## Looking back at 2022

"The building is gone, but the Church ain't got a scratch on it," Pastor Billy Borho said.

These words spoken by Pastor Borho just days after an EF-3 tornado tore his church, Victory Baptist Church, down to its foundation, have expressed the resilience of Salado in 2022.

Borho has been Pastor of Victory Baptist Church for 43 years. The Victory Baptist Church building on FM 2843 in Cedar Valley is one of three local country church buildings that were destroyed by an EF-3 tornado that ripped through the southern part of Bell County April 12.

Only the foundation was left of Victory Baptist Church. Nearby, First Cedar Valley Baptist Church was destroyed by the 165 mph winds of the tornado, except for the cross.

"Everything was destroyed but that cross," Pastor Donnie Jackson said, pointing to it for Governor Greg Abbott who came to visit the tornado stricken area on April 16.

Jackson said that the Church itself "is stronger than we've ever been before."

"There is no force of nature more powerful than Texans helping Texans, and together we will rebuild communities affected and help them come back stronger than before," Abbott said.

The April 12 tornado damaged 76 structures in bell County, 70 of which were homes. There were 25 injuries with 12 residents transported to local hospitals.

Salado Strong raised \$93,605.86 for relief of families affected by the April 12 Salado tornado.

Shortly after the tornado, singer Brandon Rhyder contacted KD Hill at Barrow Brewing Co. about doing a fundraiser there.

Hill contacted the Salado Family Relief Fund, a local 501(c)3, to be the recipient of the funds. Salado Family Relief Fund can trace its roots as a 501(c)3 to another tornado, 25 years ago, the Jarrell tornado.

### **D**ROUGHT **C**ONCERNS

Salado and most of Texas have struggled through one of the worst droughts in memory this year.

In June Clearwater Underground Water Conservation District entered into Stage 2 of its Drought Management Plan, recommending a 20% reduction in water usage by all well owners (both exempt and permitted wells). "The aquifer system layer known as the Edwards BFZ is experiencing significant drawdowns in monitor wells and a drought trigger-based rate of reduction in Spring flows below 10.408 cubic feet per second," CUWCD General Manager Dirk Aaron said.

Due to severe drought conditions in the area, Clearwater Underground Utility District and the Brazos River Authority have asked Salado Water Supply Corporation to reduce its daily usage by 20%

Stage 2 makes outside watering restrictions mandatory and prohibits use of water for aesthetic water features.

Addresses ending in odd numbers may water on Tuesday and Friday while addresses ending in even numbers are allowed to water on Monday and Thursday.

According to the Drought Contingency Plan, "Salado WSC will vigorously enforce violations of the Drought Contingency Plan."

### FIRES IN SALADO

Due to the dry conditions, Bell County enforced a burn ban throughout the summer. The County enacted a fireworks ban for the July 4 holiday but relented after rains and allowed some use of fireworks in the unincorporated areas of the county.

Salado fire department responded to several grass and brush fires this summer, including a brush fire Aug. 5 off of Royal St. that threatened but did not spread to any residential structures in Mill Creek. The fire consumed 5.4 acres. Salado fire received assistance from Belton, Jarrell, Holland, Bartlett, Little River, Bell County Emergency Management, Texas Forest Service, and Nation Forest Service with personnel and assets from Kentucky, South Dakota, Tennessee, Wyoming, and Oregon. The following afternoon, Salado responded to a car fire on I-35. There were no injuries. On Aug. 8, they assisted Belton Fire at a brush fire at Fox and Elmer King that was 13 acres. No structures were involved.

Salado firefighters were called out for a structure fire overnight of Dec. 20-21. When they arrived at the fire at 110 N. Main St. (housing Wild Angels boutique) at about 4:45 a.m. Dec. 21, the wooden building was fully engulfed. The fire department was able to save the building next door Salado Creek Jewelry, which suffered some damage to its ceiling and exterior wall.

