Salado Village Voice: always independent, family-owned

While the *Salado Village Voice* is not the first newspaper in Salado, it has had the longest life-span since being founded in 1979. The Fleischer family bought the newspaper in 1988, marking 33 years in Salado in Spring 2021.

When historian Dayton Kelley published the first edition of the Salado Village Voice on February 17, 1979, it was the first time in more than 100 years that the village had a newspaper.

The first newspaper known to be published in the village was the *Salado Newsletter*. Published by E.W. Billings, the first edition came out on August 25, 1874. Only one copy of the newspaper exists at the newspaper collection of the University of Texas at Austin.

The Grange published another newspaper, *The Texas Farmer* in Salado, but it was later moved to Dallas.

Reference to a third Salado newspaper has been found on a letterhead in the Rose Papers at the University of Texas at Austin. The *Salado Sentinel* was published by A.S. Hornbeck. No copies of the Salado Sentinel are known to exist today.

Salado Village Voice founder Dayton Kelley was a native of Bell County, a journalist and a historian. He taught journalism at the University of Mary Hardin-Baylor for 12 years before accepting a position as Director of the Texas Collection at Baylor University in Waco. After Dayton passed away, his sons Dennis and Bill ran the Salado Village Voice, selling it to the Fleischer family in 1988.

Since the Fleischer family purchased the newspaper, a week has not passed that the newspaper has not published. *Salado Village Voice* has published the quarterly magazine Salado: A Jewel in the Crown of Texas for more than 25 years.

Salado Village Voice was named the first Business of the Year by the Salado Chamber of Commerce in 2002. Marilyn Fleischer was named to the Hall of Fame by the Chamber for 2019.



Knifemaker Smith's knives bring top dollar at Cattlemen's

Bill Smith started making knives more than a half-century ago and began selling them when he was going to college.

"I needed a good knife and I couldn't afford one, so I made one," he told me while I was watching him work in his shop next to the historic Hendrickson-Caskey house on Center Circle where he and wife Bonnie live. He was putting the finishing touches on one of three knives he is donating to this year's Cattlemen's Ball, set for Oct. 16 at Tenroc Ranch.

His knives typically go for \$2,000 each at the Auction, with auctioneer Bill Hall getting every penny he can, often pitting friends against each other in a bidding war. The replica Musso Bowie knife he crafted and donated a few years back went for almost \$10,000 alone.

With good reason. Smith spent a year researching the authenticity, history and drawings of the Musso Bowie knife before making one that was displayed at The Alamo. He crafted a second one especially for the Cattlemen's Ball, bringing in top dollar.

Back to that first attempt, where creativity and invention are the child of necessity. He needed a knife and was going to make one from a broken plow. "Dad's foreman told me 'you can't make a knife of that. It's too hard.' Well, I did."

He then began to make knives using blades from old planers and joiners, casting handles to put on them.

Smith found out that he could sell knives and make a little profit. He sold his first knife for \$85, which was a lot more than the \$50 he made working full time as a mechanic.

Bill wanted to be a preacher early in his life, but a friend told him he should be a teacher so he signed up as one of the first male students at University of Mary Hardin Baylor. He went on to become an art teacher and spent most of his 32 year teaching career in Belton.

He was teaching in Belton and living in the old Hendrickson-Caskey House when he met Bonnie, marrying her in 1985.

Bonnie was working at Salado schools in the administration office and Bill teaching at Belton when they attended the first ever Cattlemen's Ball two decades ago.

The next year, Bill donated his first knife to the auction and Bill Hall sold it for a heck of a lot more than \$85. "I've been donating ever since," he says. And the knives have brought tens of thousands of dollars to SEF coffers since then, where they go out to Salado graduates in the form of scholarships and to Salado teachers in the form of Innovative Teaching Grants.

This year, Bill is donating three knives. Two are folding and one is a straight blade. He used ivory from a mammoth tusk found in Alaska for the body on two of them. Two of the knives will be sold in the live auction this year and one in the silent auction.

Tickets to the Cattlemen's Ball are \$85 each and include a steak dinner from Johnny's Steaks & Barbecue. Bill Hall will gavel the Live Auction. Meanwhile the silent auction will go live at noon Oct. 14 and close at 9 p.m. Oct. 16. Anyone can join the silent auction by registering at https://app. bidbeacon.com/invite/#CPNY-HW.

In addition to two knives by Bill Smith, the live auction will







Salado Highland Games, Gathering of Clans marks 60th anniversary

Sixty years ago, on November 12, 1961, people from around the country who shared Scottish ancestry came together in Salado for the First Gathering of All Scottish Clans. Tartan banners waved bearing the name of each clan and more than a thousand people attended. Every November since, the Scots have gathered in Salado to celebrate their heritage making this the oldest Scottish festival in Texas.

