 500 spaces

Approving the Master Development Agreement also approved the road design standards identified in the Conceptual Master Plan and includes roadway connections to the following Village roads: Royal Street, College Hill Drive, Baines Street, Santa Maria Road, San Jose Road, Salado Oaks Drive, Main Street and FM 2268.

The Design Guidelines referred to in the Master Development Agreement states that the Developer will provide design guidelines to the "Village of Salado prior to the first preliminary plat."

The Chapter 380 Economic Development agreement outlines 15 years of tax rebates for commercial properties. It states that the owners will receive rebates equal "to the annual Property Tax Receipts actually received by the Village associated with such development (if any) less the amount of Property Tax Receipts in the Base Tax Year for the property associated with such development," multiplied by 50 percent.

The property taxes will be rebated for a period of 15 years "from the recording date of the last Subdivision as deigned by the Village of Salado Subdivision Ordinance No. 2009.02 or the 15th anniversary date of the last certificate of occupancy issues for a commercial building, whichever is the last to occur."

The Chapter 380 agreement also includes Rollback Grants for periodic economic development grants "equal to 100 percent of the Rollback Taxes to offset the portion of the Owner's cost of development of the Land." Rollback Taxes are defined in the Chapter 380 agreement as "the tax and/or penalty assessed against the Land, or operation thereof, as the result of the removal or agricultural and/or open space land designation(s) for the Land."

Property that is appraised as Ag Use is valued on its capacity to produce agricultural products, not the market value of the land. According to the article entitled "Ag-use Exemption: Fact or Fiction?" by Judon Farmbrough in the Tierra Grande, the Real Estate Center Journal, "This is determined by capitalizing the average net income that the land would have been earned during the past five years using prudent agricultural management practices."

The chief appraiser will also appraise the land at its

# Sales of existing homes hits highest mark since '06; home construction starts up




Despite a week with more scary news about the pandemic and the labor situation in the U.S., the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) rose 1.94% to close at 3841.47. The week's gain put the index up 2.27% in the three weeks since the beginning of the year and nearly 9.5% since the election. As we have often said, markets don't particularly care who gets elected but like to see the election over with. The CRSP US Mid-Cap Value Index sagged 0.31% but remains ahead of the broad market, having risen 3.49% year-to-date. That indicates that in the last week the ten or so super-large growth stocks that led the SPX most of last year are again surging. Even the commentators who were on the fence late last year are now voicing concerns that speculators are driving the S&P 500 to

unrealistic heights. The yield on the benchmark ten-year U.S. Treasury note did not join the S&P 500's soar toward the sky but sagged about 3% to end the week yielding 1.086%, still holding above the 1% barrier but drifting downward in volatile trading. Moody's Analytics reported that large influxes of foreign investment are pouring into the Treasury market here, tending to lower rates, while domestic holders of Treasury securities are selling to get cash for stock investing, pushing interest rates upward. Year-to-date, the yield on the 10-year note has risen over 18%, signaling that bond investors are optimistic about economic growth. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) agreed with the bond market, sagging just a bit to \$51.97 but remained up about 7.4% for 2021.

# The Economy

The lead economic news for the week was the Labor Department's announcement that there were 960,668 new claims for un**Market & Economic Update** 





much higher than we saw in October and November. Anecdotal evidence continues to point to the pandemic as the culprit. Moody's is now forecasting a drop to 5.8% unemployment by the end of 2021 and 4.2% by mid Despite the number of

layoffs in the economy, IHS Markit announced on Friday that their flash index of manufacturing activity rose to 59.1, the highest reading in more than a decade, while the service sector index rose to 57.5. Numbers above 50 indicate growth while readings below 50 suggest contraction. While the total activity in both sectors remains well below where it was a year ago, business recovery appears to be in full stride in the U.S. as manufacturers reported a "renewed and solid rise" in new export orders in January while service providers were seeing slowing orders as the number of COVID-19 cases surged.

