

## Mayor briefs residents on growth, developments staffing, safety in village

The Village of Salado has an operating budget of \$2.1 million per year, of which the public safety (police department) comprises about 30% of those expenses. Mayor Michael Coggin discussed this and other matters during a town hall meeting March 13 attended by more than 50 residents.

He said that the Village is in the process of filling vacancies both in the administrative side and on the police department side. Recently, the Village hired Andrea Howard to be the Assistant Village Administrator. Her previous role as Tourism Director will become one geared towards marketing tourism and overnight stays. That position has not yet been filled, according to Coggin. Nor has the position of Village Secretary which became vacant when Cara McPartland retired.

Police Chief Gary McHone is leaving the police department, but not the community, Coggin said. He will be the first chief of the newly-formed Salado ISD Police Department. The Village is also looking to fill two other vacant positions with the police department.

On the administrative side, there are four positions: Village administrator Don Ferguson, assistant administrator Andrea Howard, permits clerk Leticia Gauna and the vacant village secretary position.

Much of the \$2.1 million operating budget is funded through sales tax, Coggin said. "I used to be a crotch-

ety old guy towards the tourists," Coggin said, "until I found out that they are the ones who bring money into the village. Now when I see a tourist, I let them cross the street and tell them where stores and restaurants are."

Speaking of sales tax, Coggin reported the sales tax rebates to the Village are about 15% higher than the prior year. "If they were 30% higher, I would be worried about uncontrolled growth. If they were 3%, I would be worried about no growth," he said.

Coggin told the audience that the Village has almost \$3.5 million in federal and state grants, matching funds and private donations coming to it. Among those are a \$150,000 matching grant from Texas Parks and Wildlife for the All Abilities Playground in Pace Park, \$1.2 million in transportation funds for the overlay of Royal St., \$575,000 in COVID-relief funds that will be used on drainage projects, \$1.5 million for expansion of the wastewater treatment plant and a payment of \$365,000 from Kerby Ventures for the All Abilities Playground.

"We have done a lot with very little resources," Coggin said. He said that the Village has a general fund balance of \$1 million to handle emergencies and other unforeseen expenses.

He then took the audience on a fast tour of the developments in and around Salado, starting with Salado Town Center at the northwest intersection of I-35 and FM 2484. The Village has annexed almost all of the development and is working with the developer to purchase the

wastewater treatment plant on the property. It has a capacity of 50,000 gallons per day but is permitted for up to 500,000 gallons per day. The Village is pursuing a letter of intent to purchase the plant through a process in which impact fees and sewer usage fees for that area are rebated to the developer until the purchase price is met. "You're not going to have to pay for it," Coggin said. "The users of it will."

He said that because of the fast growth along FM 2484 and FM 1670, the Village is working with TXDOT and county officials to try to get traffic lights at the intersection of FM 2484 and 1670 and FM 2484 and Event Dr.

He touched on a potential development at Solana Ranch that could bring 9,000 retirement homes to the area.

He spoke highly of Mustang Springs at Salado, which is in the process of annexing into Salado and forming a Public Improvement District to fund infrastructure for the 1,100 acre property off of FM 2843.

He discussed the recent development work going on at Sanctuary.

"I am proud of work we have done on this," he said, referring to recent amendments to the agreement that put in a deadline of 2043, rather than an undefined deadline "that could go on for more than 60 years."

He also discussed plans for the Village to build a new 5,400 sq. ft. municipal building on the county-owned property at Event Dr. The new municipal building will house both the administrative offices and the police department.

## Community Garden still has plots

Local gardeners held a work day March 11 at the raised beds at the Salado Community Garden on the grounds of the Salado Civic Center.

The gardeners will gather there again at 1 p.m. March 18 where they will spread a trailer load of fresh topsoil and compost on the plots there.

According to Jerry Herrick, there are six plots available for spring planting at the Salado Community Garden, which has a total of 42 plots.

Membership is open to residents or property owners in the Salado Independent School District. The cost is \$20 per year. Each member is assigned one plot for gardening.

If a participant agrees to donate 10 percent of their produce to the Heart and Hands Ministries Food Bank in Salado, the annual cost for plot will be \$10. The minimum age for membership is 17.

Each of the 42 plots has a raised planting bed with fresh top soil. The garden is surrounded by an 8' coated fence with a secure entrance. Water is available for garden on site for use by members, at no cost to members.

Access to the garden plots will be dawn to dusk daily.

