
CUWCD recommends **20% water use reduction**

As drought conditions continue in central Texas, the Clearwater Underground Water Conservation District (CUWCD) alerted well owners in Bell County over the Edwards BFZ Aquifer Alarm that the district is now in Stage 2 of its Drought Management Plan (DMP).

Stage 2 of the CUWCD DMP recommends a 20% reduction in water usage by all well owners (both exempt and permitted wells).

"The aquifer system layer known as the Edwards BFZ is experiencing significant draw-downs in monitor wells and a drought trigger-based rate of reduction in Spring flows below 10.408 cubic feet per second," CUWCD



early morning hours," Aaron cept as required for human stated.

Aaron gives the following measures as ways to reach a 20% reduction in water:

• Limit watering of landscape (lawns, trees, shrubs, etc.) to only once every five to seven days. "Agriculture and horticulture operations are exempted from this measure but are encouraged to reduce tree, plant, and crop watering by 20%," he stated.

• Check for and correct

or animal health and safety needs, or for fire prevention.

 Water livestock in leakproof troughs as much as practical.

Bell County is not alone. Bell County is part of the 78 percent of the state to find itself in drought status.

Storage in our water supply reservoirs is at 78 percent of capacity, six percentage points below normal for this time of year," stated Dr. Mark Wentzel, hydrologist with the Texas Water Development Board."Drought is expected to expand and cover all but the northeast corner of the state by the end of August."

Ways to reduce water use in landscape & garden

Adding compost to your soil is one of the best things you can do to reduce water usage in your garden and landscape.

Zach Zezulka said this to a group of people gathered for the first in a series of Barrow Brewing Summer Lectures on a Sunday afternoon as temperatures headed popcorn," he said. "It has these tiny pockets for water and air." If you incorporate that into the soil, it should be done in the top 12 inches of it.

When choosing compost, Zezulka said, go for the dark stuff. "The finer it is and the darker it is, the better it is," he said.

Mulch is also helpful in the garden. It provides a buffer between the plant roots

General Manager Dirk Aaron said.

"Well owners failing to conserve their precious resource is often evident by expansive lawns and excess groundwater use," Aaron stated. "The aquifer is not just overburdened by large volume users but also by private well owners. We strongly urge all well owners of this sensitive aquifer system to reduce all outside water use to less than 1,500 square feet of irrigated turf and reduce your entire household use by 20%."

"The best way to conserve is to only water your lawns once a week during

all plumbing leaks.

• Re-use or re-circulate water whenever possible

• Water supply systems are encouraged to implement measures to achieve a 20% reduction in water usage.

• Only water landscape at night between the hours of 7 p.m. and 7 a.m.

• Keep swimming pools, landscape or decorative ponds and fountains covered (where possible), re-circulate water, and wait five to seven davs to refill.

• Wash vehicles at car wash only as needed.

• Do not wash buildings, driveways, streets, patios, or other outdoor surfaces ex-

"Water supply storage has been trending below normal for the time of year since late October last year," he added.

Since April, Salado Water Supply Corporation has been in Stage 1 of its Water Contingency Plan, asking its customers to limit outside watering to ODD addresses Tuesday/Friday and EVEN addresses Monday/Thursday.

towards triple digits June 12.

He should know. He has more than two decades experience in the nursery business. He is the owner of Silver Sage Landscape and Gardens.

The organic nature of compost releases carbonic and humic acid into the soil, helping to bring the pH into balance. Humic acid binds to plant roots and helps bring water into them.

You can add inorganic material to the soil, as well. Expanded shale will help clay and soil from getting compact (and thus loosing absorption of water due to run-off). "It's kind of like

and "the scorching sun." Mulch also helps the soil to retain water. But there is too much of a good thing, Zezulka says.

He advises two or three inches of mulch. "If you have too much mulch and it piles up around the stem of the plants, bugs will get into it and the water won't."

