Water's Edge apartments to open Jan. '23

The first 60 units of 300 apartment units at Water's Edge will be ready for rental by January 2023.

Phase 1 of the Water's Edge development is being built by RREAF Holdings south of College Hill Circle to FM 2268. It will be 210 apartments in seven buildings of 30 apartments each.

The apartment buildings will be three or four-story, depending upon the topography.

Vertical work will begin as soon a roads are asphalted to meet fire safety standards during the construction pe-

Entrance and exit will be off of South Main Street and FM 2268. There will be exits from the complex onto College Hill Circle and onto Santa Maria.

After the first set of buildings are completed, a new unit of 30 apartments will be completed every 30 days for a six month period.

Once occupancy reaches 50% in Phase 1, work will begin on Phase 2, which include the construction of 53 townhouses for sale and an additional 90 apartments.

Water's Edge will include a new road, Nottingham Street, that enters onto South Main Street. Edinburgh Street will connect College Hill Dr. to Santa Maria.

Phase 1 will have nine studio apartments, 77 one bedroom apartments, 92 two-bedroom apartments and 32 three-bedroom apart-

The studio apartments are 610 sq. ft. One bedroom apartments are 724-788 sq. ft. The two-bed apartments are 1,108-1,170 sq. ft. and the three bedroom apartments are 1,331 sq. ft.

All parking is interior of the complex, not outside the footprints of the buildings themselves.


Water's Edge is one of three possible apartment complexes that may be developed in the Village. Another may be built on the Sanctuary South Tract near I-35. Another apartment complex may be built off of FM 2484 and voluntarily annexed into Salado to tie on to the sewer system.

No plans have been submitted to the Village for either of these projects.

In other Sanctuary-related news, the Planning & Zoning commission met in a special session on May 25 to consider the final plat of the Sanctuary Phase 1A Residential Subdivision, which has 70 lots with the smallest lot being 3,944 sq. ft. (0.09 acre).

The P&Z Commission also considerd the final plat for the Drake's Landing residential subdivision.

The meeting was held after presstime for this edition.

An Open Exchange of Ideas

The weird is becoming new normal for markets

The Markets

The week ending on May 20 was another weird one in the markets. If this keeps up much longer, weird is going to become normal. The S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX), the quite flawed but possibly best indicator for the U.S. stock market behaved like a plunging horse all week but finally ended at 3901.36, down 3.06%. That leaves it down 18.14% this year, down 6.12% from a year earlier, and 18.6% below its record January close.

The key was that it did not end the week down more than 20%, and thus into a bear market, despite having crossed that line in the early afternoon on Friday. Quite interestingly, it appeared that it was the short dip into bear market territory that sparked the rally that took the Index back to a gain for the day.

To put this in perspective, if we go back three years to May of 2019, before the last recession and bear market, and come forward to today, the SPX has gained a very respectable 37%, giving it an 11% average annual rate of return for that period. For whatever it is worth, that rate is about its average over the past 100 years or so. Thus, despite the panicky headlines, if you are a long-term investor the last three years of pandemic, recession, bear market, recovery, and now war and more pandemic have evened out to be quite aver-

The other equity index we follow, the CRSP Mid-Cap Value Index closed at 2373.67, down 2.18% for the week, 8.61% from its high this year, and 3.39% from this time last year.

The yield on the 10-year U.S. Treasury note slipped back about 5% to 2.789% but left the Treasury yield curve still in positive territory, boding well for the future. The price of West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) inched upward about 2% to \$112.70 for the week, meaning the pain at the pump will contin-

indices that reflect the level of the stock market were the headline grabbers for the week. A dig into that event reveals that about half the of market fall is a result of the price plunge of just eight large growth companies, Microsoft, Apple, Amazon, Alphabet (formerly Google), Meta (formerly Facebook), Tesla, Nvidia, and Netflix. Several of those stocks were down well over 40% from six months ago with Netflix leading the way, down about 72%. On the other side of the coin are the somewhat smaller, value-oriented stocks from the index we mentioned above, down only 7.61% in the last half year. Whether a given investor is staring a bear market in the face or has yet to cross over into a "correction" depends entirely on where they are invested.

This rather severe market correction is serving its purpose well. Among the worst hit issues are the Special Purpose Acquisition Companies (SPACs), initial public offerings that took in money without stating where it would be invested in the economy, but with a promise to find something, somewhere. Another cleanout was in cryptocurrency issues. Some have simply vanished while the most popular are down more than

A little heralded landmark was crossed during the week as the official U.S. death toll from COVID-19 rose above 1 million. That puts the total U.S. COVID deaths higher than the total from AIDS plus the 1918 influenza pandemic and all in the span of just over two years. Meanwhile, infections in the U.S. are rising once more and the economic effect is being felt across the world as about 300 million people in China, the equivalent of the entire U.S.

population, are in lockdown because of the virus.

Meanwhile, the underly-

ing U.S. economy keeps driving forward. The Conference Board released its index of Leading Economic Indicators (LEI), and, in the words of its Senior Director of Economic Research, "Overall, the US LEI was essentially flat in recent months which is in line with a moderate growth outlook in the nearterm." The Labor Department reported that unemployment remained steady at 3.6%, 2.4 points lower than a year ago as continuing unemployment insurance claims fell to the lowest level in 50 years. The Federal Reserve reported that U.S. industrial production increased 1.1% in April, the fourth month of increases greater than 0.8%, and was 6.4% ahead of where it was a year ago. The Commerce Department chimed in with a report that retail sales in the United States rose 0.9% in April at an annualized rate of 11.35%. The average U.S. home price hit a new record high, \$391,200, although the rate of home sales has begun to moderate in the face of those high prices and rising mortgage rates. To top off the good economic news for the week, Bloomberg Economics is forecasting that U.S. economic growth in 2022 will come in higher than that of China for the first time since 1976. The forecast is for U.S. GDP to grow 2.8% while China's will only be 2%.

