Village officials will share information on the new golf cart regulations on Aug. 30.

Informational meeting on golf carts set Aug. 30

The Village of Salado will hold an informational meeting on Aug. 30 regarding the recently adopted regulations authorizing golf carts, neighborhood electric vehicles (NEVs), all-terrain vehicles (ATVs) and utility vehicles (UTVs) to operate on public streets in Salado. The public meeting will be held at 6 p.m. at the Municipal Building located at 301 N. Stagecoach.

"The purpose of this meeting is to provide residents with the information needed to help navigate the new regulations regarding the operation of golf carts, NEVs, ATVs and UTVs in the Village," said Village Administrator Don Ferguson. "While people are not required to attend the meeting, it will help them understand the new rules."

At the meeting, the Village Administrator and Police Chief will brief residents on the provisions of the new regulations including, but not limited to, driver's license requirements, vehicle equipment requirements and requirements relating to safety gear.

"It is the responsibility of drivers and riders to know the new regulations", said Ferguson. "This meeting will provide people with an opportunity to get their questions answered."

The Village of Salado recently adopted ordinances authorizing golf carts, NEVs, ATVs, and UTVs to operate on Village streets provide they operate in accordance with the provisions of state law relating to such vehicles. SISD trustees adopt COVID-19 protocols

Salado ISD Trustees at their Aug. 23 meeting unanimously adopted a protocol to require masks on school campuses that meet a two percent threshold of active COVID-19 cases for either one week or until the campus gets below the threshold. The new protocol also will close a campus for one week if it hits a threshold of five percent active cases of the total population of students and staff. On a split vote of 3-3, trustees failed to pass a resolution which would rewards staff members who receivee full vaccinations with a \$500 stipend.

The trustees took the votes in front of an audience of more than 50 and after listening to input from about 10 speakers, some opposed to the measures and others in favor of the measures.

The board also honored Burt Smith, who retires on Aug. 31 and who will be moving to Oklahoma to be near family. See related story this edition.

"My decision making based on a lot of research and consulted a lot of people. Increasingly based on freedom and liberty," Courtney Baglie told trustees before presenting them with packets of research.

Liz Cooley asked the board to consider amending the protocol for Thomas Arnold Elementary which has three different buildings under one campus. She asked that the protocol be applied to each separate building rather than the entire campus. "If the numbers are high in one campus, why shut down the others," she asked, adding "We need to keep our kids in school as many days as possible."

She told trustees that the stipend was "dividing our school."

Ashley Voss-Liebig told trustees that in Trauma Area L (which includes Bell County), "we have zero ICU beds available. In Texas, there are 65 people on the waiting list to get into any hospital anywhere. This is not counting those who are on hold in the ERs." Voss-Liebig is a critical care nurse who is the Division Chief overseeing Clinical Performance and Education for Travis

County Emergency Services. She is also Chief Clinical Manager for Travis County STAR Flight. She added that by supporting the protocols, "you're being reasonable."

Darrell Street, who served on SISD board of trustees for 15 years, told the board: "This school board and administrator has one thing as a common goal... Keeping students safe, keeping them learning and keeping them in school,. If it causes hardship to some people, that is too bad."

Ed Blado told trustees that he would like to see the Pledge to the Flags before school board meetings and that Critical Race Theory not be taught in schools. "It is nonsense," he said.

Dr. Brian Boucher, an OBGYN physician with two children at school, said that "I do know that children can carry it to households, to grandparents and to others in the household who are immune compromised."

Dr. Matt Altman, an emergency room physician, read from a study that stated that there was not "statistically significant evidence that masks had more than a mod-

erate influence in preventing influenza-like illnesses. "Masks that aren't made to the N-95 standard aren't doing anything to prevent it."

"I don't see anything ethical about paying someone to influence their healthcare, especially from a government entity," he added.

Pamela Uschek took issue with technology, particularly the Chromebooks being sent home with students. "Who is in charge of security and safeguarding what kids can look at on the Chromebooks. I have safeguards on my computers at home. You need to buckle down on our internet security for our children."

April Lewis read definitions of Coercion and Bribe to trustees before telling them "you should bribe or coerce your staff into doing something that they would not willingly do on their own.

Superintendent Michael Novotny reviewed with board members the active, reported COVID cases he is tracking.

