# **BoA** public hearing Oct. 6 on rezoning Sanctuary

Salado aldermen at their 6:30 p.m. Oct. 6 meeting will hold a public hearing and consider approval of amendments to the existing and future land use maps in the Village of Salado's Comprehensive Plan.

The board will also hold a public hearing and consider approval of an ordinance to rezone approximately 57.985 acres located near the southeast corner of FM 2268 and I-35 from Planned Development District (PDD-C) to Agricultural (A).

The property in question is part of the proposed North/ South Public Improvement District (PID) that the Village agreed to support when it approved the Master Development Agreements with Sanctuary in 2015.

In a Sept. 22 letter to Mayor Michael Coggin, Sanctuary principal Billy Hanks, Jr. provided two updated analyses of the North/ South PID and the East PID for a total of \$19.08 million in bonds (\$7.41 million for the North/South PID and \$11.67 million for the East

"In Sanctuary's view, the unwarranted delay in creating these PIDs in contravention of our agreements for apparent political reasons has gone on far too long," Hanks stated in his letter to Coggin. "We expect the Village to approve our petition and consent to the creation of the PIDs, in compliance with the Master Development Agreement. Specifically, we ask that you provide the required notice of public hearing required by Chapter 372 of the Texas Local Government Code to create the PIDs within ten (10) days of receipt of this letter, and thereafter consent to the creation of the PIDs at the next regular meeting of the Board of Alderman that is at least fifteen (15) days after the date of such public hearing notice without delay."

No public notice on the hearings for either of the proposed PIDs has been published in the Salado Village Voice newspaper, the newspaper of record for the Village of Salado. No public postings of public hearings on the PIDs has been posted at the Village of Salado office as of presstime for this

tuary provided to the Village, have a total projected assessed value of \$315 million. Of that, \$122.4 million would be in the North section (northeast corner of FM 2268 and I-35 to College Hill and adjoining the Linda Ventura residential subdivision). The South section (southeast corner of FM 2268 and I-35 that is being considered for rezoning) would have a total projected assessed value of \$192.6 million.

The North section would include 235 units of Hotel at a value of \$75,000 per unit; 10,000 sq. ft. restaurant space at a value of \$400 per sq. ft.; 151,043 retail space at \$400 per sq. ft.; 265 units of Multi-Family Retail at \$105,000 per unit value and 50 Multi-Family for Sale at \$250,000 per unit value.

The South section would include 130 Hotel units at \$250,000 per unit value; 73,090 sq. ft. Office at \$200 per sq. ft. value; 56,000 Mixed Use at \$200 per sq. ft. value; 26,175 restaurant at \$400 per sq. ft. value; 190,789 Retail at \$400 per sq. ft. value; 311 Multi-Family For Rent at \$105,000 per unit value; 57 Multi-Family For Sale at \$205,000 per unit value; 11 Single Family at \$286,110 per unit value.

The PID Equivalent Tax Rate for the North/South PID is \$0.21, which would bring the total equivalent tax rate (as of Sept. 2022) to \$2.57, which is still below the maximum total property tax rate

With a projected assessed value of \$315 million (at project buildout), the North/ South PID would generate the following amounts in property taxes to the various local governing bodies, based on 2021 rates: \$1.16 million to Bell County; \$82,834 to Bell County Road; \$4.32 million to Salado ISD; \$1.56 million to Village of Salado (of which one-half would be rebated to the developer for a period lasting until 15 years after the last certificate of occupancy is issued); \$9.764 to Clearwater Underground Water Conservation District; \$283,463 to Bell County ESD #1.

With an equivalent PID assessment of \$0.21 per \$100 valuation, the North-South PID would generate approximately \$661,500 in PID revenues to retire the bond over a 30-year period.

