

SHS commencement set May 28, top graduates named

Commencement for the Salado High School Class of 2021 will be 7 p.m. May 28 at the Mayborn Campus Center at the University of Mary Hardin Baylor.

SHS has named its top two graduating seniors: Valedictorian Amy Manning and Salutatorian Nena Vero.

Valedictorian Amy Manning

Amy Manning is the Valedictorian of the Salado High School Class of 2021, graduating with a final grade point average of 112.50294. She is the daughter of Will and Kris Manning of Salado and has been attending school here since Kindergarten.

She has an older sister, Kayla, who is in her third year at Harvard University. Her grandparents are the late Norman and Shirley Manning of Taylor and Brenda and Ellery Friess of Temple.

While attending SHS, she took honors courses in the following: AP World History, AP US History, AP Government and Politics, AP Macroeconomics, AP Biology, AP Statistics, AP Calculus AB, AP Language & Composition, AP Literature & Composition, AP Computer Science Principles.

She also took the On-Ramps Chemistry course for dual credit with the University of Texas at Austin, where she will attend to study Computational Engineering in the Honors Engineering College there. She will pursue a career in the technology industry.

Cost of lumber axes April new housing starts

The Markets

Despite all the alarmist headlines about a market decline underway, the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) closed out the week ending May 21 at 4155.86, down only 0.43% for the week and a mere 1.81% from its record high close of 4282.60 on May 7. The Index is up 10.64% year-to-date. The reported consensus on Wall Street was that the market was looking for something to be afraid of. First, it was a fear the Federal Reserve would prematurely raise interest rates, then when the minutes of the last Fed meeting allayed that fear, the market slumped because of a sell-off in crypto currencies. Walmart, Amazon, and Target all came in with exceptional revenue and earnings reports for the first quarter as well as positive guidance for the rest of the year, indicators of more growth to come. The CRSP Mid-Cap Value Index slid 0.93% leaving it up 19.74% for the year and down 1.75% from its top two weeks ago.

The rate on the 10-year U.S. Treasury note where one would expect to see the first evidence of any inflation threat, actually declined 1.1% to yield 1.612% at the end of the week. Traders reported that they, like their stock-trading comrades, are confused as to what the future holds but with each small rise in yield, interest-hungry buyers swoop in and drive the rates back down. The yield curve remains steep. Analysts who read the Treasury tea leaves posit that the Treasury market is forecasting about 2.25% average annual inflation over the next five years, very close to what the Federal Reserve Board has targeted as its goal. The price of West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) slipped down about 2.6% to \$63.78, well within its recent trading range and suggesting the economic recovery will continue.

recovery continues, there is an abundance of noise and fleeting fears of this and that, which, by the way, is quite healthy. One issue is clear and a steadily growing concern. Despite the fact that we have about 8 million workers unemployed we also have about the same number of unfilled job openings, an all-time record. The worker shortage is one of the leading concerns of business managers across the country. They consistently report an abundance of customers, plenty of demand, but are having a hard time getting products to fill their shelves, or to put on tables, and an even harder time finding people to do the work to supply those customers.

It would be easy to blame generous unemployment benefits for the worker shortage, but only about 25% of the unemployed workers are drawing those benefits. More, the same labor shortage in the face of high unemployed numbers is evident in other countries. In Australia, where unemployment benefits were cut in March, there are 40% more unfilled jobs than before the pandemic, and in England, as the pubs open up, hours are being limited by the inability to hire staff. Surveys suggest that fear of contracting COVID combined with a critical shortage of childcare may account for some of the discrepancy. McDonalds, Amazon, and Walmart have responded with increased hourly wages and in some cases, hiring bonuses, and that seems to be working. The minimum wage is being raised by the marketplace.

If you are worried that this expansion may stumble and as it does, take down the stock market, the Con-

ference Board's Leading Economic Index (LEI) may put your mind at ease. As their report states, "While U.S. employment and production have not recovered to their pre-pandemic levels yet, the U.S. LEI suggests the economy's upward trend should continue and growth may even accelerate in the near term." The Board now forecasts real GDP growth at an annualized rate of 6 to 9 percent in the second quarter and 6.4 percent for 2021. The LEI is not infallible, but in the decades of its existence, it has proven to be one of the most reliable indicators of where our economy is in the business cycle of recovery-expansion-contraction.

