Village in talks to buy sewer

The Village may pursue purchasing a 50,000 gallon per day wastewater treatment plant that currently sits outside of the Village limits but within the extra-territorial jurisdiction of the Village.

There have been preliminary discussions between the Village and Celts International, the owner of the treatment plant located on a proposed development of more than 60 acres at the corner of FM 2484 and I-35. The southern portion of the property is in the Village ETJ while a northern portion is in the Belton ETJ.

Discussions have been for the Village to buy the plant for \$100,000 with future payments to the developer coming from impact fees and sewage fees until the developer's costs (\$5 million) are recovered

Village administrator Don Ferguson told aldermen at their Sept. 15 meeting that the village has discussed the possibilities with the developer over the past week. "It opens a whole lot of opportunities to bring to that area," he said.

The Village would have to work with the city of Belton to release its portion of ETJ to the Village so that the property could then be annexed into Salado.

"That plant offers some significant opportunity. Right now we pump waste across the city and up the hill. As the area grows, we are not interested in pumping entire west side up the hill," Ferguson said. "We need to have a plant on the west side. There is going to be a lot of growth on the west side."

Local man seeks bone marrow transplant for multiple sclerosis

Walt Tollefson needs our

The long-time Saladoan is seeking a specialized treatment not currently available in the United States to halt the progression of the multiple sclerosis that he was diagnosed with several years ago. The treatment is a bone marrow transplant that utilizes the patient's own hematopoietic stem cells rather than the marrow of a matching

In layman's terms, the hematopoietic stems cells are harvested from the person and are used to restore the normal hematopoiesis of the patient after that patient has been exposed to high dose chemotherapy delivered to aim immunosuppression.

About a month ago, Walt came to me to talk about the treatment and what it would

mean to him. "It will stop this disease," he said.

For the last seven years, I have watched Walt as the multiple sclerosis has rapidly progressed. In the early 2010s, Walt was hiking four to six miles a day from his house that sits on a wet weather creek next to Bill Hall. He and his wife of 38 years keep their horses Traveler (who is a miracle story in himself, but save it for another day) and Ruby, a giant, black Percheron and dogs and tend a garden.

Walt and I go way back, which is why I am telling his story to my readers in hopes that they will help him to reach a goal of \$65,000 to pay for the treatment, travel, lodging and a caregiver.

Marilyn and I have known Walt and Karen Tollefson for the better part of 30 years here in Salado, Texas. About 20 years ago, he saved our business, the Salado Village Voice newspaper! At the time, he had just started a computer repair business when I came to him in desperation with a dead file server containing all the newspaper archives, customer files, pages, photos, stories and image files. We were sunk. He was able to recover the data for us and build a new file server and backup system, making it possible for us to continue in business.

Up until the mid-2010s, Walt worked on computers for small businesses and residents in the Salado area. He was a one man mobile shop who probably rescued hundreds of others who found themselves in the dire situation that Marilyn and I were in when a computer turns into a brick. He built systems for my house and my business and was someone I could call regardless of the time. Most of his customers

knew him that way. They were his friends and he was a rescuer. Forget Saul, you better call Walt.

But then in 2014, an opportunity came up that would allow him to retrain as a pilot, and return to his first love of flight. While he was training for a regional airline, he had a seizure and lost consciousness in midair. Thankfully he was not flying the plane at the time. However, this led to several months of doctors trying to determine what was causing the seizure, loss of

feelings in limbs and so on.

He was finally correctly diagnosed as having Multiple Sclerosis. Since then, the disease has progressed to the point that he now uses a wheelchair full-time. His long-term prognosis is bleak. He has lost the use of his legs as well as his left hand and arm, yet he stills finds a way and finds joy in tending a sizeable garden, his gi-

ant horse Ruby and his dog, while hugging his wife of 38 years Karen.

About a month ago, Walt found what he believes is an answer to his prayers, through a bone marrow transplant. This treatment is offered through Clinica Ruiz in Mexico. The treatment re-

quires a 28-day stay in Puebla, Mexico with a full-time caregiver on hand. His wife Karen will not be able to stay the entire time, so Walt will need to hire a caregiver while he is there recovering from the treatment. You

Consumer Price Index up 8.3%, setting off drop in markets

It was a rough week in the stock market. The S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) fell 4.77% to close at 3873.33. That left it down about 19.2% from its high back in January, up 5.63% from its low point in June, and down 12.62% from this time last year. Looking longer term, as we do, the SPX is now up 35.27% from this time back in 2019, before the pandemic, and perhaps more impressively, up over 73% from where it was in March 2020, only about two and a half years ago. The stated reason for the fall this week was that the trailing one-year CPI inflation number came in only slightly lower than it did last month. More on that below. Our other followed stock index, the CRSP Mid-Cap Value Index, dropped 4.88% for the week to 2294.29 and is now down 11.66% from its high in January and 5.97% from a year ago.