The East PID, which is off of Royal St. and FM 2268, will be 416 Single Family Residential units when

completed over three phases. Phase 1 is in current development. Phase 1 includes 175 lots, some less than 1/8th of an acre in size. There will be 60 50-foot-wide Silver Lots with a projected assessed value of \$400,390 per unit; 61 50-foot-wide Gold Lots with a projected assessed value of \$474,190 per unit: 34 75-foot-wide Silver Lots with a projected value of \$496,390 per unit; 20 75-foot-wide Gold lots with a projected assessed value of \$527,790 per unit.

Phase 2 will include 20 50-foot-wide Silver lots with a projected assessed value of \$416,566 per unit; 50 50-foot-wide Gold lots with a projected assessed value of \$493,347 per unit; 45 75-foot-wide Silver lots with a projected assessed value of \$516,444 per unit and 30 75-foot-wide Gold lots with a projected assessed value of \$549,113 per unit.

Phase 3 will be 96 75-foot Gold lots with a projected assessed value of \$571,297 per

With a projected assessed value of \$208 million (at project buildout) the East PID would generate the following amounts in property taxes to the various local governing bodies, based on 2021 rates: \$765,214 to Bell County; \$54,688 to Bell County Road; \$2.85 million to Salado ISD: \$1.03 million to Village of Salado (of which one-half would be rebated to the developer for a period lasting until 15 years after the last certificate of occupancy is issued); \$6,446 to Clearwater UWCD and \$187,145 to Bell County

With an equivalent PID assessment of \$0.21 per \$100 valuation, the East PID would generate approximately \$436,000 in PID revenues to retire the bonds over a 30-year period.

The bonds would be issued at 6% interest rates, according to the PID analysis prepared by Development Planning & Financing Group Inc., which Hanks stated has "has completed multiple PIDs across Texas."

As of Oct. 4, the Village has received no building permit applications for any new construction on the East PID.

Work on the Waters Edge apartment complex has slowed or stopped in the past two months. The apartments were announced earlier this year to open in early 2023. It is part of the North/South

# lan's impact brings stormy economic waters

Reading the headlines for the last week in the quarter of 2022, ending on September 30, one would think that the market had "crashed" and was plunging toward zero. While the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) did fall 2.91% to close at 3585.62 and is now down just over 25% from its high in January, and 17% from where it was last year at this time, it is also up over 25% from where it was three years ago, three months before the pandemic. The CRSP Mid-Cap Value Index ended the week at 2099.27 as it fell 3.32% putting it down just over 19% from January's high and 14.13% from last year. We are, indeed in a bear market, but in our four decades of being involved in such things, we have certainly seen far worse.

The yield on the U.S. Treasury 10-year note continued its relentless climb to 3.83%, up a whopping 152% this year. Still, it was better than it could be. Midweek the 10-yr note rose above 4%. The 2-year note was yielding 4.22% at the end of the day, so the Treasury yield curve remains in a decidedly inverted state. The price of West Texas Intermediate crude oil mirrored the market, slipping below \$77.50 on Wednesday and the inching upward at the end of the week but still below \$80 per barrel at \$79.67. The average price for a gallon of gasoline also continued downward, dropping to \$3.80 according to AAA.


The Economy

The economic seas got rougher this week, and the storm hit from several directions. It became very clear on Thursday that Hurricane Ian was going to be a monster storm and would carve a path across the Florida peninsula and then turn north to beat up the Atlantic coast. Hurricanes tend to hurt GDP in the short run and boost it in the longer-term. Adding to the rough seas, the United Kingdom's currency and bonds were pummeled hard

a record low against the dollar. The Euro ended the week at \$0.98 as the Eurozone reported that inflation hit a record high of 10% for the year ending in August closely matching the 9.9% annual inflation reported in Here at home, our very own beloved Bureau of

Economic Analysis (BEA) reported that the trailing PCE Price Index, the inflation number that the Fed pays attention to, was up 6.2% for the trailing year, with the core PCE, excluding food and fuel, up 4.9%. The core and regular PCE inflation for August came in at 0.6% and 0.3% respectively. The issue continues to be that our economy has generated too many good jobs. The demand for employees is driving wages up at about 5% per year, while we are still suffering from an ongoing shortage of the things people want to purchase. The law of supply and demand states that when there is more demand than available supply, prices will rise, and they have.

