West Williamson Co. seeks groundwater help

Public hearings set on Clearwater annexation

Clearwater Underground Water Conservation District will hold three public hearing in March to receive input from citizens in both Bell and Williamson Counties on the possible annexation of Western Williamson County into their jurisdiction.

The Clearwater UWCD Board received gthe petition for annexation of western Williamson county at its Jan. 11 meeting.

The citizens who delivered their petition to the Board are known as the Aquifer Conservation Alliance (ACA).

Clearwater verified the signatures on the petition as those of Williamson County residents in the proposed area of annexation (west of I-35).

The leadership of ACA stated publicly on their website that "If persons having homes in the rural parts of Western Williamson county then you very likely have a ground water well as your sole domestic water supply. If you receive water in your home, it can and often times is a blend of surface and groundwater from pub- 177, Leander. lic water supply entities, MUDs, SUDs or municipalities. Majority of these groundwater wells produce from the Middle Layer of the Trinity Aquifer. The Trinity Aquifer is a major aquifer that extends across much of the central and northeastern part of the state - sixty-one counties contain the aquifer. It is one of the most extensive and highly used groundwater resources in Texas."

The public hearings will be conducted in a manner that all persons interested in testifying to the board may do so at any one of the three hearings. The board has asked that the leadership of ACA layout their petition goals and comments early in all three hearings. The board will then take public comments and will ask questions as needed for clarity and discernment of whether the Williamson County citizens desire a GCD or not.

The following are the three public hearings:

March 14, 6 p.m. at Rock Pointe Church Leander Campus, 1070 County Road

March 16, 6 p.m., Texas A&M University Central Texas (Warrior Hall, Bill Yowell Conference Center, 1001 Leadership Place, Killeen.

March 21, 6 p.m., Rock Pointe Church Liberty Hill Campus, 170 County Road 214, Liberty Hill.

The Clearwater Underground Water District was established in 1999 by the residents of Bell County to manage and protect the groundwater resources of the county. "We are a political subdivision of the state of Texas, and we oversee the permitting of wells while providing protection of the groundwater resources across Bell County," Clearwater general manager Dirk Aaron said.

"We are driven to develop policy based on sound science thus we conduct a lot of research about the state of groundwater in and around Bell County," he said. "We have completed an extensive database, with a full interface on our website."

Texas bill would ban voting on college campuses

Texas voting advocates say a bill before the Legislature to ban polling sites on college campuses for fear of mass shootings is instead a direct attack on the perceived political power of young people. Language in the bill by Republican Representative Carrie Isaac does

not mention mass shootings. but since it was filed, she has said "public safety" is behind the legislation.

Alex Birnel, advocacy director with the MOVE Texas Action Fund, said young people ages 18 to 35 are the largest electorate group in the state - and calls the bill "nonsensical" and a targeted

bill will pass, but less relevant than its passage is the idea that these types of legislation could even be entertained because this is a state where we're already ranked the most difficult place to vote," Birnel said.

In the last 10 years, Texas has closed a total of 750 polling locations - the most duced in 39 states to restrict voting access, according to the Brennan Center for Jus-

In Texas elections, people casting ballots can present a concealed handgun license for identification to vote, but not a student ID. Birnel added the trauma of gun violence should not be used as of any state. Last year more a reason to keep college stu-

"To deploy that pain for a measure that seeks to ban polling locations on college campuses muddies the water of both issues, and on the mass-shooting end, we all know that banning polling locations is not going to change that reality." he said.

Research that suggests voting is a habitual act meaning those who have voted in past elections are more

likely to do so again, Birnel

"And the earlier one does it in life, the more likely they are to be a life-long voter," he added. "So this is also about creating longevity in the electorate and eliminating that site where a lot of young voters will cast their first ballot is about disturbing

State affairs advances election offense bill

A person who is ineligible to vote would not have to know that they are ineligible to vote to be convicted of illegal voting under a bill presented before the Senate State Affairs Committee on Feb. 27. Mineola Senator and committee chair Bryan Hughes told members that it is well understood that ignorance of the law is no defense. "Under SB 2, if you are a felon, and you know that you are a felon, you don't have to also know that it's illegal for felons to vote," said Hughes. "If you're not a citizen, you have to know that you're not a citizen, but you don't have

to know that citizens cannot vote." His bill would also restore the penalty for illegal voting back to a class 2 felony, after it was reduced to a class A misdemeanor by the Legislature last session. The low bill number, second lowest only to the state budget, indicates this measure is among Lt. Governor Dan Patrick's top priorities for the 88th Session.