As we have written before, we were overdue for a correction and now we have one, in spades! Despite the market numbers, we remain optimistic. Real long-term stock valuations tend to be driven more by what is happening on Main Street than on Wall Street and Main Street looks pretty good from here.

Don't Weaponize Demographic Change

The horrific massacre in Buffalo, New York, has created a debate about the "great replacement theory," the rancid theory adopted by white supremacists that Jewish people are conspiring to destroy the influence of white Americans by importing non-white immi-

The Buffalo shooter was in thrall to the theory, as have been other racist and anti-Semitic killers.

The theory should be denounced by all people of goodwill and, indeed, it thrives only in the most sewerish precincts of the internet.

Yet, there is an attempt to tar Republicans more broadly with the theory and somehow attribute responsibility for the atrocity in Buffalo to them on this basis. The argument is that the likes of Elise Stefanik, a Republican congresswoman from New York, have warned that the Democrat party views immigration as a way to change the electorate in their favor, and so are mainstreaming the hateful replacement ideology.

This is a smear, and especially perverse since Republicans sounding the alarm about this Democratic view have been unquestionably correct. There hasn't been any secretive cabal at work -- it's all been out in the open, discussed by progressive political operatives and think-tank analysts, and celebrated in the press.

The left-wing Center for American Progress issued a report in 2013 titled "Immigration Is Changing the Political Landscape in Key States." It summarized its argument thusly, "Supporting real immigration reform that contains a pathway to citizenship for our nation's 11 million undocument-

ed immigrants is the only way to maintain electoral strength in the future."

about this idea. The widely cited (and over-interpreted) 2004 book, "The Emerging Democratic Majority," by John Judis and Ruy Teixeira, called the Democrats "the party of transition" as "white America is supplanted by multi-racial, multi-ethnic America." In 2016, Steve Phillips wrote "Brown Is the New White: How the Demographic Revolution Has Created a New American Majority." The website for his publisher says the latest edition of the book contends that "hope for a more progressive political future lies not with increased advertising to middle-of-the-road white voters, but with cultivating America's growing, diverse majority."

Donald Trump's victory in 2016 suppressed some of this sentiment since it made it clear that white working-class voters didn't appreciate being spoken of as if they were a relic of the past; and the 2020 election and its aftermath made the assumption that Democrats will own Latino voters forevermore seem increasingly shaky.

But the left wants to create rules that define it as perfectly acceptable for Democrats to advocate high levels of immigration as a means of gaining political power, and out of bounds for Republicans to call them

Washington Post writer Greg Sargent slammed New

York Rep. Elise Stefanik for allegedly flirting with the great replacement theory in Facebook advertisements last year. They warned that Democrats want a sweeping amnesty for undocumented immigrants in order "to overthrow our current electorate and create a permanent liberal majority in

Washington." Never mind that Stefanik could have drawn her warning directly from various left-wing writers and advocacy organizations. Or that Sargent himself wrote after Barack Obama's victory in 2012 that the election had been "all about demographics" and that the outcome showed the electorate wasn't "reverting to the older, whiter, more male version Republicans had hoped

What makes Sargent's basic view different than Stefanik's, other than the fact that he welcomes how immigration trends have changed our politics and she doesn't?

Immigration has been hotly contested throughout our history, and is an inherently highly emotive issue, involving the composition of our polity and core questions of national identity. It can only inflame the issue further to explicitly weaponize demographic change, as the left has for decades now. We should have an immigration policy that serves the national interest, not the narrow interest of one political party.

Yes, by all means, further shun and marginalize replacement theory, but don't support high levels of immigration for partisan reasons and expect the other side not to notice.

The bidding: East South West North **Pass** Pass Pass 3 ♥ 4 ♥ Pass Pass Opening lead — five of spades.

The Flannery convention, used mostly in tournaments, was devised for those hands where the opening bidder has specifically five hearts and four spades and usually less than 16 points in high cards — a hand that is difficult to describe in standard bidding methods. Those who play Flannery open such a hand with an artificial bid of two diamonds. Partner then makes whatever response is

appropriate for his high-card values and distribution.

This deal occurred some years ago in the Blue Ribbon Pairs. At most tables, North got to four hearts and made four after East led a club to West's ace and ruffed the club return.

But our story concerns itself with the table where South, playing Flannery, got to be declarer at four hearts and West led his singleton spade. South played dummy's eight, which held the trick. Then, unaware of the catastrophe about to befall him, declarer led dummy's queen of diamonds, at which point the roof caved in.


East took the diamond with the ace and returned a low spade, ruffed by West. West then led the ace and another club, ruffed by East. East played another spade, ruffed by South with the nine and overruffed by West with the ten.

The debacle continued when West led another club, ruffed by East, and East then returned a fourth round of spades. Declarer ruffed with the four, overruffed by West with the six, and South's agony was finally over.

It is true that declarer could have made the contract by simply drawing the opposing trumps at the start of play. But instead, he went down four — 400 points — all because of his seemingly innocuous play of the queen of diamonds at trick two!
