Calling the plays again Westerberg loves his return

"I love calling the plays. I missed doing it," Coach Tom Westerberg said after his Eagles beat the 5A Bryan Rudder Rangers 38-28.

Westerberg returned to Salado, the place where he grew up as an Eagle, after a storied career in Texas football. At Allen High School, the largest school in the state, he coached those Eagles to a 57-game winning streak and three straight state championships, the most in a row in UIL's largest division.

"At that level, with so many players and such a big staff, I was more of a CEO," Westerberg said. "I wasn't calling the plays on the field."

In Salado, he does. And he likes it. And it shows.

"It's kind of like being quarterback from the sideline," Westerberg said. "Maybe that's why we throw so much."

"This is what I thought it could be when I applied to come back home," Westerberg said. "We are 2-0 and have room for improvement. We watch videos on Mondays and look at different things that we could have done better. We look at where we left points on the field."

Last week, the Eagles left two scores on the field, both as a result of penalties. "We'll do better on not making those kinds of mistakes," Westerberg said.

They will need to because the schedule is not an easy one.

This week, Salado will host the #7 Malakoff Tigers in a neutral site. Kickoff is 7:30 p.m. Sept. 9 from Midway Panther Stadium. Tickets are on-line at https://bit. ly/3ATdW6z.

Westerberg will have to call some great plays to beat the Tigers, who went 9-4 last year, won their district and lost to West 14-12 in the 3A-Div. II Region II Semi-final.

The Tigers return 21 players from that team, including seven offensive and seven defensive starters. The Tigers are 1-1 with a 21-17 loss to the #6 Grandview Zebras last week. "They run a spread, but with more of a run game to it," Coach Westerberg said. In their first game of the season, three runners all had 100 yard games. Junior Chauncey Hogg, senior Damien Jackson and sophomore Jason Tennyson each had 111 yards against West Rusk, who the Tigers beat 28-7.

The Eagles defense held Fredericksburg to 188 yards rushing and 95 yards passing in week one. Last week, they held the Rudder Rangers to 67 yards on the ground and 298 passing. The defense did have an interception and two fumble recoveries against Rudder.

With an expanded corps of running backs sharing time, fresh legs may make a difference in the second half of games. Caden Strickland and Brendan Wilson were able to share time in the backfield against Rudder. Meanwhile, receiver Seth Reavis played all 88 offensive snaps. In two games, he has 395 yards receiving and five TD receptions. He also has a rushing TD.

"He got a little tired

against Rudder," Westerberg said. "He was in for every play."

If Malakoff should find an answer to the Luke Law-Reavis connection, Law has five other receivers to pass the ball to.

Coach Westerberg says that Law, in his first two

games as an Eagle, is getting more comfortable in the pocket each week. Providing protection are center Dray McLane, guards Kye Hayes and Jaxson Lieskau and tackles Ethan Van De Plas and Ethan Llobregat.

You may see Law making use of his legs more, as well.

"We ran him a bit more last week," Westerberg said.

Eligible Texans must register to vote by Oct. 11

Texas Secretary of State John Scott today encouraged all eligible Texas voters to make sure they are registered to vote by October 11th to participate in the upcoming November 8 General Election.

Texas law requires eligible voters to be registered 30 days before Election Day, and since the 30th day before Nov. 8 falls on the Sunday before Columbus Day, eligible Texas voters effectively have two extra days to register this year (Texas Election Code Sec. 13.143(e)). Secretary Scott urged Texas voters to visit the state's official voting web site - VoteTexas.gov - for accurate and comprehensive information on voting in Texas.

you're registered, update your registration information if you need to, and prepare yourself to vote in the upcoming election," Secretary Scott said.

"If you're renewing your Texas Driver License or personal ID card online, please take the extra second to check the box to register to vote if you're eligible to do so. If you're registering to Eligibility for Voter Registration in Texas



The Markets

The week that ended on September 2, was one of those weeks we have seen so many times in the past when, as far as the market is concerned, good news is bad news. The problem with the data released this week is that just about all of it indicates a strongly growing U.S. economy. Stock and bond traders are unhappy about that news because they believe that good economic news will cause the Federal Reserve to increase interest rates more and longer in their efforts to slow demand and thereby crush inflation. Higher interest rates can mean lower earnings for some of the highly indebted, faster growing companies, and lower earnings may mean lower stock prices. So, the traders sell stocks in anticipation of lower earnings. Our experience is that a good economy tends to increase earnings, not decrease them, but once the herd of traders starts selling, others start selling too, thinking the fast-moving stock and bond traders must have a good reason to be selling.