The benchmark 10-year U.S. Treasury note yield rose an impressive 4.3% to 3.455% for the week. With the 2-year yield standing at 3.85%, the 2-10-year yield curve is again decidedly negative. The yield curve beyond 10-years remains resolutely positive causing the yield curve indicator to be a mixed signal. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) prices were stable, falling about 1% for the week, to \$85.27 per barrel. Markets are behaving oddly, note that bonds, the supposedly reliable alternative to stocks, are down about as much this year as stocks with the Bloomberg Aggregate Bond Index down about 15%, and even gold, widely hailed as a hedge against inflation, is down over 18% from its high in March.

The Economy

The gorilla in the markets this week was clearly the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) announcement that their Consumer Price Index (CPI-U) was up 8.3% from a year ago with even the core CPI, where food and energy are not counted,

up 6.3%. That report was



widely quoted as the reason for the stock market decline with the underlying argument being that with inflation that high, the Federal Reserve was almost certainly going to raise interest rates too far and strangle the economy. Even a short glance at the actual report, rather than the headlines, seems to us to tell a different story. For starters, the oneyear rate was lower than last month. Then, there was the, to us glaring, issue that the monthly inflation rate for July was 0% and for August was a mere 0.1%. Yes, for both months, energy fell 7.6% and then 10.1%, but the inflation wave was led by energy as petroleum costs soared following Russia's invasion of Ukraine and it took a few months to filter through to prices in general. Almost everything we use in our economy has an energy cost component, so it is reasonable to see the price of just about everything go up a couple of months after the price of oil rises as it did from about \$75 per barrel last fall to \$120 in June. With the price of oil down about 40% from its high, we are not surprised to see an end to month-to-month high inflation. Yes, given the labor shortages and wages rising at an annualized rate of about 5% for the past six months, we expect the Federal Reserve to kick rates up to the 3% or even 4% range, but it is also clear that the underlying cause of this inflation spike, the cost of fuel, has ceased to be a if there is no monster to

Another issue that worried the markets this week was another Labor Department news release where good news is bad news. New jobless claims for the week ending on Sep. 10 were only 213,000. If we take out the

seasonal adjustment, the nominal claims were just under 156,000 compared with almost 266,000 a year ago. Employers are simply not laying off very many workers and that suggests a very strong economy. Unfortunately, with the unemployment rate at only 3.7%, there was a fear that the Fed will feel free to really put the pressure on the economy to slow things down.

Then came another report, this time from the Commerce Department, that retail spending rose 0.3% in August, an annualized rate of 3.6%. Retail sales are the biggest factor in our GDP, so, again, there was evidence of a hot-running economy. To confuse things even more, the Producer Price Index for final demand, a measure of wholesale prices, dropped 0.1% for the month with the price of goods falling 1.2% and the price of services up 0.4%. Giving weight to that report was the news, again from the BLS, that the price of imports to the U.S. fell 1%. Monthly import prices have been falling since April of this year. Those numbers are important because price increases in imports, like that of petroleum, have led the domestic inflation numbers consistently.

The more we look at the total picture, the more it looks like the inflation spike we have seen was just that, and not the entrenched long-term inflation monster we had to fight in the early 1980s. We are hoping that fight the Fed will not need to take severe action and we will have the soft landing to which Chairman Powell has referred, as the economy cools a bit but doesn't stall

In Ukraine, There's No Substitute for Hard Power

The ongoing Ukrainian counter-offensive, if successful, could reshape the war and the geopolitical contours of Europe.

It is a testament to Ukrainian pluck and staying power but, above all, to the advanced weapons that the West has put in the hands of the Ukrainians.

Soft power, the coinage of political scientist Joseph Nye for the ability of a country to get others to do what it wants without coercion, is important; hard power is absolutely indispensable.

This is easy to forget in a West that believes deeply in democratic ideals and moral example. Even if it is true, as optimists believe, that the arc of moral history bends toward justice, an armored division can smash and bend it back.

The history of the West is in part the history of arms races, in fortresses, cannons, ships, rifles, aircrafts and much else.

