#### McDonald's, Starbucks to be built in Salado

Salado will soon be getting a McDonald's and a Starbucks.

The Village Planning and Zoning Commission will hold a public hearing 6:30 p.m. May 14 on a zoning variance request to allow construction of a sign on property zoned commercial located at the southwest corner of I-35 and Salado Cen-

The Board of Aldermen will take up the request with a public hearing 6:30 p.m.

The request is for a twosided pylon sign for a Starbucks location.

Additionally, village staff has approved a minor plat

for the construction of a McDonald's at the southern side of Williams Rd., I-35 and West Village Road. The plans are being modified to include five-foot sidewalks along three roadway sides.

Construction could begin within three weeks. The property is expected to close

### **Election changes** complexion of BoA

Following the May 4 local elections, the complexion of the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen will change dramatically as three currently sitting aldermen will be leaving the board.

Aldermen Jason Howard, first elected in 2020, did not file for re-election. Paul Cox, also first elected in 2020, lost in his bid for re-election. Bert Henry, first elected to the Board of Aldermen a year ago, was successful in his bid for Mayor.

Michael MacDonald and Zach Hurst were elected to the Board of Aldermen.

Henry, MacDonald and Hurst will be given their board of aldermen meeting.

Henry had 325 votes in the Mayor race, while Michael Coggin had 280 in seeking his third term. Coggin was elected Mayor in 2020 after a term as Alder-

The Village of Salado is a Type A General Law Municipality. Aldermen may choose to leave the term vacant, or fill the vacancy by appointment or a special election for the remainder of the unexpired term.

Previously, when the Village faced having an unfilled seat on its board, it was a Type B general law city, which cannot call for a special election.

#### **ETJ** owners petition Village to release their properties

Village of Salado aldermen voted 4-1 at their regular meeting to receive but take no official action on four petitions for release from the Extra Territorial Jurisdiction of properties located on Armstrong Rd.

The four petitions are the latest in requests by property owners in the ETJ of the Village to be released from the ETJ. The properties are all on Armstrong Rd. and voluntarily annexed into the Village of Salado ETJ when other municipalities (Temple and Belton) were annexing property and extending their

Because they voluntarily annexed into the ETJ, they may not petition for release from the ETJ.

Chapter 42.101 of the Local Government Code dealwith Extraterritorial

Jurisdiction of Municipalities reads "Sec. 42.101. AP-PLICABILITY. "This subchapter does not apply to an area located: (2) in an area that was voluntarily annexed into the extraterritorial jurisdiction that is located in a county: (B) that has a population greater than 240,000." Bell County population in July 2023, according to the US Census Bureau, was 393,193.

In 2004, the Village accepted petitions for annexation into its ETJ from hundreds of property owners worried about being trapped in the ETJs of Killeen, Temple and Belton. In 2019, the Village annexed other properties along Stinnett Mill road when Belton announced plans for annexation in that area.

The Village subdivision ordinance and sign ordinance apply within the ETJ. Senate Bill 2038, which

went into effect in September 2023 allows properties in the ETJ of municipalities to petition for release. If the governing body does not act within 45 days, the property is released by default.

The law is being questioned, however, with cities such as Grand Prairie suing

"Until this gets resolved, I recommend that you acknowledge receipt but take no action." Village administrator Manny De La Rosa told aldermen May 2. "It may take months or years for the courts to address this."

Alderman Jasen Graham gave a motion to acknowledge receipt but take no further action on petitions for release from the ETJ. It passed 4-1 with Alderman Jason Howard voting against.

In other business, aldermen approved by majority vote ordinance 2024-03

granting Mustang Springs Utility, LLC powers, licenses, privileges and franchise to operation and maintain a water utility system within the Village.

The motion for approval came from Mayor Pro Tem

from Alderman Paul Cox. Bell and Cox were joined by Graham in favor. Aldermen Howard and Bert Henry voted against.

Aldermen approved installation of stop signs at the intersection of Smith Bluff Rodney Bell with a second Road and Smith Bluff Way.

#### $\mathsf{TXDoT}$ plans to expand FM2484 toFM3481

Texas Department of Transportation has given formal notice to the Village of Salado and other entities that it proposes construction on FM 2484 from I-35 to Park Rd. and from Park Rd. to FM 3481.

