

Salado returns incumbents

Michael Coggin was easily re-elected Mayor of Salado, Amy McLane was re-elected to the Salado ISD Board of Trustees and Nancy Mills Mackey was re-elected to the Salado Library District Board of Directors May 7.

Paul Cox and Jason Howard were re-elected to the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen in unopposed races. Cox received 436 votes and Howard received 428.

Coggin won the Mayoral race against write-in candidate Linda Reynolds. He had 521 votes while Reynolds

Five candidates filed for two unexpired three-year terms on the SISD Board of Trustees. Amy McLane led the field with 1,066 votes. Jim Reed followed with 765

votes. Susan Starnes was also elected to the board, receiving 590 votes. Theresa Howard received 465 votes in the race.

Two proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution also passed.

Proposition 1 passed with 1,121,860 voting in favor and 169,011 voting against.

Proposition 2 passed with 1,106,460 voting in favor and 197,960 voting against.

Tampa's second round pick has Salado connections

Logan Hall likes getting past big offensive linemen. And he is dang good at it.

The University of Houston graduate will board an airplane today headed for Tampa, where he will start what his agent Drew Pittman said could be a stellar career, and one that might someday land him in Canton.

The son of Salado Chamber of Commerce Executive Director Amanda Organ, Hall was the 33rd pick in the 2022 NFL Draft, selected as the first pick of the second round by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers to play on the defensive line.

Hall graduated from University of Houston after a high school career at Belton High School. Playing for the Houston Cougars,he was named to the 2021 First Team All-AAC (American Athletic Conference). He started 12 games in 2021 for the Cougars at defensive tackle, leading the team with 13.5 tackles for loss and 6.5 sacks, tied for second in the AAC. He had 48 tackles his senior year, including two games with six tackles (USF and UConn). He registered tackles for loss in nine of his 12 games his senior, including 3 TFL against Tulane. He had sacks in seven different games with 2 sacks against Tulane and against UConn.

Pro football scouts describe him as having size and further growth potential. According to Tony Pauline's NFL scouting report (profootballnetwork.com), Hall "fires off the snap with a ter-

rific first step. Immediately alters his angle of attack to make plays against the run... Very explosive, keeps his feet moving and draws the focus of opponents."

More importantly, according to Pittman, is that Hall is a young man of character.

Pittman told me that he is selective in who he represents. Pittman has more than 30 years of experience as a sports agent, including being a founding principal agent for Capital Sports Advisors which recently joined Shark Sports Football. He has represented more than 100 pro-

fessional athletes.

was "an easy fit. He is someone of high character and high integrity. In the end, it ended up being the right fit."

But the two may not have made that fit if Hall's mom didn't work here in Salado. Organ says that as Logan's star began rising at Houston in 2021, he was being inundated by agents reaching out to him. "He wanted us to help him handle the calls because he wanted to keep his head down and concentrate on playing and school," she says. "We didn't really know what we were doing."

One day Organ was talking about the challenge with With Hall, Pittman said, it Andrea Howard, Salado

took Chamber checks out to Nancy Best for her signature. She got to talking to Sam Best about her son and his prospects of playing beyond college.

"From the interview, I Some time later, Organ could tell Drew was a quality man and that Christ is an important part of his life," Organ said.

"The connection was spooky," Organ said. "I knew Mike growing up. And Drew represented him in his NFL career."

After the season was over, Hall chose Pittman not only as his agent but as a mentor.

"I'm not the flashiest guy in the business," Pittman said. "If you want 'Show Me the Money!' I am not the fit for you."

Instead, Pittman works with his clients to get them ready for life after football. He helps them with financial literacy and business acu-

"A pro athlete can make millions during their career," Pittman said, adding that as their agent, he has a heart to "help them build a life after football."

But first is the life during football and Hall's looks bright with Tampa Bay.

"The sky is the limit for him," Pittman said. "He has the God-given tools, but more importantly, he has the SEE HALL, PAGE 4A

Fed Reserve raises rates 0.5% sending markets into tumble

The Markets

The week that ended on May 6 was another one for the books. Reading the daily headlines about the stock market, a person could easily have concluded that a major market collapse was underway with terms like "panic selling" and "market selloff" being thrown about in large, bold print. The reality was very different. For the week, the Standard and Poor's 500 Stock Index (SPX) our preferred indicator U.S. stock market valuations, declined a miniscule 0.21%, closing at 4123.34. Yes, the market remains solidly in "correction" territory, meaning that it is down 13.49% from its high mark in early January and down 2.58% from this time last year, but market history is replete with corrections, most of which, like this one, seemed to spring out of nowhere and then "uncorrected" nicely. Critically, Morningstar posted on Friday that, in their opinion, the market is now trading at a 12% discount to fair market value. The other equity index we follow, the CRSP US Mid Cap Value Index, closed out the week at 2472.81, up 0.64%. It is still down about 4.8% from its high in January and down 1.12% for 12 months, but we fail to find any signs of