Salado VFD announced in 2022 that Jim Franz would take over as Fire Chief while Shane Berrier would become Assistant Chief. Berrier served as volunteer Chief for almost a decade and led the effort for the approval of Bell County Emergency Services District #1, which funds the Salado VFD budget and equipment purchases. The ESD received its first new vehicle funded by taxpayer dollars in August 2022.

### COVID-19

COVID-19 continued to make the news in 2022

In January, Bell County Public Health District changed the COVID-19 Threat Level from Level 3 (Moderate) to Level 2 (Significant) due to the increasing incidence rate.

At the same time, Salado ISD closed classes for Jan. 19-21 in reaction to a spike in COVID-19 cases in the classrooms.

"Our COVID-19 numbers are at an all-time high with our elementary school and middle school now over 5% COVID-19 positive within the last seven days," Dr. Novotny stated.

More than a quarter of Salado ISD employees were diagnosed in a seven-day period, resulting in the short term class closure.

Bell County saw a second spike in COVID during the summer vacation.

In July, the Bell County Public Health District recently raised the Community Burden Level to High. The Community Level was raised SEE 2022, PAGE 4A

# Existing home sales fell 32% in Nov., prices likely to see decline in 2023

The Markets

On this, the penultimate week of a very tumultuous 2022, the U.S. stock market, represented by the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) continued in its bipolar surges up and down as if not knowing good news from bad. In the end though, it wound up almost exactly where it started, closing out the week at 3844.82, down a mere 0.2%. We think it must be difficult to be a stock trader intent on selling as the threat of recession rises and buying on hopes of a soft landing. Any economic news suggesting the economy is doing well might mean that the Federal Reserve will overreact and push us into a recession but any bad news that the economy is slowing might be the leading edge of the much feared and forecast recession. This week's small move left the SPX 19.78% lower than its high in early January but 71% higher than it was back in March of 2020, and 18% higher than it was three years ago on Christmas Eve in 2019. Our other market indicator, the CRSP US Midcap Value Index, closed out the week at 2346.56, up 0.67% for the week, but still down 9.65% for the year.

The benchmark 10-year U.S. Treasury Note ended the week yielding 3.75%, about 7% higher than last week, but still substantially below the 4% (+) yields it had in October. The infamous Treasury yield curve remained stubbornly inverted with the 6-month note paying 4.67%. West Texas Intermediate crude oil prices inched upward all week, rising about 7% to \$79.66 per barrel. That price, interestingly enough, is almost exactly where it was last year at this time, despite its rise to over \$120 per barrel in June.

The Economy

The economic pundits remained focused on their often-vain attempts to forecast what the Federal Reserve was or was not going to do with interest rates in 2023. In the background some solid data was reported this week that strongly indicated that any signs of a pending



things, US existing home sales fell an astounding 32% in November and now have been falling for ten consecutive months. The price of homes has held up reasonably well, but falling sales are a strong indication that home prices are likely to see a serious decline in the next year or so. The Chinese economy continued to show signs of stress as work and production was interrupted by what appears to be a severe and widespread outbreak of COVID-19 that is overwhelming hospitals and reportedly resulting in bodies being stacked outside designated COVID treatment centers.

The underlying U.S. economy remains on a roll with little sign outside of housing of anything even vaguely looking like an impending recession. Inflation appears to be abating to healthy levels. Even the formerly kinked supply chains look to have mostly returned to their normal functioning. The Federal Reserve continues to apply the brakes but at least is no longer increasing rates at three-quarters a percent each month. Once again, America seems to be the exception as a global recession is taking shape just about everywhere else. We remain guardedly optimistic as we wish for you and yours a very happy holiday season and a safe, prosperous, and rewarding year to

### 'Independent State Legislatures' can't shred Constitutional rights

Are state lawmakers free to ignore the results of a presidential election?

Can they — in defiance of a state's own constitution — design its congressional districts so a minority of voters pick a large majority of the state's representatives?

Can they discard voting rules written into law by voters themselves?

In other words: Can state legislatures flout the basic principles of American constitutional democracy and destroy majority rule?

