Memorial dedication on 20th anniversary of September 11

A granite memorial featuring the shoulder patches of the local agencies that serve our community as First Responders will be installed in early September and dedicated during a 10 a.m. Sept. 11 ceremony on the grounds of the Salado Civic Center.

Included on the memorial marker are the Salado Police Department, the Bell County Constable Precinct 2, the Bell County Sheriff's Department, Emergency Medical Services, the Salado Volunteer Fire Department, Department of Public Safety and Game Wardens

Local Justice of the Peace Cliff Coleman will act as master of ceremonies for the dedication. Scheduled to give short talks during the ceremony are U.S. Rep. John Carter and State Representatives Dr. Brad Buckley and Hugh Shine.

The Texas shaped granite memorial will be located on the grounds of the Salado Civic Center near the Salado Veterans Memorial and flagpole. The memorial's design was guided by sculptor Troy Kelley.

On September 11, 2001, the entire nation watched in horror as our country was

attacked by terrorists. The immediate and selfless action of First Responders directly involved in the tragic incidents reminded us all that our First Responders put their lives on the line for us every day. Across the country, First Responders traveled to New York City to offer support and assist. Locally, our First Responders did much to assist with relief.

This memorial was the vision of the First Responders Memorial Committee following the Patriot Day service that was held on September 11, 2018. In that service, all our local First Responders were honored with proclamations and thanked in speeches from our elected officials including Mayor Skip Blancett and U.S. Representative John Carter. First Responders were each issued a certificate of appreciation and a challenge coin in gratitude for their outstanding service. Committee member, Larry Nathanson explained, "Our Salado community feels a great responsibility to continue to honor our First Responders."



At 11:43 p.m. Sept. 2, Salado Fire Department responded to a Multi-Vehicle Accident near mile marker 285 on Interstate 35 through Salado involving three vehicles: two tractor trailers and a passenger car. Both tractor trailers were fully involved upon arrival by fire department personnel. Due to the size of the scene and the unknown contents of the trailers, the interstate was closed in both directions and mutual aid was requested from Belton Fire Department and Temple Fire Department, Texas DPS, Village of Salado Police Department, Bell County Precinct 2 Constable, Belton Police Department and TXDOT assisted with Traffic Control. Texas DPS investigated the accident. Grones Environmental was called to provide clean up services and removal of hazardous material. Salado Fire Department cleared the scene at 5:44 a.m. Traffic during the clean up continued to be diverted off the interstate until late in the afternoon. Just after clearing that incident, Salado Fire Department responded to an accident on FM 2843 at 6:30 a.m. Sept. 3 for a report of an overturned tractor trailer. Crews arrived on scene to find the vehicle on its right side. The trailer was loaded with pallets of cut stone, which was strewn across the roadway and into the ditch. The driver complained of neck and back pain. Salado Fire Department EMS personnel stabilized the patient until an EMS Transport Unit arrived on scene. Fire Department personnel assisted with removing debris from the roadway. Salado Fire Department cleared the scene at 7:45 a.m. (Photos Courtesy Salado FD)

He will bring recommendations to aldermen at the Sept. 16 meeting for aldermen to development a spending plan for the funds.





BoA approves \$30,500 in tourism grant awards

Village of Salado Aldermen approved at their Sept. 2 meeting \$30,500 in community tourism grants, following the recommendation of the Tourism Advisory Board.

The grant recipients and events are as follows:

Barrow Volksride, which is anticipating 300 out-oftown visitors and 100 hotel stays, \$4,000.

Northbound and Down, Barrow Brewing Co., which is anticipating 750 visitors and 120 hotel stays, \$4,000.

Salado Springs Beer Festival, Barrow Brewing Co., which anticipates 3,500 visitors and 100 hotel stays,

Cowboy Music and Poetry Gathering, which anticipates 300-1,000 visitors and 50-100 hotel stays, \$8,000.

Blow Your Own Ornaments, Salado Glassworks, which anticipates 930 visitors and 930 hotel stays, \$4,000

Highland Games, Salado

Museum, which anticipates 4,000 visitors and 2,500 hotel stays, \$8,000.

