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CUWCD to hold encumbrance, permit hearings

Clearwater Underground Water Conservation District (CUWCD) will hold an encumbrance hearing and a permit hearing at 1:30 p.m. June 11 at the Clearwater UWCD Board Room, at 640 Kennedy Court, Belton.

The meetings were postponed from May 8 when the board failed to meet a quorum

CUWCD board may grant an exception if, after notice and hearing, the Applicant provides a properly executed and recorded Encumbrance Agreement, transferring the groundwater rights attributable to the adjacent land of one or more property owner(s) to the Applicant sufficient to attain the minimum tract size necessary to support a Nonexempt Well.

Encumbrance of acreage necessary for 20-acres as it relates to an approved drilling permit requiring tract size necessary for a Lower Trinity well equipped with a maximum 4-inch column pipe, per District Rule 9.5.2.

On Feb. 14, CUWCD approved the drilling permit for Well #2 and Well #1 with a caveat that the applicant must return to the Board on March 13, 2024, with a properly executed groundwater reservation by encumbering the groundwater rights on the two tracts the applicant owns for the purpose of obtaining 20 acres or more for the second drilling permit for well #1.

The proposed wells are for proposed future production of groundwater for a future public water supply entity at a combined annual quantity not to exceed 249.8 acre-feet or 81,397,580 total gallons per year at a maximum pumping rate not to exceed 320 gallons per minute per well from the Lower Trinity Aquifer (Hosston Layer)

No production was issued with this drilling permit application other than that necessary for the purpose of drilling and completing the wells and the prescribed elements of the required Well Completion Reports per District Rule 6.9.2(f)(1-8) for the purpose of a future operating permit.

The proposed wells will serve as a water source for a public water supply to serve an 1,100 acre development known as Mustang Springs at Salado.

The developer is applying for release from the Certificate of Convenience and Necessity (CCN) of the City of Georgetown.

The CUWCD board will also conduct a public hearing for an amendment to an existing permitted well owned by Victory Rock Texas, LLC.

The existing well is completed in the Hensell Layer of the Trinity Aquifer and is geographically in the CUWCD Stillhouse Hollow Management Zone.

The well (#N3-24-003G) is equipped with a 2-inch column pipe with a submersible pump rated at 42 gallons per minute on a contiguous tracts of land totaling 394.18 acre tract located at 7090 Solana Ranch Rd.

Victory Rock Texas, LLC is requesting an operating permit to produce ground-water for a defined beneficial use to provide water for commercial sand and gravel mining operations, to wash the mined material, dust suppression, and to provide water to a concrete batch plant facility known as Five Star, Concrete, LLC on contiguous tracts of land, leased from Byron Goode

This operating permit request is to allow production of groundwater not to exceed 67.75-ac-ft (22,076,405 gallons) per year.

Farmers, ranchers encouraged to report losses

In the wake of last week's severe weather, Bell County farmers and ranchers are being encouraged to report any damage using the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) iSTAT portal. This critical step will help assess the overall impact of the storm on the local agricultural community and support necessary recovery and relief efforts.

"We have heard from some of our neighbors in the agricultural community that they were not sure how or if they could report some of their damages, and we want to assure them that they absolutely can," Bell County Emergency Management Coordinator Bob Reinhard

The iSTAT tool is designed to quickly gather initial damage assessment information in disaster-affected areas. It can help evaluate the extent of damage to homes, business, and agricultural operations.

"Once, they get to the online survey, they will see a question asking if their damages include agricultural losses," Reinhard said. "Once they click 'Yes' in answer to that question, it will take them to some additional questions pertaining to ag losses."

Bell County residents in and out of the agricultural industry can access TDEM's iSTAT port by visiting https://damage.tdem.texas.gov.

Crisis Cleanup Hotline established

Bell County Emergency Management is encouraging residents impacted by last week's severe weather to call the Crisis Cleanup Hotline at 512-201-4814 to connect with volunteer cleanup services.

"One of the most consistent requests we have gotten by folks impacted by this storm is about getting assistance removing downed

trees and debris," Bell County Emergency Management Coordinator Bob Reinhard said. "With this hotline, people can make their needs visible to a myriad of volunteer organizations looking to lend a hand."

Upon connecting with the hotline, callers will outline the location and nature of their unmet need. Operators will add that request to a growing database, where it will be available for volunteers to claim and satisfy.

"We do want to encourage people to be patient with this process," Reinhard said. "The hotline already has hundreds of requests, and these awesome volunteers are working through them."

Survey shows harm from quarries, need for change

Georgetown: The Coalition for Responsible Environmental Aggregate Mining (CREAM) released a detailed report May 27 featuring the results of its public survey on the impact of rock quarries in northwestern Williamson County.