As of Aug. 23, Thomas Arnold Elementary has four active cases of COVID-19 among its students and none among employees. In the current school year, it has had six cases. Salado Middle School had four active cases as of Aug. 23 and seven in the current school year. Salado High School had one active case as of Aug. 23 and three for the school year. For the 2020-2021 school year, Thomas Arnold had 75 total cases, 50 students and 25 employees; Salado Middle School had 40 cases, 30 students and 10 employees; Salado High School had 80 cases, 62 students and 18 staff and an additional eight staff not assigned to a campus for a total of 203 confirmed cases. There were 2,103 students enrolled in 2020-21 compared to 2,215 enrolled for 2021-22 school year.

The recommended protocols for masking and perhaps closing a campus are much different than last year, according to Dr. Novotny. Last year, following CDC and state guidelines, all students and staff were required to wear mask while on any school facility. Also, schools would be required to close if

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American Ignominy

So far, the American withdrawal from Afghanistan has been a chaotic and even deadly abandonment. We leave behind so many Afghans who helped us over two decades and are now desperate to escape the Taliban.

Why are Taliban troops having such an easy time with pro-government forces, who either surrendered at their first encounter or simply deserted? The Taliban militias cut through them like a knife through butter, in spite of 20 years of training and an estimated \$88 billion of the United States' money to formulate an Afghan-armed military.

Actually, it's a story of three governments -- the Taliban, the puppet government installed in Kabul and the U.S. government -- one of them living in the dark ages but emerging victorious yet again.

Ragtag though it was, the Taliban governed Afghanistan before the United States invaded and drove them out. The Muslim militants' support of Osama bin Laden and the 9/11 attacks was given as the reason. In December 2001, the U.S. invaded Tora Bora after intelligence pinpointed bin Laden there. But he escaped to Pakistan and went into hiding for several years, until the Obama administration flushed him out and killed him.

The second government -- the U.S.-established Afghan civilian government -- was the U.S. pawn, and the United States did exactly with it what it did in Vietnam. American taxpayers threw in a total of \$2.25 trillion for Afghanistan military and civilian endeavors and an ever-increasing number of troops. Over 2,000 armed



forces died. The blood and treasure supported a corrupt cast of characters.

Meanwhile, the United States, in its fury over the deadly terrorist destruction of the World Trade Center and the Pentagon, was willing to occupy Afghanistan despite its history of successfully resisting Soviet invaders and others who tried over the centuries. It was, like Vietnam, a quagmire.

Then successive American administrations and our allies did what we do best. We lied about progress there, or at least stretched the truth. So with that backdrop, why has the shattered Taliban always been proficient at wearing down the Americans and so easily rolling over the Afghans?

There is a considerable body of thought that it's because the Taliban have a mystical cause: They don't fear death because they dream of Paradise. Plus, their enemies are always the invaders ... infidels.

The U.S. and its lackey government have only money. Fundamentalist passion always beats money, particularly when it is so misspent. To his credit, Donald Trump wanted to withdraw troops but was not able to. President Joe Biden, who quickly opposed being there after first supporting the invasion, last April announced that his administration would finally withdraw all American troops from Afghanistan.

After the past days of miscalculation and tumult, it was a defiant President Biden who addressed the nation:

"I stand squarely behind my position ... We gave them every chance for their own future."

But now that the Taliban is taking the country back with such ease, escape for U.S. diplomats, families, supporters of Americans and the allies has turned into a helter-skelter mess. Biden has ordered thousands of troops back, but they were fired upon and unable to land for several hours because the runways were jammed with Afghans desperate to escape. How desperate? Many fell to their deaths while clinging to the side of a U.S. military plane as it took off. It was like fleeing from Saigon in April 1975 when the last Americans took flight. Only

As the Taliban army rolls through Kabul and takes over, the country's president has fled and his government has collapsed. As reports of new Taliban atrocities seep out, Joe Biden will bear the blame. Republicans have already started. Even Donald Trump sent a gloating email: "DO YOU MISS ME YET?"

There is time for recriminations later, including accounting for at least three presidents -- Bush, Obama and Trump. Right now the American mission is to escape Afghanistan without further bloodshed and shame. Then the blame game can begin. Will we learn from defeat this time?

bility.

President Biden arrived in office with the southern U.S. border secure and Afghanistan in a state of fragile equilibrium.

