After Tornado, building is gone, Church ain't got a scratch

"The building is gone, but the Church ain't got a scratch on it," Pastor Billy Borho said.

Borho has been Pastor of Victory Baptist Church for 43 years. The Victory Baptist Church building on FM 2843 in Cedar Valley is one of three local country church buildings that were destroyed by an EF-3 tornado that ripped through the southern part of Bell County April 12.

Only the foundation was left of Victory Baptist Church. Nearby, First Cedar Valley Baptist Church was destroyed by the 165 mph winds of the tornado, except for the cross.

"Everything was destroyed but that cross," Pastor Donnie Jackson said, pointing to it for Governor Greg Abbott who came to visit the tornado stricken area on April 16.

Both the new building and the older building, where Donnie said he "was saved in that little church right there," were destroyed by the tor-

But Jackson said that the Church itself "is stronger than we've ever been before."

Ministers are often seen supporting, loving and comforting people in their distresses. Now, it was time for people to do the same for these two ministers, and their flocks.

"The love has been pouring out on us from the community," Jackson said.

"There is no force of nature more powerful than Texans helping Texans, and communities affected and help them come back stronger than before," Abbott

FM 2843 and Cedar Valley Road were closed to traffic for two days following the storm, to allow Bartlett Electric Co-op and Texas Department of Transportation to restore power and clear the roads of debris.

Bell County Emergency Management, working with local first responders, assessed the damage done by the tornado at 76 structures. Of that, 70 were homes.

There were 25 injuries with 12 residents transported to local hospitals. One was in critical condition. As of presstime, Vanessa Rios remains in the hospital, but her husband Joel, daughter Mariam and baby Ezra have been released.

Go Fund Me pages have been established for the two churches and for the Rios family.

As of April 19, the Go Fund Me has raised more than \$91,000 for the Rios family to help rebuild their house and pay medical and other bills. The Go Fund Me page for the Rio family is https://www.gofundme. com/f/rios-family-donations

Those numbers manned 8 a.m.-5 p.m., Monday to Friday.

Bell County Judge David Blackburn issued a local disaster declaration followed by a Disaster Declaration by Gov. Abbott on April 14.

Emergency Management officials are encouraging residents and business impacted by the storm to report damage to the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM), through its TDEM Individual State of Texas Assessment Tool (iSTAT) Damage Survey (https://damage.tdem.texas. gov). The iSTAT website includes a tutorial video to help users navigate the system. Once on the page, users need to select April Severe Weather from the list of Current Active Incidents.

For people impacted by the Cedar Valley tornado on April 12, which tore through parts of Salado, Bell County is teaming up with a few key partners to offer a Multi-Agency Resource Center (MARC).

The MARC, which will offer free resources to assist those impacted by the storm, will be open 10 a.m.-6 p.m. April 22-23 on the second floor of the Salado Civic Center (601 N. Main Street).

"This event will be a great opportunity for residents impacted by last week's storm to connect with a wide variety of resources," Emergency Management Coordinator are going to find everything from free food and clothing to offerings of debris removal, documentation recovery,


as spearheading many of Salado's great annual events."

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CPI shows 8.5% increase in cost of living versus last year

The Markets

dex (SPX) turned in a disappointing week to begin its quarterly earnings season. Bank stocks led the decline as comparisons with last year's furious burst of mergers and new offerings faded while interest rates increases have not yet generated the income from the difference between loan and savings rates on which banks traditionally thrive. The SPX closed at 4392.59, down 2.39% for the week and down 7.84% year to date. Even the one-year return of the SPX was anemic with a rise of only 5.33%. Our other favorite equity indicator, the CRSP Mid-Cap Value Index sagged 0.15% to 2580.25, down 0.65% this year but up a respectable 7.95% from last year at this time.

The S&P 500 Stock In-

The ten-year U.S. Treasury note yield continued its relentless climb, ending the week at 2.828%, up 4.277%, marking a return to the range where it was before the pandemic. The increase in the 10-year note yield was more than academic as it now is higher than any earlier maturity but below the 2.920% yield on the 30-year bond. That condition in which the longer maturing Treasury securities have higher yields is called a "positive yield curve" and puts to bed the chorus of alarm about a yield-curve inversion. The price of West Texas Intermediate crude oil followed the T-note yield upward, rising 8.81% to \$106.48 as the European nations appeared to be getting serious about cutting the flow of Russian

