Few surprises in Texas or Bell County elections

Republicans continued to maintain control in Texas and in Bell County, returning U.S. Rep John Carter (D-31), every state-level offical and county officials, with the exception of Bell County Commissioner Precinct 4 and Bell County Justice of the Peace, Precinct 4, Place

U.S. Rep. Carter faced no Democrat challenger in the Nov. 8 election. He did defeat Republican challengers in the March primaries.

Texas Gov. Greg Abbott defeated Beto O'Rourke by taking 4.4 million votes to O'Rourke's 3.5 million. In Bell County, Abbott netted 59% of the vote with 51,677 while O'Rourke had 34,590.

Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick beat Democrat challenger Mike Collier by a similar margin of 4.3 million to Collier's 3.5 million. In Bell County, Lt. Gov. Patrick had 50,375 votes to Collier's 33,550.

Ken Paxton was re-elected Texas Attorney General with a 4.3 million vote tally compared to challenger Rochelle Mercedes Garza's 3.4 million total. In Bell County, Paxton had 49,635 votes compared to 33,983 for Gar-

Glenn Hegar was reelected State Comptroller with a statewide tally of 4.5 million votes while Democrat challenger Janet. T. Dudding had 3.3 million. Hegar had 51,569 votes in Bell County, compared to Dudding's 32,267.

Republican Dawn Buckingham, who has represented Salado and Bell County in the Texas Senate, will be the next Land Commissioner, winning with 4.5 million votes, while Democrat Jay Kleberg had 3.3 million votes. In Bell County, Buckingham had 51,227 votes compared to 33,682 for Kle-

Sid Miller was re-elected Ag Commissioner with 4.5 million votes. Challenger Susan Hays had 3.5 million votes. In Bell County, Miller had 52,054 votes while Hays had 33.951.

Wayne Christian was reelected Railroad Commissioner with 4.4 million votes. Democrat challenger Luke Warford had 3.2 million votes, Libertarian Jaime Andres Diez had 238,654votes and Green Party candidate Hunter Crow had 85,191. In Bell County, Christian had 50,682 votes, Warford had 31,645, Diez had 2,760 and Warford had 832.

Bell County voters also re-elected its two Republican State Representatives. Dr. Brad Buckley, of Salado, was re-elected to District 54 over Democrat challenger Johnathan Hildner by a wide

margin: 24,677 to Hildner's 14,493. Hugh Shine was reelected to House District 55 over Tristian Sanders by a 28,792 to 18,333 margin.

Bell County voters returned Bobby Whitson as Commissioner, Precinct 2 with 12,815, while Democrat challenger Stacey Wilson had 10,693.

Village sets historic overlay hearing for Nov. 15

A five-member citizen task force has proposed an overlay district ordinance that is intended to ensure that new development within the Village's Historic District (the "District") will complement and build on the existing historic architecture, character, and integrity

of the District.

The proposed ordinance addresses development regulations such as setbacks and building size, while at the same time defining allowable land uses in the subject area. Properties on and adjacent to Main Street and Royal Street, as well as proper-

ties along West Village Road and a portion of Thomas Arnold Road, would be governed under the proposed ordinance.

The regulations set forth in the proposed ordinance would establish additional standards and criteria for the covered properties, in addition to those standards of the base zoning districts of the covered properties.

Prior to moving forward with consideration of the proposed ordinance, the Salado Board of Aldermen would like to hear from the public on the ordinance. A public meeting will be held

on Nov. 15 where the Village staff will provide an overview of the proposed ordinance, gather public input and answer questions. The public meeting will begin at 6 p.m. at the Salado Municipal Building located at 301

N. Stagecoach Road. The public is encouraged to attend the meeting, especially the owners of those properties that would be subject to the proposed ordinance, if approved.

U.S. inflation stuck at 5%, half of rate EU faces

The S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX), representing the stock market, slipped, and slid up and down for the week that ended on Nov. 4, but finally came to rest at 3770.55, down 3.35%. To again put that in perspective, it leaves the Index down 21.33% from its high point in early January, but up 5.24% from its recent bottom. It also is up about 69% from where it was in March of 2020 and up 26% from three years ago, giving it an average rate of return for the trailing three years of over 8% per year. Its smaller cousin, the CRSP US Mid-Cap Value Index, only declined 0.68% for the week, to 2305.34 leaving it down just over 11% from its high as the year began. We should not overlook an item of good news in the stock markets, as the Dow Jones Industrial Average rose 14% in the month of October, its best monthly performance since 1976.

