# **Hearings set** for village budget, \$0.4953 tax rate

The Village of Salado will hold a public hearing on the 2021-22 proposed budget at 6:30 p.m. The board will hold a public hearing on the proposed tax rate at 6:30 p.m. Sept. 9. At their 6:30 p.m. Sept. 16 meeting, aldermen will adopt the budget and set the tax rate.

Aldermen voted on the public hearing dates after discussion of individual aldermen schedules and ability to take part in the public hearings and vote on the budget and tax rate.

The \$1.7 million general operating budget is an increase of 12.9% over the current year. It includes \$120,000 for resurfacing of Pace Park Road and Mill Creek Road and \$50,000 in general street repairs.

The M&O rate, according to Village administrator Don Ferguson is 3.5% lower than the current M&O rate. "We have one of the lowest M&O rates in the county," Fergu-

Aldermen proposed a tax rate of \$0.4953 which is lower than the current tax rate of \$ 0.5339. The proposed tax rate is \$0.1955 for maintenance and operations and \$0.2998 for debt service. The proposed tax rate is below the Voter Approval Tax Rate of \$0.5303 but it is higher than the No New Revenue tax rate of \$0.4898.

Total general fund revenues is estimated at \$1.6 million, about 10% more than the current fiscal year budget.

Total general fund expenditures will be more than \$1.7 million, resulting in a deficit of \$120,000 covered by the fund balance.

The debt service budget is also at a deficit. The proposed 2021-22 budget estimates \$678,903.56 in revenues and \$753,437.00 in expenses to cover the sewer bond debt. To cover the \$75,533.44 deficit, \$78,849.65 will be transferred from the general

# Sanctuary BoA approves **North Tract for apartments**

Village of Salado aldermen at their Aug. 5 meeting approved the proposed construction plans and construction plat for the Sanctuary North Tract located at the northeast corner of I-35 and FM 2268. The Sanctuary North Tract is 45.492 mixed use development that will have apartments, townhouses and single family residences.

According to Village Administrator Don Ferguson, the village engineer reported that the plans and plat were in compliance with Village codes and that no waivers were being requested. The planning & zoning board voted unanimously on July 22 to approve the plat and plans.

The plat includes an extension of Main Street to connect to FM 2268. The Main Street extension will have two 90° turns in order to connect to FM 2268.

Sanctuary has an agreement with Salado Water Supply Corporation for water tanks to be built on the south tract of Sanctuary to

development, according to Mark Ramseur, PE. The water lines for the north tract are included in the construction plans.

Sanctuary developers are still working on an easement to connect sewer collection lines to the Royal Street collection location.

RREAF Holdings is developing Water's Edge, a \$55 million apartment, townhouse and single family living development on Sanctuary North Tract. The drawings presented to aldermen in February show that the design of the apartment buildings deviates from the Old European style of architecture that the Sanctuary developers said would be the key look of Sanctuary properties. Instead, it opts for a simpler, historic Texas design in its architecture that features lap siding, high pitched roofs, limestone and board and batten siding.

"We tried to model the majority of our features after buildings in Salado like the Stagecoach Inn," James Zavodny told aldermen at their Feb. 25 meeting.

Phase 1 of the develop-

bring water to the apartment ment will be 210 units of apartments along with a resort-style pool, a leasing headquarters and clubhouse. Phase 2 will be an expansion of multi-family residential with 90 units. The third phase will include the 10 single family residential units.

Water's Edge will include a new road, Nottingham Street, that enters onto South Main Street. Edinburgh Street will connect College Hill Dr. to Santa Maria.

The first phase will have seven three- or four-story apartment buildings. Phase 1 will have nine studio apartments, 77 one bedroom apartments, 92 two-bedroom apartments and 32 three-bedroom apartments.

The studio apartments are 610 sq. ft. One bedroom apartments are 724-788 sq. ft. The two-bed apartments are 1,108-1,170 sq. ft. and the three bedroom apartments are 1,331 sq. ft.

All parking is interior of the complex, not outside the footprints of the buildings themselves, according to Za-

"These are high-end, nice looking units," Zavodny said.

# **Covid-19** threat level now severe

Bell County Public Health District will change the Covid-19 Threat Level from Level 2 (Significant) to Level 1 (Severe) due to continued higher incidence rate and hospitalizations.

The Bell County Public Health District tracks local COVID-19 data and reports to the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) for the state dashboard. The local dashboard can be found on the health district website, www.bellcountyhealth.org.

The highest spread of cases, hospitalizations and severe outcomes is happening among the unvaccinated population within Bell County. The vast majority of those in the hospital are under age 55 and virtually all Covid-19 related hospitalizations continue to be among the unvaccinated.

