# 1,000 acre property holds One Day Land Sale Oct 15

Southland Marketing and Development, Inc. marketed and conducted a one-day Land Sale for a 1,000+ acre development off of FM 2843 just west of Mustang Creek Ranch on property formerly owned by Double B Wildlife Ranch.

Southland brought potential buyers from as far away as California to purchase 2.5 acre lots for as low as \$49,900 and creekfront (Mustang Creek) estate lots marketed at \$139,900 (https://landsales.southlandgrp.com/texaslandsale).

The Village of Salado got a couple of calls about Salado after the initial out-of-state marketing campaign by Southland launched, prior to the one-day land sale.

On the morning of Oct. 15, two large tents were set up on the old Tyler house property to welcome the potential buyers who had to book appointments through the website or by calling Southland at 877-717-5263.

Large off-premise signs were placed around the Village on Main St. and the interstate access roads, which the Village directed the company to take down because they were in conflict with the sign ordinance.

Potential buyers were taken out to the property by customer representatives to view the property, which included a 6,142 sq. ft. residence which may be the "luxurious clubhouse with guest suites, pool, fitness room, hot tub and relaxing lounges both indoor and out" marketed on the website. The website also promotes a 14-acre park and lake on the property.

The marketing website also states that the development includes "underground power and water with a beautiful Boulevard entrance for easy access."

At the one-day Land Sale, customer representatives took reservation payments of 20% on proposed lots until the subdivision is

platted, water supply issues resolved and infrastructure completed.

No concept design or plat has been submitted to the Village of Salado. The property is in the extra-territorial jurisdiction of the Village of Salado and any proposed subdivision would have to be approved by the Village of Salado.

The marketing material on the development says that it will have community water, rather than each owner drilling their own water wells like those at Hidden Springs

The property sits in the Certificate of Convenience and Necessity (CCN) of the City of Georgetown, which took over the now-defunct Chisholm Trail Special Utility District. Phone calls and emails to the utility department at Georgetown were made by Salado Village Voice with no response.

If the subdivision cannot be served by the City of Georgetown, the developer will have to form its own water service provider after being released from the CCN of Georgetown.

That water service provider will have to apply for a permit for a large well from the Clearwater Underground Water Conservation District (CUWCD).

The property is owned by Mor-Maur Mustang, LLC.

On June 7, Mor-Maur Mustang, LLC purchased three parcels totaling 1,105 acres from Double B Wildlife Ranch. Mor-Maur Mustang, LLC principal is James Kerby, a well-known Austin-area developer.

Kerby is a central Texas developer whose projects have centered around golf course communities in the Austin lakes region.

Among Kerby's developments are these:

• Bayplace, a 750-acre development at Horseshoe Bay that included an 18-hole golf course (partnering with Douglas Jaffe and Russell Parker) in the early

2000s

- Flint Rock Falls, a golf course and residential development that began in 2002 in the Lakeway area.
- Forest Creek, a master planned golf course community in Round Rock.
- Rocky Creek Ranch, a 396-home development that went bankrupt before any homes were built in the 2008 recession and housing bubble. Rocky Creek Ranch was bought by Hillwood Communities in 2012 and finally developed.

In addition to the Salado development, Kerby is actively developing a 245-home development on 452 acres in Marble Falls, according to a news release from the Texas A&M University Real Estate Research Center.

The Austin Business Journal reported that the Marble Falls development was given zoning approval in March 2022. (https://www.bizjournals.com/austin/news/2022/03/07/thousand-oaks-marble-falls-rezoning.html)

Kerby is also developing Lakeside Meadows, a 420 acre mixed use urban development south of Lake Pflugerville that will include a corporate campus, industrial, office, commercial, single family residential and multi-family rental. According to a report in the Austin American-Statesman, mixed use commercial could include up to 45 residential units per acre with minimum building heights of four stories. Single family residences would have a density of 10 per acre, according to the Statesman report (https://www.statesman.com/story/news/local/ pflugerville/2022/01/13/ pflugerville-officials-discuss-rezoning-changeslakeside-meadows-project/6510930001/)

If this development is a few hundred lots, it will add to the inventory of developments already on the books in Salado.

# Feds want economy to cool down, but not crash

The S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) for the week ending on the 14th declined 1.55% to close at 3583.07. That leaves the SPX down 25.24% from its high in early January, and about 20% lower than at this time last

On the other hand, it is also over 60% higher than it was in March of 2020 and 21% higher than it was three years ago. Whether the market is up or down depends entirely on your time frame. Our other index, the CRSP Mid-Cap Value Index fell 0.29% to close at 2117.73 and is now down 18.46% this year. Once again, reading the headlines a person could easily have imagined that there was a market crash Thursday morning, followed by a major bull market surge on that same day. The reality though was that not much changed. The stock market seems to have priced in the economic drag caused by an anticipated 0.75% interest rate increase at the Fed meeting in November and further rises after that taking short term rates to the upper 4% range.