Following are the rules for the Community Garden:

1. Members shall have something planted in their assigned plot no later than two weeks after the date their membership was approved and their plot was assigned.
2. Members shall keep their plot planted at all times.
3. Members shall notify the Garden Leadership if they must abandon their plot for any reason
4. Members shall keep weeds and dead plants at a minimum and maintain the areas immediately surrounding their plot and adjacent walkways.
5. Members shall keep their plants out of the adjacent walkways and contained within their plot.
6. Unkept plots are subject to reassignment to another member.
7. Members shall keep trash and litter out of their plots, as well as from adjacent walkways and perimeter fencing.
8. Members shall till and have their plots ready for the next member to plant prior to the expiration of their membership.
9. Pets are prohibited in the Community Garden.
10. Members shall pick only their own crops unless given permission by another

member to do so.

11. Members shall not use chemical fertilizers, insecticides or weed repellents and will grow their garden using organic growing practices.

12. Members shall not plant tall crops where they will shade neighboring plots.

13. Members shall not abuse or misuse any and all Community Garden property, including gardening tools that may be provided.

14. Members shall not leave their children unattended in the Community Garden, nor shall they allow them to interfere with other members or other plots not assigned to them.

15. Members shall not share the combination lock number to the Community Garden's access gate with anyone.

16. If a member resigns during a planting season, the member's plot will be given to the next applicant on the membership waiting list.

17. Members shall notify the Community Garden Leadership of any problems or concerns related to the garden.

## ACA withdraws annexation petition

The Aquifer Conservation Alliance has withdrawn its petition for annexation by Clearwater Underground Water Conservation District of Bell County.

Public hearings previously planned for March 14, March 16, and March 21 are canceled.

"Unfortunately circumstances beyond the control of ACA and Clearwater UWCD left our organization

with little choice," stated Keith Elliston, chair of the ACA. "This decision was difficult and not without significant consideration by members of the ACA board.

"ACA remains committed to the issues concerning groundwater availability for the citizens of western Williamson County," he added. "We will continue to pursue all avenues available to establish a groundwater con-

servation district in order to protect our groundwater now and for the future."

"The next chapter in our organization begins now," Elliston stated. "It is more important than ever that the citizens of western Williamson County make their voices heard all the way to the Texas Capitol!"

## KSB transforms, focuses efforts on village pocket gardens

Just like the butterflies in the Salado gardens, Keep Salado Beautiful has transformed.

Affiliated with Keep Texas Beautiful in 2009, KSB was established by Tourism in 2007 and has successfully worked with the community for nearly 15 years. Initially, a drop-off Recycling Center run by volunteers was established that generated funds to support beautification projects. The Recycle Center

helped establish the curbside recycle program that exists today.

Beautification began when Keep Salado Beautiful partnered with Master Gardeners and Master Naturalists for the first refurbishment of the Green Bridge Garden in 2009; this success led to the establishment of the Pocket Garden concept for the Village. Currently there are 13 public and private gardens that have the pocket garden designation.

Clean up programs twice a year led to an Adopt-A-

Spot program in 2015. KSB celebrated Earth Day with Village events for several years, and partnered with Sirena Fest.

Education programs in the schools led to KSB working in the established TAE school garden and Monarch Way Station and when this garden needed a boost, KSB helped secure the A&M \$10,000 grant to expand opportunities for the TAE students.

The public gardens are demonstration gardens with plant markers, and demon-

strate the benefit of using native plants to withstand our climate and the deer population. Plant books are available at the library for \$2.00 to help determine what is best for your yard.

Keep Salado Beautiful was awarded \$45,000 in grants that benefited the Village for gardens, education, and recycle containers. In addition, we received Keep Texas Beautiful awards as TXDOT grants for \$90,000 in 2018 and again in 2022. We added railing to the Thomas Arnold overpass as a

safety measure in 2018. The 2022 award is in discussion.

The KSB Board requested a merger with the Village in January 2022, as we had not been able to recruit new Board Members. Most of the successful Keep Texas Beautiful affiliates work closely with their city. The Village agreed and a merger was in place. When administrative changes occurred, the Village was not staffed to give attention to the needs of KSB. Unfortunately, at this time KSB has dissolved.

Salado Gardeners will

continue to maintain the Museum and Sirena gardens, and assist with the TAE School Garden. The Lions Club has offered to sponsor the Main Street cleanups, and our Litter Chair will continue to work with the Adopt A Spots.

Community collaboration, education, and development of new projects will be left to others. At some point, hopefully the Village will establish a new KSB affiliate. All of the important records will be located in the historical section of the library.

## Silicon Valley Bank closure may be warning of more to come

The Markets

It was a rough week for the stock market as the S&P 500 (SPX) slid 4.56% to close at 3861.59. First, Chairman Powell, then other members of the Federal Reserve Board continued to emphasize that interest rates will go higher and stay higher than most people seem to believe, but that they would be open to whatever new data indicated. On Friday, they got some of that new data as the Labor Department reported that the U.S. economy had added a net, seasonally adjusted 311,000 new jobs in the month of February, and the market did not like it. More on that below. The SPX is still up 0.58% year to date. It is 7.8% higher than it was in mid-October of last year, and about 73% higher than it was in mid-March three years ago in 2020 but is now down 19.43% from its high in early 2022. Our other stock market indicator, the CRSP US Mid Cap Value Index fell 6.67% for the week to 2280.68, taking it to a 2.36% decline this year and about 12% below its all-time high in January 2022.