The Economy

The headline economic news this week was the U.S. monthly Consumer Price Index (CPI) report. The topline number was a shocking twelve-month rise in cost of living of 8.5%. The one-month rise was even more scary at 1.2%. If that

be up 14% by next March. Digging deeper, as it often does, revealed some different news. First, over time, the topline CPI is an unreliable figure as it is deeply affected by the price of food and fuel, both of which are extremely volatile. The so-called "Core-CPI" with those numbers removed was still up a depressing 6.5%, but the one-month Core-CPI only rose 0.4%. The important bit about that number is more recent monthly inflation numbers are declining. Firms, like Moody's Analytics, that have been consistently accurate in their economic forecasts, are suggesting that the oneyear inflation number may have peaked and as the year unfolds, the 12-month numbers should come down. The prime culprits driving the high inflation numbers continue to be the price of used cars and trucks, petroleum, and the cost of houses. As we have written before, those areas are unlikely to continue to rise as fast over the next twelve months as they have over the last year, so the potential is there for inflation to moderate.

While the CPI was the headline, the underlying economics chatter all week remained about whether the Federal Reserve can engineer a "soft landing" for the economy as it raises rates and effectively sells bonds from its inventory, both of which tend to make borrowing more expensive and slow economic activity. The goal of the Federal Reserve, Bureau of Labor Statistics as expressed by Chairman Powell, is to raise rates across the spectrum to the point where they are "neutral" and no longer stimulate economic growth, but to stop raising rates before causing economic growth kind of inflation continued to reverse into a recession. for a full year, prices would Lael Brainard, the nominated Vice-Chairman of the Fed, spoke during the week and expressed confidence that the Fed can indeed slow the growth rate without reversing it, echoing Chairman Powell's sentiments. History is replete with examples of how the Fed hit the brakes too hard and a recession ensued, but the underlying causes of inflation were different then than now, so an argument can be made that past performance is not a good indicator for this time around.

The higher rates are already beginning to show in the real world as the average 30-year mortgage in the U.S. rose to 5% for the first time since 2011. Higher rates did not appear to slow consumer spending in March though as U.S. retail and restaurant spending rose 0.5% at a 6% annual rate and was up 12.9% for the first quarter from a year ago according to the Census Bureau. That pocket-book indicator was probably created by the factor that the University of Michigan reported as its consumer sentiment survey showed that consumers are feeling better about the economy as its index rose 10% from March's 59.4 to April's 65.7.

Once more, the battle continues between the negatives of war, supply-chain disruption, high inflation, and rising interest rates on one side and the very positive reality that the U.S. economy is running at full speed and has a lot of momentum on the other. One thing we can say is that the immediate future does not look like it will be boring. Expect a lot of variances in market values and in the underlying economy, but the signs that historically have preceded economic downturns and bear markets are just not there.

Question 1: I am very proud of how we have responded to the pandemic, ice storm and recent tornado emergencies.

Pandemic – our team provided guidance, resources and vaccination location information. We continued to provide police and village office services during the pandemic while our staff was limited due to illness. Our village went through the pandemic with very limited impacts to our services.

Ice Storm – our police team were heroes during the Ice Storm by checking on seniors, helping stranded motorists and patrolling our streets. Our staff was in constant communications with utility providers to restore services. We have since worked with the electrical service provider to upgrade our services and improve reliability (power poles and transformers replaced, additional lines added and new electrical substation constructed).

Tornado – our police were some of the first responders at the tornado, we have provided phones and manpower to support the victims.

We are definitely prepared to handle the next emergency. We have great relationships with Bell County and other emergency responders. We also have a great staff with emergency response experience which positions us to be able to respond to future events.

Question 2: Salado is the safest or one of the safest areas to live in central Texas. As your mayor, I will budget and provide a responsive police department to keep up with our growth. As mayor, I have implemented the license plate reader protection this has been a huge success with controlling crime and has lead the area in cutting edge police support. Other ing this protective measure due to the success seen in our village. I will continue to prioritize our police team with increased salaries (fairly managed to keep up with cost of living and other police agencies), upgraded police vehicles and cutting edge equipment. 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



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

of North Carolina at Greensboro. She married Brian S. Heintzel man in McLean, Virginia in June, 1972.

During a 30 year government career she worked at sever al federal agencies while following the whims of her husband's career. These included: the Agricultural Marketing Service in Washington, D.C.; the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, Department of Agriculture, Kansas City, Missouri; the Department of Justice, Washington, during which time she met and married Brian. 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




Shopping Map of Salado

Question 1: Parents are children's first teachers. Parents and Teachers work together to support core curriculum including reading, math, science, history. Character training is developed at home and supported at school. This has always been the case in raising children and really no need to have such a drastic paradigm shift especially in our community with so many wonderful families that are clearly involved and sup-

reminds Kindergarten children to share and take turns; the following years of homework, group projects, sports and extracurriculars remind children to be responsible, accountable, and trustworthy. The ultimate responsibility of what curriculum is adopted and paid for by our district lies with the school board.

