### Planning group recommends upgrade in designation for several Salado roads KTMPO taking input on Thoroughfare Plan

Killeen-Temple Metropolitan Planning Organization (KTMPO) is taking public comment on its draft Bell County Thoroughfare Plan, a 40-page document that will be used in coming years for planning purposes by Texas Deepartment of Transportation and other governing entities that build road and street infrastructure.

The draft plan can be viewed in full at https://kt-mpo.org/planning/special-studies/ along with maps of existing roads and proposed roads.

The draft plan defines various types of roadways, to include Interstates, Major Arterial, Minor Arterial, Collector and Local.

Interstates: Bell County has two interstates, I-35 and I-14 with 57.72 total miles. There is no direct land access and facilities are designed to carry high volumes of traffic at high speeds over long distances.

Major Arterial Roads are access-managed roadways, characterized by considerable length roadways that provide continuity throughout the area. general design standards call for a 130' minimum right-of-way for a four-lane facility, with 160' desirable for six lanes. A travel lane width of 12' as specified is common for existing Major Arterials in the KTMPO region, but Complete Streets and Vision Zero guidance calls for narrowing travel lanes to 11' to slow traffic to speeds that are safer for all road users. According to the draft plan, there are 120.02 miles of Major Arterials in the county.

Minor Arterial are designed for fast, heavy traffic and are generally provided in a grid system. General design standards call for a minimum right-of-way of 80' for three lanes, increasing to 110' for four lanes. The desirable right-of-way is 120', which will accommodate five lanes. There are 128.74 miles of Minor Arterials in the county.

Collectors provide a greater balance between mobility and land access. With mobility as a less critical attribute, narrower lane widths of 11' are recommended, although widths as narrow as 10' are cited in Complete Streets and Vision Zero guidelines. Shared auto and bicycle outside lanes may be as narrow as 14'. Minimum right-of-way of 60' for two lanes and 70' for three lanes are listed in the guidance. For four lanes, a desirable right-of-way is 80'. There are 456.74 miles Major Collector roads and 110.05 miles of Minor Collector Roads in the county.

## **TEA tells Senate that schools will see enrollment decline**

After years of blockbuster student growth, Texas public school enrollment rates are forecast to go down for the next ten years, according to testimony offered by the state commissioner of education before the Senate Finance Committee earlier this month.

While COVID changed the trajectory of enrollment growth, Mike Morath told senators the big factor has nothing to do with the pandemic. "After the great recession of 2011, people started having fewer babies," he said. Morath described it as a "negative enrollment bubble" that's moving through Texas school populations, where each incoming class is a little smaller than the one before it. "Enrollment is actually going to begin trending negative on a net basis for the next decade in Texas because of this decrease in birth rates," said Morath. Though an individual district here or there may still be seeing robust growth, on the whole, all regions of the state are seeing the same decrease. National data, too, bears this out, with the National Center for Education Statistics forecasting a decline of around two million students enrolled in American public schools through 2030.

Texas Education Agency data shows that Texas has seen close to linear growth in student population for many years. Between 2012 and 2019, the state added almost half a million students, with a rough growth rate of around ten percent. In 2020, the pandemic drove enrollment rates down for the first time, though they snapped back to similar levels of growth starting in 2021. TEA is now projecting a small, but sustained decrease in student enrollment through 2025. It's a modest downturn, forecasting a decrease of about 50,000 students out of around 5.5 million, but it's a sharp change from the last 10 years. "For the last two decades, student enrollment in public school in Texas has been growing by leaps and bounds," said Morath. "We added probably 70,000 kids a school year for the better part of ten or fifteen years. To put that in perspective it's sort of like an Austin ISD-sized school system emerges from whole cloth every single year." He said that growth meant that the state had to increase spending on schools by hundreds of millions of dollars every year just to keep pace with current levels of per-student funding. This expected decrease in enrollment is all happening despite historic numbers of new residents moving to Texas from other states. "The people who move here have less kids than the people that are

here," said Morath. "Everybody is essentially having less children post-great recession than they were pregreat recession...this is a demographic shift." International net inbound migration is also down from a decade ago, he added.