Tourism Director Andrea Howard reported that the VisitSaladoTX.com app had 190 unique visitors in August with 135 using the app and 55 using browsers. Of those, 44.5% were new users and 55.5% were returning visitors. There were 270 sessions and 1,244 pageviews.

Howard said she investigated at the request of the board, advertising on gas pumps. She found a threemonth program for \$10,000. There are no availabilities on I-35 once you are north of San Antonio. She will continue to investigate the costs and availabilities of this me-

She reported on the digital billboards. Salado ads are seen for eight seconds each minute, 60 times per hour.

She reported that the visitor center logged 417 visitors in August, down 319 from July. She attributed the decrease to families getting ready for going back to school.

In other business, aldermen approved an amended concept plan for Mill Creek Meadows Phase III, located near Blackberry Road and Marie Lane. The first two phases of the 119 acre development are near completion. The amended concept plan will make about nine acres of land fronting Blackberry commercial/retail rather than single family residential. It will decrease the total number of lots. Ferguson told aldermen that the engineer found the amended concept plan meets ordinances. The Planning and Zoning Board unanimously voted to recommend approval and city staff concur with the recommendation.

Aldermen voted unanimously after a motion by Cox, receiving a second from Cole.

Aldermen also unanimously approved the concept plan for Stinnett Mills Estates, which is in the ETJ of Salado and Belton. Belton deferred to Salado on the regulations. Earlier, aldermen rejected the concept plan because it requested variances for block length. Ferguson told the board that the developer made changes to the plan after aldermen adopted changes to the subdivision ordinance on block lengths and traffic slowing measures.

The 70-acre development will be developed in three phases with 80 total lots. The subdivision will have sidewalks on both sides, as well as a 35-foot wide roadway, speed control devices, turnarounds and stop signs due to the length of the street. The subdivision also has the required exits and stub outs. any movements in our direction.

The P&Z was unanimous in recommending approval. Engineers and staff also recommend approval. Aldermen unanimously approved the concept plan on a motion by Cole, receiving a second from Cox.

Aldermen approved a change order on the Salado Plaza Dr. project to include \$7,000 for sleeves under the road for future expansion of the wastewater system to serve the commercial properties on Salado Plaza Dr and \$1,190 for the electronic message board placed at the entrance to the project before work began.

Aldermen Bell told Ferguson to instruct the engineer not to "do another project without all of the necessary signage ahead of time." He gave the motion for approval of the change order, receiving a second from Cole. It passed 4-0.

Aldermen also gave Ferguson approval to post the position for assistant village administrator, which is funded in the 2021-22 proposed budget at a salary of \$65,000. The assistant, according to Ferguson, will focus on wastewater, billing and customers and assist him in day-to-day tasks such as social media. The assistant will be assigned to some committees and others will be shared with Ferguson.

Cox will act as board liaison in the hiring process, as he did in the hiring of the tourism director. Ferguson will make the final decision on the hire.

Cox made the motion to approve the position, receiving a second from Cole. It passed unanimously.

After discussing regulations on yard parking, signs in residential areas and construction materials in residential areas, aldermen instructed the Village administrator to work with aldermen Cole and Howard and legal counsel to build components of ordinances to address each of the situations.

Bell made the motion and Cox gave the second. It passed unanimously.

Aldermen also authorized \$20,000 to fund acquisition and installation of 48 flags to be put on the street lights. Bell made the motion and Cox gave the second. It passed unanimously.

Variant may be cause of drop in service jobs

The Markets

Our preferred market barometer, the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) frenetically shot up and down for the week that ended August and saw the beginning of September. As it often does after zig-zagging all week, it ended with only a bit of a change, up 0.58% at 4535.43, another record high with no fanfare. The week's close marks a 20.75% gain this year and puts the Index up 32.35% from a year ago. This week's record comes against the backdrop of a surprisingly poor hiring report and a host of other tidbits of bad news. The "wall of worry" that bull markets are reputed to climb appears to be alive and well. Our other followed Index, the CRSP US Mid Cap Value Index closed at 2512.43, down 0.08% for the week, but up 22.48% year-to-date.