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



scarifice fly by Bri Waters.



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

Question 1: Parents are partners with educators, administrators and school board members in their children's education. Parents should have the right to attend all public meetings where curriculum is discussed and selected. When raising concerns every effort should be made to provide specific examples when possible. That way the administrators and school

board members can effectively address the concern.

Question 2: There are no lessons that I am aware of that have caused me any level of alarm.

In the event that such a concern were to arise, I am confident that processes exist within our district for addressing the situation effectively. During the period of time that our children attended SISD, we had two instances where we had concerns. In each of those instances we worked within the established process and were satisfied that our concerns were addressed. We started with the campus principal and then went to the Superintendent. Had our concerns not been addressed, avenues existed to bring them to the School Boards attention.

That is the role that administrators and the school board should play. They should provide open communication channels and opportunities for airing and addressing concerns as they arise.

Question 3: I am unaware of any books in our school libraries that should not be there. The books in our libraries are selected following TEA guidelines. Additionally, there are processes in place for parents to restrict books which they do not want their children to read as well as options to petition the school board for reconsideration of titles they find inappropriate.

If elected it would be my intent to assure parents continue to have a role in determining what books their children can access.

Question 4: Our district does an amazing job in most curriculum areas. Both of my daughters were students in SISD and both were highly successful students at private universities. The area they were least prepared was in computer language coding. Since that time the district has increased investment in this area. I believe that is how improvements are best made, through input from parents and students based upon their experiences.

One area where I'd like to expand curriculum is in the area of dual credit enrollment. To the maximum intent possible, our students should have the opportunity to maximize the number of college level credits to take with them after graduation.

Another area where I would like to see the district expand its curriculum is in

entrepreneurship. Not all of our students are bound for college, some have futures in their own business ventures. Curriculum in business planning, business accounting, personnel law and technology use in business and economics would be areas where we can assist those students not planning on going to college.



SAM DOWDY, JR.

Question 1: Parents should know and have access to the curriculum being taught to their children. The parent should also be able to object to the curriculum being taught to the students and bring their concerns to the staff or school board.

Anything being taught or provided to the student that involves the indoctrination of the student should be removed from the classroom or library.

Question 2: I am not aware of any lesson plans being taught that would cause an alarm. I am concerned about the software provided on the Chrome books. A good vetting process of the curriculum by the teachers, staff and parents would allow us to make better decisions on the curriculum.

Question 3: I am not aware of any books at this time. I would highly recommend entrepreneurial / business books. Books that encourage leadership development, personal and emotional growth and development and financial management (Debt Free Degree)

Question 4: I personally believe that not all kids need to go to college and should be provided an alternative path that is encouraged just the same as a student wanting to go to college. I have seen and have been a part of many vocational schools and programs that offer great opportunities for the student and the school. The local businesses have come into these programs to help expose the student to the career opportunities they have in their community.

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

Question 1: Curriculum standards are set by the SBOE, written in the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS). Parents have several options for their children and what is being taught through the Texas Education Code, Chapter 26. As far as what input or influence parents can have on curriculum, the best way is to establish and maintain an open channel of communication with their children's teachers and the school staff. If parents see an issue with what is being taught, they can contact the school as soon as it is noticed, and can oftentimes contribute to the necessary changes and improvements that are needed.

Question 2: During the school year, my daughter had a couple math assignments that were graded wrong, despite her having answered the questions correctly, and showing work. The problems were with the processes that were not done in the way that the assignment called for. The "processes" looked remarkably similar to Common Core, which is not allowed in the state of Texas. I contacted the school, and immediately received responses from the superintendent, as well as principal Mullins. The lessons were not common core, but were similar and were in accordance with TEKS. I reviewed the standards and we came up with a solution together.

Question 3: I am not aware of any books that should or should not be in the Salado ISD libraries. However, I am aware of the latest actions of the SBOE regarding pornography in schools. There is a way that parents can review ALL of the titles within each school library; https:// saladoisd.follettdestiny. com/common/welcome.jsp? context=saas002_4274817. Parents have full access to review any and all books within the school libraries. There is also a process in place that addresses selection, adoption and review of instructional material, including library books, as well as policies to handle complaints.