Education spending makes up by far the largest chunk of the state budget, with nearly \$60 billion in discretionary state revenue -about 45 percent of all such money - going towards public and higher education over the next two years. A decrease in student population could have significant implications as lawmakers prepare a spending plan for the next biennium. "If enrollment is flat or declining, that actually provides appropriators far more flexibility in the next decade than you had in the last decade," Morath told members. Some of that flexibility is being exercised in the size of property tax cuts planned for the session, with \$15 billion being set aside in both the Senate and House budget drafts to lower local levies. With enrollment projected to go down, that means that the state can address property taxes while actually increasing per-student funding totals at public schools. "Comments that we don't have enough money because we're doing property tax relief, or we're not doing enough for schools, et cetera, when you look at the real numbers you see an

increase in a per-ADA (average daily allotment) level of funding by the state," said Houston Senator Paul Bettencourt.

### Salado ISD may buck statewide trend toward declining enrollment

While experts predict a statewide decline in enrollment, a drive around Salado ISD shows that the district is likely to buck that trend and in a big way.

To prepare for the projected growth, Salado ISD has formed a facility planning committee of 46 community members to begin meeting in March.

In the spring of 2022, the district contracted with Zonda Education for an in-depth demographic report looking at the past decade of enrollment and the projected enrollment for the next decade.

Zonda inventoried the existing and expected residential inventory in the district and calculated that by 2031-32 the district would have a total enrollment of 4,150 students.

Thomas Arnold Elementary has an enrollment of 1,021 in January 2023. The Zonda study predicts that Thomas Arnold Elementary (EE-fifth grade) will have an enrollment of 2,036 in 2031-32. Salado Middle School has a current enrollment of 590. The Zonda study predicts that Salado Middle School (sixth through eight grade) will have an enrollment of 982 in 2031-32.

Salado High School has a current enrollment of 701. The Zonda study predicts that Salado High School (ninth through 12th grade) will have an enrollment of 1,131 in 2031-32.

West Amity Duplexes: 36 total units.

Amity Estates: 235 total lots near build-out.

Sage Hill at Amity: 30 total future lots.

Hollow Ranch: 47 total lots.

Eagle Ranch: 350 total future lots.

Eagle Heights: 175 total future lots.

Stinnett Mill Estates: 80 total future lots

Callie Christina Estates: 11 total lots.

Salado Mills: 77 total lots, eight vacant developable lots (VDL).

Mill Creek Meadows: 121 total lots, 60 future lots.

Mill Creek Springs: 309 total lots; 194 occupied homes; 50 VDL and 65 homes under construction. Drake's Landing: 154 total lots.

Sanctuary:525 total future SF lots; 600 multi-family units. 210 MF being built now.

Windmill Estates:120 total future lots.

Flint Ridge Estates: 230 total future lots.

Armstrong Ranches: 280+ total future lots.

Armstrong Estates: 70 total lots.

Salado Center Project: 200 future lots. Age-restricted community with no district impact.

Jarrell Future Mixed Use: future development will be in both Jarrell ISD and Salado ISD. 1,200+ single-family lots; 500+ multi-family units in multiple complexes. No platting done, but Solana Ranch published intent to file a bill with the Texas legislature to form a Municipal Utility District.

After the study was completed, a developer applied to the Village of Salado for variances for a 300 lot single family residential development on FM 2484.

Also, Kerby Ventures announced at the end of 2022 that it would develop what is known as Mustang Springs at Salado, a 1,105.6 acre development that will ultimately have 500 homes and some multi-family and commercial development. Aldermen at their Feb. 16 meeting approved the construction plan and final plat for Phase 1 of Mustang Springs at Salado.