The benchmark 10-year U.S. Treasury note yield fell enthusiastically to 3.7% from the near 4% levels it has recently held as the yield curve became even more inverted. The 6-month Treasury bill was offering an annualized rate of 5.17% as the market closed, while the 30-year bond slipped down to the same 3.7% as the 10-year note. Even the 90-day T-Bill, another benchmark yield, rose above 5%. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) fell about 4% to \$76.61 per barrel, heralding potentially lower prices at the pump.

The Economy

We are living in strange times. The corporate bond market continues to signal good times ahead, while the Treasury yield curve is screaming "Recession!". The leading economic indicators, led by that same Treasury indicator, agree that we not only are likely to have a recession coming, but that we should already be in one. Out where recessions live or die though, businesses are hiring like nothing but boom times

are ahead of us. A careful look at the Labor Department's Employment Situation Summary only adds to the confusion. While employers hired a surprisingly large number of new employees in February, the unemployment rate rose to 3.6%. That was because apparently a lot of new people entered the job market in search of work as the labor participation rate rose to 62.5%. In other times, those numbers would be a delight. More people working and new entrées into the workforce are a key element in economic growth. The problem is that those people with new jobs are suddenly earning money that they are likely to spend.

Given that the Federal reserve is focused on slowing spending in the U.S. economy, that good news is potentially bad news. On the other hand, the fact that the unemployment figure went up as more people entered the workforce was likely the factor that produced a pleasing number in that jobs report. Wages only rose 0.2%. Annualized, that amounts to a 2.4% increase. When that number is paired with the approximately 1.7% annualized productivity rise we saw late last year, the inflationary factor in those numbers equates to about 0.7% per year, well below the Fed's 2% goal. Throw in the revisions to earlier jobs reports from December and January reducing the number of new jobs gained for those months by about 35,000 and perhaps, just perhaps, the Fed will not throw on the brakes in an emergency stop.

One more shocker came at the end of the week as Silicon Valley Bank (SVB), which was only a year ago a stand-out example of the wealth being generated by new tech companies, was ordered closed and its assets seized by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation as it was declared insolvent. While there

is little indication that SVB is an indicator of the financial health of the banking industry, it may be a warning of something else. SVB's downfall came not from issuing bad loans, but from buying long-term Treasury bonds to generate income. As the high-tech startups in Silicon Valley started to sag under the rising interest rates of their loans, they began drawing out money to cover expenses they had previously deposited at SVB. Trying to remain conservative, SVB had bought a lot of long-term Treasury bonds rather than make a lot of loans. To create cash for those withdrawals, SVB had to sell some of those Treasuries, and as interest rates rise, the market value of bonds falls. Because of the regulations put in effect after the banking crisis of 2008-2009, SVB had to post the market value of their Treasury portfolio regularly, and as it fell, large depositors pulled their money, forcing SVB to sell bonds and realize those losses. Then came the notorious run on the bank this week and the regulators and the FDIC stepped in to seize SVB. It has been 40 years since we witnessed what rising interest rates can do to a bond heavy portfolio like some banks and many insurance companies depend on. We suspect this is not the end of the story.

Once more, the economic picture remains the same. The U.S. economy is showing every sign of being in excellent shape, creating jobs, making things, providing services, and generally rocking along about as good as things can get. Even some of the underlying signs of inflation and too-fast job creation appear to be abating. At the same time, the fear remains that the Federal Reserve will overreact and bring the party to a crashing halt. We can only watch and see.

## Facility planning committee discusses school finance

Our facility planning committee has met two times so far and also participated in a tour of our school facilities. The committee is comprised of 47 voting members, including 23 parents, 13 community members, and 11 teachers. The following is some of the school finance information the committee has discussed.

School funding in Texas is based on Weighted Average Daily Attendance (WADA). Our enrollment has a lower percentage of students that qualify for free or reduced price meals and other weighted funding. **GRAPH A** shows the annual state and local funding amounts per student for 12 mid-sized school districts in Central Texas, along with how much more funding these districts receive each year based on an enrollment of 2,304 students (which is our current enrollment).

We maintain competitive salaries for all of our employees based on a comparison of the mid-sized school districts (with student enrollments between 1,600 and 4,999 students) in Texas. The compensation plan for all of our positions are based on 3% above the average of the other mid-sized districts from the previous school year. This is a very impressive accomplishment considering we are one of the lowest funded school districts in the state, based on funding per student. (SEE **GRAPH B**)

## Republicans must get on board with securing borders

Department of Homeland Security Secretary Alejandro Mayorkas has repeatedly told Congress that the "border is secure," and the White House continues to insist that this is true. However, facts on the ground demonstrate otherwise.