Yes, says the state of North Carolina, with the support of Republican attorneys general from other states — and many of those who conspired to overturn the 2020 election — in a case now before the U.S. Supreme Court.

No, say bipartisan groups of election officials, judges, lawyers, election experts, 50 chief justices of state supreme courts, members of redistricting commissions, and historians.

But what say the justices of the U.S. Supreme Court?

Three of them — Justices Clarence Thomas, Samuel Alito, and Neil Gorsuch — seem to agree. If they can win over two of the remaining three right-wingers, our democracy will be in deep trouble.

The case arose in 2021 when the Republican North Carolina legislature gerrymandered their congressional districts.

Though North Carolina voters are about equally split between the two parties, the GOP's re-districting plan

gave the party three-quarters of the state's congressional seats. The North Carolina Supreme Court rejected the scheme, holding that it violated the state constitution's guarantee of free elections.

Republicans went to federal court, asserting that state court judges — and voters — have no power over anything a state legislature chooses to do regarding federal elections. They call it the "independent state legislature" theory. Legal experts call it bogus.

The argument rests on Article I, Section 4 of the U.S. Constitution: "The Times, Places, and Manner of holding Elections for Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof, but the Congress may at any time by Law make or alter such Regulations..."

The provision does not say only state legislatures control federal elections, nor that courts cannot intervene, as the plaintiffs argue. It certainly does not say state law-makers can ignore their state constitutions, which created state legislatures in the first place, or override the rights of their own citizens under state law.

We wouldn't apply a standard like this to other parts of our Constitution.

Consider, for example, the First Amendment, which states: "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the

Government for a redress of grievances."

The First Amendment only speaks of Congress. But that doesn't mean the president is free to shut down newspapers that criticize him, that judges can decide praying in some churches is okay and not in others, or that the police can forbid peaceful demonstrations

Likewise, the power of legislatures to prescribe voting procedures doesn't give them absolute, unreviewable dominion over elections

But some Republican politicians support the theory because they've given up on democracy. Instead of trying to win elections fairly, they seek to make it harder for people to vote and box them into districts where their votes don't matter.

And they want to lay the groundwork for overthrowing election results should they lose. The "independent state legislature theory" is just fancy legalese dressing for the kind of putsch Donald Trump tried to pull after the 2020 election, when he called on state legislatures to overturn federal election results.

If the right-wing Supreme Court justices embrace this latest effort to hinder free elections, then we must find a way to end their power to thwart American constitutional democracy.

### Trump's Miserable Month

So far, Donald Trump is having the worst campaign launch since Beto O'Rourke.

Like almost everything else he's done lately, his early announcement of his next presidential campaign has proved a flagrant political misjudgment.

A move that was supposed to demonstrate his strength is showing his weakness; a move that was meant to keep other candidates out of the race is an invitation to other candidates to get in; a move that was supposed to serve notice of his continued dominance of the party is pointing toward its potential end.

He's been eclipsed as an internet troll by Elon Musk, and as a vote-getter by Gov. Ron DeSantis.

He's managed to get the worst of both worlds -- he's been largely invisible at the same time that he's been involved in several damaging controversies.

His midterms got even worse, with the final thudding defeat of one of his prized political projects, Herschel Walker in the Georgia Senate runoff.

And Trump's entry hasn't boosted his poll numbers, or even stabilized them. He's continuing to slide versus DeSantis, with a couple of new polls showing him trailing the Florida governor in a hypothetical head-to-head matchup.

In short, it's hard to imagine how Trump could have had a worse monthlong run. Ordinarily one might say, as a way of exaggerating to emphasize the point,





that it only could have been worse if he had had dinner with a Nazi -- but, of course, he did that, too.

It's still early, and premature to count Trump out. Elected Republicans remain scared of him, and we still can't know if the only potential candidate to show strength against him, DeSantis, will run, or how he'd perform.

If Trump is going to win the nomination, though, it will involve recovering from his disastrous announcement and aftermath.

He clearly believed that the act of announcing in and of itself would be sufficient to cement his status as top dog. That was wrong, and it meant he never thought through the rather crucial question, "So you're a candidate -- now what are you going to do?"