At issue is the case of Crystal Mason, a woman who was convicted and sentenced to five years in prison for casting a provisional ballot in the 2016 election while she was still under supervised release for a previous felony conviction. Texas law permits those convicted of felonies to vote once their debt to society has been discharged, but this includes all post-release provisions such as probation or parole. Mason said she didn't know she was ineligible and cast the illegal vote in error. The Second Court of Appeals ruled that the fact that she wasn't aware of her status "was irrelevant to her prosecution," but the Court of Criminal Appeals disagreed. "The court below erred by failing to require proof that the Appellant had actual knowledge that it was a crime for her to vote while on supervised release," the court found in its ruling on Mason v. Texas. They remanded the case back to the lower court to reconsider in light of this rul-

According to representatives of the Office of Attorney General, this is a significant departure from established precedent. "Prior Courts of Criminal Appeal and other appellate courts ruled that the knowledge required was as to the condition that caused the ineligibility," said Jonathan White, a former director of the Division of Election Integrity. Absent a confession, he said, the new ruling would make it all but impossible to successfully prosecute a case where a person is alleged to have voted while ineligible. "I think after this opinion, it would be very hard to prove with circumstantial evidence," he said. "In my experience of prosecuting election crimes for 15 years, I never had someone admit that they knew the law and they knew that they were violating it, what they say is 'Gosh, I made a mistake, I didn't know' - whether that's true or not."

The second part of the bill would return the penalty for illegally voting to a class 2 felony, an offense which carries a potential prison sentence of two to twenty years. Last session, the Legislature passed SB 1, which contained a number of changes to state election code, including lessening the sentence for voter fraud to a class A misdemeanor. Though not

in favor of the provision, Hughes said the rest of the bill made up for it. "Back in 2021, there was so much positive reform in SB1 that it made sense to pass the bill even with this amendment included, knowing that we could come back and clean it up and that's what we're doing now," said Hughes, who carried that measure in the Senate in 2021. Hughes said that the offense had been a felony for almost 50 years before the 87th Legislature changed it. "These offenses are serious and they should be treated as such," he said.

The committee advanced the bill to the full Senate on a vote of 7 to 3.

Bell Co. Sheriff's prostitution sting leads to 10 arrests

Bell County Sheriff's Department, with its partners the Bell County Organized Crime Unit, the Fort Hood Military Police, and the Fort Hood Criminal Investigations Division, concluded a Human Trafficking Suppression operation. The sting resulted in the arrest of 10 would-be john on Feb. 23.

Digital ads were posted Feb. 22-23 to known websites promoting prostitution. Over the course of two days, officers responded to more than 700 communications from 73 different contacts in

response to the ads. On the first day of the operation, six individuals were arrested. An additional four individuals were arrested on the second day of the operation.

Each of those arrested individuals was charged with Soliciting a Prostitute, a state felony in Texas. Additionally, one of the johns received a charge of resisting arrest. Each of these defendants' arrests have been reviewed by the Bell County District Attorney's office and all criminal charges have been accepted.

"In the past, we have heard public criticism to operations like this that amounted to 'this is just sex between consenting adults,"" Chief Deputy T.J. Cruz said, "but that's far from the

"In a previous sting, we arrested an individual with body bags, duct tape, and bleach in his trunk," Cruz said. "During this week's operation, one of the defendants negotiated a price but arrived with no money. What do you think his plan was?"

The Sheriff's Depart-

ment is also concerned with Human Trafficking Hotline the potential connection between prostitution and human trafficking.

"Many prostitutes are themselves victims of human trafficking," Cruz said. "They can be subjected to physical and sexual assault, robbery, and even murder."

Bell County residents, who suspect or have knowledge of human trafficking or are in need of assistance themselves, can reach out locally to Aware Central Texas at 254-813-0968, or can nationally report by calling the

at 1-888-373-7888, or by texting "Help" to 233733 (BEFREE).

Another concern is for potential johns themselves, who have often become the victims of other crimes.

"There are known incidents, though many go unreported, of johns being assaulted, robbed and, right here in Bell County, recently murdered," Cruz said. "Our effort is to deter all people from seeking out this criminal behavior, and, therefore, making our County safer for

Personal consumer expenditures rose 1.8% in January 2023

The Markets

The S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) serving in its role of U.S. stock market indicator, turned in a depressing week ending on February 24. It dropped below the emotionally important 4000 mark to close at 3970.04, down 2.67% for the week. Fortunately for those of us who like positive numbers, it is still up 3.4% year to date, up 10.82% from last mid-October, and over 77% higher than it was just under three years ago in March of 2020. It is also about 31% higher than it was in the closing days of February 2020, just before it fell in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. That puts its three-year compound average rate of return at 9.39%, substantially higher than its long-term averages but it does remain down over 17% from its record high at the beginning of 2022. Once more, whether you consider the market up or down depends largely on your time horizon. The other indicator we use, the CRSP US Mid Cap Value Index, joined its older sibling in retreating, and was down 2.73% for the week, closing at 2421.06. That index is now up 3.48% this year but down 4.10% from a year ago and down 6.78% from its high at the