# Consumers increase spending 3% in Jan.

It was another bumpy, sideways-sliding week for the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX), our preferred, albeit flawed, indicator of what is going on in the U.S. stock market. The movement was up, but very rough through mid-day on February 16, then it dropped from around 4134 to around 4050. On Friday it crept back up to 4079.09 to end the week, down 0.25%. Putting that number in perspective, the SPX is, as of February 17, 6.24% higher than at the beginning of the year, up about 14% since mid-October, 82% higher than it was in March of 2020, and up about 23% over the last three years, from just before the pandemic-induced bear market of 2020. It remains though, down almost 15% from its high at the beginning of 2022. Our other stock market indicator, the CRSP Mid-Cap Value Index closed out the week at 2486.46, up 0.11% for the week, 6.28% year-to-date, and 14.4% from mid-October, but remains down 4.27% from its high last year.

The benchmark 10-Year Treasury note yield ended the week on the 17th at 3.82%, 2.14% higher than last Friday, but at about the same level it has been since last September. The Treasury yield curve became even more inverted with the 1-year note now yielding a full 5%, while at the other end of the maturity curve, the 30-year U.S. Treasury bond was only paying 3.88% per year. The Treasury bond market is saying, in effect, that market participants expect Treasury interest rates to run on at about 4% for the next several decades after peaking at around 5% a year from now. Those assumed rates are about 2.5 times the rates we have seen over the last decade and the assumption is creeping higher each week. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) prices

slipped about 4.4% for the week to \$76.33 with little change since last November.

### The Economy

All eyes, and certainly those of stock traders, were focused on the Consumer Price Index (CPI) report published by the Labor Department on Valentine's Day. The headline CPI was 6.4% higher than a year ago, which, while high, is not as high as the one-year numbers we saw last year. The month-to-month number was what jolted observers though. For the month of January, the CPI rose 0.8%. If that one-month figure were to continue for the rest of the year, it would mean that inflation was running at about 9.6%. Since the last 12 months only saw a 6.4% rise, or so the argument goes, then inflation rising at 9.6% means it is totally out of control and, logically, the Federal Reserve will have to force the economy into a full-blown recession to tamp it down. If we see those numbers remain high for a couple of more months, then we will have reason to be concerned. If, on the other hand, February's numbers come in lower, as they have for the past several months, then it was a blip.

The perception of higher inflation and therefore rates to come was reinforced by the Producer Price Index report, again from the Labor Department, as it was reported as having risen 0.6% in January. Again, that was a strange number, as it would indicate prices are rising at a 7.2% annualized rate, but the 12-month trailing rise in prices was only about 4.5%.

Either some strange force has suddenly supercharged inflation through the entire supply chain, something is wrong with the measurement formula, or there was a one-time factor at the beginning of this year. Yet another number released this week seemed to contradict the inflation figures. A lot of what we buy here in the United States is imported, and the U.S. Import Price Index for January fell 0.2% ,while the price we received for our exports rose 0.8%. Historically, import prices lead inflation, and import prices have been falling for months.

Then came the report that U.S. consumers, the drivers of our economy, increased their spending by a full 3% in January, one of the biggest jumps in 20 years. That followed a Labor Department report that hiring doubled that month, adding more than a half million jobs, up from 223,000 in December. Unemployment claims, after being stubbornly low last week, fell even further this week too. All that added to the signs that the U.S. economy remains at full steam ahead, despite the many published forecasts of an imminent recession.

The bottom line we get from all of this is that the

The Five former Memphis police officers were charged with murder over the death of Tyre Nichols but pled not guilty in their first court appearance.

The arrest of Mr. Nichols on January 7 has been reported throughout the national media.

They were fired after an internal investigation by the Memphis Police Department.

"Memphis and the whole world need to see that what's right is done in this case, and it needs to happen sooner rather than later," lead prosecutor Paul Hagerman told reporters.

The officers were arrested and taken into custody on January 26, after the Memphis police reviewed bodycam footage of the violent arrest.