The proposed construction will be to widen the roadway by adding shoulders and turning lanes.

The project is scheduled to be ready to let by Oct. 2024, according to Waco District Utility Coordinator Dustin L. Deaton.

TXDOT sent notice to area utilities and governments for them to show their facilities which might be affected by the expansion of FM 2484 from I-35 to FM 3481. TXDOT is seeking information on facilities that might be encountered during construction of the projects as well as the approximate boundaries of easements and other interest inlands that those entities hold along and/or across this route.

With recent growth, FM 2484 has become a heavily traveled road. The addition of Salado Town Center and subdivisions along FM 2484 and FM 1670 have caused frequent congestion.





## School vouchers perpetuate segregation; limiting access to books does not protect kids

To the Editor:

Voucher programs were created to perpetuate segregation and School Choice began as a dog whistle for bigotry and racism. One Mississippi Republican said, "We can kill" this desegregation by "growing a freedom of choice system."

Counties in Virginia

closed public schools and then provided vouchers for private schools. Jackson Mississippi closed swimming pools to keep minorities out. Then they leased the pools to private organizations that discriminated and practiced segregation, such as the Young Men's Christian Association. Self-proclaimed Christian, Mississippi Senator Cindy Hyde-Smith joked about going to a "public hanging" and initiated a segregation academy that was "started because people didn't want their kids going to school with minorities." After the Supreme Court's Brown vs Board of Education ruling, private schools in the South proliferated; the governor of Mississippi pledged to establish a private school system as a "workable alternative" for white children. James Madison termed any governmental financial tax supports "an establishment of religion," and thought that compulsory contributions to religion through taxes as a violation of the individual's religious liberty. Thomas Jefferson explained that "to compel a man to furnish contributions of money for the propagation of opinions which he disbelieves and abhors, is sinful and tyrannical" and "that even...forcing him to support this or that teacher of his own religious persuasion, is depriving him of the comfortable liberty" of making voluntary financial contributions. Christian Nationalists are eroding public schools to establish a parallel religious education system. University founder and evangelist Bob Jones stated, "If you are against segregation and against racial separation, then you are against God." Bob Jones U

It is not the library's responsibility to determine what an individual chooses to read. It's not the librarian's responsibility to assert his/her beliefs onto others. Librarians do not censor. A core value of the library is allowing the free and full exchange of ideas.

If an individual does not like a certain topic or subject and sees a book at their local public library about said subject...you don't have to check it out and read it. Just walk on by.

The parent can determine what books their child takes home to read but this is not the responsibility of the library.

the library. Parents have the right to determine what is considered appropriate books for his/her kids but they do not have the right to determine that for other children and the public. This really should be the only argument against book banning. Other people have no right to force their beliefs onto others and remove books based on their beliefs. Reading materials available in our library are not required reading but should be made available to the community for personal selection.

If our library was a private one funded by a group or organization, then it can absolutely determine what books are offered. Again, our library is funded by the community and state and not with private funds.

My second point I want to make and I think is the most important one...is the importance of representation in books. If a child, for example, reads a book with a character who thinks like them, then that child may not feel so alone. A child may not feel so different if they learn there are other people in the world who believe the same way they do or have the same struggles they do. This is especially important if a child does not get this feeling from home, school, or their church. We know, as adults, there is value in diversity and it's our duty to expose our

children to diversity. When a child reads a book where a kid has two mommies... then sees a kid with two mommies at Brookshires, it makes the exposure in the real world less odd. They've seen or heard of this before and it's no big deal. That's the beauty of learning about other beliefs...a child realizes there are different ways of thinking and that is okay. Books may not only make a child feel less alone in his or her feelings but also make them more tolerant and empathetic humans. I think we can all agree we need a more loving and tolerant society and this starts with our children. Young people deserve to see themselves reflected in a book. This is IMPORTANT and NEC-

ESSARY. Books are tools for understanding complex issues. Limiting young people's access to books does not protect them from life's complex and challenging issues. Reading is a foundational skill and is critical to future learning and exercising our democratic freedoms. Removing and banning certain books from public libraries is a slippery slope to government censorship and the erosion of our country's commitment to freedom of expression. Freedom of expression protects our right to read, learn, and share ideas free from viewpoint based censorship. The idea of banning particular books from this library is a misguided attempt to try to suppress this right.