In another bright spot, sales of existing homes rose to the highest level since 2006 while U.S. home construction starts also rose in December to their best level since the housing bubble in 2006. The difference this time around is that bank lending practices are tight and mortgage interest rates remain at historical lows. Residential housing starts rose 5.8% to nearly 140,000 in December, an annualized rate of 1.67 million. Meanwhile, applications to build

new homes increased 4.5% for the month, another high dating back to 2006. Builders did cite a dramatic rise in the cost of materials and a critical shortage of qualified, skilled workers, like licensed electricians and plumbers, as a potential bottleneck to future growth. They also noted that buyers seem to be ready with substantial down payments and desirous of purchasing larger homes with larger lots than in the past. Sales of existing homes are up an astounding 22% from a year ago to an annualized rate of 6.76 million as the average new 30-year fixed mortgage rate was 2.77%, down from 3.6% a year ago. The median existing-home price rose 12.9% in December from a year earlier to about \$300,000, a new record.

Moody's Analytics Back-to-Normal Index continues to hover around 80, indicating that the overall U.S. economy remains down about 20% from where it was as the pandemic began. The good news is that we seem to have adapted to the surging infection rates and hospitalizations far better than has Europe where the numbers suggest the EU and UK are sliding back into recession. The not-so-good news is that the COVID variant that already dominates in Europe is here and growing. In the UK the death rate from the new, more infectious variant is now being reported to be 30% to 40% higher than before. The race is on to see if we can get enough people vaccinated before the new mutation hits us economically and if our behavior can hold it at bay pending those vaccinations. Only time will

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# Let's get to work to provide actual property tax relief

As one of 254 County Judges across the State of Texas, I congratulate the state Senators and Representatives on becoming a member of the 87th Session of the Texas Legislature. It is indeed a high honor and privilege that you have been entrusted with. Thank you for embracing it and for your service.

During the 86th Session, the Legislature took significant steps to reform the property tax system: changes to the appraisal process, streamlining taxing entities tax rate approval process, and improving transparency in tax rate development. During the 86th Session, you did a heavy legislative lift reforming the appraisal system. Thank you for those reforms. Texas, and Texans, are better for them.

During the 87th Session, it is time to actually cut individual and business property taxes.

As you know, County Commissioners Courts' only implement the property tax system that you authorize. We are your partners and use the processes you created. We stand ready to work with you again, but the priority should be significant property tax cuts for homeowners and small business.

To this end, the Governor should make the following property tax cut proposals emergency items and the Legislature should pass them without delay:

First, give counties more options for property tax relief for residents and businesses. The legislature should authorize counties to have the ability to offer fixed dollar exemptions to residential homesteads, an option for business property tax relief, and revenue options outside of property taxes.

Second, the State should use its significant amount of COVID-19 federal funds to offer homeowners and small businesses one-time grants for mortgage or property tax assistance. Just like the small business grants and rental assistance programs counties across the state have offered, homeowners and small businesses deserve direct relief from the State too.

Third, the State needs to pay for day-to-day operating costs for public education ('M&O'). This would result in everyone's property tax bill being cut by more than half. So, if you just wrote a check to your County Tax Assessor for \$4,000, next year you would write it for less than \$2,000. This property tax relief is for everyone - individuals and businesses.

Currently, Texas has the 13th highest property tax among all 50 states. If the State paid for daily M&O of the public schools, Texas would drop into the lowest ranks of the states in terms of property taxes paid. I believe that the State can replace the property tax reductions by simply looking at increased revenue from the approximately thirty other taxes currently collected and by reviewing current exemptions.

Let me be clear that I am not wanting overall tax revenue to be increased. I am in no way suggesting any consideration of a personal income tax. Neither do I support an increase in the State's general sales and use tax percentage. But, I do believe there is a way forward. The question is whether there is a will.

I believe that the three suggestions above offer a path forward toward mitigating the current pressure many of our constituents are facing. In addition to these fixes, I believe counties across the State stand ready to work with you to fix our broken property tax system. Welcome back – now let's get to work.