Eight months later, the border continues to be deluged with migrants overwhelming our capacity to properly house and process them, and we are evacuating our personnel from Hamid Karzai International Airport in Kabul overrun by desperate Afghans fleeing the Taliban.

The crisis at the border and the stunningly swift defeat in Afghanistan are entirely on Biden. He took sustainable situations and overturned them out of ideological fixity and fantastical wishful thinking.

The outcomes were utterly predictable. Indeed, anyone who knew anything about the border or Afghanistan warned what would happen.

The debacles haven't been the product of forces beyond Biden's control; events didn't take a hand, he did. These are man-made disasters.

Throw on top the crime wave in U.S. cities that is a product of the left's enthusiasm for fashionable anti-cop sentiments, and the picture is of a party that is unable to maintain order or rationally calculate the downside consequences of its rhetoric and policies.

One hallmark of the Biden approach has been laughably false assurances. He maintained at a press conference in March that there was nothing unusual going on at the border, when the historic surge had already begun. Only last



month, he confidently predicted that there'd be no dramatic rooftop evacuations from Kabul, when a rapid collapse of the government

was always a distinct possi-

Then, there are the ineffectual warnings. Biden officials have repeatedly told migrants to stop coming to the U.S. border, when they have every incentive to continue to do so, and his representatives tsk-tsked the Taliban about sweeping to power by force -- something that they have fought to do for 20 years -- because it would supposedly harm the group's international image.

And, finally, the rank blame-shifting. Biden's team has outlandishly tried to argue that President Donald Trump somehow created the conditions for the border spinning out of control, when the truth is that Trump, after false starts, figured out how to get a handle on it. Biden points the finger at Trump, too, on Afghanistan.

Here, he has more of a case -- the so-called peace deal that Trump cut with the Taliban was a travesty that undercut the Afghan government. But nothing forced Biden, who has happily reversed field on most Trump policies, to abide by an agreement that the Taliban violated from the outset or to execute a withdrawal that kneecapped the Afghan army in the midst of fighting

season and a gathering Tali-

ban offensive. He was the one whose it denied the Afghan army the U.S. air support and logistics it had always depended on, who left without securing a nearby base in the region, who didn't care enough about Afghan allies who had risked their lives for us to ensure that they could get out of the country, who sent a message of abandonment that was a blow to Afghan morale from the top all the way down.

It's a particularly galling Biden rhetorical move to use the catastrophic failure of the Afghan forces that he helped bring about to insist that his decision to leave was the only responsible one. He's gone from claiming we could safely leave because the Afghan security forces would do just fine on their own, to arguing we had no choice but to get out because they couldn't manage without us.

Both at the U.S. border and in Afghanistan, Biden merely had to keep in place what he inherited to sustain success or at least avoid disaster. On the border, Trump's pandemic-era controls and his agreements with Mexico and Central American countries were sensible and tested. Afghanistan was more difficult, but with some determination and finesse, Biden could have maintained the minimal U.S. commitment that had forestalled a Taliban takeover for years.

Instead, in both cases, he quite literally chose chaos.





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

There are times — albeit few and far between — when a declarer is called upon to make a play that could very appropriately be termed fancy.

Take this case where South gets to four hearts and West starts off with the K-A-J of clubs. Declarer ruffs and would collect 10 tricks as easy as pie with a normal 3-2 trump division. But when he cashes the A-K of hearts.

trump, he will be unable to score the jack of diamonds as his 10th trick. while if he abandons further trump leads in order to first cash the A-K-Q of diamonds, he subjects himself to a ruff by West and would still have to lose a spade.

There seems to be no solution to this dilemma, but declarer can accomplish his mission by making a very unusual (but entirely reasonable) play. Since West passed originally and has already shown up with the A-K-J-10-9 of clubs, it is unlikely he will also have the king of spades.

Accordingly, South draws West's two remaining trumps with the Q-J, following suit from dummy to the queen but discarding the ace of

Fancy? Of course! But certainly the right play under the circumstances.

East shows out, and South is faced with a challenging problem.

He sees that if he continues to draw

spades from dummy on the jack!

This extraordinary play works like a charm when declarer next cashes the A-K-Q of diamonds and then leads the nine of spades from dummy. Regardless of which three cards East has in his hand at this point, South, holding the Q-2 of spades and jack of diamonds, is sure to score two of the last three tricks.