Gardeners and homeowners can be more efficient with their irrigation.

Zezulka advises less frequent watering, but for longer periods of time. "This way, it encourages the growth of the roots into the soil," he said.

Watering once a week

for 30 to 45 minutes is better than watering every other day for 20 to 30 minutes.

He said homeowners should "know what their system is putting on the ground." They can do that by putting open tuna cans in different spots of the yard to test their sprinkler system for coverage and water amount.

Check your systems once a month for possible damage to sprinkler heads by mowers. "A busted head can waste a lot of water," he said.

A lawn needs an inch of water a week to thrive, but can survive on as little as a half-inch per week, he said.

June sales tax rebate check dips 5% for Village

For the first time in more than a year, Salado showed a noticeable dip in sales tax revenues when it received the June disbursement.

The Village received a \$60,083.68 check for the June disbursement, which is 5.2% less than last June's payment of \$63,396.44.

Three cities in the County are down for June: Salado, Morgans Point (-8.3%) and Rogers (-13%).

For the year, Salado's sales tax payments are 12.4% remain ahead of yearto-date payments through June 2021. The Village has received \$385,195.14 compared to \$342,707.51 through June 2021.

Salado Public Library District continues its upward trend in sales tax payments, although at a lower pace than previous months. In June, the Library District received \$51,878.99, an increase of 1.6% over last June's payment of \$51,043.51.

is still running at a doubledigit increase over 2021. Through June, it has received \$319,755.20, compared to \$274,726.50 paid through June 2021.

Bell County is also trending higher. The County received \$2.56 million, an increase of 8.7% over last June's \$2.35 million. For the year, the County is running 13.2% ahead of 2021, having received \$15.15 million, compared to \$13.39 paid through June 2021.

Fuel costs driving inflation to 6.8% annual rate

The Markets

It was not a pleasant week in the equity markets. As the 10th day of June opened, the Labor Department announced that the U.S. Consumer Price Index was up a stunning 8.6% over the trailing 12 months. Worse, the index rose 1.1% just in the last month, and even 0.6% when food and fuel were removed to get the "core" inflation measure.

The market reaction came as analysts concluded that the Federal Reserve would raise rates by a halfpoint in June, July, and September. That scenario puts the likely short-term rate at about 3.25% by the end of the year.

More than a few companies in the S&P 500 would find their debt service costs each month at that rate higher than their current profits. Those were the companies that led the market down for the week and that news triggered broad automated sell orders across the market. Those sell orders took the S&P 500 from around 4100, where it had been trading on Thursday down to 3900.86 at the close on Friday.

The Friday slump left the SPX down 5.05% for the week, 18.61% from its record high on January 3, and 7.98% lower than it was a year ago. The CRSP Mid-Cap Value Index, not wanting to be left out of the pity party, fell 5.16% to 2355.80 leaving it down 9.3% from its record high in January and 5.64% from this time last year. Once more, it is a good idea to keep longer-term returns in mind. After this week's slump, the SPX now has an average annual rate of return of 12.95% over the last three years. Measuring from the last time the market took a nosedive, in March two years ago, it is up over 74%. While it is hard to stomach, this is very typical historical behavior for the U.S. Stock Market. RBC Capital Markets issued a report that in their opinion, the S&P 500 will end the year at about 4700, about 20% higher

than its current level. That would still not put it ahead for the year but would be a great recovery. Let's hope they are right.

The yield on the 10-year U.S. Treasury note reacted as expected to the inflation news as it rose to 3.162%. While the Treasury yield curve flattened, it remained positive with the 30-year bond yielding 3.169%, while the 2-year note remained lower at 3.065%. Stocks have clearly taken a hit, but the S&P 500 Bond Index is showing even more pain with that bond index now down 11.24% over the last year and showing an average annual rate of return over the last three years of only 0.57% even with interest reinvested. In a hint of at least less-bad news, West Texas Intermediate crude oil held almost constant for the week at \$120.50 per barrel.