The Health District recommends getting vaccinated which prevents severe illness, hospitalization, death and helps to reduce the spread of the virus in our community.

"Community interest in getting vaccinated is increasing as we see the severity of the pandemic and variants. We continue to encourage Bell County residents to get vaccinated and to protect themselves by wearing a mask until fully vaccinated. The vaccines provide a layer of protection which can prevent or reduce the severity of Covid-19, including death." Interim Health District Director Nikki Morrow said.

The Health District and local healthcare leaders are continuing to monitor the incidence rate and hospitalizations. Covid-19 vaccine locations can be found throughout Bell County, including the Health District's health departments located in Temple and Killeen. Go to www. vaccines.gov or text your zip code to 438829 to find a location near you. Covid-19 vaccines are free and available to anyone in the community 12 years and older.

There are now 1,401 active cases of Covid-19 cases in Bell County.

# Bell Co. ESD 1 sets hearings on budget, tax

Bell County Emergency Services District 1 will hold two public hearings on its proposed budget and proposed tax rate of \$0.09.

The first will be held at 6 p.m. Aug. 17 at the Salado Fire Station #2, located at 3520 FM 2484.

The second will be held at 1 p.m. Aug. 19 at the Salado Fire Station #2.

The proposed \$1.17 million budget will fund a \$550,000 annual contract with the Salado Volunteer Fire Department to provide emergency response services. It also dedicates \$440,000 for capital expenditures for the department.

The plan calls for a fulltime fire chief to administer the organization. The plan also calls for hiring at least two part-time firefighters/EMTs. The department calls for a total of \$247,000 in human resource costs: \$100,000 for part-time employees; \$70,000 for fulltime chief; \$40,000 in stipends to volunteers; \$17,000 in payroll taxes and \$20,000 in training.

# Economy is booming back but COVID surge is lurching

The Markets

The stock market, represented in this case by the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX), sagged on Monday on fears that the COVID Delta variant would cripple the economic recovery and expansion, then slugged a zig-zag course upward for the rest of the week as earnings reports and CEO forecasts of good times ahead buoyed spirits. The Index closed at 4436.52, another record but perhaps significantly, did so on a Friday after a week of less than record-breaking closes. When market indices end the week upbeat, it is because the word on the street is that good surprises are more likely than bad ones. The SPX is now up over 18%, year-to-date. The other stock index we follow, the CRSP Mid-Cap Value Index, not to be outdone by its bigger cousin, closed at a new record too, 2464.87, up 1.10% for the week and over 20% this year.


In the inverted, reverse, and some would say, perverse logic of the bond market, the yield on the 10-year U.S. Treasury note climbed a whopping 6.4% to 1.307% as investors sold bonds to buy stocks. Earlier in the week the T-note yield had sagged to the 1.1% range, setting a record low for a real, after expected inflation, rate of negative 1.19%. There are a lot of scared nations, institutions, and regular people who are willing to pay Uncle Sam that much to hold their money. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) prices bucked the trend and slipped almost 8% for the week to \$67.98 per barrel on a combination of inventory buildup and fears that the surge in the Delta variant will cause a drop in travel over the summer.

The Economy

There were two big economic issues that dominated the week. On the posi-

en economy, which, by the way, is a good thing to have, the more people we have working and earning wages, the better things get. The same people who get paid for making, delivering, fixing, and serving things are the ones who are paying for those goods and services. That is why we focus so hard on the employment statistics, and they were good this week. U.S. employers added 943,000 net new employees in July. More, the new jobs number was revised upward for June to 938,000. Contrast that with the revised number for May of 614,000 and the roughly 250,000 figures we saw earlier, and you can see why we economists are excited. But there's more, average wages are going up too, rising at about a 4.3% annualized rate. The good news was confirmed in the separate, household survey, where the unemployment rate dropped by a full half percent to

The downside news is disturbing though. We are receiving local reports that hospitals and ICU wards are full, and surgery patients normally kept in the hospital for observation are being sent home. Patients in Emergency Rooms are being held there rather than admitted simply because there are no available beds. We have

heard from doctors and read reports that the inundation of the medical system is almost all from unvaccinated persons who have contracted the COVID-19 Delta variant. Several reputable sources are projecting that this wave may be as bad or worse than the one we saw at the beginning of the year and will not peak until October. There are already reports of travel plans being canceled and employee absences that could slow the economic expansion. On the positive side, with about 70% of the population vaccinated, the impact may be far less than we saw last

In other news, the July ISM manufacturing index came in at a strong 59.5 on a scale where numbers above 50 indicate growth. New unemployment claims fell to 385,000 for the last week in July even as the total unemployed both long and short-term decreased. We still are employing about 7.2% fewer people than in February of last year, but things appear to be headed in the right direction.