In one of its not uncommon counterintuitive moves, the yield on the U.S. Treasury 10-year note rose to 1.314%, up 0.84% from last week, continuing its rise from what appears to be a bottom of about 1.25% hit a couple of weeks ago. Several interest rate commentators suggested that 2020 may have well marked the end of a 40-year bull market in bonds and the beginning of long-term decline in bond market values. A bond's market value rises as interest rates fall and declines as interest rates rise, and interest rates have been falling for a full 40 years. The benchmark 10-year T-note rate has risen 84% from the beginning of September last year. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI), the U.S. benchmark for oil, rose to \$69.21, up a mere 0.80% for the week but up 43% yearto-date and a whopping 75% since this time last year.

The Economy

The lead economic story this week was conflicting signals from the Labor Department's monthly jobs report as the new jobs number was shockingly low while unemployment declined. Payroll employment was broadly forecast to rise by over 700,000 in August but when the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics made

Update

The Delta variant appears to be hitting China's economy hard. China's official non-manufacturing purchasing managers index (PMI) fell to 47.5 on a scale where numbers below 50 indicate a contraction is underway. It was the first time the China PMI has dropped below 50 since February 2020. Their manufacturing PMI took a hit too as it declined to 50.1, indicating a no-growth month. Across the board, China's economy appears to be on the verge of contracting. Those slowdowns in China have a direct effect on our economy as many components

and products we purchase in the U.S. are made there. The same effects appear to be in place across most of Asia as national economies are slowed or stop growing in the face of the new variant. Asia, in general, adopted a policy of containment and isolation to halt the disease while in the U.S. we focused on developing effective vaccines and getting the population vaccinated. So far, the death rate per 100,000 in Asia from COVID is substantially lower than in the U.S. but we are charging ahead economically while they are stymied. The result is that we will likely continue to see parts and product shortages through this year and probably through 2022.

Speaking of manufacturing PMIs, the ISM U.S. manufacturing PMI came in at 59.9, higher than expected and up 0.4 from last month, indicating that U.S. industry is growing about as fast as it has the capacity to do. Orders are up, productivity is up, and purchasing managers are optimistic about the future. At the same time, the official one-year inflation numbers came in lower than last month with 1 year core PCE inflation up 3.6%. That is not a low number but is far better than the 5% range we were seeing earlier this year. The inflation spike does indeed appear to be transitory and already moderating. In one last positive note, COVID hospital admissions appear to have peaked and may be in a slight decline. That doesn't mean this is over. Americans are still dving from COVID at a rate of about 700 per day and 23 people died last week in Bell County alone. ICUs are over-filled, and hospitals are

out of beds. The bottom line once more is that we are in a solidly growing economy that is well on its way to full recovery but with the Delta or some new variant remaining the wild card.

On rights of Afghan, American women

To the Editor:

cry about the anticipated fate of Afghan women under the rule of the Afghan Taliban. Trillions of U.S. taxpayer dollars and tens of thousands of lives have been expended in an alleged, but failed effort to prevent that eventuality. To many it is a foregone conclusion that basic Afghan women's rights will be denied, including but not limited to access to education, and therefore their potential for socio-economic advancement.

Today there is a hue and

Yet, closer to home, there has been a multi-decade, increasingly successful movement to do the same to U.S. women. While the means may be more devious, the end is the same, and it appears to be initiated and supported at many political levels. Most recently, the Texas faction of the U.S. Taliban equivalent seems to be situated in Austin. While some may argue that Texas' stringent abortion laws denying women's bodily autonomy are based on religion, that can't be valid. Otherwise, to be consistent, forms of contraception equating to males committing Biblical onanism must dictate prosecution in a religiously inspired and directed political system - and God sentenced Onan to death. That's not going to happen in the male dominated U.S. political system; note the failures of the Comstock Act. Furthermore, the government's treatment of many U.S. and world citizens could not be considered "Christian" by the most liberal interpreta-

Some may argue that male politicians' suppres-

sion of women's rights is due to fear of being displaced or emasculated by powerful women. If such is the case, that fear might be justified. First, there are more women than men in the U.S., giving them a voting majority; second, women live longer, giving them more years to vote and achieve socio-economic advancement; third, women are becoming better educated than men, giving them an advantage in the job and political arenas; and fourth, women are more important to the propagation of mankind, thus they are more necessary than men. (Here I reference my agricultural background: 100 bulls and one cow might yield one calf, but 100 cows and one bull might yield 100 calves.) Some in government may fear that unless preventative measures are taken these latent but valid powers of the female gender might come together, arise, and create political upheaval by displacing those intimidated male politicians. Such an uprising would have a much greater and longer lasting impact than all of the frustrated demonstrations, marches, and proclamations combined. (This may be necessary before the Equal Rights Amendment to the U.S. Constitution finally