Reflecting the fact that interest rates are driving the train in market actions, the yield on the 10-year U.S. Treasury note surged past the 4% line three times in the week before finally stabilizing at 4.025%. Unfortunately, the 2-year yield rose to 4.48% leaving the Treasury yield curve still quite inverted and warning of a recession, probably next year. Much of the volatility in bond yields and prices, which move inversely to the yield, was the amazingly volatile and dysfunctional pricing of bonds (gilts) in the United Kingdom as the government there faces a major recession while inflation is in the double digits. Meanwhile the price per barrel of West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) fell slowly and steadily over 8% to \$85.61 despite threats by Russia and Saudi Arabia to cut oil production.



We have addressed this before, but the immutable law of supply and demand states that when demand exceeds supply, prices will rise. It takes years to increase supply in an economy as large and diverse as ours, so if we want the price increases to slow down, we need to reduce demand. The primary source of demand in our economy is consumer spending. With wages rising at 5% per year, it should not come as much of a surprise when the cost of goods and services are also rising at about the same rate. Why are wages rising at 5%? Well, companies are expanding and want to hire more workers than we have in the jobs market. Since the demand for workers is higher than the supply, the price, expressed as wages, rises. The Fed's job then is to reduce the demand for workers and that means slowing the growth of the companies that are doing the hiring. Expanding companies tend to borrow money to pay for the expansions. Higher interest rates on borrowed money

should slow things down. The complication is that there is a lot of momentum

an increase in interest rates to show up as slowed corporate expansion. So, the big question is, "How far will the Fed need to raise interest rates to slow things down and will they raise them too far, and bring the economy to a screeching halt?" Trying to guess what rate will slow demand without crashing the economy is as much art as it is science. The bright side to this is that the last time we had inflation this high, back in the early '80s, Chairman Volker fully intended to create a recession, and we got one. This time around, the members of the Federal Reserve Board are making it quite clear that they do not see a need for nor want a recession, but we might get one anyway.

Economists surveyed by Bloomberg put the odds of a recession in 2023 at 60% but there is good news to be found in the consensus of those economists. They also believe any recession we get will be relatively mild. There is more good news to be found in the fact that the stock market appears to have already priced in a mild to moderate 2023 recession. Since the traders who move the markets already were expecting a high inflation report and for the Fed to raise interest rates 0.75% in November to about 4%, with smaller increases thereafter and topping at about 4.75%, the CPI news this week resulted in very little change.

Despite all the hysteria, we remain optimistic for the longer term. As we have written before, the rest of the world wishes they had our problems of too many jobs, too much income, and an economy running too



# **High-speed Rail Is a Progressive Fantasy**

California sives tried to build a European-style high-speed rail network and alienated the French in the process.

A big New York Times piece on the rail project reports that the French, who wanted to work with California, decided the state was simply too dysfunctional and departed to help complete a high-speed line in Morocco instead.

The ongoing unraveling of California's rail plan is an object lesson in how infrastructure as eschatology is a bad idea. If transportation is conceived as a way to save the planet and fulfill a deep-seated, quasi-religious fixation rather than a means to move people around more efficiently, it is bound to fail. Throw on top California's politicized decision-making and regulatory and legal obstacles to building, and it's a formula for a boondoggle for the

No matter how high California has estimated the cost of the project, it hasn't been enough, even as almost nothing has been built. It started out at \$33 billion in 2008. Now, it's \$113 billion, with no one knowing where the funding is going to come from.

Not that the California experience will diminish the progressive ardor for high-speed rail. As far as its enthusiasts are concerned, it is like socialism -- never failed, just never truly tried.

President Barack Obama proposed an 8,600mile high-speed rail system, and Transportation secretary Pete Buttigieg wants the U.S. to be the "global leader" in high-speed rail.



let trains like windmills on rails, a symbol of enlightenment and modernity, a way to free ourselves from the selfish, small-minded tyranny of the automobile and adopt a sleeker, greener, more virtuous future.

Then, the wheel meets the rail. In California, it might have sounded appealing to build a high-speed rail link between Los Angeles and San Francisco -- if you abstracted the project from all the topographical and other difficulties. For political reasons, a less direct, less economical route between the cities was selected. And the decision was made to start building between the two megalopolises, in the Central Valley, creating the possibility that California may end up with a bullet train to and from nowhere.

Of course, we already have cheap, high-speed transport between population centers. It is called air travel.