There's been no media blitz. There's been no tour of the country. There's been no rollout of policy or any unifying theme.

If it's too early to make too much of the polls, the former president is still in a uniquely vulnerable place. It's one thing to be trailing if you are a new figure on the national stage who still has room to grow; it's another if you have universal name ID and everyone already has an extremely well-formed view of you.

It's going to be hard for

Trump to find a second act when his act hasn't changed since 2015. Besides, even if he purports to have turned a new leaf, who at this point is going to believe him?

He doesn't have easy levers to use to change the narrative. It's not as though he can have a good legislative session next year like the governors who are thinking of running or use his executive powers to pick useful fights.

There probably aren't even exciting new events he can hold to grab the attention of voters or the media. His signature, of course, are his rallies. They were fresh and new in 2015 and 2016, and quite powerful throughout his presidency and immediately afterward. Now, they are as old and familiar as a Rolling Stones concert.

What's been most damaging to Trump is that association with him in general and "Stop the Steal" in particular proved politically toxic in the midterms. Other Republicans can try to achieve distance in the future. But obviously Trump can't.

These things would have been true even if he hadn't announced already, but if he hadn't gotten in, people would have wondered if he'd instantly look stronger once he was actually in the race. Now, he's answered that question for his adversaries decidedly in the negative.

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
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

### Growth in 2022

Salado continues to see growth and 2022 is a dramatic example of it as Meadowcrest subdivision was built out in just a year and dozens of homes are going up in Drake's Landing and Eagle Heights, both of which were annexed into Salado.

Phase 1 of Water's Edge apartment complex in the Sanctuary development looked as if it would be ready to lease in January 2023, but that opening date will be later in the year. Phase 1 is 210 apartments.

After the Village approved amendments to the Development Economic Agreement, Master Development Agreement and Wastewater Development Agreement with Sanctuary, the development has applied for its first building permit for the single family residential phase off of Royal St. Expect to see the Public Improvement Districts approved for this major development in 2023.

The greatest change in the agreements is the length of term. In the original agreements, the term ends on the latter date of either 15 years after recording the final subdivision plat or 15 years after the last Certificate of Occupancy is issued for a commercial building.

Under the new amendment, the end term is December 1, 20421 with one extension of up to five years.

The amended agreement also sets a maximum amount on the Economic Development Grants, capping tax abatements at \$6 million and impact fee abatements at \$6 million.

The agreements didn't come without some difficulty this year as the Village threatened to rezone the portion of the Sanctuary that sits at the southeast corner of I-35 and FM 2268 to agricultural.

The Village annexed a portion of the Salado Center property at the northwest corner of I-35 and FM 2484. The Village approved an EDA that will allow a 100foot tall sign for the Quick Trip convenience store that will be built there in 2023.

Village aldermen also approved pursuing purchase of the 50,000 gallon per day wastewater treatment plant on the property.

Addressing growth and wanting to preserve Salado's historic character, aldermen are drafting an Historic District Overlay zoning change.

### LOCAL ELECTIONS

Michael Coggin was easily re-elected Mayor of Salado, Amy McLane was re-elected to the Salado ISD Board of Trustees and Nancy Mills Mackey was re-elected to the Salado Library District Board of Directors May 7.

Paul Cox and Jason Howard were re-elected to the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen in unopposed

Jim Reed was elected to a full three-year term on the Salado ISD Board, while Chris Diem was elected to

on the SISD Board,

Susan Starnes was also elected to a two-year term on the Salado Library board.

Two proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution also passed. Proposition 1 passed

with 1,121,860 voting in favor and 169,011 voting against. Proposition 2 passed

with 1,106,460 voting in favor and 197,960 voting against.

But the local election wasn't without problems.

Local election officials learned within minutes of early voting polls opening at 7 a.m. April 25 that there was an issue with the Salado Public Library District election, which has resulted in several registered voters in the Library District not being able to cast a ballot in that race at all.

