Village BoA meets Oct. 7

Village of Salado Board of Aldermen will meet 6:30 p.m. Oct. 7 at the Municipal Building, 301 N. Stagecoach. The meeting will also stream via ZOOM. Meeting 838 1711 8931, password 612306.

Village administrator Don Ferguson will update the board on the Salado Plaza Reconstruction Drive project, which is supposed to be complete in mid-October. The board added a change order of some \$36,000 to extend the projection. Ferguson will also update aldermen on the All Abilities Playground project, the recreational

vehicle ordinance and participating in a county-wide Habitat Conservation Plan.

Aldermen will consider the following agenda items:

- A proposal to install two flag poles and flags in the landscape island at the intersection of Salado Plaza Dr., North Main Street and IH-35 access road, amending the FY 2022 budget to do so.

- Disposition of a 2.092 acre tract of Village of Salado owned property located in the 400 block of South Main St. in Salado.

- Spending plan for the funds awarded to the Village

under the American Rescue Plan Act.

- Closing part of Pace Park Rd on Oct. 31 for a community Halloween Event.

- Approving a Salado employee holiday calendar for 2022.

The board will also hear reports from the Police Chief Pat Boone, Tourism Director Andrea Howard and Fire Chief Shane Berrier during the meeting.

Shortage of truckers drives backlog of products

The Markets

The stock market, as measured by the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX), had a rough month in September, as it often does, and ended the month on Thursday with a loss of 4.76%, its worst since March of 2020. Still, for the third quarter of 2021, the SPX squeaked out a gain of 0.2% and has now gone 317 trading days above its 200-day moving average. For the week ending on Oct. 1, the Index had slipped 2.21% so half the monthly loss was crammed into one week. On the bright

side, the SPX rose 1.15% on Friday to close at 4357.04, signaling traders were not too concerned about potential bad news over the weekend. It is still up 16% year-to-date and 30.12% from a year ago, so no serious complaints were registered. The CRSP Mid Cap Value Index, the other equity indicator we

follow, pulled back a mere 0.44% for the week to close at 2444.84 and is up 19.14% this year.

The yield on the U.S. Treasury 10-year note pretty much ignored the drama on Capitol Hill about the debt ceiling, rising a mere 0.6% to 1.463%, although it is up over 54% this year

and over 76% from a year ago. West Texas Intermediate crude oil rose 2.4% to \$75.75 as optimism about the recovery's future course rose.

The Economy

The week ending October 1 was filled with conflicting indicators and a host of worries. China's economic well-being has a direct effect on the U.S. as our economies are interlocked, and there was some bad news from that quarter. The China official manufacturing Purchasing Managers Index (PMI) there declined to 49.6 in September on a scale where numbers above 50 indicate growth and below 50, contraction. A series of unpleasant events are shaking companies there as rolling lockdowns, a sudden government crackdown on popular companies, port closures, electricity rationing, and what looks more and more like a real estate slump sweeps across the world's second largest economy.

Here in the United States, a ray of good news emerged as Bloomberg reported that in 47 states, the "Rt factor," a measure of how fast the COVID virus is spreading, dropped below 1, indicating that there is less than one new infection occurring for each existing infected person. While there are a multitude of issues besetting

our potential for economic growth, almost all of them can be traced to the pandemic. Seeing the growth rate for new infections start to turn negative is heartening.

Meanwhile, the backlog of products unable to get to their destinations across the country swelled in September. Record numbers of ships are at anchor off ports, railroad yards are overflowing with containers, and trucking companies are backlogged with orders and freight that is stuck where it is. The shortage of truck drivers continues to be a key issue as the pandemic hits that set of workers hard. As an example, our nation's largest seaport in Los Angeles, is only operating at about 60 to 70% of capacity with ships at anchor waiting weeks and more to dock and unload. The problem is not unloading the ships but rather what to do with the full shipping containers. Further afield, in the center of the country, trains were backed up as much as 25 miles as the rail freight yards were filled to overflowing, again awaiting trucks and drivers to move them. Estimates from corporate executives suggest that the problem will continue well into 2022.

Despite the goods logjam, the Commerce Department announced that consumer spending, the main fuel of our economy was up

0.8% in August following a worrying 0.1% drop in July. Accompanying that report was the revised report that the U.S. economy expanded at a 6.7% annualized rate in the second quarter, up from the initial estimate of 6.3%. OpenTable indicated that in the week ending September 29, dining reservations were only down about 8% from the same period in 2019. In a bit of core good news, durable goods orders, a leading indicator of future business activity, rose 1.8% in August. Economists surveyed by the Wall Street Journal recognized the current slow-down in growth, but collectively forecast a resurgence in the fourth quarter as COVID cases decline.

The bottom line is that in September and October it is not uncommon for there to be a steep wall of worry for the stock market and economy to climb. When that happens, it is good to remember that bull markets, and economic expansions do climb just such a wall. Historically, the time to be afraid is when there are no worries and the cry of "This could go on forever." and "It's different this time." echoes through the streets. There seems to be plenty of worry out there, but we are still seeing almost all the leading indicators pointing to good times ahead.