Housing starts sagged a bit in April and the reports from builders are that the cost of lumber has simply gone to the point where it is often unprofitable to build even at the house prices we are seeing. One local builder noted that a piece of lumber that cost him \$7 a year ago is now priced at \$51. Initial unemployment claims hit a new pandemic low of 444,000, still twice the pre-pandemic norm, but trending nicely downward.

The bottom line remains mostly unchanged. Both the U.S. and global economies are experiencing some glitches and bumps as demand suddenly ramped up in the last month or so, but a lot of focus and money is going into the means to meet that demand. Expect more bumps as we do an economic restart in a few months that took us years to accomplish following the great recession of 2008-2009. Meanwhile, the markets are going to fret and worry, but that is good. Be patient, keep some powder dry and hang on for the ride!

When it comes to property taxes, you ain't seen nothing yet

To the Editor:

Today there are consistent complaints about local property taxes, but as they say, "You ain't seen nothin' yet."

What with aberrant construction inflation and induced property value increases due to a few area developments, there will be no limit to Bell County values. However, I recently told an Appraisal District employee that what we have now is much better than it once was.

Before the District's evolution, appraisals were "catch as catch can." In the 1960s, Salado ISD's appraiser would sit at your dining table and inquire as to how much livestock you had; your furniture's worth; and any jewelry, cash in bank, securities, etc. that you had.

Later, the district used Bell County's assessments. Invariably, with that came multiple and gross inequities in appraisals. One assessor's ran to good buddy deals and another's to corporate favoritism, about which, as the ISD's appointee to address tax values within the Salado ISD, he and I had several heated disagreements - I won.

Inequities are not adequately addressed under the current system, but there is a more legitimate appeal process instead of having to challenge the county assessor and then appeal to a consortium of pompous and avaricious county commissioners. (Still, I don't understand the Appraisal District's concept that bedrock-exposed, caliche land is more productive than creek bottom, ex-farm land planted in improved grasses. But who is a rancher to question "experts"?)

Real estate - land and improvements - still carry the major burden of what taxpayers must "render unto Caesar." This, for no other reason than their visibility and lack of mobility. Business inventories contribute a minor part. A few decades ago, individuals were expected to voluntarily render their personal assets, but I was told that only one person in Temple did so, and the city commissioners would laugh at her honesty.

Soon after Nixon abandoned the Gold Standard in 1971, agricultural land became a target, and projected taxes were feared to exceed production. This precipitated a movement to assess and tax "open/agricultural" land based on use, not speculative "value." Early successes were only partial, but as LBJ said, "Anyone not satisfied with half a loaf has never been hungry."

Some elected officials began a search for taxable options. One such individual was Gene Fondren, the "floatorial" state representative between Bell and Milam Counties. I had met Gene in the mid 1970s upon his campaigning in Salado's Pace Park, and he invited me to present at a "Special House Committee on Alternatives to Ad Valorem Taxes for School Funding" to be chaired by Tom Massey. In my youthful optimism, I gladly accepted. I prepared a list of potential items for assessment that would support the philosophy of tax-

ation - small assessments on a broad tax base that would be fair to everyone. Since investors, including me, paid no taxes on securities transfers, I felt that a small tax on their many transactions would be fair, as would be a small tax on real estate transfers. There already was one on automobiles.

I really emphasized extending the sales tax to groceries. There was already one on restaurant meals - and even beer if one ate something with it. The collection and reporting mechanisms were already in place, so there would be no start up costs, and everyone ate, so the tax would be broad.

The committee consisted of old time legislators who had for years fed at the taxpayers' trough as well as one recently elected Black female representative. There came forth a cacophony of cries that a groceries' tax would be "regressive." I countered, "It would not be regressive," and above the clamor arose a firm female voice, saying, "He's right." She and I simultaneously said, "Food stamps." I later found that the lady was a younger Wilhelmina Delco, who had been elected in 1974, and during ten terms was a stalwart for support of public education in Texas.

There was one unanticipated distraction. Off to my left a television crew was conducting an interview. I asked who it was, and was told it was the Speaker of the House, Bill Clayton. That night I saw the interview during which Clayton emphatically said, "There will be no action on school taxes."