In the footage, 29-yearold Mr. Nichols can be heard calling for his mother as he is beaten by police after being pulled over for alleged reckless driving. He was pepper-sprayed, kicked and punched by the officers and died in hospital three days later.

Memphis Police Chief Cerelyn Davis said the incident was "not just a professional failing", but "a failing of basic humanity toward another individual". (Source BBC news)

# Credit card holders get protection from fraud Shouldn't EBT users, too

A few years ago, someone stole my card information and took over \$100. You'd assume the bank or credit card company would reimburse that fraud, right?

Not for me, unfortunately. The skimmed card number was for my Electronic Benefits Transfer (EBT) card, which allows me to purchase food for my family through the federal SNAP program (formerly known as food stamps). Unlike credit and debit cards, EBT cards are not protected. Most of the time, if they're stolen we just lose that money - along with the food we were going to buy for our families with it. In December, Congress passed a new law so that victims of benefits theft can finally get reimbursed — but only if their benefits are stolen between October 2022 and September 2024. That leaves me out, and it's hardly reassuring about the future. If you have a credit or debit card, you may also take for granted that you can check your purchase history and balance online. You expect to be notified when there are suspicious charges. Unfortunately, EBT users can't count on this either. Since it's hard to check our balances, we may not know if the month's benefits have been loaded - or if money's been stolen until a cashier at the checkout line tells us there's no cash on our card. Imagine

#### that feeling.

I never planned to be on SNAP. But when restaurants took a big hit during the pandemic, my hours as a waitress were slashed just as the landlord spiked our rent. I lost our apartment and had to live with friends and family, cycling

The option to use an app is a godsend, but the right to do so isn't guaranteed and it's no substitute for the consumer financial protections that better-off Americans get.

The Consumer Financial Protection Bureau, or CFPB, is now updating its rules to ensure that consumers get control of their own financial data. But the update they're considering currently excludes low-income people who receive federal benefits from that protection. That's wrong. Forty-two million Americans who struggle to put food on the table receive SNAP benefits — and we deserve the same protections everyone else gets. The CFPB must include safety net benefit delivery cards in its new rules. That would help ensure we can choose the best tools to access our information and take advantage of the benefits we get with third-party apps like Providers. All of us deserve to be in charge of our own financial data – and protected from fraud and abuse. That's the point of consumer protection rules in the first place. Why should it be otherwise for a hard-working mom and her kids who have dreams, too?

U.S. economy is in probably better shape than at any point in the last half century. The one change we see unfolding is that the bond market and we agree that higher interest rates are likely here to stay for a long time and may get higher than most suspect.

It doesn't feel good to ask for help, but sometimes you have to for your kids. I applied for Section 8 federally subsidized housing and for SNAP.

And it's been a blessing. We got a good roof over our heads and food on the table. We moved to a better school district, where my kids could do sports and band after school — even summer camp.

Yet our safety net system still puts obstacles in our way. The more I make at work, the less assistance I get for my kids. But the increased pay doesn't nearly make up for the lost benefits. It's always a precarious situation to be low-income — and being excluded from consumer financial protections makes it harder.

Fortunately, new technology can help fill in these gaps.

I downloaded an app called "Providers," which lets me check my EBT card balance so I know if my balance is low, or if something is wrong, before I get to the cashier. It even provides budgeting help, highlights discounts and job openings, and explains where to get help during emergencies.

A.T. (Audrie Talmadge) Powell, age 78, passed away peacefully at home in Salado, Texas on February 10, 2023.

A.T. was born on July 19, 1944 to Carrie Lorene

(Black) Powell and Edward Talmadge Powell in Corsicana, Texas. There he rode Vespa scooters around town and loved and played music with his band The Monarchs. He graduated from Corsicana High School in 1962, where he was a very proud member of the Corsicana Tiger Marching Band, serving as band president his senior year.