The yield on the benchmark 10-year U.S. Treasury note rose to 3.95% from last week's 3.88%. That rise did not help to correct the yield curve inversion with the sixmonth and one-year Treasury bills yielding 5.06% and 5.05% respectively. All listed maturities of Treasury securities except the 10year note and the 30-year bond are now above 4%, a dramatic departure from what we have seen over the last decade. A year ago, the highest yields were in the 20- and 30-year T-bonds at 2.05% and 2.01% respectively, with the 10-year note yielding 1.63%. Morningstar is reporting that its Long-Term Treasury Bond Index is showing a oneyear loss of over 22%, even with all interest reinvested. The Bloomberg US Long-Term Bond Index isn't doing much better with a loss

of 18.17% from a year ago. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) wandered sideways to \$76.41 per barrel, essentially where it was last week.

The Economy

All eyes were once again focused on inflation and jobs data and the resultant speculation about what the Federal Reserve was likely to do over the next year in response to that data. Not so much followed or noticed was a pickup in business activity both here and in the Euro-Zone. First the alarming news

credited with causing the stock market to slide and bond rates to rise. The Federal Reserve does not give as much weight to the Consumer Price Index (CPI) published by the Labor Department's Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) as it does to the Personal Consumption Income and Outlays Index (PCI) published by our beloved Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) at the Commerce Department. So, when the BEA speaks, traders listen. January's PCI was a bit of a shocker, much like the CPI. The one-year CPI Inflation figure was 5.4%, and by excluding food and energy, the "core" PCI came in at 4.7%, both a tenth of a point higher than last month's. That small change was not the surprise. The shocker was that the one-month rise in PCI prices was a whopping 0.6%, while in December the increase was just 0.3%. The stock and bond markets promptly fell as the pundits proclaimed that those rising numbers would surely force the Fed to raise rates high enough to crush the economy. The reality is that a onemonth blip does not make a Federal Reserve policy.

Also, in that report though was what is possibly a more important number. Personal Consumer

Expenditures (PCE) rose a quite surprising 1.8% in the month of January after falling 0.2% and 0.1% in the last two months of 2022. The "real" PCE, adjusted for inflation, increased 1.1%, with a 2.2% increase in spending on goods and a real 0.6% increase for services. Historically, the spending jump is in December as Christmas approaches, but for this year the jump appears to have been displaced to January. The detailed information in the report suggests that consumers pulled back on spending toward the end of last year but surged forward as 2023 began.

Another report came out, this time from S&P Global, stating that the composite output for U.S. businesses rose to 50.2 for February, on a scale where numbers above 50 indicate expansion, after sagging below 50 late last year. That report, when combined with the PCI and PCE reports strongly suggest that the U.S. economy is accelerating rather than slipping into recession. When we include the rising consumer confidence readings that are coming in, the data suggest that the debate about our near-term economic future should not be about whether we have a hard landing (recession), soft-landing (slow to stagnant growth), but should include a third option, that we might have an accelerating growth scenario despite rising rates and negative tea leaves.

Our view remains that things really are different this time. We also continue to see the earmarks of a rebounding rather than a declining economic environment. Stay tuned. This may well prove to be quite interesting.






Thank you Judy!














Contract Bridge



For reasons no one is quite sure of, the nine of diamonds is sometimes referred to as "The Curse of Scotland." One side's curse, however, might prove to be the other side's good fortune. That was precisely the case in this deal, where the dreaded nine took its toll on the declarer but worked like a charm for the defense.

The deal occurred in the quarterfinals of the 1988 Spingold Knockout Teams. North's double of one diamond

was "negative," promising two fourcard majors, after which South ended up in four hearts.

West, Lew Stansby, led the seven of clubs, and East, Chip Martel, won with the ace. Fully expecting the club lead to be a singleton, Martel returned the club three.

Ostensibly, the three of clubs was a suit preference signal, directing West to return the lower-ranking of the two remaining suits. In this case, the two suits were spades and diamonds, and Martel did not have much to shout about in either one. However, his diamonds were just the slightest bit better than his spades.

After ruffing South's king of clubs at trick two, Stansby no doubt eyed his 150 honors in the suit and wondered how East could be asking for a diamond return. But partnerships like this are made of strong stuff. So Stansby, demonstrating complete faith in his partner, returned the diamond five, and that was that. Martel won the trick with the nine and gave West another club ruff to set the contract.

If West had not underled his diamond honors at trick three. South would have made the contract, eventually discarding his losing club on dummy's fourth spade. But against a daring defense possessed of "The Curse of Scotland," he didn't have a ghost of a chance.



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
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Shopping Map of Salado