In fact, it was the second voter of the day April 25, Salado ISD Superintendent Michael Novotny, at the Salado polling location to bring it to the attention of the election workers that the Library District race did not appear on the voting machine when he voted.

The issue was resolved, but not before 124 early voters cast ballots at the Salado location on the first day of early voting.

Bell County Elections Department printed paper ballots for voters living inside the boundaries of the Salado ISD and Salado Public Library District boundaries and mailed corrected paper ballots to those who requested them. These paper ballots were hand counted.

### ANNEXATION AND

### **D**ISANNEXATION

It wouldn't really be a year for Salado without a petition for disannexation or disincorporation.

This time, the disannexation petition was rejected by the Board of Aldermen at their July meeting. After the petitioners missed the deadline to get it on the May ballot, the petition was rejected for the November ballot because the metes and bounds description did not enclose the area completely.

Clearwater Underground Water Conservation District may annex part of western Williamson County at the request of petitioners in that area. The CUWCD will submit the petition at the Jan. 11 meeting and the board will consider putting it on the May 2023 ballot for those voters living in the proposed annexation area.

### **GENERAL ELECTION**

There were no real surprises in the November general election with Republicans winning the day.

At the national and state level, the following Republicans were re-elected: John Carter; U.S. Rep. Dist. 31; Greg Abbott, Governor; Dan Patrick, Lt. Gov.; Ken Paxton, Attorney General; Sid Miller, Ag Commissioner; Wayne Christian, Railroad Commissioner; Glenn Hegar, Comptroller; Dr. Brad Buckley, State Rep.



In many hands, the ability to count to 13 is all that is needed to find the winning play. Take this deal from a team contest where at both tables, South wound up in five diamonds doubled. Both declarers won the spade lead, played a diamond to the ace and then led a club.

At the first table, West feared that the club might be a singleton, so he put up the ace and tried to cash the ace of hearts. Declarer ruffed, conceded a diamond and claimed, discarding his losing spade on one of dummy's winners.

At the second table, West was not so quick to grab the ace of clubs at trick three. Instead, he reasoned as follows:

South was known from the bidding and play to this point to have started with eight diamonds, two spades (assuming East had seven for his preempt) and the club he was now leading. If he had only one club, then he had to have two hearts. In that case, West would eventually score tricks with the ace of hearts and king of diamonds, and East would get a spade trick since dummy's clubs could never be established. Thus, no harm could come from holding up the ace of clubs initially.

After West ducked, East played the nine of clubs on the king, beginning a high-low to show that he held only two clubs. Declarer's hand now became an open book: eight diamonds, two spades, three clubs and, therefore, no hearts.

South did the best he could by conceding a diamond to West's king at trick four, but West found a brilliant reply. After taking the trump king, he exited with a low club! Declarer won and led his last club to West's ace, whereupon West returned the ace of hearts. South ruffed, but eventually lost a spade to East for down one.

Observe that if West leads anything but a low club after winning the king of diamonds, declarer makes the contract.