Eagles Kick off Season with Troy

Salado Eagles will continue their tradition of kicking off the football season by facing the Troy Trojans at the University of Mary Hardin Baylor Crusader Stadium at 7:30 p.m. Aug. 27.

The Eagles beat Troy 46-27 and went on to blow through District 9-4A Div. II competition, last year thanks to a stacked lineup of three senior running backs who led the Eagles to 4,370 yards on the ground and 4,795 total offense.

All three starting running backs -- District MVP Wrook Brown and District first teamers Noah Mescher and Reid Vincent -- were lost to graduation, as well as crucial offensive linemen, leaving four-year starting quarterback Hutton Haire with young runners and young lineman to master the complex Slot T offense his father and coach Alan Haire brought to Salado six years

But perhaps his seventh season at the helm of the Salado Eagles will be a lucky one.

The Eagles return four starters on each side of the ball from last year's 11-2 Region Semi-finalist and District Champion team.

The offensive line, crucial in its execution of the Slot T scheme, will be anchored by Gavyn Keyser, a 6'2" 290 lb. tackle who was named the top lineman in the district last year and received All-State Honorable Mention. He registered 36 pancakes last year.

Aidan Wilson also returns to the offensive line. The 5'11", 210 lb. senior guard is what Haire describes as "very fast and physical." he earned First

Team All-District honors face the #7 Zebras on Sept. last year.

Haire's sure hands, cool demeanor and knowledge of the Slot T, will be needed under center this year with three new starting running backs.

Caden Strickland saw a great deal of action last year. He had 73 touches for 565 vards and nine TDs. He was also a top receiver coming out of the backfield for six catches for two TDs and 145 yards.

Safety Josh Huckabee will lead a defensive squad that will have several new faces, including Blake Rives and Scott Balmas taking over Co-Defensive Coordinator from alumni John Kirk, who took a coaching position at Texas powerhouse Aledo. Huckabee was named to the First Team All District. He had 49 solo tackles, 36 assisted tackles and an interception last year.

Blake Volk will also bring experience at defensive tackle. He had 21 total tackles, including eight solo tackles and four sacks, using his speed to get around larger offensive lineman. He was named to the second team All-District squad.

Other defensive notables are Seth Reavis, a 6'0" 175 lb. junior who was named to the second team all-district defense as a sophomore and lineman Cahvan Wilson, a 6'1", 200 lb. junior. Sophomore Garrett Combs (6'3", 225 lbs.) was named to the second team all district defense as a freshman. Haire says he "has the ability to be a force on the defensive front."

Senior Nolan Williams returns to defend against the pass. He was a second team All District defensive player at Cornerback.

The Eagles won't play a home game until Sept. 17 as they travel to Grandview to

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

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it hit the 2% threshold of active COVID-19 cases.

The new protocol requires that if a campus hits 2% threshold for active CO-VID-19 cases, masks would be required of students, staff and any visitors for one week or until the school gets below the threshold. If a campus hits the 5% threshold, it would be closed for one week.

Dr. Novotny said he met with Bell County Health Department officials and was in consultation with emergency room physicians at both Baylor Scott & White McLane Children's Hospital. The doctors told him, "The Delta variant is a different disease regarding the kids than the prior variants," Dr. Novotny said. "Before, they would have two or three percent of the beds with COVID-19. Now 15% of the beds at McLane are kids with COVID-19."

He added that of the 160 COVID-19 cases at Baylor Scott & White, 116 are in intensive care and 95% of those are unvaccinated. More than 40% are under 65 years of age.

Dr. Novotny reported that 60 school districts are requiring masks, setting up a legal battle between the districts and Gov. Greg Abbott. "These were generally large school district in urban areas like Dallas, Houston, Austin and San Antonio. The closest to us that is requiring masks is Round Rock ISD," he said. "Four district around the state have already had to shut down. "These are smaller than us. The ones that have shut down is not because the number of students hit a threshold, but because of the number of staff that are out... they cannot operate." He added that many of the local school districts that had to have closures last year was because of staff issues, not hitting a threshold.

Jeff Kelley asked Dr. Novotny if Salado could reach the point of not having enough staff and subs prior to hitting any threshold of overall cases on a campus. "That depends on the availability and number of substitutes and other workers. My goal is that none of this happens," Dr. Novotny responded, adding that the proposed protocols is to have "a plan in place to be prepared for that."