He went on to study music and biology at Navarro Junior College graduating in 1964 with an Associate Degree. He then attended Stephen F. Austin State University, graduating with a BS degree in 1967. He was an active member of Phi Mu Alpha and Phi Delta Kappa. Shorty After graduating from SFA, he enlisted in the United States Air Force. He was stationed at Goodfellow Air Force Base, San Angelo, Texas where he served for four years. He was an Education Specialist at the Russian Language School and completed his commitment with the rank of SGT. During his time in the Air Force, he was part of a NASA experiment where he lived in an altitude chamber testing the effects of high altitude on humans for 60 days. This experiment was part of a research program for low orbit and extended space flight, which he continued to be interested in his entire lifetime.

After his time in the Air Force, he began his work as a Band director at Fairway Middle School. During this time he studied at Tarleton State University in the summer breaks and received his MS in education in 1977. He then moved on to become a band director at Manor Middle School and progressed to assistant principal. In 1982 he moved to Killeen High School and worked as an assistant principal until he became the principal at Rancier Middle School in 1986. He continued in this role until retirement in May, 2000. He loved to work at the KISD schools and worked with Herff Jones for years following while also working for the Texas State Board of Education.

A.T. was a long time member of the Killeen Rotary Club where he was a Paul Harris Fellow. He was an active member at Grace Lutheran church and served as Choir director for a time. Later he moved to Salado United Methodist Church as the Powells moved to live in Salado. He played in the Harker Heights Concert Band and Jazz Ensembles. He had several other bands playing around town. He was also a freelance instrument repairman bringing horns and woodwinds back to life for another year of use in school. A.T. loved model trains and was part of the Model Train Society who built massive layouts and elaborate realistic models together. He love boating and traveling to Islands and beaches around the world. He also loved Alaska and the calm that the wilderness and mountains provided him. He was a Vespa, Lambretta and Cushman fanatic and loved to restore these vehicles and ride on two wheels. Above all of these things, he loved his family most of all and cherished every moment with them. A.T. married his SFA girlfriend Cheryl Kay Lewis in 1968. They lived in San Angelo, Texas where they had a baby girl, Wendy Kay Powell in 1971. They moved to Killeen, Texas in 1972 and began their central Texas lives. "You are West, looking at a terrific hand. You are getting ready to do some serious bidding when South opens three spades. That is kind of annoying but, no choice, you bid the obvious four hearts. The auction continues with four spades by LHO, back around to you. Should you double? Probably not. Should you bid at the five-level all by yourself? No, that is crazy. So you pass.

"It is your lead. How about your singleton? No, that is unilateral. You make the normal lead of the heart ace. Partner signals with the seven. You continue with your king and everyone follows, partner playing the deuce. How do you defend? Think about where you will find the setting trick.

"The winning defense is for West to cash the club ace immediately and continue with the heart eight. It would be wrong for him to lead a heart honor, as this would tell East not to ruff. Leading your lowest heart will make it obvious for partner to ruff with his spade queen. Declarer will be forced to overruff, promoting your jack for the setting trick. This elegant play is called an uppercut.

"It was crucial to cash the club ace first. Suppose you led the eight of hearts at trick three. When partner correctly

(AUSTIN) – Texas families can lock in today's cost of undergraduate resident tuition and schoolwide required fees at Texas public colleges and universities by enrolling their children in the tax-advantaged Texas Tuition Promise Fund® before the close of the current general enrollment period on Feb. 28.

"It's never too early to start planning for a child's college education," Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar said. "The Texas Tuition Promise Fund has a range of payment options that gives Texans the flexibility they need to plan and provide future opportunities for their children, grandchildren and

other loved ones. Families will find that when it comes to planning for their children's future education, every little bit adds up and starting early can make a difference."

The Texas Tuition Promise Fund, the state's prepaid college tuition program, allows participants to prepay undergraduate resident tuition and schoolwide required fees by purchasing tuition units for a four-year degree, two years of community college or just a few semesters. For additional flexibility and portability, the plan also can be used at Texas medical and dental institutions, Texas private colleges and universities,