The 60th Scottish Gathering and Highland Games will be held on the grounds at Johnny's Outback, on Thomas Arnold Road at I-35 in Salado. Limited edition 60th anniversary merchandise will be available for purchase on the grounds and at the museum.

This year's event is sponsored by Johnny's Steaks & BBQ and Modisett & Sons Distillery. Proceeds benefit Salado Museum and College Park, the 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that has hosted the event since its inception.

This is the place to experience all things Scottish -- the skirl of bagpipes, wearing of the tartan, tossing the caber, Celtic music, men in kilts, Scots shops, good eats and more. One of the event's main features is the Clan Village, the largest gathering of Scottish Clans in Texas where members of up to 40 Scottish clans and societies will share information with visitors about Scottish history and genealogy.

The weekend begins on Friday evening, November 12, when a torchlight ceremony is held on the banks of Salado Creek. The solemn ceremony recreates the coming together of the ancient Scottish clans to fight with Robert the Bruce for Scotland's freedom in 1314 at Bannockburn. The Calling of the Clans is free and open to the public and starts at 6:00 pm creek side off Royal Street just north of the museum. A ticketed "Welcome Social" follows at the Museum.

The parade forms at South Pace Park Road and will move west along Thomas Arnold Road to the festival grounds. Spectators are invited to stand along the route or bring lawn chairs to enjoy the parade. 

The display is free to the public and children will have the chance to operate the model trains (with assistance from the Tinplate Trackers, of course). The display will be open 10 a.m.-5 p.m. November 13 and noon-4 p.m. November 14.


The Tinplate Trackers of Austin, Texas is a 3-rail O-Gauge Model Train Club located in the Austin area. The club participates in a number of model railroading activities and events in Central Texas.

Membership is open to anyone having interest in Trains. Our website is constantly being updated so please check back frequently.

The Tinplate Trackers are people who enjoy the operation of O-gauge tinplate trains on modules that are basically standardized, yet open to unlimited improvisation. The largest layout created by members was 40 feet by 60 feet.

Tinplate refers to toy trains and track — such as American Flyer, Marx and Lionel -- built before World War II, when they were actually made of metal. However, toy trains built today are mostly plastic but the tinplate rails still remain. Tinplate trains are larger than most scale model trains and are lots of fun.

A module is a unit, a short section of railroad, built to standard specifications so that it can be joined with other such units to form an oval layout. It is distinguished from a sectional layout, used by



many clubs, which is made up of a number of units which assemble in only one way. The Tinplate Tracker modules, made in a few basic types, can be assembled in many, many different ways.

Posada recreates journey of Joseph and Mary

Las Posadas, the nine day Christmas tradition observed in Spain, Mexico and the Southwest United States, will be celebrated as La Posada, a one day event, in Salado during the community's Christmas Stroll. La Posada will be from 6:30-8:30 p.m. Saturday, December 12. The public is invited to take part.

The Spanish term means inn, place of lodging or accommodations. In some ways the spirit of Las Posadas is similar to the English custom of caroling.

It dates back 400 years in Mexico and recreates the journey of Joseph and Mary to Bethlehem.

Each year the same drama is played out. Though thoroughly rehearsed, what will happen will seem fresh and exciting to the young people taking part. Dressed in period clothing, they will begin at the gate to the old ruins on College Hill and then lead a candle light procession down Main Street a distance of two miles. Along the way they will stop to ask for lodging and a place to rest.

Of course there is no room at any inn until they reach St. Joseph's Episcopal Church. There, too, The Reverend Lynn Osgood will apologize at first for the lack of lodging.

Then The Reverend Lynn Osgood will have a thought. He will lead the couple to a stable behind the church. There he will offer to settle them in for the night in mounds of hay.

Participants are members of St. Joseph's Youth Group and Spanish language students from Belton High School. They spend weeks practicing the para pedir posada (searching for lodging) in a call and response chorus. Barbara Yanez-Smith, a Spanish language teacher, gave a loose translation of the words. The first chorus asks for a place to rest: "Let me in, my wife is Maria, she is the Queen of

Heaven."

The second chorus responds, "Well, if she is the Queen of Heaven why is she out in the middle of the night wandering about?"


At the final destination there is unison of choruses.

"Entren santos peregrinos – come on in, we had not recognized you – we now see you're Jose and this is your wife Maria."

Each year nearly 200 participants take part. Afterwards they gather in the church courtyard for tamales, empanadas, hot chocolate with cinnamon and fruit punch. Small children get to bat a piñata for the candy inside.