Question 4: "Common Core" was never adopted by the State of Texas. However, some of the processes in TEKS resemble some "common core" basics. These were brought to my attention by my daughter's homework. I have been closely monitoring it ever since. It is not "common core" and it does follow the guidelines of TEKS. Working with the TAE staff, we have been able to find the sticking points and work through them. I continue to watch her school work closely. The communication with the staff was very clear with very rapid responses. I was very pleased with how it was handled. I don't currently see a lot of issues with the curriculum that is being used today.



AMY McLane

Question 1: As a public school, the Salado ISD curriculum is set by the Texas Education Agency. have the same curriculum standards across the board. These standards are called Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS) and have been given to each district to follow. These standards have been created by educators and others and adopted by the State Board of Education. At Salado, we are required by the state to follow this curriculum. Every day, our teachers plan class lessons and activities based upon the specific TEKS for each grade level. This curriculum is set and determined by the state. However, current state law does give parents the right to have their student abstain from any particular lesson if it conflicts with the parent's religious or moral be-

All Texas public schools

Question 2: I have not had any issues as a parent with the lessons and curriculum taught to my three children at SISD. My husband and I have a junior, a freshman and a sixth grader, all who have attended Salado schools since kindergarten. As parents with students in the district since 2010, we have not had any lessons given to our children that have caused alarm.

Question 3: I do not know of any books in the SISD libraries that should not be there. The SISD library system is a great asset of the district. Our school district librarians work hard to keep the libraries in top shape and ready for each day. These librarians are certified professionals in their field of work and select the books appropriate for grade levels to be included in our library. If a parent has an issue with a particular book in the library, the parent does have the right to appeal for the book to be removed from the library.

A committee will be put together to review the book and make a decision regarding said book. However, library materials are different from classroom instructional materials.

Question 4: I would like to see more Career and Technical Education (CTE) classes at Salado. These classes can provide students with skills needed to enter the workforce right out of high school. A welding program was added to the curriculum and the board recently voted to add various improvements to the program, including an upgraded plasma cutter and electrical upgrades. The district also added health science, computer science and culinary arts. These classes provide a foundation for specific work skills to be used upon graduation. I would like to see more offerings in the CTE area, possibly including an electrical technology class, building maintenance and mechanics.



Marlon Reed

Question 1: First and foremost, the classrooms belong to the taxpayers in the community, and the lessons taught therein should uphold good order and discipline. Parents have one hundred percent input in the curriculum taught to their children in local public schools. The curriculum taught should enhance our children's critical thinking, reading, writing, and arithmetic skills. Everything should lead to one outcome: developing strong, resilient, children that grow into welleducated, confident adults.

Question 2: I have only heard about Prodigy and Navigate 360 having questions that introduce or allude to the concepts of gender ideology. The school board, along with the administration, should conduct a full review of any material before it is used in the classroom. These internet sites should not be allowed to update material without new content being approved by the administration or school board. I understand the convenience of these programs, but the developers are serving many schools that do not have the same values we have. similar programs.

Question 4: Salado ISD lacks sufficient vocational training for students that may not desire a college degree. We could improve on working to get students certified in a trade, so they can enter the workforce when they graduate high school. Until we get the necessary facilities, we could enter into a cooperation agreement with another school district that would allow students to attend classes on their campus. We could also use a basic economics class to teach our students about budgets, credit card debt, investing for retirement and other valuable life skills.

port continual review. I appreciate that the library collection is available to view online; this promotes transparency and assures that our community is aware of what our children have access to. Transparency promotes trust, and the district's willingness to openly show what is in the library tells me they are confident in their library collections. Similar to the curriculum adoption process, I trust that our librarians have a good knowledge of what is on their shelves, why it is there, and whether the content is appropriate for their

respective libraries.

Like every parent, I don't want my children exposed to material that I don't feel is appropriate; I also understand that what is deemed inappropriate is variable. As a parent, it is my job to instill in my children expectations about what I feel is appropriate for them to check out from the library, just like it is my job to teach them what is okay to watch on TV or visit on-line.

Question 4: We must continue to enhance the diversity of classes that promote the various postsecondary tracks. These

course offerings can begin well before high school, as the adoption of the AVID program showed. This also includes adding depth to our vocational training and allow for more students to receive certifications upon graduation. I would also like to see us pursue a JROTC program; this process isn't as easy as simply adding the courses, and I know SISD has pursued this program previously, but I would like to see us revisit this and attempt to make it a reality in our district.

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