# **Dear Editor:**

Buckle up, it's gonna be a rough ride...About 25 years ago I put a pile of papers on my desk corner documenting dishonorable drug company practices. As the pile grew, visiting salesmen looked apprehensively at the stack hoping their company was not included - most were. The dishonorable practices coincided with the growing influence of company accountants, ie., CFOs, much like their similar rise in banks prior to the Bush 43 administration's disruption of the housing industry. (One banker said that was caused when the "smart" people (Quants) went into finance instead of math and science. Company reps called their equivalents "bean counters".)

Historically, branded drug prices decreased over time even though there was "fixing" among competitors, but after company acquisitions and consolidations, prices escalated. The FDA accommodated companies to retain patent protection - thus high prices - even for dangerous and deadly drugs and their competitors. (Killer drugs like Propulsid, Bextra and Vioxx were approved and left on the market by the FDA up until patent expiry, and most recently, FDA's relationship with the makers and distributors of opioids has resulted in thousands of deaths.)

Enter the Internet...In addition to people crossing the Mexican and Canadian border for cheaper international drugs, patients were buying on-line from wherever. As an adviser to my insurer clients, I warned them that their members were at risk for adverse events and incompatibilities that could create

market value. Then, according to Farmbrough's article, "If the land is sold or diverted to a non-agricultural use, the difference between the two appraisals" for the past five years, plus interest, must be recaptured. This is what is referred to as the Rollback Taxes in the Chapter 380 Economic Development agreement.

Additionally, the agreements include verbiage concerning Future Phases in which it states that the Village "shall look favorably in good faith on extending the existing economic incentives" for the future Phase Two Entertainment District which will consist of an approximately 1,800 to 2,500 seat additional music venue and multi-story parking garage. However, the agreement is not binding on this future development.

The agreements signed by then-Mayor Blancett and Billie Hanks, Jr. included a Tourism Marketing Agreement in which 50 % of the hotel occupancy taxes generated by the Sanctuary will be rebated to the development to promote the property for overnight stays. The Tourism Marketing Agreement shall "continue for a period of 15 calendar years from the Opening Date of the last Venue opened to the public by the Owners."

The agreements also state that the Village will support the formation of Public Improvement District for financing the construction of infrastructure.



# **DPS Reminder: DL Expiration Waiver Ends in April**

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is reminding the public the waiver on expiration dates for driver licenses (DLs) and identification cards (IDs) ends on April 14, 2021. Customers who need to renew are urged to make an appointment or renew online today.

The waiver, granted by Governor Greg Abbott in March due to the COVID-19 pandemic, applied to DLs, commercial DLs, commercial learner permits, ID cards and election identification certificates that expired on or after March 13, 2020.

"Driver License employees have worked diligently to help Texans during challenging times and should be commended for their dedication," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "The Driver License Division has innovated to better serve constituents by implementing a new appointment solution to improve services and by providing extended hours at several locations across the state."

Online renewals still a convenient option

Many Texans are eligible to skip the trip to the office entirely by renewing their DL/ID card or changing their address online at Texas.gov. Customers can also renew by phone at 1-866-DL-RENEW (1-866-357-3639). The requirements and cost for online and phone renewal are the same as in-person transac-

Expanded office hours To assist customers needing in-office DL services, designated high-volume offices are offering expanded hours from 7 a.m.- 7 p.m. Monday through Thursday, and 7 a.m.- 5:30 p.m. Fri-

day.

Services at driver license offices are now conducted by appointment only. To schedule an appointment or check availability, visit the online appointment scheduler. If you are unable to find an appointment at the office of your choice, check back for availability at that office or other locations nearby. Please check often as availability does change.

If you are unable to make your scheduled appointment, please reschedule or cancel it ahead of time. While the department is working to serve as many customers as possible, people with appointments not showing up continues to be a major obstacle. In December 2020, for example, approximately 31% of people were no-shows for their appointments.

The appointment system, which debuted in May 2020, is designed to provide convenience, additional reducing the time Texans Scheduling an appoint- wait in line. Customers can

book appointments for a specific day and time, up to six months in advance, and show up 30 minutes or less before their scheduled time. Customers can checkin using the kiosk inside the office or from their mobile device.