The bottom line is that as of the end of July we had a solidly recovering, expanding economy with corporations hiring lots of people, making good profits, and those profits supporting the stock market. At the same time, the threat of an overwhelmed hospital system and needed restrictions in activities is very real. We, and the markets, were expecting a return to normal to take place around Labor Day, but it is looking more and more like it will be the end of the year.

# **Trust Nonsense**

Well, who ya gonna believe, me or your own eyes?"


"The party told you to reject the evidence of your eyes and ears." -- George Orwell, 1949, "1984"

Slow-forward years to the present: Day by day, contribution by contribution, Trump has raised \$82 million in the first six months of 2021, an extraordinary amount for an ex-president. That means that millions of Americans are willing to open their wallets and make the statement that they choose not to believe their eyes and ears that Jan. 6 ever happened, at least not the way they're "seeing" and "reading" and remembering. More basically, in spite of overwhelming evidence to the contrary, stating that the Joe Biden forces somehow stole Trump's re-election from him.

They ignore all that reality. Their memories have been wiped clean. Why? Because Trump said so. And he raised \$82 million in six months to show for it. And that, by the way, is just in reportable donations. There's no telling how much "dark money" he has shoveled into his accounts where you can't see it. Not that you need to.

Nor has their collective amnesia recalled the horror of the extremist mob that invaded the Capitol building on Jan. 6. The "big lie" of Trump's election victory



manifested itself in a riledup riot. But following his lead, Donald Trump's Republican lemmings have turned those arrested for trashing the Capitol into "political prisoners." And Ashli Bennett, the woman who was shot to death by a policeman, has become a martyr to the blind followers of the Trump cause. She had followed the mental buzz of some conspiracy theory and stormed the barricades that outnumbered law enforcement were trying to protect.

So what can Trump do with his post-presidency millions? Pretty much anything he wants. He can lavish primary cash on the campaigns of candidates who have pleased him, or, more importantly, against those who have displeased him. His travel expenses can be paid as he barnstorms the country. More importantly yet, it could be easily transferred to a presidential campaign if he actually decides to run, or if he doesn't, to the campaign of a successor.

As a result, most of the candidate wannabes in the Republican Party, which includes nearly every politician in the party, are occupying some territory between trying to ingratiate him- or herself to Trump and everyone else in his base who he absolutely has under his spell. This includes everyone from House Minority Leader Kevin McCarthy to

the pillow guy, Mike Lindell. Lindell is at the forefront of the "Trump will be reinstated" movement, which is pure gimmickry. That's a polite way of saying it's a con.

The rest of the other serious hopefuls are biding their time, holding their breath to avoid antagonizing the manic-depressive Trumpster. Some are secretly hoping that he is tripped up by all the legal problems that could cause him grief.

Could he use his political contributions for legal expenses? Possibly. There are a number of lawyers out there willing to represent him -- and get their share of billable hours in the process. Although, perchance Rudy Giuliani is not one of them. That's conceivable because of the fact that Trump has a past of stiffing everyone who does business with him. Presumably that would include lawyers

Over a lifetime, Trump has been telling lies, ignoring business expenses, breaking promises, stretching the truth, demagoguing issues, whatnot. He's able to get away with it because of the blinding light that wipes away the sight and intellectual ability of millions of his followers. There is just one description for what he gets away with:

# The President Who Wasn't There

Teddy Roosevelt fervently believed that the president of the United States should be at the center of the political universe, constantly attracting attention to himself. But he'd never met Joe Biden.

Biden is the most powerful man in the world and yet makes almost no impression.

No one, besides political and media professionals, wonders what Biden is going to say about something or considers him a figure of fascination. In fact, he barely rates.

His recent CNN town hall was a fizzle, averaging only 1.5 million viewers. Fox News easily beat it with its regular programming, and MSNBC had more viewers as well, dumping the president of the United States into third place in the cable-ratings race.

He's underperformed in more formal settings, too. Biden drew 27 million for his first address to a joint session of Congress, whereas Donald Trump drew 48 million.

The contrast with Trump's constant, impossible-to-ignore cocktail of provocation and political melodrama, naturally makes Biden's approach even more stark.

He's the Olympic badminton competition after a WWE match; he's elevator music after a heavy metal concert; he's the sparkler after a fireworks display.

Biden's presidency is, in this sense, practically premodern, almost hearkening back to the pre-mass-media days when presidents were neither seen nor heard.