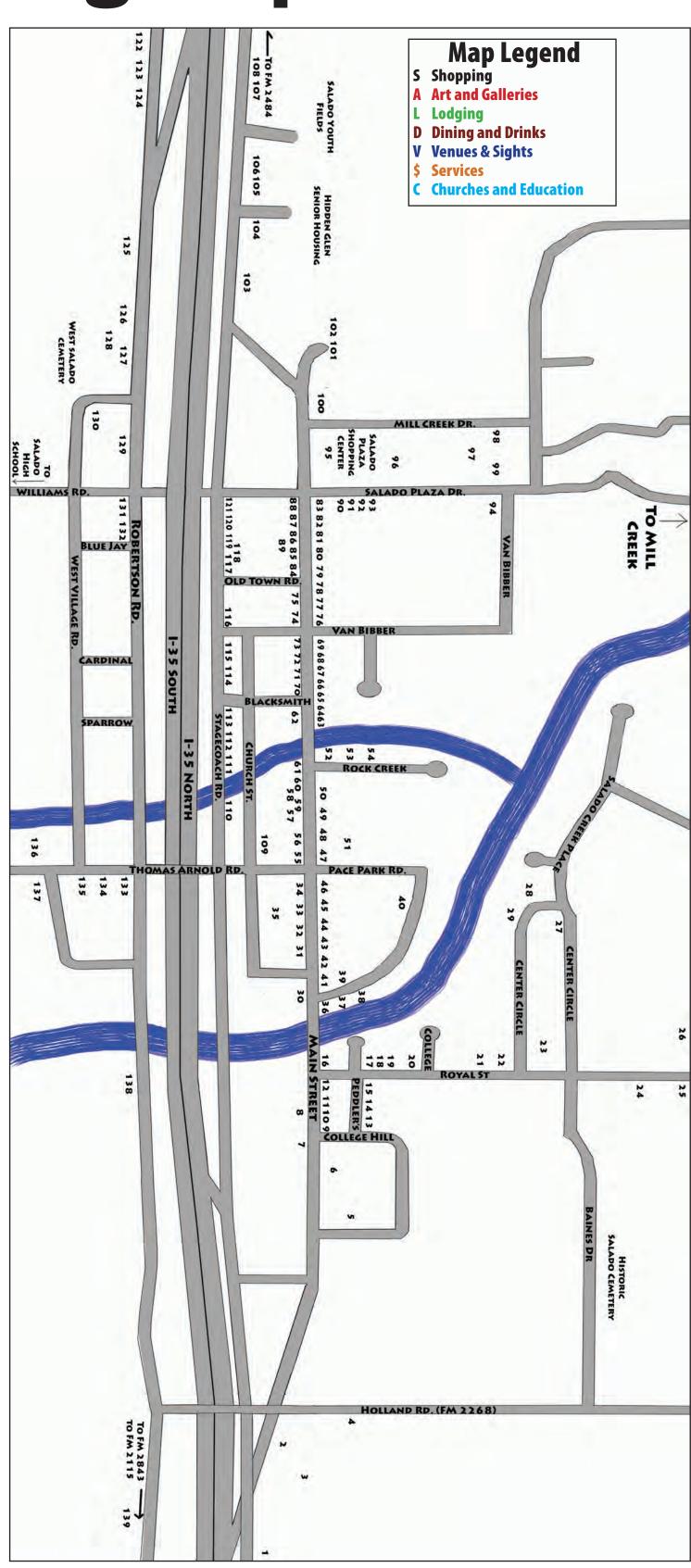
# **Shopping Map of Salado**

### Looking back at 2022 for Salado schools

Salado schools saw the departure of a hometown boy turned head football coach in 2022 with the departure of Alan Haire as the first head football coach of Killeen Chaparral High School. It also saw the arrival of a hometown boy turned head football coach this year with the arrival of Tom Westerberg.

Local cheerleaders marched in the legendary Macy's Thanksgiving parade and a local teacher got to experiment in zero gravity in 2022.

There were a lot of things to report on the schools this year. Here is a highlight!

### New Coach for Eagles

Alan Haire, after six seasons at the helm of Salado football, announced he was leaving to take the new head coaching job at Chaparral High School in Killeen.

Shortly after that, Salado High School alum Tom

Westerberg was hired to take over the reins of the Eagle football program.

The Eagles completely changed their offense, going from a slanting, running game to a spread out passing game. With new coaches and new schemes, the Eagles faced a daunting schedule and finished in fourth place in District 11-4A Div.

The Eagles fought the #4 Cuero Gobblers to a 7-7 tie in the first round of the playoffs, but the Gobblers scored in overtime to launch their State Semi-finalist run in the playoffs and end Salado's season at 3-8.

The Eagles played a 4A Div. 2 State Semi-Finalist (Cuero); a 4A Div. 1 State Finalist (Boerne), a 3A State Semi-Finalist (Malakoff) and a 3A Div. 1 Regional Finalist (Hitchcock). Two of those teams (Malakoff and Cuero) had to go into overtime to beat the Eagles.

Salado had six players named to the District 114A Div. 2 All District First



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