All offices offer a limited number of same-day appointments. These appointments are available on a first-come, first-served basis. Customers who book these appointments can leave the DL office until their designated time.

Additionally, most offices also offer customers without an appointment a spot on a "standby" list. These customers are required to wait in the office and are assisted in the event of a cancelation or no-show. The number of standby appointments available is limited to ensure all customers who are placed on the list will be served by the end of

serious medical problems. They said, "Fix it", and I did. I flew to Canada and set up a relationship with an ethical pharmacy group and helped them develop technology to interface with my claims processor in order to maintain complete patient profiles for electronic protective mechanisms. I chose Canada for two reasons - they spoke English, and drug quality was assured because Canada funded citizens' medical care. Not so in the U.S., where fraudulent drugs sometimes entered the distribution system. Patients and insurers saved thousands through Canadian purchases, and when the companies shorted supplies to Canadian pharmacies, we expanded to include Israel and other advanced countries. Pharma was not happy, and after initially saying I was doing nothing wrong, industry pressure forced FDA to change its tune, sending me a "Warning Letter". Not to be outdone the Texas State Board of Pharmacy sent me a "cease and desist" letter based on an anonymous

complaint. I responded to both, and after these fifteen years, I have as yet to hear back from either. After most "blockbuster" brands became generic, and Bush 43 and Greenspan "killed the dollar", importation was no longer advantageous. With fewer widespread

diseases they could invent to promote their sales, the drug manufacturing cartel joined with the Bush 43 administration to develop a Medicare Drug Benefit, which allowed increased volume and prices while subsidizing big PBMs like Medco and Express Scripts. Side benefits were FDA's receptiveness to approve specialty drugs costing thousands of dollars, thus helping further the "conservatives" dream of bankrupting Medicare.

Now the drug cartel is attacking the last consumer refuge - generic drug prices. After another unfulfilled Trump promise - the lowering of drug costs - generic prices are steadily increasing, and some are dramatic. Prices at big box stores

for the generic of a widely used thyroid drug went from \$4 for a 90 day supply a few years ago to \$10 last year and to more than \$50 this January. Today the brand name costs about \$200 per hundred - two dollars per tablet. Thirty years ago, as a purchaser for the Scott and White Health Plan Pharmacy, I bought the brand name of this drug for about \$2 per hundred and the generic for \$1. These new increases were enabled because the FDA cooperated with manufacturers to require New Drug Applications for this and some that had been used successfully for hundreds of years and were on formularies. There is no legitimate reason for these types of increases, but this is only the tip of the iceberg. Hundreds more such increases are in the pipeline. Canada is once again looking favorable to this old man.

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

There are three ways to approach such a situation. First, you can resign yourself to defeat and graciously go down one. However, that attitude is hardly likely to improve your stature as a bridge player.

mate way to make the contract, even if this requires a highly unlikely distribution of the opposing cards. Finally, you can resort to some form of chicanery in an effort to bilk the opposition

my after taking the ace of spades and lead the jack of hearts, hoping to induce your right-hand opponent to cover with the king from K-x. But there is no reason to think that East was born yesterday, so your best bet is to seek a legitimate way to achieve your goal.

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



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

# Senate budget funds public education \$119.7 billion in proposed spending

Texas would spend slightly more over the next two years than it did in the last biennium under both the Senate and House budget plans filed Jan. 21, including fully funding the increases in public education spending approved last session.

"SB 1 funds essential services, keeps up with growth and meets our obligations to vulnerable citizens," Finance Committee Chair Jane Nelson, who will lead the Senate's appropriations effort, said in a statement.

In all, the Senate's first draft would spend \$119.7 billion through 2023, representing about four percent growth over last biennium, but still well within constitutional spending limits, said Nelson. It also includes five percent across-the-board cuts for most non-education and non-public safety related state agencies.