The yield on the benchmark 10-year U.S. Treasury note rose 7.3% to 3.143%. Because the value of bonds falls as interest rates rise. the result of the ongoing rise in rates can be seen in the 12.39% decline this year in the S&P 500 Bond Index. The good news is that the Treasury yield curve remains generally positive. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) rose too, up 5.92% to \$110.33 as it became ever more obvious that Russian oil was being forced out of the global market.

Another bit of good news that the markets saw as "bad" was the report from the Institute for Supply Management (ISM) that its non-manufacturing index came in at 57.3 on a scale where numbers above 50 indicate growth in business activity. The drivers were reported to be a surge in new orders and employment. As if that weren't enough "bad" good news, the Commerce

Department announced that factory orders for U.S. Manufactured goods rose 2.2% in April. Non-defense durable goods orders minus aircraft, a key indicator of the future direction of the economy, rose 1.3% in March, revised upward from an earlier 1% estimate. The backside to those numbers was that the Employment Cost Index (ECI) rose 1.4% in March after remaining well below inflation for the previous year. That last number was scary in that the Federal Reserve watches the ECI carefully for signs of the dreaded "wage-price spiral" in which rising wages create rising prices, which in turn spurs wage growth. So far, over the past year, wages have lagged well behind prices, but this does bear watching.

The final doses of badgood news came as the Census Bureau reported that domestic consumer spending for "real final sales" rose at annualized rate of 3.7% in the first quarter of this year. Notably, that number has been adjusted for inflation, so it is a strong indicator that our economy is still growing at breakneck speed. In an economy like ours where consumer spending is the main driver, historically, that high of a number has never been followed by a recession in the next year.

The bottom line remains that the U.S. economy is running at an astonishingly high rate of speed and has plenty of momentum and fuel to keep on doing so for some time to come. At the same time there is a very healthy, if irrational, strong sense of worry and fear in the markets that counterintuitively suggests that better times lie ahead.

A Shocking Assault on the Supreme Court

Despite what you might have learned in high school civics, the Supreme Court really only has one role in our system of government -- to uphold Roe v. Wade.

That's the animating sentiment behind the furor over the leak of a Supreme Court opinion drafted for a majority by Justice Samuel Alito overturning the abortion decision.

Left-wing commentators have hailed the shocking leak of the opinion and said that the Court deserves to be burned down and even ended altogether for the offense of finding no constitutional warrant for one of the court's most controversial and consequential decisions of the last half-century.

The leak, assuming it's legitimate (there's little reason to doubt it) and assuming it came from someone on the left of the court (which seems most likely), is a brazen breach of the Court's rules in an attempt to sabotage its deliberations.

The Court has been one of the few institutions in our national life that has managed to maintain a measure of self-respect and integrity. Its oral arguments aren't televised, which always tempts people to play to the cameras. The arguments are invariably civil and substantive, even if intense -- in contrast to what is heard on cable news, social media, or on the floor of Congress. The Court has honored confidentiality as it considers a case and justices write and share their

opinions among one another.

The leaker, whether a justice, a clerk or a staffer, clearly intended to engender a huge reaction to try to intimidate a member of the majority into changing his or her mind.

This is how hardball politics works in Congress or in the executive branch, where strategic leaks are the norm and very often no one trusts nobody. It's completely inimical to the spirit of the Supreme Court, which is supposed to decide its cases as a strict matter of law free of political influence.

Tellingly, almost no one on the left criticized the leak. Instead, many praised it as an act of brave defiance that reflects the gravity of the moment.

This is yet another sign of the hypocrisy of all the Trump-era lectures from progressives about the importance of norms and neutrally applied rules. As soon as a Supreme Court decision might go against them, they abandon all pretense of believing any of that and attempt to bludgeon the Court into submission.

The leak, in its own way, brings home how one of the key assumptions in the Court's abortion jurisprudence has been wrong all along. It imagined itself settling once and for all a highly contested social issue. In reality, by attempting

to take the issue out of politics, it made the fight over abortion even more divisive, while making itself a political football. Now, the issue that it sought to settle has blown back on the Court, perhaps changing how it operates forever.