The yield on the benchmark 10-year U.S. Treasury note crept upward, rising to 4.17% at the end of the week. With the two-year note yielding 4.66%, the inversion of the yield curve with its inherent forecast of an incoming recession, continued apace. The price of West Texas Intermediate crude oil, jumped almost 5%, to \$92.60, driven by threats and suggestions that Russia would further curtail oil exports. Market observers warned of continued volatility as in China and the EU economies appear to be slowing toward recession, but in the U.S. demand remains high, while international supply is uncertain.

The Economy

As has been the case for the past several months, the economic news focus for the week was on what the Federal Reserve might do with interest rates as news was posted about the strength of the U.S. economy. Once more, what in different economic times would have

been hailed as "good news" drove markets down and was seen as "bad news". Employers added a seasonally adjusted 261,000 jobs in October. That would be a great number if we were looking to have more employed people who would spend more money in our economy, but since the concern is that we have too much money being spent, more people employed, and with good wages, becomes bad news. On the other hand, the unemployment rate slipped to 3.7%, a wee bit higher than in September as more people entered the job market.

Not only did our economy employ more people, but the Labor department also announced that the employment cost index was up 5% from this time last year, as employers competed for workers. Perhaps at least partially reflecting that rise in wages and employment, The Commerce Department reported that consumer spending increased by a seasonally adjusted 0.6% in September, an annualized rate of 7.44%, a number we are sure the Federal Reserve did not want to see. Then, the Fed's preferred measure of inflation, the Core PCE Index, also from the Commerce Department, came in at 5.1%, far above its 2% target. Personal income continued its rise at an annual rate of about 5%, so people are not about to run out of money. The only suggestion of good news was that those rates were not rising quite months ago.

With our inflation rate stuck at about 5% and the Fed set on raising short-term rates to about that same level or a bit more, investors ed real estate bubble looks more and more like it is collapsing.

and economists are unhappy, but our problems are literally less than half that of the European Union. The EU announced that inflation there surged to a record high of 10.7% in October. The European Central Bank promptly raised its short-term rates 0.75%, as did the Bank of England, and the Federal Reserve.

Whether you consider it good news or bad news, the Institute for Supply Management (ISM) reported their October services Purchasing Managers Index (PMI), a consistently reliable indicator of business activity for the next three to six months, stood at 54.4 for October. Considering that any number above 50 indicates growth, and that 55 is about as fast as that growth can be sustained, that is a high number. It is even more significant when we consider that a majority of our GDP is in services. High growth is once more not what the Fed wants to see.


The bottom line remains much the same. The U.S. economy is on a tear with rising employment, rising wages, relatively few job losses, and plenty of fuel to keep going for some time. The contrast is stark between here and the economic indicators coming out of China and the EU. We do have an inflation problem, but it is less than half as bad as that in Europe and while we are likely to have some sort of recession next year, China may already be in one, and it is looking worse with each passing month as their government-supported real estate bubble looks lapsing.

Assume you're in four spades and West leads the nine of clubs. How should you proceed? If you're an impulsive player, you cover the nine of clubs with the ten, East follows low, and regardless of what you do from this point on, you eventually lose two

Opening lead — nine of clubs.

hearts and two diamonds to finish down one.

But if you're a more cautious type, you make the contract. You play low from dummy on the club lead, take the nine with the ace, cash the A-Q of trump and then return a club to dummy's ten to force out the king.

This method of play guarantees the contract regardless of how the adverse cards are divided, as it assures you of scoring six spades, three clubs and the ace of hearts. All East-West can score is a club and two diamonds, since your two heart losers can be discarded on dummy's clubs, with dummy's king of spades serving as the entry.

The big test comes at trick one, when you must resist the impulse to cover the nine of clubs with the ten. This would avert a club loser, but it would leave you with four potential losers in two other suits.

The hand dramatically illustrates the vital importance of planning the play before making any move from either hand at trick one. That is the time when most contracts are won or lost, and that is the time when a little extra thought can produce substantial dividends.





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
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Shopping Map of Salado


Rich led the girls with 13 kills, followed by Haley Brown, 11, Morris, 9, Wilk, 8, Niu, 4 and Law, 3.

Damonte Foster led the Eagles defense with 9 tackles and a caused fumble. CJ Larremore followed with 7 tackles while Dildine made an interception in the game.



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
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SMS students plant native garden on campus



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