As Randal O'Toole of the Cato Institute points out, planes cruise at roughly 500 miles per hour. The Amtrak Acela, on the other hand, has a top speed of 150 miles per hour. Yes, airplanes need infrastructure, but not expensive, complex new infrastructure all along their routes.

O'Toole notes that Japan's high-speed trains seemed like the future in the 1960's, when air travel was more expensive than

rail. Also, Japan's highspeed trains had a readymade customer base in the substantial proportion of the country's population that already traveled by

In the U.S. today, in contrast, the average cost per mile of traveling by air is cheaper than traveling by rail, and a minuscule 0.1% of all passenger travel is via Amtrak.

If we built the Interstate Highway System, why can't we build a comparable high-speed network? As O'Toole observes, the highway system basically paid for itself and accounts for a substantial 20% of the country's passenger-miles and a roughly comparable proportion of freight ton-

High-speed rail could never be a match. Even if you put aside the endemic cost overruns, the inevitable construction delays, and the considerable maintainable costs, it can only carry passengers, not freight.

While progressives swoon over high-speed rail as the shiny future, some other genuinely futuristic technology is likely to emerge. If the age of self-driving cars ever arrives, people will be able to experience a car more like a personal train, except unlimited by rails.

California hasn't created a railroad to the future but a warning to the rest of the country to avoid its delusion and folly.

# Salado Artist Ron Coleman paintings on display at CAC Nov. 5- Dec. 15

When Salado artist Ron Coleman tells people "I am color blind," it leads to a host of questions.

"What color is this?" they will say pointing to something," Coleman says. "'Why don't you wear the glasses for that purpose?' Or.... 'Did it just start one day or have you always been color blind?""

Art has been a passion for Ron for his entire life. But painting did not come along for a long time, he said.

"Growing up in Georgia, I only did pen and ink drawings," he said, "knowing that being color blind presented somewhat of a problem for my art teachers."

Colors were very important to him, but Coleman says "they seemed so very different from other people's views. My mother tried to help, but to no

Coleman recalls that even as a young boy "I would ride the bus to downtown Atlanta to art museums to see famous original works of art and to see the beautiful churches to look at the stained glass windows."

He credits A. D. Greer with getting him into painting. "I spent time with him at his home and at the end of the day, A.D. asked me if I painted. I said no because I was color blind. With a quizzical look on his face, he came very close to me and looked into my eyes and said, 'Can you read?'

Ron responded yes. "To which he said, "Then read the damn paint tube!" Ron said. "At that moment I thought this man is brilliant!"

Later Coleman realized that "after buying so many

different colors of paint, the words on each tube meant nothing," he said. "I just did not see them the same as other people."


With 50 tubes of paint and five blank canvasses, Coleman began to paint.

"The rules of art are elusive for me," he said. "Colors resist coloration for me, they deliver what is seen at the time of transition to the canvas."

"Some colors are adventures, some new sensations, some strangers," he says. "Some paintings have meaning with the presentation, for others the meaning must be found within the viewer. Every painting is unique and original."

Coleman works from his home studio in Salado. His paintings have been shown at the Texas State Capitol in Austin and are in private collections across the country and internationally.

His original art will be on display in Nov. 5-Dec. 15 in the Saulsbury Gallery at the Cultural Activities Center in Temple. An opening reception will be 5-7 p.m. Nov. 5 followed by a Hayes Carll concert at 7:30 p.m.







Assume you become declarer at four spades on the bidding shown and West leads the K-A-Q of hearts. After you ruff the third heart, it might seem that all you can do is draw trump, play a diamond from dummy, finesse the ten and later lead another diamond from dummy and finesse the jack. If you do this in the actual case, though, you'll go down one, since West has

both the king and queen of diamonds.

You could lament your bad luck in finding West with both diamond honors, but in truth the outcome would be your own fault because you overlooked a superior line of play.

Since the only danger to the contract is the possibility of losing two diamond tricks, you should search for and then implement a line of play that might eliminate the risk factor inherent in taking two finesses.

Accordingly, at trick four you should cash the ace of clubs, then ruff a club in dummy. Next you ruff dummy's last heart before ruffing your last club.


As a result of these preliminary maneuvers, dummy's hand and your own have no more hearts or clubs. You then cash the K-A of trump and lead a diamond from dummy, and, after East follows low, you finesse the ten.

West wins with the queen but finds himself without recourse. His last three cards are the K-5 of diamonds and jack of clubs. If he returns a diamond into your A-J, he hands you your 10th trick, and if he returns the jack of clubs instead, you ruff in dummy and discard the jack of diamonds from your hand to produce the same


# **Shopping Map of Salado**

The Lady Eagles swept Waco La Vega at home on Oct. 11 26-6, 25-12, 25-9.




the 37-14 final.