The aggregate industry provides gravel, sand, and stone that helps sustain the rapid growth of Central Texas, and Williamson County has more operations than any other county in Texas.

But some of these have become bad neighbors because the industry has weak regulatory oversight by local and state entities, according to Coalition for Responsible Environmental Aggregate Mining (CREAM) Founder Michael Spanado.

As the first of its kind, the CREAM survey gathers input from almost 200 Georgetown-area residents, illustrating a widespread problem and the desire for change.

"This survey gives a voice to many Williamson County residents who have had their quality of life affected by the quarries and other operations," said CREAM member, report author, and Sun City resident Christina Schwerdtfeger, PhD. "Many of us in the area know the frustrations of living near aggregate operations, so we set out to gauge the level and breadth of this impact. The responses only underscore our continuing concern about how prevalent and significant our shared experiences are. We hope the survey will show our elected officials just how important this issue is to voters, and give all residents hope that there is a path forward together."

The survey was conducted from January to March 2024 and was advertised for several weeks in the Williamson County Sun newspaper, on the Nextdoor platform, on the Facebook

groups "The Nature of Sun City" and "My Florence Texas," and on the CREAM Facebook page.

Some of the most important findings include:

- 97% of respondents have personally experienced negative impacts that have damaged their property or degraded their quality of life.
- 90% have felt quarry blasts and 44% have had property damage from blasts.
- 60% have experienced excessive dust on their property
- 53% have experienced damage to their vehicles from trucks transporting materials from APOs.
- 97% want legislation to curb nuisance issues associated with APOs.
- 98% want the county and/or city to be more proactive

The report and survey results come after CREAM's community panel event,

where Rep. Terry Wilson and three other legal and regulatory experts spoke to about 250 audience members and neighborhood representatives, who also had a chance to voice their concerns. The report includes information on the rapid expansion of the aggregate industry in Williamson County, weak enforcement of existing regulations that has enabled bad actors, the failure of previous legislative efforts, and the popularity of future local and state policies to curb the industry's impact on residents. It ends with a look toward potential efforts that might lead to improvements, such as a Citizens Advisory Council.

"We recognize that aggregate operations are needed to support all of the growth in the Central Texas area, and at the same time we think the playing field should be more even so everyday people aren't suffering so much from bad actors

and lack of enforcement," said CREAM Founder Michael Spano, who is also a neighbor of the quarries. "We'd like to see change on several levels - within the Legislature in 2025, within the regulating agencies like the Texas Commission for Environmental Quality, and within our local governmental bodies. We all want to take good care of our homes and our land, and to do this some aggregate operations need to take better care of their neighbors."

"I and many of my neighbors had no idea when we bought our homes that we had moved next to a quarry, and we soon felt blindsided by how the quarry would disrupt our lives," said Dana Martin, a mother and local resident. "Almost daily we are subjected to frequent blasting that cracks our drywall and foundations, loud vibrations that disrupt our peace and ability to homeschool and work from home,

bad air quality, or driving hazards from trucks carrying uncovered loads over the speed limit. This isn't fair – or safe – for our communities and our kids, and we've had enough. We are ready for the people in charge to pay more attention and make things right."

CREAM is a coalition of community members advocating for Williamson County-area rock quarries and batch plants to be good neighbors to the surrounding communities. The group pushes for the quarries to operate with community concerns in mind: Blast but do not shake homes; transport goods but cover loads so debris doesn't crack windshields; wet the job site but recycle water to save precious Williamson County groundwater; and find a way to operate but reduce air pollution so residents and children can breathe healthy air.







In 1989 Dave and family moved to Salado, TX. He and Linda became active members of First Baptist Church of Salado, where Dave served as a deacon. He also ran sound for services, and together he and Linda contributed to numerous live nativities and cooked in the kitchen.

He retired in 2014 and spent the following years woodworking and acting as 'Grand Poobah' to a host of grandchildren (and welcoming blissful silence when they returned home to their parents).

He is preceded in death by his parents. He is survived by his wife of 50 years, Linda, their three children, Nic, Paige, and Jon, and their spouses; as well as ten grandchildren. He is also survived by his sister, Elizabeth Gilmer, and numerous cousins, nieces, and nephews.

He was a wonderful partner, proud and caring family patron, and a dedicated friend and servant of the church. His distinct playfulness and occasionally deranged sense of humor will be remembered warmly.


Saladoans wrestle for national team



District 23-4A foe China Spring will play Spring Hill in the Region III finals, after ousting Bullard 2-1 in their series.

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
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
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