Almost 2.4 million illegal migrants were apprehended at the U.S. border with Mexico in fiscal year 2022. This is an historic high that doubled the previous record number of apprehensions from 2021.

The new Republican majority in the House of Representatives is promising to address the border crisis with oversight and legislative reforms. A serious step toward that end is the Border Safety and Security Act (H.R. 29) recently introduced by Representative Chip Roy (R-Texas). The bill creates a non-pandemic-related authority for DHS to turn away illegal aliens at the border. DHS would have the option to either detain asylum seekers pending their hearings, return them to the country from which they entered to await their hearings -- as was done under the Remain in Mexico program -- or return them to their home countries.

House leadership should move quickly to get Rep. Roy's bill passed. The longer they wait the worse the border crisis will become as the Biden administration grows more emboldened in its flouting of the letter and intent of existing immigration laws by claiming its discretion to admit illegal

immigrants -- or to disguise them as legal by abusing parole authority -- is unlimited.

A handful of House Republicans are standing in the way of getting Rep. Roy's bill passed, arguing that it would totally prevent foreign nationals from making asylum claims.

This is completely false. It would only require DHS to comply with existing law and detain asylum seekers until they have a hearing with an immigration judge. Right now, the Biden administration is using the asylum system as cover to release hundreds of thousands of individuals into the United States who make frivolous or fraudulent asylum claims, in many cases granting them work authorization.

If Rep. Roy's bill clears the House, it will put pressure on the Democrat-controlled Senate to take it up. As Secretary Mayorkas becomes increasingly defiant of Congress and with an eye toward the 2024 election, with voters already heavily favoring Republicans on immigration, will vulnerable Democrats reject a commonsense approach to stemming the border crisis?

There remain other remedies that must be applied. Congress should prohibit migrants who have passed through a safe third country from claiming asylum in the United States. No doubt many who are arriving at our southern border are seeking a better life, and many are hoping to escape poverty or other deplorable conditions back home -- but these are

not legal conditions for asylum. Congress must respect and reiterate the original intent of the asylum system to prevent future abuses by the executive branch.

There is no good reason for members of Congress who say they want to stop the flow of illegal immigration into the United States to oppose Rep. Roy's border bill. They should enthusiastically promote and support it.

Opening lead — ten of spades.

This deal occurred in a high-level pair championship. At all five tables where the hand was played, the contract was three notrump, with South as declarer, and at each table South found the winning line of play to make the contract.

Despite the identical outcome at each table, it is safe to say that many declarers facing exactly the same situation would have gone down. Superficially, there seems to be nothing to the play, but that's exactly what makes it so easy to go wrong.

It appears to be normal to win the

opening spade lead with the queen, play the queen of diamonds and finesse. But in the actual deal, this approach proves fatal after East takes the queen with the king and returns a spade. When the diamonds turn out to be divided 4-2 rather than 3-3, South can do no better than go down one.

But the correct method of play — adopted by all five expert declarers — makes the contract and, in fact, produces 10 tricks. Instead of leading the queen of diamonds at trick two, South should cross to dummy with a club and lead a low diamond toward the Q-2!

What can East do in that case? If he rises with the king, South scores four diamond tricks. If East plays low instead, declarer wins with the queen and leads a diamond to the ace, felling East's king. South then continues with the jack and another diamond, and once again scores four diamond tricks.

Declarer should reason that if the opposing diamonds are divided 3-3, it makes no difference whether he starts the suit from his own hand or from dummy. But if the diamonds are 4-2, South does better in the long run by initiating the suit from dummy.

It is true that if either opponent has four diamonds to the king, declarer's play does not matter -- he goes down either way. But if West has four without the king, as in the actual deal, leading the first diamond from dummy is absolutely essential.

**Notice of Application for a Sand and Gravel Permit**

The Village of Salado has applied to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) for a(n) Individual Permit pursuant to Texas Parks and Wildlife Code Chapter 86 to remove or disturb 1,685 cubic yards of sedimentary material within Salado Creek in Bell County. The purpose of the project is to remove a significant deposit of sedimentary material that is putting public infrastructure and adjacent private properties at risk. The location starts at Chisholm Trail Road, where it crosses over the Salado Creek, and goes upstream 939'. Notice is being published and mailed pursuant to Title 31 Texas Administrative Code section 69.105(b).

Within 30 days of the receipt of an administratively complete application, TPWD will publish notice of a public comment hearing regarding the application in the Texas Register at least 20 days prior to the date of the public comment hearing. The hearing is not a contested case hearing under the Texas Administrative Procedure Act. Oral and written public comment will be accepted at the hearing.