Kelley gave a motion that received a second by Dr. Bobbie Ann Adair White to implement the protocols with splitting the three buildings at Thomas Arnold Elementary having their own thresholds rather than the entire campus having one threshold. The motion was later withdrawn and a motion to adopt the Superintendent's recommended protocols as presented passed with all members present voting in favor: Kim Bird, Savannah Hennig, Kelley, Amy McLane, Smith and White. Jim Hodgin was absent.

Trustees then discussed but failed to pass a proposal that would offer a \$500 stipend to Salado ISD employees that have received full vaccination or will receive full vaccination.

Dr. Novotny reviewed recommendations from Texas Education Agency to school districts concerning contact tracing and notification. Districts are not required to do any contact tracing or notification of parents if a case comes up in their child's class. Schools are not allowed to quarantine students based on close contact with positive CO-VID-19 cases, but only on positive cases.

In early discussion, Smith said that the school now relies on "parents selfreporting that their child has COVID-19," adding that he felt the actual number of students with COVID-19 will be more than the recorded number of students in school with COVID-19.

"This is a strategy to try to maintain safety in our schools and keep our schools open," Dr. Novotny

He added that employees who have come into close contact with a diagnosed case of COVID-19 either in the classroom, home or outside of school could face being quarantined.

A staff member who is vaccinated who has been in close contact with a CO-VID-19 case will not have to quarantine for 10 days. Those who are not vaccinated will either have to be quarantined for 10 days or be tested every other day over 10 days in order to avoid quarantine. "Being vaccinated will void the other two choices," he said. "The easiest option is to be vaccinated and avoid the others."

He said that other school districts are offering stipends to employees who get vaccinated. Other employers, including Baylor Scott & White are requiring employees to be vaccinated. "The 1.4 million active duty troops are being required to be vaccinated," he said, adding, "we are not doing any of that. We are offering an incentive to those who have put it off for whatever reason."

"If we don't know how



many are unvaccinated on our staff," Hennig said, "then we don't know how many this may incentivise to get vaccinated. I support the vaccine but I don't support spending money on something if we don't know the

Dr. Novotny told trustees that even though he and his wife are fully vaccinated, that they would not accept the stipend. Kelley said the same of his wife employed in the district. "There is no conflict of interest," he said.


benefit of it."

Trustees discussed sending a survey to staff and directed Dr. Novotny to do so after a motion by White (and second by Kelley) failed on the stipend program. White and Kelley were joined by Bird in voting in favor. Hennig, McLane and Smith voted against.

Other Agenda Items

In other business, trustees adopted a tax rate of \$1.372 per \$100 valuation with \$0.872 for maintenance and operation and \$0.50 for debt service. Even though the tax rate is \$0.027 lower than last year's, it will raise more money due to increases in appraisals and new growth in the district.

The board also learned that Salado ISD again received a Superior preliminary rating of 94 out of 100 points on the Financial Integrity Rating System of Texas (FIRST). The board will hold a public hearing when the final rating is released

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

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



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Brand registration renewal begins in Bell Co. Aug. 31

The Bell County Clerk's Office will begin the process of renewing all registered marks and brands in Bell County on Aug. 31, in accordance with Texas Agricultural Code Section 144.044. The requirement of this section states that every 10 years on August 30.

Each person who owns livestock shall have that person's marks and brands recorded with the County Clerk regardless of whether or not the marks and brands have been previously recorded.

The Bell County Clerk's Office has mailed 513 renewal notices to those currently having a mark and/ or brand registered in Bell Texas Agricultural Code. County. A renewal cannot be processed until August 31st, 2021 and will remain in effect for ten (10) years following which will be August 30, 2031. The recording fee will be \$11.00 per mark/brand per location on the livestock.

You will have six months, until Monday, February 28, 2022, to renew your brand registration. A person, who does not re-register their mark/brand during this sixmonth period, forfeits their legal right to that mark/ brand. Any brand that is not renewed during this period becomes 'void' on March 1, 2022, in accordance with the

Brand locations:

Left or right: shoulder, side, rib, flank, hip, loin, or

Jaw, face, tail, back, leg,

Sometimes, multiple locations may be used for one record

Ear marks must be designated right or left and registered with the brand

If you have marks/brands registered in other counties in the State of Texas, it will be necessary for you to contact the office of the County Clerk in that County and renew your registration there