With much of China still shut down and Russia's invasion of Ukraine reducing supply from Europe, the fact that things are going so well here in the U.S. is causing a rise in the price of just about everything. Unfortunately, there is nothing we can do in the short term to create more supply, so to stomp out high inflation, the Federal Reserve must take steps to reduce demand. The way that is done is to raise interest rates, thereby making operating a business or getting loans to buy big-ticket items more expensive. The intention is to reduce business purchases, reduce the number of people being paid, and increase the cost of borrowing to buy

things like houses, cars and

the Federal Reserve is how to slow the economic train down a bit without causing it to stop. Current interest rates are what economists call "stimulative" in that short term rates are still carrying less interest cost than the rate of inflation. The clear intention of the Fed is to get rates up to at least neutral by the end of the year and then take them a bit higher in 2023 to slow things down. That is a great plan in theory, but then along came Hurricane Ian, smashing its way across a big part of our economy. The impact of Ian alone is estimated to cut 0.3% off this year's GDP. On top of that, we are economically interlinked with China, the U.K. and Europe, all of which appear to be slipping into outright recessions.

Those things are all happening as the Fed tries to pull money out of the economy while gasoline prices are falling, providing more money for consumers to spend. Consumer confidence stubbornly keeps rising, suggesting that people are more likely to keep raising their spending, and in fact did increase household spending by 0.4% in August. Once more, good news is bad news. To slow down spending, the Fed has a lot of work ahead of it, and the fear is that it will go too

Are we likely to have a recession? With the arrival of Ian, our answer has turned to "yes." We still do not see evidence of a major economic contraction, rather we see an amazingly strong U.S. economy, plenty of cash in reserve, and a likely shake out that will precede good growth in the years to come.



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



# **Bicycling with Butterflies**

# **Dykman follows route of Monarchs** from Mexico to Canada and back Stops for book-signings in Salado

After biking 10,201 miles from Mexico to Canada and back, Sara Dykman (37) became the first person to cycle the entire route of the migrating monarch butterflies. This fall she returns to the road, this time on a motorcycle, to celebrate monarchs and the publication of her book, Bicycling With Butterflies (Timber Press, April 2021).

Dykman will be traveling through Kansas, Oklahoma, and Texas, before continuing south to the monarchs' overwintering grounds in Michoacan, Mexico. She will be stopping along her route to speak on behalf of monarch butterflies, whose population has seen dramatic declines in recent years. "I want to give the monarchs a voice," Dykman explained. "I want people to know that they can help monarchs by planting milkweed, which is the only food source for the monarch caterpillars."

Dykman will be at Salado Public Library at 1 p.m. Oct. 7 to speak about her adventures, monarch conservation, and how everyone can help the migration. Her presentation is open to the public. Copies of Bicycling With Butterflies will be available for sale and signing.

She will also be at the Salado Civic Center at 2 p.m. Oct. 8 to make a presentation and sign books.

About Sara Dykman

Sara Dykman is the founder of beyondabook. org. She works in amphibian research and as an outdoor educator. She hopes her own adventures—walking from Mexico to Canada, canoing the Missouri River from source to sea, and cycling over 80,000 miles across North and South America (including the monarch migration trip)—will empower young and old to dream big.

This deal, which occurred in a duplicate game many years ago, is most remarkable in that a different result was achieved at nearly every one of the 13 tables where it was played.

When North-South bought the contract, they played in four, five or six hearts, or five or six clubs, doubled in some cases. When East-West played the hand, they were in five or six spades, doubled in every case.