Thus furthered my education on the political process, but upon reviewing the documents my comments and projections are still relevant today. Unfortunately, the politicians also continue to be of the same cut.

Although that effort was fruitless, landowner interests were able to make somewhat of a trade: They would not push taxation of the wealthy's personal assets in return for consideration of open land taxes based on use or potential agricultural productivity.

I still treasure legislators' kudos for my helping make this happen. For a few years taxing entities circumvented the intent of the process, but eventually it evolved to what we now have. However, even today there appear to be stirrings within taxing entities to whittle away at the hard won protective aspects of the legislation(s).

Yessir, the inevitables: Death and taxes.

To the Editor:

I have read with great concern your article in the *Salado Village Voice* on May 20, 2021.

The front-page article entitled "CUWCD approves both Well permits for Victo-

ry Rock crushing operation" was incomplete and very deficient and lacked the whole story. Because of its misleading nature, the full truth did not prevail. The District's desire is to conduct a public hearing in accordance with State Law and District Rules for non-exempt wells. We have a storied history of providing due process to all parties and staying within our statutory authority.

CUWCD is a model of taking this approach since being affirmed by the voters in 1999. I am a Bell County native and a Salado graduate, property owner and businessman. I cherish my role that we be fair to all parties, protect property rights, keep the district in our lane and deliberate in such a manner that decisions are legally and scientifically defensible. What better opportunity for our constituents to feel that their opinions are heard and that the board can fairly and impartially deliberate.

I would like to simply provide additional facts and insight to the nine hours "you referenced" in your article and let's call it "The Rest of the Story" in memory of the late and great, Paul Harvey. I was the Presiding Officer of the Contested Case Hearing on both permits by Victory Rock LLC and have been the board president since 2011.

As the Presiding Officer, my role is to determine and afford all affected parties who wish for a contested case hearing that we conduct one with empathy and decorum. This simply means, if protestants are adjacent property owners and/or well owners potentially effected by the pumping of groundwater, they are given "legal standing". Legal standing affords them the right to offer formal comments, offer evidence and cross examine the applicant, their representatives, the district general manager, the district's consultants as well as the board members. During the time of hearing testimony and deliberation, the board, prior to rendering any decision, is required to consider the affected parties comments, evidence and specific requests before rendering a defensible decision.

In your article you failed to state, at the beginning of evidentiary portion of the hearing, why I denied their attorney's initial request for another continuance on the first application. For the record we decided at the initial hearing on March 10, 2021 that a continuance was needed for all parties and specifically that the applicant provide additional evidence and correct their initial needs assessment. We were aligned with the concerns of the affected parties and a continuance was given at that March meeting. We then put our general manager to work gathering additional information, have the applicant modify the application to address our concerns, and provide

a better understanding why the 2-acre feet was needed from the middle Trinity well located on the property. He was also to communicate to the protestants what a "Contested Case Hearing" is and what it provides to the affected parties. It was apparent they did not know in the first hearing that it affords them effect legal remedies over simply offering "public comments" prior to the hearing. All elected officials know and understand the limits to deliberating on public comments.

If a person listens to the entire recording, they will hear numerous times during the testimony and after testimony that, I "the presiding officer" offered all parties the opportunity for them to request a "Continuance". The protestants, their attorney and the applicant did not take advantage of those multiple offers I made. They had a legal right at that time to stop the hearing for an additional thirty days. I could have and most likely, would have provided another continuance. It was then their choice, at that time, to put the board on a path to render a decision. The board deliberated and applied measures and benchmarks of accountability of

the applicant to comply before using groundwater.

The Village Voice has failed to tell the whole story. CUWCD's hope is that the community would see the merits of holding a contested case hearing at the local level so that citizens can hear all sides.

At the end of the night the board sided with the concerns of the affected parties and established legally defensible expectations of the applicant to protect groundwater and comply with TCEQ's regulations. I quote from the six protestants at the end of the evening that "We want them to have water! We want them to suppress the dust?"