Historically, U.S. women have fought for their rights, winning the few only after a hard struggle. My wife's mother was 16 before U.S.

women could vote, and I was 27 before a woman could get a loan or open a business without a male cosigner. Many ancient civilizations treated women better than the U.S. One might argue that denial of women's bodily autonomy is a political mechanism to keep them subjugated and to increase the spread between economic classes. An unplanned pregnancy could likely prevent a woman's advanced education and progression in the workplace, and it could prevent economic advancement of an entire family by taking one member out of the job force or at the least by creating additional expenses like child care.

Additionally, an insidious element of the Texas' legislation pits neighbors against neighbors by encouraging snooping "tattle tales" who suffer no consequences for frivolous accusations. This by no means creates endearing situations that will stimulate amenable social interaction, and combined with the new authorization for everyone to carry a gun, there are ominous implications.

For many Texas politicians, the attitude is: "The end justifies the means", and because of that, there is much for the rest of us to be concerned about with what is emanating from Austin. While it's "them" today, it could be "you" or "us" tomorrow.

Sorry Joe, This Was Not a Success

Talk about a catastrophic success.

The Biden administration wants credit for the Afghanistan evacuation as measured by the sheer number of people it flew out amid a security and humanitarian crisis of its own making.

This is the arsonist bragging about how many fires he has put out.

Those with memories that stretch past a couple of weeks ago will recall the halcyon days when a mass evacuation at a civilian airport exposed to suicide bombers and other attackers wasn't, according to Joe

Biden, even conceivable. Biden contributed to the collapse of the Afghan military by denying it air cover, gave away Bagram Air Base for no good reason, pulled out U.S. troops before our diplomats and civilians, drastically underestimated the gathering Taliban offensive, and then, caught unawares by the fall of Kabul, scrambled to jury-rig a desperate rescue that shouldn't have been necessary in the first place.

That the U.S flew out more than 115,000 people out of Kabul is a testament to the awesome capabilities of the United States mili-

It is not in any way a vindication of President Biden's

The evacuation itself has been costly. Because we outsourced security outside the airport to the Taliban, our service members were forced to operate in dangerous conditions. A nearly inevitable attack last week killed 13 of them. That's the





one day than were killed in action most years in Afghanistan since 2015.

Then, we failed by the most important metric. We left hundreds of Americans behind who wanted to leave, a squalid betrayal that was unfathomable before the Biden team began to try to prepare the public for it a week or so ago.

It's hard to imagine any prior American president, perhaps with the exception of Jimmy Carter, abandoning Americans behind enemy lines. Theodore Roosevelt mustered the naval might of the United States to save one American who had been kidnapped in Morocco in 1904. Barack Obama traded five Guantanamo detainees for Bowe Bergdahl in 2014.

Even Biden felt the impulse to get every last American out. He pledged to do it in his interview with George Stephanopoulos. In order to keep his promise to the Taliban to get out by Aug. 31, though, he broke his promise to his countrymen.

We still don't know how many U.S. green-card holders, to whom we should also feel an obligation, have been left behind. And there have been reports that the Taliban was blocking our most deserving Afghan allies from getting to the airport, meaning the Afghans we got out weren't neces-

sarily the most endangered. Even if the evacuation had been flawless and complete, the underlying situation speaks of an abysmal failure. After 20 years, we lost a war to a Taliban that now controls more territory than it did on September 11, 2001. The Taliban hasn't renounced al Qaeda; indeed, the Haqqani network, a key element of the Taliban that has been responsible for security in Kabul, is closely allied with the terror group. Biden talks bravely of launching counterterrorism strikes from "over the horizon," but failed to secure a base in a neighboring country. We will have to operate from hours away in the Persian Gulf, even as our intelligence capabilities in Afghanistan are drastically

diminished. Our ineptitude and dishonorable conduct have shocked our allies, who need to place their trust in our competence and reliability.