The North-South pairs who bid and made slam in hearts earned the best scores in their direction. The East-Wests who sacrificed in five or six spades achieved good scores, going down 200 or 500 to prevent the opponents from making a vulnerable game or slam.

Only one East-West pair found the way to set six hearts. The bidding went as shown, with West deciding not to sacrifice against six hearts because he thought he had a reasonable chance to defeat the slam. And defeat it he did. He boldly led the deuce of spades at trick one, taken by East with the queen. The fact that West had underled the ace of spades — a highly risky maneuver against a slam — was not lost on East, who was certain that his partner had a very good reason for such an unusual lead.

He therefore resisted the natural impulse to try to cash the ace of diamonds. Had he played the ace, of course, South would have ruffed and taken the rest of the tricks to make the slam. Instead, demonstrating supreme faith in his partner, East returned a club, fully expecting his partner to be void in that suit. West happily ruffed to defeat the slam, and the defenders earned themselves a well-deserved top score.


# **Shopping Map of Salado**

# **Eagles fall to undefeated** Hitchcock Bulldogs, 35-30

Hitchcock Bulldogs scored on the last play of the first half and on their first possession of the second half, which gave them enough of a cushion to withstand a 21-point second half effort by the Salado Eagles and win 35-30 in a neutral game Oct. 1 at Merrill Green stadium in Bryan.

The touchdown at the end of the first half came with no time left on the clock as Hitchcock lined up at the Salado 23-yard line with four seconds left to play. LLoyd Jones scrambled away from pressure and found Damien McDaniel in the end zone. Grant Thiem converted the pointafter to give the Bulldogs a 21-9 halftime lead.

battled teams through most of the first quarter — in fact through most of the game - before the Bulldogs scored on an 80-yard pass from Jones to McDaniel with 4:16 left.

Salado answered in the second on a 22-yard field goal by Daniel Chtay, which capped a 42-yard drive that took 16 plays. Seth Reavis returned the Hitchcock kick 27 yards to get into Bulldog territory. Salado faced a third-and-2 at the Bulldog 2-yard line, but Kase Maedgen was caught in the backfield on a screen pass, forcing the fourth down. The Eagles settled for Chtay's field goal.

Salado would take their only lead of the game after the Eagle defense stopped the Bulldogs at their own 26-yard line, taking advantage of a 22-yard punt.

Luke Law and Kase Maedgen moved the ball forward and Law hit Caden Strickland for a 17-yard pass in the scoring drive. Maedgen bulled his way for 2 yards on a fourth-and-1 and scored on the next play on a 5-yard dive with 4:26 left in the half. The Bulldogs blocked Chtay's pointafter kick, leaving Salado with a 9-6 lead.

Hitchcock scored twice over the next 4:26. Chase Bruton returned the ensuing kick off 39 yards to the Salado 40-yard line to give the Bulldogs great field position. Hitchcock took advantage of it by scoring six plays later on a 9-yard pass from Jones to McDaniel. The PAT gave Hitchcock a 14-9 edge with 1:43 left to play.

Drew Bird returned the ensuing kick off 24 yards to give Salado the ball at their own 41-yard line. Bird carried the ball into Bulldog territory but coughed it up as he was tackled, recovered by Zack Pruden with 52 seconds left in the half.

Jones found Cole Fisher for two first down passes. setting up the Bulldogs at the Eagle 23-yard line with four seconds left in the first half. He hit McDaniel over the Salado defender for the TD with no time left on the clock. The PAT kick gave the Bulldogs a 21-9 lead.

The Bulldogs extended that lead on the opening drive of the second half, on a 74-yard pass from Jones to McDaniel. The PAT kick made it 28-9 with 10:14 left in the fourth.

Salado answered on the next series, scoring on a 19yard run by Law with 7:28 left in the third. Chtay's kick made it 28-16.



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


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# Ladies make it 10-in-a-row!


# Swimmers set records

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

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