Of course, this is in part a deliberate choice by the





White House, playing on the contrast with Trump and limiting Biden's exposure to avoid distractions (and gaffes). Being a notably low-voltage political figure worked for Biden in his comeback primary campaign and in the 2020 general election, so why not as president?

As a result, Biden strangely doesn't feel like the main event of the Biden years.

Assuming it arrives, the midterm backlash in 2022 won't be directly about Biden; instead, it will be driven by the Biden-adjacent issues of the border, crime, critical race theory and -- if they reemerge in force -- mask mandates and school closures.

Biden is the prime driver of only one of these issues, the crisis at the border that easily could have been avoided by keeping in place the policies the Trump administration had implemented to get control of the flow of migrants.

In other words, the culture war itself is likely to be the overwhelming issue in 2022, rather than the president.

This would be a marked departure from the midterm shellackings that Bill Clinton and Barack Obama got in 1994 and 2010, which were deeply personal rejections of both men (Clinton was viewed as a draft dodger unworthy of the office and Obama as a crypto-so-

cialist hostile to American exceptionalism).

If no one on the right is enamored of Biden, very little energy is invested in opposing him as such.

Indeed, the idea that tends to generate the most interest and passion isn't that the president is assiduously working to destroy the American way of life so much as Biden -- whose verbal meanderings can be truly bizarre -- isn't in charge at all.

Given the alternatives, this probably works in Biden's favor. He is pushing a truly radical spending agenda that would, if championed by a more in-yourface progressive president rather than someone who feels like a caretaker, surely be met with much fiercer resistance.

But there are risks to Biden, too. If his spending agenda founders, it's not clear what comes next. Even if the White House decides to try to "unleash" Biden, he is not well-suited to rallying the country or driving an agenda.

His low-intensity presidency may, as his advisers hope, help create a sense of a return to normality in Washington, but it easily could be consistent with a disturbing sense of drift. Usually, the dynamic of the presidency is if you don't seem to be in control of events, they are in control of you.

The test for Biden will be if, eventually, he has to be the dominant public figure in his own presidency. Rich Lowry is editor of the National Review.

# Salado ISD announces new COVID-19 protocols

By Tim Fleischer Editor-in-Chief

With Salado ISD students returning for in-person classes on Aug. 18, Salado ISD Superintendent Michael Novotny emailed parents Aug. 10 of the COVID-19 protocols that will follow the Texas Education Agency guidance released on Aug. 5.

The district cannot require students to wear

Salado ISD will not offer remote options because Gov. Greg Abbott's disaster declaration has expired. However, remote learning will be offered for students who have tested positive for COVID-19 and are not on campus.

SISD is required to report confirmed cases of COVID-19 to the Bell County Health Department and to the Texas Department of State Health Services (TXDSHS).

The school district will continue to notify parents when test-confirmed cases of COVID-19 have been in school. "While TEA no longer requires this type of notification, Salado ISD

believes it is important to provide families with the information they need to make decisions in the best interests of their children," Dr. Novotny stated.

Campus nurses will conduct contact tracing and communicate with families to discuss quarantine options whenever there has been notification of a positive COVID case. Students who test positive for COVID-19 will be required to quarantine. Students who are a close contact of a positive person will not be required to quarantine, but will have the option, based on parental discretion. Parents must provide the school with documentation of a positive test or a note from their medical provider in order for the absence to be excused as a medically related

Social distancing will be encouraged, but will not be required.

Hand sanitizing and cleaning protocols will remain in place. "We will continue to allow time in the school day for handwashing and will continue to provide direction on appropriate respiratory etiquette

and hand sanitizing," Dr. Novotny stated. "Campuses will post hygiene signage and reminders for students and staff. Additionally, hand sanitizer will be available at all campuses for students,

staff and visitors. "
Visitor access to campuses will be limited. Visitors should call ahead and make an appointment if a meeting is necessary. Parents are not allowed at this time to eat in the lunchroom with stu-

Students should bring a

water bottle to school and fill it at hydration stations.

Face coverings are optional for participants and spectators at all UIL events and activities.

"As the health and safety for all students and staff remains a priority," Dr. Novotny said, "Salado ISD will continue to monitor the local health situation and communicate any updates or modifications as necessary."

Salado ISD is partnering with Baylor Scott & White

to offer the Pfizer vaccine noon-6 p.m. Aug. 12 at Salado Middle School. The vaccine is free and you do not need to register in advance to participate. Anyone 12-17 will need a parent or guardian present to sign a consent form. The district and Baylor Scott & White will offer the vaccine again noon- 6 p.m, Sept. 2.

The District has not had any cases of Salado ISD students or employees diagnosed with COVID-19 since Aug. 4.