Biden's supporters have resorted to the defense that almost all of this was inevitable. Yet, for years, the Afghan army fought and bled after we had stepped back into a support role, suggesting an unsatisfactory stalemate was achievable at a relatively low cost. Biden rejected that option. Instead, he chose defeat and disgrace. All of the exertions to rescue people from the wreckage over the last two weeks can't change

County Houses 205 Inmates in other locations

Bell County Commissioners at their Sept. 6 meeting extended a contract with Burnet County to house up to 168 inmates at its facilities. The contract allows for up to 144 males and 24 females to be housed at \$55 per prisoner per diem. Without the contract, the cost would be \$65 per prisoner per diem.

Bell County has contracts with seven other counties for housing prisons. The County currently is housing 205 of its inmates in other counties.

In other business, Commissioners awarded bids for aggregate supply and rejected the single bid it received for the widening of Event Drive for \$130,477.51. The project may be sent out for bid at a later date after County road crews prepare the base to widen the road that will service the future Salado Annex.

Commissioners awarded a contract with Arcosa LWS to provide surface aggregate Type L (grades 4 and 5) for costs of \$60 for Grade 4 per ton and \$50 per ton for grade 5.

Commissioners awarded a contract with Texas Material Group for surface aggregate Type D (grades 4 and 5) for \$22 per ton and \$23 per ton with the additional hauling costs of \$13 and \$20 per ton.



- · Authorized the County Judge to contract for juvenile residential services with these facilities: County of Hill, Cherokee Home for Children, Erath County Juvenile Probation, County of San Patricio.
- Authorized a cooperative agreement with the state Attorney General concerning child support.
- Ratified agreement with BioIQ to provide for COVID-19 testing in Bell County Sept. 1-14 for a cost not to exceed \$117.600.

dren's ministry, student ministry, parking, hospitality, and more," said David Laws, Associate Pastor of Engagement & Operations.

The church's Fellowship Hall has gone through an extensive renovation and is scheduled to re-open on Sept. 12.

CIP Committee Chair Jon Huss presented expansion plans to Grace Church members on June 13. The Phase I & II plans include a new 10,000 square foot education building, improvements to the existing worship facility, and a 43% increase in parking space.

Both Phase I & II plans

July 11 and a generosity campaign, "Grow Grace", is now underway to provide funding. Grow Grace began on Aug. 1 and runs through Oct. 31.

The children's ministry known as "Grace Kids" was organized in Fall 2018 by Lauren Wells, Minister to Children. Wells also serves as the Administration Coordinator at Grace.

"In Grace Kids alone, attendance is growing nearly 70% per year," Wells said. "We have exceeded our existing building capacity, which in turn affects our ability to serve families well. The new state-of-theart education building is designed to meet our needs for the next 20 years for training Grace Kids (Ages birth to 5th grade), Grace Students (Ages 6th grade through high school), and for other important ministries like Men's & Women's Bible Study and the Stephen's Ministry."

Phase I of the Campus Improvement Program is the construction of the new 10,000 sq. ft. education building -- five new classrooms, a large meeting room with three breakout rooms, increased storage, and a great new space for Grace Students. "

"These new spaces will allow us to increase our maximum classroom capacity from 50 kids to over 226 kids," said Jason Goings, Pastor of Preaching and Vi-

Laws explained that Phase II would be renovation of the church foyer by relocating the office spaces to the west wing of the building, enlarging the church entryway, improving the foyer bathrooms, and raising the ceilings.

"This will create more space for us to welcome guests and allow our body to fellowship with one another," Laws said.





Salado's Stagecoach Inn is looking forward to a bright future as principal owner Clark Lyda announces that the hotel and restaurant will now be under the management of Bunkhouse, an Austin-based hospitality company.

At the same time, it is making a return to its earliest roots by returning to the name Shady Villa Hotel for the hotel and maintaining Stagecoach Restaurant for the restaurant, paying homage to Dion Van Bibber.

Bunkhouse manages multiple hotels in Austin, Marfa, San Antonio, San Francisco and Mexico.

Bunkhouse plans to keep the property's character and spirit intact while making design updates and driving new business to the village of Salado

The property features 48 guest rooms and suites surrounded by greenery and native Texas flora, multiple event spaces to accommodate many different party sizes, a large swimming pool, an on-site restaurant and bar, and modern conveniences all set amidst mid-century architecture that reflects the property's history. Dogs are always welcome.