The leak speaks of the desperation of pro-abortion forces to preserve Roe, and its guarantee of a radically pro-abortion regime everywhere in the United States. It doesn't matter if it requires a breach of trust at the Supreme Court -- indeed, for many of them, the Court as we know isn't worth having if it doesn't uphold Roe.

Never mind if, as Alito's draft opinion devastatingly demonstrates, there's no constitutional basis for Roe whatsoever.

The leak must fail. The Supreme Court justices in the prospective majority should get 24/7 security in case the intimidation campaign reaches another level. Alito's opinion, assuming it's final and speaks for a majority, should be released as soon as possible -- to send a message that the Court isn't going to bend to pressure. And everything possible should be done to ferret out and punish the leaker.

The Supreme Court's loyalty isn't to Roe, but to the Constitution, and it can show it by issuing the Alito opinion that its critics want to foil by any means neces-

We will have a reception next Monday, May 16, from 5:00 p.m. until 5:45 p.m. to thank Jeff for the outstanding job he has done serving our students, school district and community. The reception will be upstairs at the Salado Civic Center, located at 601 North Main Street and it is open to everyone.

Congratulations to Chris Diem, Amy McLane, and Jim Reed for being elected as Salado ISD school board members this past Saturday. Chris will serve in the unexpired (two year) term position that was vacant due to the passing of school board member Jim Hodgin. Amy and Jim will serve in full (three year) term posi-

Over 1,700 voters participated in our school board election. This is the highest number of voters that have ever participated in a May school board election in the history of our school district. The only time we had a higher turnout for a school board election was in 2020 when the State of Texas rescheduled the elections from May to November due to concerns regarding COVID-19. That year our school board election was on the same ballot as the 2020 presidential election so the voter turnout was very high.

There has been some confusion regarding the vacant school board position that is now being filled by Chris Diem. It has been alleged that our school district violated the law by not filling that position within

180 days. Unfortunately social media is often not the most accurate source of information. I would like to take this opportunity to correct this misinformation.

It is true that if more than one year remains in the term of the position vacated, the vacancy must be filled not later than the 180th day after the date the vacancy occurs (Texas Education Code Section 11.060(d)). However, a special election to fill a vacancy may only be held on either of the two uniform election dates in May or November. When school board member Jim Hodgin passed away in September, it was past the deadline to post a school board meeting to call a November election to fill this position. Thus, the next available election date was this past Saturday, May 7.

The attorney general has concluded that Texas Election Code Section 41.004(a) authorizes a board to hold a special election on the first uniform date following the 180-day period if no uniform date falls within the 180-day period that would allow enough time to hold a special education in the manner required by law (Texas Attorney General Opinion Number KP-0102, 2016). Thus, our school district fully complied with the laws regarding filling this vacant school board position.

While we could have appointed someone to that position, our school board members felt it would be better to allow the voters

to decide who should fill that position instead of six of them choosing someone. Furthermore, if someone was appointed into that position, that appointment would have only been for up to six months. Texas Education Code Section 11.060 specifies that an appointed trustee only serves until the next trustee election. Thus, even if we had appointed someone, that position would have been up for election this past Saturday. 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
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
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work ethic, the character and the intelligence to go very far."

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
Shopping Map of Salado



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
























Contract Bridge

The bidding: North East South West Pass 3 NT Pass 1 NT Opening lead — five of hearts.

Everybody plays to win, and it is a good idea to keep this in mind during the play of a hand. So, when West leads a low heart against your fourspade contract, it is best to assume that East has the ace and adapt your play accordingly.

The reason to place East with the

ace is that virtually all players have learned in one way or another that leading away from an ace against a suit contract will prove to be a losing proposition in the great majority of deals. You should therefore play the six of hearts from dummy at trick one, dismissing the unlikely possibility of West's having the ace.

East wins the heart with the queen and cashes the ace, but he is then at a dead end. Whatever he returns, the only other trick you can lose is the ace of diamonds. You don't lose a club trick because your clubs can eventually be discarded on dummy's diamonds.

Now let's suppose that you imprudently played the king of hearts from dummy at trick one. In that case, good defense would defeat you.

East takes the ace, but instead of cashing the queen, he returns a low heart! He does not have to be a genius to do this. East realizes that if you had the jack, you would have played low from dummy at trick one rather than put up the king.

West wins the heart at trick two and shifts to a club, and in the fullness of time you go down one.