The board also expressed our legal position that the applicant should take extreme efforts and measures to conduct a geologic assessment of the underlying aquifer even though the district legally cannot demand that to be done. The district also guided our GM to develop a legal and scientifically defensible effort to monitor the Edwards BFZ water quality in the area wells with the owner's approval. That was funded later in the evening.

The purpose of the Memorial Day ceremony is to remember the veterans buried not just in Salado Cemetery but in all of the Salado-area cemeteries, including family and church cemeteries, by a roll call of their names. All Veteran's grave sites will have flags placed on them before the service by Cemetery Association Board members. The Veterans are from the Texas Revolutionary War, Early Day Rangers, Home Guard, Indian Wars, Mexican War, Confederate and Union Armies, Spanish American War, WWI and II, Korean War, Vietnam War, and from peace time service.

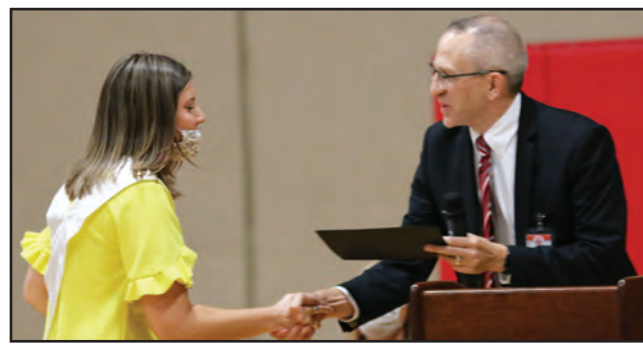

The Salado Cultural Arts District (SCAD) is hosting their annual "Spring for the Arts Show" through May 30 at the Salado Museum, located at 423 S. Main Street. The show is open to the public and features 14 Salado artists and various art styles. Art pieces are also available for purchase. About the artists: Helen Alexander came to Salado in 1999 and began her journey in art. Having retired from a counseling career, she recognizes the im-

portance of artistic creativity to stimulate and maintain a healthy life balance. Her art is featured at the Uniquely Salado Gallery. Gail Allard opened Salado Glassworks in 2011, in what was an old potter's studio, and soon expanded into his current location, a 5,000 square foot gallery and working studio space. There he and his team design and produce some of the most unique pieces of custom hand-blown glass art currently available and

each signature piece created has its own beautiful story to tell. Titia Arledge has been a potter since 1981. Her work emphasizes functional stoneware, which are done in high-fire stoneware clay. The Village Potter and Mud Pies Pottery has been open as working studios in Salado since 1993. Hollye Davis found ways to include art in her daily work life before she became a full-time artist. From designing labels for

a food processing company to making doodles during her spare time at a law firm, she describes her signature style as "abstract, with elements of realism." Davis enjoys making her paintings identifiable, yet still subjective. She is also the owner of Uniquely Salado, an artist collective of over 30 different LOCAL artists showcasing their talents. Tim Flanagan is a 25-year veteran of the portrait industry and owner of Solas Gallery, one of the nation's leading photography studios located in Salado. His portraits hang in thousands of homes around the world and help people remember the value of their relationships. Flanagan strives to create images that capture not only the beauty on the surface of his subjects, but a glimpse into their hearts.

Kay Griffith came to the realization that she was born an abstract expressionist painter. In the mid 1990's, she started to paint full time and began to sell paintings locally. The focus for the