Bunkhouse will enhance the guest experience at the Shady Villa Hotel and Stagecoach Restaurant by making improvements to the rooms, pool, lobby and restaurant menu, as well as create new cultural programming and retail offerings

In early 2000, the late Pat Merrill wrote an article published in our January 26, 2000 edition of the Salado Village Voice honoring the history of Stagecoach Inn and its connection to Salado Creek.

Quoting that article: "According to Bell County deed records, the land on which the hotel was built was sold to Thomas Jefferson Eubanks on December 3, 1860, for \$100 as 'hotel property.' The earliest building may have been a log cabin structure, with a paling fence of cedar stakes to protect the hotel from cattle. Mineral waters pumped from beneath the hotel were thought to have significant medicinal value, and a bath house was part of the establishment until it was washed away by one of the periodic flood of the creek."

In 1861, W. B. Armstrong, one of the area's first settlers, erected a frame building on the footprint of the old Tonkawa village and opened the "Shady Villa Hotel."

The property passed through the hands of several owners and underwent several name changes. Apparently at one time it was owned by a family named Buckles and called the Buckles Hotel. It was also known as the Salado Hotel and as the Shady Villa Hotel

Although the records have been lost, tradition has it that Sam Houston, George Armstrong Custer, Robert E. Lee, cattle baron Shanghai Pierce, and outlaw Sam Bass were among the visitors to the hotel in the nineteenth century.

Dion and Ruth Van Bibber purchased the property in the 1940s. During World War II, it housed soldiers returning from the war.

In 1943, Dion and Ruth Van Bibber restored the building and opened the Stagecoach Inn. "Mrs. Van" created and prepared the now-famous Stagecoach recipes, while "Mr. Van" hosted with old world charm. Just as in earlier times when local frontier women greeted the stagecoach passengers and cattle drovers by announcing the day's bill of fare (whatever was ready in the kitchen), the Stagecoach Inn waitresses recited the distinctive daily prix-fixe menu, which included the Inn's iconic hush puppies and Strawberry Kiss.

Under the management of Bunkhouse, the Shady Villa Hotel and Stagecoach Restaurant will keep these roots while growing new ones and bringing branches of new families to Salado.

"Returning to an earlier name of the Stagecoach Inn - The Shady Villa Hotel - feels like a special way to honor the past and also look toward what the future holds for this legendary property," said principal owner Clark Lyda in making the announcement. "I grew up coming to this hotel and restaurant and want to see them both thrive. Bunkhouse shares this vision, and I'm excited for what will unfold at The Shady Villa Hotel."






















Shopping Map of Salado

A declarer who relies more on general principles than common sense is doing himself a great disservice. In one way or another, every deal played is different from every other deal ever played before. To be guided only by habit — and not by the actual circumstances one faces — is sure to prove costly from time to time.

For example, in a particular case it may not be right to play to drop the queen instead of finessing when

you're missing Q-x-x-x of a suit. Or why it is sometimes better to ruff dummy's losers in your hand rather than ruff your losers in dummy.

Consider the present case where West leads the queen of diamonds against three notrump. Without giving the matter much thought, you might take the first trick with the ace in order to attack your most promising suit, clubs, by means of a finesse.

If you did this, you'd most likely go down after East won the queen of clubs with the king and returned a diamond to establish West's suit. When you later tried a heart finesse for your ninth trick, West would take the king and cash his diamonds to put you down one.

The correct line of play is to win the first diamond in dummy and lead a low heart to your jack. Win or lose, this is certain to make the contract. In the actual case, the heart finesse loses, but West cannot safely return a diamond. Whatever he does, you can next attack clubs to assure at least nine tricks.

It might seem odd to attack hearts, where you might gain only one trick, instead of clubs, where you might gain three — but that is certainly the right thing to do when playing clubs first jeopardizes the contract, while playing hearts first guarantees it. First things first.





Zebras deny last minute TD pass for 32-28 win

With 35 seconds left on the clock, Grandview's Kasen English tomahawked the ball out of Salado's Seth Reavis's hands as he was making his way across the goal line, breaking up a 28 yard touchdown that would have lifted Salado over the #4 Zebras, forcing a third down and 18.