Highlights from the Senate plan includes \$8 billion grams across two dozen state agencies, more money for women's healthcare, and nearly \$40 million to fortify security at the state Capitol building. It includes \$3.1 billion to pay for enrollment growth in public education, and \$5 billion to cover reforms and growth in the Teacher Retirement System. Lt. Governor Dan Patrick released a statement praising the plan. "I want to thank Senate Finance Chair Nelson and the Senate Finance Committee who have worked tirelessly with our office for months. As always, Senator Nelson has done outstanding work," he said. Appointed chair of Finance by Patrick when he was elected as Lt. Governor in 2014, this session will mark Nelson's fourth as lead budget author for the Senate.

There is still much work to be done before a final bill reaches the Governor's desk. Nelson said in her statement that the bill filed this week represents only a starting point. "We have many tools available to balance this budget, which will require us to re-establish our priorities, stretch every dollar and find more efficient ways to deliver services".

Beginning in February, the Senate Finance Committee will hold daily hearings on agency budgets. Directors from each state agency will appear before the panel to explain their appropriations requests, and then members will draw up a final appropriations bill to present to the full Senate. In the past, this typically happens around the end of March, but the pandemic has introduced considerable uncertainty into the normal legislative timeline. After it is approved by the Senate, five Senators will join five members of the House to hammer out any differences between the two chambers' plans for spending before a final product is presented to each for a final up-or-down vote. In terms of total state

chambers are very close in their initial drafts, with the House plan coming in at just \$60 million more than the Senate. As it is the only bill that must pass in any given legislative session, lawmakers will have until the legislature adjourns on May 31

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# Administration extends foreclosure moratorium & mortgage forbearance Forbearance Requirements:

In one of his first acts in office, President Joe Biden requested federal agencies to extend eviction and foreclosure moratoriums for millions of Americans. In response, the U.S. Department of Agriculture announced an extension of eviction and foreclosure moratoriums on USDA Single Family Housing Direct and Guaranteed loans (SFHDLP and SFHGLP) through March 31, 2021. The actions announced last week will bring relief to residents in rural America who have housing loans through USDA.

USDA recognizes that the COVID-19 pandemic has triggered an almost unprecedented housing affordability crisis in the United States. Today, 1 in 10 homeowners with a mortgage are behind on payments. In addition to the actions taken, the Biden Administration looks forward to working with Congress to take more robust and aggressive actions to bring additional relief to American families and individuals impacted by the pandemic.

#### Foreclosure Moratorium **Extension:**

The actions announced make it possible for the foreclosure and eviction moratorium announced by USDA, Single Family Housing Direct Loan Program (SFH-GLP) and the Single Family Housing Guaranteed Loan Program (SFHGLP) on August 28, 2020, to be extended until March 31, 2021. The moratorium does not apply in cases where USDA or the servicing lender has documented the property is vacant or abandoned.

Lenders should continue to provide impacted borrowers relief in accordance with the CARES Act by offering forbearance of the borrower guaranteed loan payment for up to 180 days. In addition, the initial forbearance period may be extended up to an additional 180 days at the borrower's request. Lenders should outline potential solutions that may be available at the end of the forbearance payment and explain to borrowers that a lump sum payment of the arrearage will not be required.

During the forbearance options outlined above, no accrual of fees, penalties or interest may be charged to the borrower beyond the amounts calculated as if the borrower had made all contractual payments in a timely fashion.

Lenders may approve the initial 180-day COVID-19 Forbearance no later than the earlier of the termination date of the national emergency declared by the President on March 13, 2020 or March 31, 2021.

# **Post Forbearance Options:**

Upon completion of the forbearance, the lender shall work with the borrower to determine if they can resume making regular payments and, if so, either offer an affordable repayment plan or term extension to defer any

missed payments to the end of the loan. If the borrower is unable to resume making regular payments, the lender should evaluate the borrower for all available loss mitigation options outlined in HB-1-3555. The special relief measured that are outlined in Chapter 18 Section 5 "Assistance in Natural Disasters" will apply. These options include Term Extensions, Capitalization and Term Extensions, and a Mortgage Recovery Advance.

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