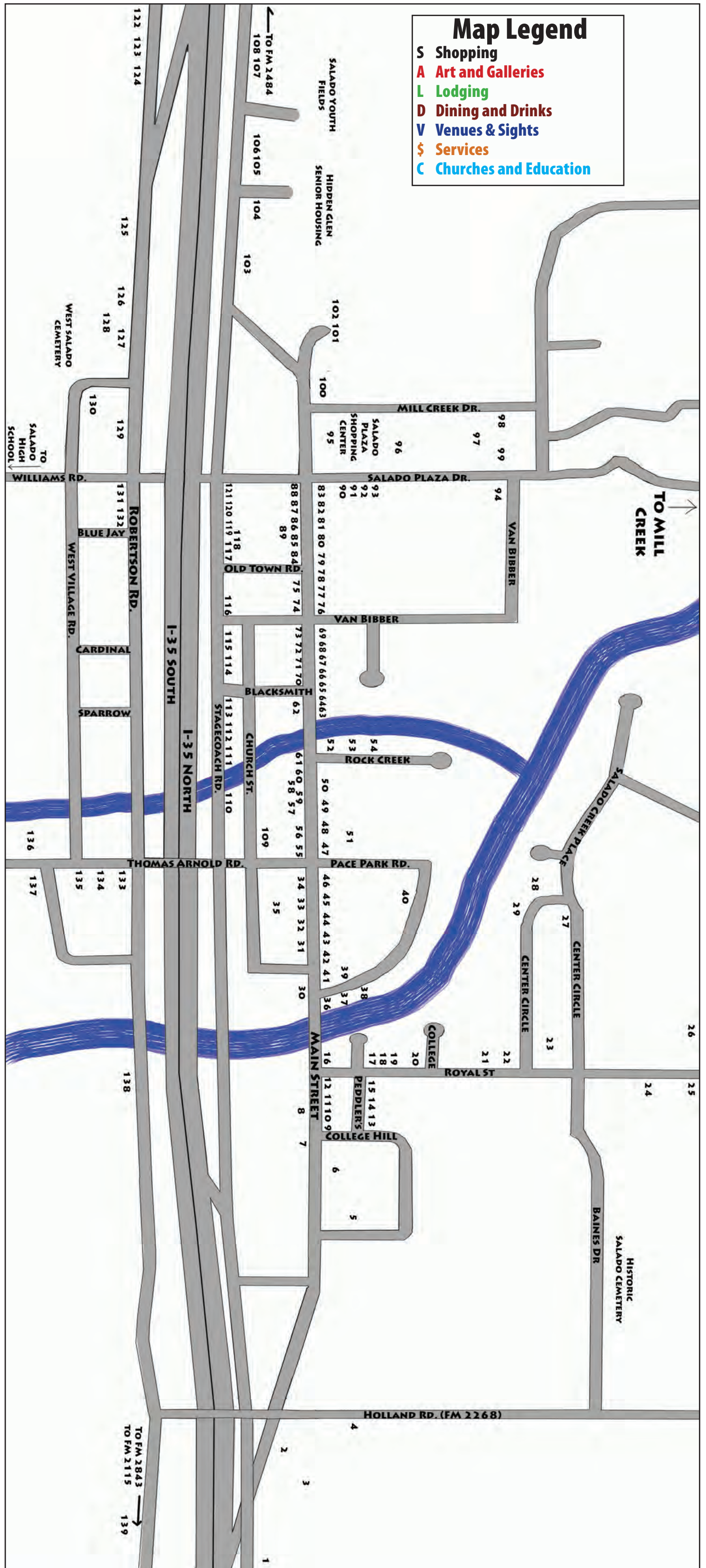

Bascomb Herd was born in Dallas and spent his early years in the Texas Panhandle, before moving to various Texas metro areas. He started his hobby of oil painting in 1968 to relax after the stress of working retail all day. His wife Ann started selling his work at various art shows in 1971, while he continued his retail profession and working hard to develop "The B.

Herd Style." In 1981 they opened a gallery in Dallas where they enjoyed 15 years of developing their own art business before moving to Salado, where the B. Heard Gallery is now located, and is run by their son Lee Herd.

Larry Prellop was born and raised in Austin and is the owner of Prellop Fine Art Gallery and Framing in Salado. As a teenager, Prellop attended school, went to work, and then spent his evenings painting while he watched television, and his mother would and sell his art to her coworkers. Prellop's landscapes and seascapes are distinctly realistic whether he is capturing the quiet water of a hill country stream or the pounding surf of the Gulf of Mexico. Medium: oil

Michael Pritchett is a former Dallas based artist whose first position was working as a designer for a fashion forward western apparel manufacturing company. A random visit to the central Texas art colony of Salado led Michael to eventually open the Sirril Art Gallery featuring all his unique and original works for sale along with a collection of artwork to shop from a variety of talented and ambitious artists from the central Texas area. Medium: acrylic

Sheryl Russell inspired and intrigued by life and things that she loves. Her mixed-up media captures her creative, innovative side, encouraging combinations of illustration, painting, manipulating texture,

color, shape, and light. Russell's lamps began as original watercolor paintings. Ironically, a broken glass occurred while she was painting. After cleaning up shards, she wrapped a painting around the functioning base for safety, and the result was glowing light, subtle hues and bold colors that radiated through the heavy watercolor paper. She has become a multi-faceted one-person assembly line, making each lamp incorporate an original watercolor.