Two plays earlier, Haire kept a drive that started at the Eagle 48 yard line alive by following his center Beau Hill's block to convert a fourth and 1, moving the ball to the 20. Over a span of two minutes, the Eagles churned yardage and clock time with eight straight running plays. Haire was forced out of the pocket on a first and 10 at the Zebra 20 and sacked for an eight yard loss. The Eagles called a time out and Haire again rolled out of the pocket and hit Reavis with a perfect pass, that English knocked out of his hands to save the game for the Zebras.

Following the incompletion and with seconds ticking away, Salado was hit with an illegal forward pass, moving the ball back five yards and forcing a fourth down attempt that went incomplete with 10 seconds left, giving the Zebras a narrow 32-28 home win Sept.

Ryder Hayes gave the Zebras their 32-28 lead on a 19 yard pass to Luke Kirkpatrick with 3:14 left in the game. The game-winning touchdown was set up by a defensive stand at the Zebra 23 yard line, stopping Haire on a fourth and 4 to go. The Zebras then drove 78 yards in six plays and 2:33 of clock time. The Zebras were hit with an unsportsmanlike conduct call following the touchdown. Grandview went for two, but the Eagles defense denied the point after try, giving the Zebras a 32-28 lead.

The Friday Night contest was a terrific example of why hometown fans will drive two hours to watch their kids play. It started with a dominance by the home team Zebras in the early part of the game.

The Zebras scored in the first two minutes of the game on a 12 yard pass from Brycen Davis to Brandon Click. The PAT run by Gavin Leftwich failed.

On the ensuing kickoff, the Grandview kicker Job Sanchez hit an Eagle lineman in the back of the helmet and shoulder pads and the Zebras jumped on the ball at midfield, setting up a second touchdown with 7:41 on a 4 yard run by Gacin Sanchez. Sanchez' PAT kick gave the Zebras a 13-0

The Eagles took just five plays to drive 80 yards following a touchback on the ensuing kick. Wilson had a 39 yard on a third and 2 and Caden Strickland followed with a 33 yard TD run. Morgan Adams kicked the PAT to make the score 13-7.

Grandview answered with an 81 yard drive, topped by a 59 yard pass from Ryder Hayes to Kason English. Sanchez kicked the PAT to give the Zebras a

20-7 lead at 4:57 in the first... Salado threatened to score early in the second, but a Haire fumble at the 1 turned the ball over to Grandview. The Zebras drove to the Salado 12 but turned the ball over on a fumble at the 16 with 5:12 left in the half. Salado drove 84 yards in 10 plays, scoring on an 8 yard pass from Haire to Reavis with 1:33 left in the half. Adams kicked the PAT to close the gap to 20-14 at the half.

The Eagles took their first lead of the game, driving 71 yards in nine plays. Reavis kept the drive alive converting a fourth and 3 from the Grandview 36 yard line. After a 3 yard run by

Wilson, Haire hit Reavis for a 30 yard TD pass. Adams gave the Eagles their first lead with the PAT kick, 21-20 at 8:19 in the third.

Garrett Combs sacked Hayes for a nine yard loss, pushing the Zebras back to their own 26 and forcing a punt, which turned out to be only 11 yards, giving Salado the ball at the Zebra 37 yard line. On first down, Haire took to the air and found Strickland for a 37 yard TD with 6:24 left in the third. Adams was good on the kick for a 28-20 lead.

Explanatory Statements for the November 2, 2021 Constitutional Amendment Election

Proposition Number 1 (HJR 143)

HJR 143 proposes a constitutional amendment expanding the circumstances in which a professional sports team charitable foundation may conduct raffles to raise money for the foundation's charitable purposes. The proposed amendment would allow professional sports team charitable foundations of organizations sanctioned by the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association or the Women's Professional Rodeo Association to hold charitable raffles at rodeo

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the professional sports team charitable foundations of organizations sanctioned by the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association or the Women's Professional Rodeo Association to conduct charitable raffles at rodeo venues."