The Economy

Clearly the dominant economic news for the week was centered on inflation and guesses on what the Federal Reserve is going to do to eliminate it. Digging once more into the underlying numbers, it is clearly the price of energy that is driving the train. Motor fuel came in over 49% higher than it was a year ago, and since motor fuel is required to cultivate, harvest, and transport food, that price is getting passed on there. Throw in the 19.5% rise in the cost of private transportation, and the spike in prices we are seeing makes sense. China announced too that it was once more shutting down about half of Shanghai as COVID cases surged. The combination of the loss of much of the food and fuel that Russia and Ukraine have historically contributed to the world market is driving prices across much

of the world upward at the highest rate we have seen in forty years. Lest you think that this is something we are feeling only here in the United States, the general inflation rate in the European Union was also announced this week, and it came in at 8.1% with a warning to expect higher numbers in the months to come. Still, there was a glimmer of hope in the Labor Report as the twomonth total for core inflation was only 1.1%, equating to an annual rate of 6.8%, still quite high, but trending downward. Moody's is holding to their forecast that inflation will peak this quarter and moderate the rest of the year.

Looking at the rest of the economy, signs are appearing that high prices and rising interest rates may be having the desired effect of getting consumers to buy fewer goods. The U.S. trade deficit shrank 19% in April as imports fell for the first time in nine months, while U.S. exports rose 3.5%. New purchase mortgage applications fell 7% to the lowest level in 22 years, and home sales dropped to a lower rate than before the pandemic, suggesting that the house-price boom is slowing.

The bottom line remains largely unchanged. The economy is racing and booming, probably a bit too much. We are in the bumpy period we forecast would come, but we are still in the largest, most productive, and healthiest large economy in the world. Bumpiness will likely continue this year, but we remain confident that American companies will find a way to profit from this chaos and we will remain on top.

If it's hot for you, it's hot for pets and wildlife too

This year's weather is unseasonably hot and dry. Animals especially suffer in this kind of weather. They can't retreat to air conditioned homes and get a cold drink from the refrigerator! They are also wearing fur coats year round. These extreme temperatures are very hard for them. Please check any outdoor pets/livestock to be sure they have plenty of fresh water. They drink more in this weather and it also evaporates more quickly. Wildlife also suffers. Small streams that used to run until late July and August have already gone dry in May. Consider placing a container of water in a shaded corner somewhere outside your home -- in a place accessible for animals so that they can get a drink without having to cross a backyard with a dog in it to get to the water! Boaters urged to "Clean, Drain, and Dry" to stop spread of aquatic invasive species

With temperatures rising, Texas are getting out on the water. Now more than ever, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) urges boaters and paddlers who enjoy water recreation this summer to do their part to fight back against aquatic invasive species that threaten Texas lakes.

"While we want everyone to have a great time, we also want them to avoid giving free rides to invasive species and helping them travel to new lakes," said Brian Van Zee, TPWD Inland Fisheries Regional Director. "The best way to prevent the spread of many destructive aquatic invasive species is to clean, drain and dry your boats and equipment - every time."

Zebra mussels and giant salvinia continue to spread to new areas in Texas. Yet while they remain some of the biggest threats to Texas lakes, other highly invasive species can also be spread or be introduced by boaters, including water hyacinth, crested floating heart and quagga mussels.

"There's no doubt that Texans love their lakes," said John Findeisen, TPWD Brookeland Aquatic Habitat to hard surfaces, also pose Enhancement Team Lead. "We also need Texans to take action to help protect their lakes. It only takes a tiny fragment of an invasive plant to create a new infestation and preventing aquatic invasive species introductions avoids costly, longterm efforts to manage these species once they infest a lake."

Giant salvinia, a highly invasive, free-floating aquatic fern that can double its coverage area in a week, is one of the major threats to our lakes. The invasive plant can produce thick surface mats that make fishing, boating, swimming and other water recreation nearly impossible.