The result for the week was a decline in the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) of 3.29%, taking the Index down to 3924.26. That leaves it down 18.13% from its high back in early January, but still up 7.02% from its recent low point in mid-June. It is now down about 13.48% from this time last year, but up a whopping 38.12% from three years ago. Our other watched stock index, the CRSP US Mid Cap Value Index, closed at 2325.44, down 2.83% for the week and 10.47% from its high in January, but still up over 7% from its bottom in June.

The yield on the benchmark 10-year U.S. Treasury note rose about 5.25%

to be a dip in the middle of a four-month low of 139.7 the curve. As we have written before, these are strange times. The price of West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) dropped an impressive 6.35% To \$87.06 per barrel, the lowest it has been since late January. Following WTI's lead, the average price for a gallon of regular gasoline in the U.S. declined for its 11th straight week to \$3.81 per gallon, just in time for the Labor Day weekend.

The Economy

The economic data released for the week is telling a clear and unambiguous story. The economy of the United States is growing and driving forward at a fast pace. On Friday, the Labor Department released its monthly Employment Situation Summary and in it was the news that total nonfarm payroll employment increased by 315,000 in August. Yes, the unemployment rate rose from July's 3.5% to 3.7% but that was not because jobs were lost, rather it was because the labor force participation rate increased by 0.3% as more people are entering and returning to the job force. Meanwhile, new unemployment claims dropped to 232,000 with the four-week moving average of newly laid-off workers near a half-century low. Add to that the report on August 30 that U.S. Job openings continued to rise in July, and the full set of data now indicates that employers are still begging for workers, and thereby believe that the economy will continue to grow rapidly into the foreseeable future. Then, the Conference Board chimed in with news that U.S. consumer confidence reversed course in August, rising to 145.4 from

in July and improved even more when consumers were asked about where they thought the economy will be six months from now. The University of Michigan consumer sentiment survey echoed that finding with a rise to 58.2 from June's low point of 50. Adding insult to injury, at least from a stock trader's perspective, the Institute for Supply Management (ISM) reported that its August 2022 Manufacturing Purchasing Managers Index (PMI) came in at 52.8 on a scale where numbers above 50 indicate economic growth coming down the road. The commentary with that report from the ISM said, in part, "New order rates returned to expansion levels." even as respondents reported that prices they were paying for raw materials softened.

Across the board, the data continue to indicate that growth is slowing to a more sustainable rate, but also that the economic growth we are seeing is deep and has a great deal of momentum. There continue to be reports that there are transportation and raw material availability constraints affecting business, but they too appear to be moderating. ISM respondents see good growth at least through the rest of this year. The back side of that is that Europe looks more and more to be in a world of hurt economically and China is not looking good either. Once more it appears the United States may need to pull the world through a recession. The open question is whether our economy will be strong enough to pull the world or will we be dragged into a recession here too? Stay tuned as we report on this drama each week.

Chtay connected on the point-after kick for a 35-28 lead with 6:09 left to play.

Rudder was the first to score, taking the opening kick off and driving 72 yards in seven plays. Nate Scoutron scored on an 8-yard run and Antonio Gonzales converted the pint-after for a 7-0 lead.

The Eagles answered on the second play from scrimmage, a 57-yard bomb to Seth Reavis. Chtay made the score 7-7 with 9:01 left in the first.

It would be almost two hours before either team scored, as lightning in the



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

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

West, convinced that declarer would eventually attempt to ruff a spade in dummy, thereupon returned a trump. Declarer won in dummy and led another spade, this time losing the king to the ace. When West returned a third trump, South was at the end of his rope. He later lost a spade and a club and went down one.

The odd part of the deal is that South would surely have made the contract had he held three small spades instead of the K-J-x. In that case, after winning the diamond lead, he would have played a spade from his hand immediately to assure a subsequent spade ruff in dummy and thus guarantee scoring his 10th trick.

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Opening lead — jack of diamonds.

There is a tendency to play mechanically in certain situations because they seem very similar to other such situations encountered previously. Unfortunately, this tendency to play in accordance with prior experience can prove costly at times, which is precisely what happened to declarer in this deal.

South won the opening diamond lead with the ace, crossed to the ace of hearts and led a spade to the jack,

But South's K-J-5 of spades created an illusion that caused him to lead a trump to dummy so that he could lead a spade toward his hand. This opened the gate to further trump leads by West that ultimately cost declarer the contract.

Of course, it's extremely rare for a declarer to lead away from a holding of K-J-x toward two low cards in dummy. But if that's the best way to secure the contract in a particular deal, that's what declarer should do. The best way to play a suit doesn't always coincide with the best way to play a hand.