Empires have risen and fallen on the strength of military hardware. Cities have conquered or been destroyed. Armies have triumphed or dissolved.

After the Russian invasion of Ukraine, Volodymyr Zelenskyy had bucketfuls of soft power. He was the most admired man in the world. He spoke at the United Nations, to Congress and other national legislative bodies, and even at the Grammys. What did that get him? It helped solidify the good will of Western countries, which was essential. He constantly tried to leverage that sentiment, though, for the

Zelenskyy could still be admired in death, or in a Russian prison, or as an exile. Yet, if he wanted to continue to be admired as the leader of an independent country, he needed sheer firepower.

Ukraine's cause hasn't gotten any more just or inspiring over the last couple of months; it's gotten better

Ukraine couldn't win a straight-up artillery fight with the Russians, and in fact it was losing one in a grinding war of attrition. A HIMARS, or high mobility artillery rocket system, versus artillery fight, though, is a different matter.

The Ukrainians have used these long-range, precision systems provided by the U.S. to hit Russian artillery parks, ammunition dumps and logistical hubs. The strikes have caused breakdowns in Russia's fuel and ammunition supplies as well as in the cohesion of its troops and command-and-control.

The Ukraine war has been a conflict of stark phases and strategic adjustments and re-adjustments. The Russians will presumably have their answer to the current Ukrainian push, and if they don't, one reason will be that they are running out of those pillars of hard power

-- men and materiel.

Paul Lockhart writes in "Firepower," his book about the history of weapons of war: "Technological sophistication and military might are, to be sure, not synonymous but closely connected, and military might is a vital factor in the calculus of international relations. Great powers tend to have great weapons, or at least a lot of really good weapons."

We should be mindful of this, not just in the assistance we provide to Ukraine but in our priorities for ourselves. Our military budget needs to be much bigger, and our defense industrial base is wholly insufficient to the new, more threatening international environment. We would run out of rockets quickly in a war with China. Even supporting Ukraine at the current level has been a

The United States is a marvel of soft power, binding allies to us, attracting people all over the world who want to come here, and reaching the most far-flung places in the world. What we've been able to provide Ukraine that has been most telling, though, hasn't been diplomatic or moral support, rather a system that can put a rocket directly on a target up to 50 miles away.

That's been the game changer, as better, more sophisticated military technology has always been from long bows, to arquebuses, to fighter jets. There is simply no substitute for hard power. Rich Lowry is editor of the National Review.(c) 2022 by King Features Synd., Inc.




Now he has until November to raise \$55,000 for the treatment. The additional \$10,000 will cover his and Karen's travel, as well as the cost for the full-time caregiver and other unforeseeable costs (lodging and caring for his animals while Karen visits, lodging for Karen, etc.). Walt and Karen were full-time caregivers to Karen's parents in their final years. Karen has not been able to return to work as she is full-time caregiver for Walt since he began to lose his mobility as the MS progressed.

Walt hopes to stop the progress of the disease and to regain some of his mobility and quality of life. If vou know Walt, vou know how strong and how deep his faith in God remains. 



The bidding: West North **East** South * • Pass Pass 1 🖤 1 🖈 Pass **Pass** 1 NT Pass 3 NT Opening lead — ten of spades.

This deal was played many years ago in a tournament in Vienna. It features an exceptional defensive play by West, who laid a clever trap for declarer and then had the satisfaction of watching him fall right into it.

After bidding all four suits at the one-level, North-South arrived at three notrump. West decided that the best hope to defeat the contract was to find

his partner with strength behind dummy's spades. So he led the spade ten, which declarer ducked to East's queen. East then shifted to a low club, taken by dummy's queen.

South had eight tricks — a spade, four diamonds and three clubs — and concluded that the best chance for a ninth lay in developing a heart trick. So at trick three, he led the ten of hearts from dummy, on which East played the three and South the five. But instead of taking the trick with the jack, West followed smoothly with the deuce!

This apparent stroke of good fortune had the desired effect on South. Convinced that East must have the jack of hearts, declarer led another heart toward his Q-9-8 in an attempt to score an overtrick. The second heart lead met with a cordial reception from West, who proceeded to cash four heart tricks for down one. His brilliant duck of the first heart trick had lured a greedy South down the road to disaster.

Of course, declarer could have romped home with nine tricks after the ten of hearts held. But how many players would be able to resist the temptation to try for an extra trick once the

heart jack was "proven" to be with East? As for West, had he taken the first heart trick, South could not have been stopped from making the contract.






Shopping Map of Salado