Giant salvinia is currently present on 23 East Texas lakes and numerous rivers, creeks and marshes between Houston and Beaumont. While TPWD efforts have kept giant salvinia from limiting angling or boating access in Texas public waters, they could still hitchhike from one lake to another on a boat, trailer or other equipment.

Zebra mussels, a nonnative shellfish that attaches a significant threat to our lakes. These invasive mussels damage boats and infrastructure for water supply and control, alter lake ecosystems and cause harm to native species. They also litter shorelines with hazardous, sharp shells that impact lakefront recreation.

Zebra mussels are found in 33 Texas lakes across six river basins, as well as in river reaches downstream of infested lakes. Quagga mussels, a close relative of zebra mussels, have also been detected in Lake Amistad. Zebra mussels are in both Stillhouse Hollow Lake and Lake Belton.The TPWD and partners monitor numerous at-risk lakes around the state for early detection of zebra and quagga mussels, but once they've been introduced and become established in a lake, nothing can be done to control or eradicate them.

"Zebra mussels and quagga mussels can be attached to boats or even carried by anchors or attached to plants clinging to boats," said Monica McGarrity, TPWD Senior Scientist for Aquatic Invasive Species

Management. "Microscopic zebra mussel larvae can be transported in residual water in the boat. Taking just a few minutes to clean, drain, and dry boats can make a huge difference in our efforts to prevent further spread of this highly damaging species and harm to Texas lakes."

Boaters need to remove all plants, mud and debris from boats, trailers, vehicles

and gear and drain the water from the boat, all equipment and on-board receptacles before leaving the lake. In addition, boats should be dried completely before visiting another lake, preferably for at least a week. If drying isn't possible, washing the boat and compartments using a carwash or spray nozzle on a water hose before visiting another lake can help reduce the risk of

spreading aquatic invasive species.

If you have stored your boat in the water at a lake with invasive mussels, it is likely infested and poses an extremely high risk for moving these invasive species to a new lake. Before moving your boat, call TPWD at (512) 389-4848 for guidance on decontamination.



It is said that in war every new weapon gives rise to a counterweapon. In much the same way, many bidding and play conventions can frequently be turned against their users.

Consider this deal where the bid-

spade bid was not based on the normal complement of at least 17 high-card points usually needed for a jump-shift response, but his bid was quite reasonable, considering the enormous trick-taking power of his spades. South knew he was on the verge of a slam the moment his partner opened the bidding, and he wanted the two of them to be on the same page.

East's subsequent double of six spades was conventional. In the given sequence, it asked West to lead the first suit bid by dummy — namely, hearts.

The significance of the double was not lost on North, who realized that a heart lead through the A-Q could prove fatal. So, he wisely ran to six notrump, a contract that proved unbeatable against any opening lead. He lost a club trick, but that was all.

East was in the unfortunate position where, if he passed six spades, West would probably lead a diamond, while if he doubled, he risked chasing the opponents into six notrump. On the whole, East was right to double, since there was no assurance that either North or South would budge after the double. In the actual case, East was a goner either way.



Brittany Chesser, AgriLife Extension aquatic vegetation program specialist in the Department of Rangeland, Wildlife and Fisheries Management, Bryan-College Station, will present the program.

Chesser said a link to the recorded program will be made available upon request for people who register.

Identify and control algae Chesser will cover how to identify the main groups

of algae. The biology and role of these algae in pond ecosystems and how to manage them will also be covered.

Specific management strategies, including mechanical, biological and chemical options, will be covered for each grouping. Chesser will also discuss the importance of correctly calculating copper treatments, which is an algaecide, applications and treatment timing for effective control.

"Some of the major mistakes related to treating algae in ponds revolve around treating all algae the same," she said. "That is why identification and treating with the correct copper concentration at the right time is critical to successful management."