A group of people with certain beliefs does not have the right to impose their beliefs onto me and my children. To me, it's that simple. Don't check out the book...that's your right. But it's not your right to determine what books are made available to my children and community.

#### Bragg, Anderson win state medals

For seniors Jackson Bragg and Luke Anderson, the wet track at Mike A. Myers Stadium in Austin became the highlight of their careers as each set personal records and brought home medals from the UIL State Track Meet May 2.

Bragg set a personal record and a new Salado High School record in the Pole Vault, after he had secured the gold medal in the event at 15-6.00.

Bragg waited until 15-00 to even make an attempt, which he cleared on the first try. Four competitors were left in the field of eight: Bragg, Burnet's Brady Rygaard, Pleasanaton's Preston Pilgrim and Rockport-Fulton's Brody Karl, who missed all three attempts.

With their appearances on the medal stand secured, all three passed at 15-3, moving the bar to 15-6.

All three missed their first attempts, but Bragg cleared on his second try. Rygaard and Pilgrim missed their second and third attempts.

With the gold secured, Bragg cleared 16-0 on his first attempt. He then cleared 16-4.75 on his first attempt.

Bragg clipped the bar on his three tries at 16-9, but now holds the Salado High School record at 16-4.75.

Anderson also has a new school record and per-

sonal best, as he earned the bronze medal in the boys 1600M Run. He dogged the heels of FW Diamond Hill-Jarvis's Angel Sanchez and Canyon's Ryan Fernandez as all three were within a second of each other at the first turn and at the finish.

Sanchez ran the first 400 meters in 4:13.08, while Anderson was in third with 4:13.97.

Midway through the race, Sanchez pulled ahead with his time of 2:05.39, while Fernandez was at 2:08.48 and Anderson was still in third with a time of 2:08.64.

The two closed in on Sanchez in the third loop. Sanchez started the final lap with a time of 3:12.00 with Fernandez on his at 3:12.40 and Anderson closing in at 3:12.62.

They came in one, two, three with Sanchez at 4:13.08; Fernandez at 4:13.55 and Anderson at 4:13.97.

Anderson ran earlier in the morning in the 3200M Run, in which he placed eighth with a time of 9:42.50. The field of nine

ran very tightly with a second between the leader of the pack and Salado sophomore Coulson Boyd in ninth at 4:46.30.

Boyd qualified for the meet that morning when the Wild Card qualifier from Burnet scratched. Boyd's fourth place time at Regionals was better than any of the third place times at the other Regionals.

Boyd finished in ninth place with a time of 9:51.12.

Angel Sanchez won the race with a time of 9:14.44. Ryan Fernandez was second with a time of 9:19.36. Sophomore Cade Har-







The best players play well, but they don't always achieve the perfection they could attain if they saw all four hands. For example, take this deal where all four players would have bid or played differently had they seen each other's cards.

North had no convenient bid over West's weak jump-overcall of two hearts. But after he passed and South showed a good hand by bidding

three clubs. North indicated interest in game by cuebidding West's suit. South read this as showing a heart stopper, and, after accepting North's invitation to bid three notrump, then stood his ground when East doubled.

West led a heart, and South ran like a bunny with nine tricks. He could have made two overtricks by guessing which way to take the diamond finesse, but he was understandably content to settle for three notrump doubled.

Of course, had West been sufficiently inspired to lead the king and another spade, the contract would have failed. But then, had North-South seen all the hands, they would have bid and made five clubs.

East surely would have altered the outcome had he simply raised two hearts to three, or even had he bid two spades. After either action, North-South could scarcely have arrived at three notrump, and it is doubtful that they would have reached five clubs.

Part of the fascination of bridge lies in attempting to gain the maximum result on every deal, even though every player realizes that, realistically, this goal is impossible to attain. But there's still a lot of fun — and certainly no harm — in analyzing all the different possibilities.