Peggy was born on August 21, 1961, to Earl and Earlene Barnett. She grew up in Blossom, Texas where she loved to ride her bike and chase crawdads and she learned the value of family and community.

Peggy went to Prairiland High School before earning her Bachelors and Masters of Science in Reading degrees from East Texas State, which is now Texas A&M Commerce. She went on to earn her Doctorate in Educational Leadership at Baylor University in 2000.

Education was the cornerstone of Peggy's life. She began a long and impactful career in education at the age of 18 when she worked in early childhood with the youngest of learners. Peggy was blessed with Micah in 1987 and could not have been prouder of her tenacity, inventiveness, and spirit. Peggy married Dr. Edd Bigbee in 2004 and they spent the next 17 years together as spouses, friends, confidants, and travel companions. Peggy's true passion shined through with her grandchildren Rylee and Keaton. Peggy loved nothing more than delighting them with whimsical gifts, unique games, and her special way of making every child feel like the most important person in the world.

Salado became Peggy's home in 2000 and she loved this charming community immensely. Her affinity for Salado stemmed from her love of the people but those who knew her well have a sneaking suspicion it was actually the surplus of deer. Peggy enjoyed feeding them apples off her front porch while holding at least one dog. She was always willing to break the rules to save an animal. 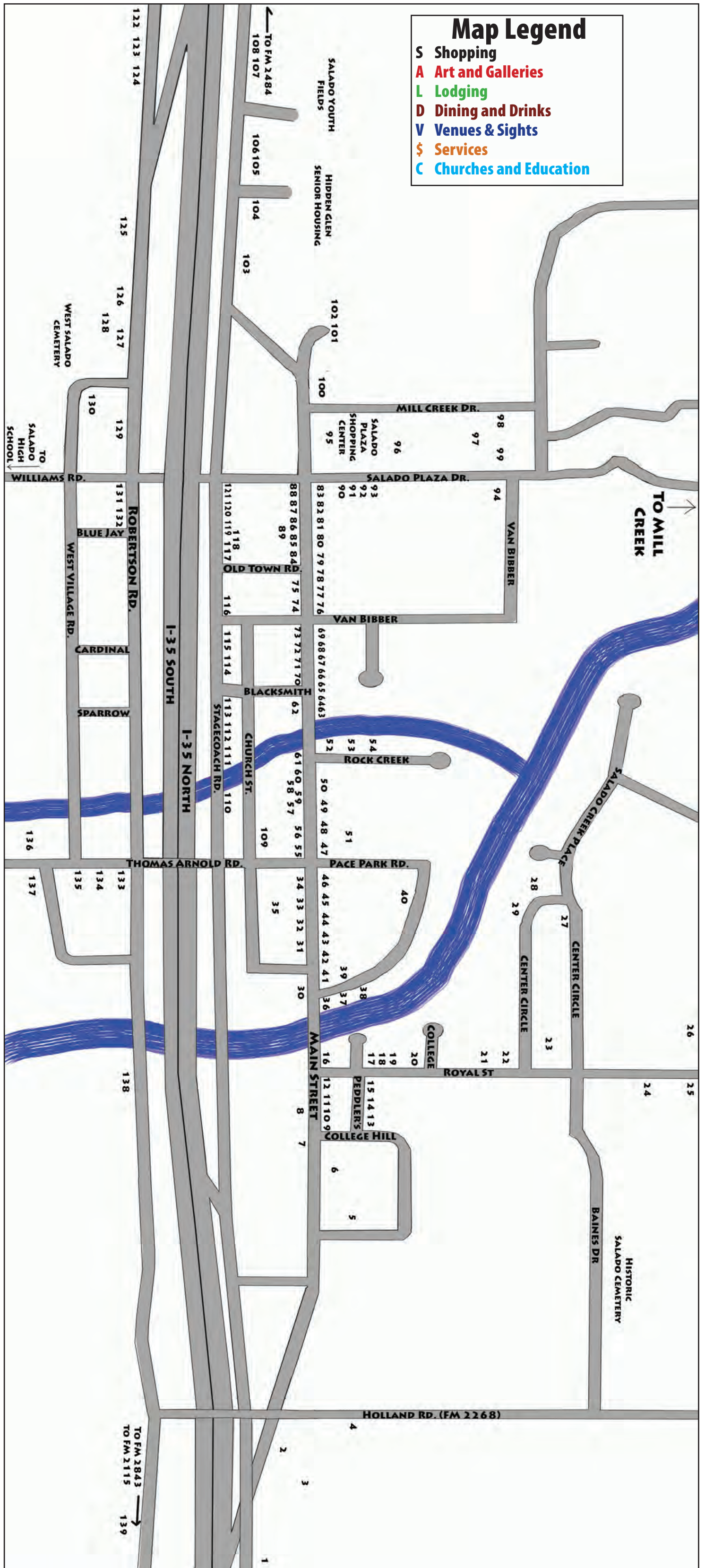

The bidding by the opponents often helps declarer find the best line of play, as illustrated by this unusual case from a team-of-four match.