Proposition Number 2 (HJR 99)

HJR 99 proposes a constitutional amendment allowing the legislature to authorize a county to issue bonds or notes to finance the development or redevelopment of an unproductive, underdeveloped, or blighted area within the county and to pledge for repayment of those bonds or notes increases in property tax revenues imposed on property in the area by the county. The Texas Constitution gives the legislature the power to authorize an incorporated city or town to issue such bonds or notes but does not expressly give the legislature the power to grant that same authority to counties. The proposed amendment also provides that a county that issues bonds or notes for transportation improvements may not pledge for the repayment of those bonds or notes more than 65 percent of the increases in ad valorem tax revenues each year, and a county may not use proceeds from the bonds or notes to finance the construction, operation, maintenance, or acquisition of rights-of-way of a toll road.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing a county to finance the development or redevelopment of transportation or infrastructure in unproductive, underdeveloped, or blighted areas in the county."

Proposition Number 3 (SJR 27)

SJR 27 proposes a constitutional amendment barring the State of Texas or a political subdivision from enacting, adopting, or issuing a statute, order, proclamation, decision, or rule that prohibits or limits religious services. The proposed amendment would apply to religious services, including those conducted in churches, congregations, and places of worship, in the state by a religious organization

established to support and serve the propagation of a sincerely held religious be-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to prohibit this state or a political subdivision of this state from prohibiting or limiting religious services of religious organizations."

Proposition Number 4 (SJR 47) SJR 47 proposes a constitu-

tional amendment changing

certain eligibility require-

ments for a justice of the

Supreme Court, a judge of

the Court of Criminal Appeals, a justice of a court of appeals, and a district judge. The proposed amendment provides that a person is eligible to serve on the Supreme Court if the person, among other qualifications, is licensed to practice law in Texas; is a resident of Texas at the time of election; has been either a practicing lawyer licensed in Texas for at least ten years or a practicing lawyer licensed in Texas and a judge of a state court or county court established by the legislature for a combined total of at least ten years; and during that time has not had the person's license to practice law revoked, suspended, or subject to a probated suspension. The same eligibility requirements would apply to a judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals and to a justice of a court of appeals. The proposed amendment further provides that to be eligible for appointment or election as a district judge, a person must be a resident of Texas; be licensed to practice law in Texas; and have been a practicing lawyer or a judge of a court in Texas, or both combined, for eight years preceding the person's election, during which time the person's license to practice law has not been revoked, suspended, or subject to a probated suspen-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment changing the eligibility requirements for a justice of the supreme court, a judge of the court of criminal appeals, a justice of a court of appeals, and a district judge."

Proposition Number 5 (HJR 165)

HJR 165 proposes a constitutional amendment allowing the State Commission on Judicial Conduct (SCJC) to accept complaints or reports, conduct investigations, and take any other authorized action with respect to a candidate for a state judicial office. Currently, the Texas Constitution only permits the SCJC to take such actions as to persons holding a judicial office.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing additional powers to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct with respect to candidates for judicial office."

Proposition Number 6 (SJR 19)

SJR 19 proposes a constitutional amendment establishing that residents of certain facilities have the right to designate an essential caregiver with whom the facility may not prohibit in-person visitation. The proposed amendment would apply to a nursing facility, assisted living facility, intermediate care facility for individuals with an intellectual disability, residence providing home and community-based services, or state supported living center. The proposed amendment also would authorize the legislature to provide guidelines for these facilities to follow in establishing essential caregiver visitation policies and procedures.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment establishing a right for residents of certain facilities to designate an essential caregiver for in-person visitation."

Proposition Number 7 (HJR 125)

HJR 125 proposes a constitutional amendment permitting a person who is 55 years of age or older at the time of death of their spouse who is receiving a limitation on school district property taxes on their residence homestead on the basis of a disability to continue receiving the limitation while the property remains the surviving spouse's residence homestead.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow the surviving spouse of a person who is disabled to receive a limitation on the school district ad valorem taxes on the spouse's residence homestead if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of the person's death."

Proposition Number 8

SJR 35 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the United States armed services who is killed or fatally injured in the line of duty. The Texas Constitution provides a property tax exemption to the surviving spouse of a member of the armed services who is killed in action, but the current exemption does not include members of the military who die during their service due to injuries sustained that are not combat-related.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the armed services of the United States who is killed or fatally injured in the line of duty."