Jill Shipman had a 25-year career in Interior decorating and set design, that included teaching color harmony classes, design, shape, and form. She now translates those skills into her paintings using vivid colors, moods, and abstract

forms. Her quest is to capture the incredible skies and landscapes of Salado.

Start saving now for higher ed. May 29 529 College Savings Day

As national 529 industry professionals prepare to celebrate 529 College Savings Day on May 29, Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar is encouraging families to save for their children's higher education expenses using the state's 529 college plans.

"529 day is a reminder that it's never too late – or too early – to start planning for a child's college education," Hegar said. "Families will find that when it comes to planning for their children's future education, every little bit adds up. One way to get a head start is by opening a new 529 plan or contributing to an existing one."

Texas offers three tax-advantaged 529 plans: the Texas College Savings Plan® (TCSP) and the LoneStar 529 Plan® (LS529), both college savings plans, and the Texas Tuition Promise Fund® (TTPF), a pre-paid tuition plan. The plans are known as 529 plans because they are authorized by Internal Revenue Code Section 529.

In commemoration of 529 College Savings Day, the Comptroller's office is offering a special webinar on May 26 at 1 p.m. Central Time to provide information about the TCSP and LS529 college savings plans.

The TCSP and LS529 allow families to work toward building college savings by investing in one or more portfolios, either by enrolling in TCSP directly or in LS529 through a financial advisor. In addition to paying for higher education costs at schools nationwide, TCSP and LS529 can be used to pay up to \$10,000 per year of K-12 tuition expenses. Age-based portfolios are designed for college savers, and account owners should discuss with their advisors whether paying for K-12 tuition expenses is appropriate for their situation. The plans are open for enrollment year-round.

The TTPF is designed to help families and individuals prepay and lock in today's rates for all or some future undergraduate resident tuition and school-wide required fees at any two- or four-year Texas public college or university, excluding medical and dental institutions. TTPF newborn enrollment is available through July 31 to lock in 2020-21 prices for children younger than 1 year of age; open enrollment begins

Sept. 1 to lock in 2021-22 prices. Texas residency requirements apply.

The Texas Prepaid Higher Education Tuition Board administers all three 529 plans through the Comptroller's office.

The Texas Tuition Promise Fund, the Texas College Savings Plan and the LoneStar 529 Plan are established and maintained by the Texas Prepaid Higher Education Tuition Board and distributed by Northern Lights Distributors, LLC, Member FINRA/SIPC. Orion Advisor Solutions, Inc, 17605 Wright Street, Omaha, NE 68130, is the plan manager and administrator.

- Salado High School students Dillon McDaniel, Logan Taylor and Logan Atchison were recognized for their success in ag mechanics at several stock shows this year. Salado Middle School students Elliott Self and Aiden Rose and Salado Middle School teacher Darcy Madsen were all awarded the Sons of the American Revolution Outstanding Citizenship award. Salado High School students Jaci McGregor and Lexi Wilson were recognized for their success at the state track meet.

- Dr. BA White was administered the oath of office for another three year term (May 2021 – May 2024). Jim Hodgins was unable to attend the meeting and will be administered the oath of office at our next meeting.

- One parent spoke during the public comment time to thank the school board and the district for trying to start a wrestling program at the high school level.

- Seven parents and students spoke during the public comment time in support of discontinuing the Texas Education Agency mask-wearing mandate and/or concerned that students are going to be required to receive the COVID-19 vaccine. (Note: the Board voted on April 19 to end the Texas Education Agency mask-wearing mandate, effective Tuesday, June 1, and to allow our high school graduates to take off their masks when they cross the stage at graduation on Friday, May 28. Our school district is not requiring students to receive the COVID-19 vaccine. The Texas Department of State Health Service will decide if students in all school districts in Texas are required to receive the COVID-19 vaccine).

- The Board approved the hiring of eight teachers, an athletic trainer, and an ARD facilitator.