At the first table, West led a diamond against three notrump. Declarer took East's king with the ace and played a club to the king, taken by East with the ace. East returned the nine of diamonds, covered by the ten, and West made a good play by letting the ten

hold. As a result, South went down one. When he later led a spade to try for his ninth trick, East took the ace and returned his last diamond to West's Q-8-7. All told, South lost three diamond tricks and the two black aces.

At the second table, after exactly the same bidding, West also led a diamond. But here, when East produced the king, South played the ten on it! East continued with the nine, covered by the jack and queen, after which the defenders were helpless. East eventually scored his two aces, but declarer made the contract, losing only two diamonds, a club and a spade.

The declarer at the second table obviously assessed the situation more accurately than the declarer at the first table. He decided that West was an odds-on favorite to hold five diamonds rather than four, in which case he (South) could short-circuit the opposing communications by holding up on the first two rounds of the suit. He also realized that he didn't need to score more than one diamond trick, since sufficient winners were available elsewhere.

It is rare for a declarer to intentionally hold himself to one trick in a suit where he starts out with two. But when the circumstances indicate that it is the right thing to do, declarer should be perfectly willing to make the sacrifice.

Eagles start district play

Salado Eagles kick off District 9-4A Div. 2 play on the road this week against the Gatesville Hornets. The Eagles and China Spring look to be the top two contenders for the District Crown and will meet in the third week of district play when Salado is again on the road.

But first Salado will have to get past last year's fourth place team. The Eagles handled Gatesville 63-3 last year in the first round of district play.

Gatesville returns 27 varsity players from last year's 4-6 team. The Hornets beat Pecos in the first round of the playoffs last year before bowing out to Carthage by forfeit. Salado went three rounds deep last year before falling to the Bulldogs 35-7 to finish the year 11-2.

The Hornets are 2-3 in non-district play with wins over Llano and Hillsboro and losses to Lorena (#10 in 2A Div. 1), Glen Rose and Lampasas.

Expect Salado to control the clock and the game with its stingy defense. The Eagles are 3-2 with losses on the road to perennial powerhouses in 3A Div. 1 and 4A Div. 1 football. The Eagles lost 32-28 in the final minute to the Grandview Zebras in the second week of play. The following week, the Eagles had a tough 48-21 loss to Stephenville, thanks a great deal to two quick touchdowns in the final minute of the first half which made sure that the hosting Yellowjackets kept momentum on their side.

The Eagles have blown out every other opponent this year, starting with a 62-0 opening win over Troy, a 57-0 shut out of Mexia and a 59-6 win over Taylor.

In what many predicted as a rebuilding year for Salado due to the loss to graduation of all three starting running backs for the slot T, the Eagles have proven not to miss a beat with Coach Alan Haire's ground and pound game.

Hutton Haire has had steady hands getting the ball to Aidan Wilson (79 carries, 600 yards, 10 TDs), Caden

Strickland (69 carries, 560 yards, 6 TDs) and Seth Reavis, (29 carries, 274 yards, 2 TDs). Haire himself has scored four touchdowns on the ground on 16 carries for 119 yards. Midway through the season, Haire has thrown for six touchdowns, adding a new element to the offense.

Reavis has caught nine passes for 202 yards and 2 TDs while Strickland has caught four passes for 81 yards and a TD. Big Gavyn Keyser has two touchdown receptions for a total of 79 yards.

The Eagles offense has amassed 2,258 yards through five games, with 1,842 on the ground and 416 through the air.

The defense has held opponents to an average of 245 yards total offense. Stephenville and Grandview were both able to get 400+ yards against Salado. Both teams did it through the air with more than 300 yards passing and 100 yards on the ground.

Nolan Miller leads the defense through the midpoint of the season with 46 tackles, a fumble recovery for a touchdown.

Josh Huckabee is just behind with 43 tackles, a fumble recovery and two forced fumbles.

Nic Bates has 40 tackles, two fumble recoveries and an interception to lead the Eagles in take-aways.

Kavahn Wilson leads the team in getting to the quarterback. He has 4.5 sacks, as well as two fumble recoveries and two forced fumbles to go with his 18 tackles.

Garrett Combs has 30 tackles and 3 sacks.

Salado will host Waco Connally in the second

week of play Oct. 15. The Eagles beat Connally on their home turf 20-15 last year. While Connally is down this year, they will compete for a playoff spot.

China Spring and Salado face each other on Oct. 22 in a contest that will likely determine the District Champions. The Cougars return 21 lettermen from last year's 10-3 Region Finalist squad. They return seven defensive starters and four on offense. Both Salado and China Spring were ousted from the playoffs by Carthage last year. Salado lost 35-7 while China Spring lost the next week 52-14. The Cougars are 5-0 with a quality 21-13 win over the #10 Lorena Leopards (3A Div. 1) in the second week of play. Both Salado and China Spring blew out Mexia. The Eagles shut out the Black Cats 57-0, throwing up 50 points in the first half on Sept. 17. The following week, China Spring beat Mexia 56-7.
