Rolly is retiring

Bell County Constable for Precinct 2 Rolly Correa will be retiring July 11 from law enforcement after 46 years serving State and County Government.

"It's been a pleasure living and working in the Salado area these past few years. I want to thank all the citizens of Precinct 2 for allowing me to serve them as their Constable. I have made good friends over the years," Correa said. "I knew that Salado had my back all these years and I am very thankful of their support."

Correa started his career in 1978 and served 31 years with Texas Parks & Wildlife as Game Warden stationed in San Antonio and in Temple. Rolly acquired a Master Peace Officers License during his tenure and held the rank as Lieutenant and promoted to the rank of Major Game Warden in 1993. He oversaw the field operations for 24 Counties in Central Texas. In his region he also oversaw a Regional Office in Temple, a District Office in Bryan-College Station and a 24-hour communication center in Austin until retirement in 2010. Rolly still maintains a Special Game Warden Commission with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Correa was elected Constable for Precinct 2 in 2013 and is ending his third four-year term serving civil

process and Bailiff for the Justice Courts. Correa was a mentor for the Salado Schools and enjoyed announcing football games on Thursday home games. He also served as the Mission and Outreach Director leading mission teams to Hati, Africa and Belize for 13 years with the Salado United Methodist Church. Correa served on JAIL Ministries for 10 years as a Board Member and is a member of the Justice of the Peace & Constables Association and Texas Game Warden Association.

Deputy Chris Bazar was elected this year after Rolly chose not to run for a fourth term. "Chris will be

your new constable for precinct 2," Correa said. "Chris brings to the office valuable experience. He is a good person and very personable. He is willing to work hard serving the constituents of Bell County. Please welcome him as you did me as he takes on the duties and responsibilities as your constable."

Correa said he feels that 46 years of carrying a Texas Peace Officer commission has been long enough. "It is time to move onto something else," he said. "My plans for now are to take my trailer, and travel with my lovely wife Beth and spend more time with their children and grandchildren."

Durable goods orders increase in April and May

The venerable, if sometimes a bit muddled, Standard and Poor's 500 Stock Index (SPX) turned in a stellar week, rising 1.95% to 5567.19. For better or worse, that gain was again driven by the performance of the Fantastic Five super big AI tech stocks. The SPX is now 16.72% higher than when it began the year, about 25% higher than a year ago, and up 28% from three years ago. Our other carefully followed stock index, the CRSP US Mid Cap Value Index, reflects what we believe is a more accurate and likely sustainable picture of what the rest of the market is doing, closed at 2576.03, down 0.97% for the week but up 7.52% from a year ago. As we have stated before, the price behavior of the Fantastic Five strongly reminds us of the behavior of the "dotcom" stocks thirty years ago. A lot of theoretical money was made there, and a lot was lost when the mania came crashing down.

The benchmark 10-year U.S. Treasury note ended the week yielding 4.28%, about 1.8% lower than a week ago but a whopping 10.3% higher than its yield of 3.88% as the year began and over 200% higher than three years ago when the yield was only 1.37%. Very short-maturity Treasuries continue to have the highest yield, around 5.5%, with the 30-year T-bond paying only 4.47%. The trend is that longer-term interest rates are rising, and we will continue to do so for the rest of the decade. The benchmark price of West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) continued its slow increase, rising to \$83.13 per barrel, rising on increasing demand from a growing U.S. economy.

The Economy

The week of July 4 is one in which, traditionally, a lot happens economically, but at the same time, very little gets reported about

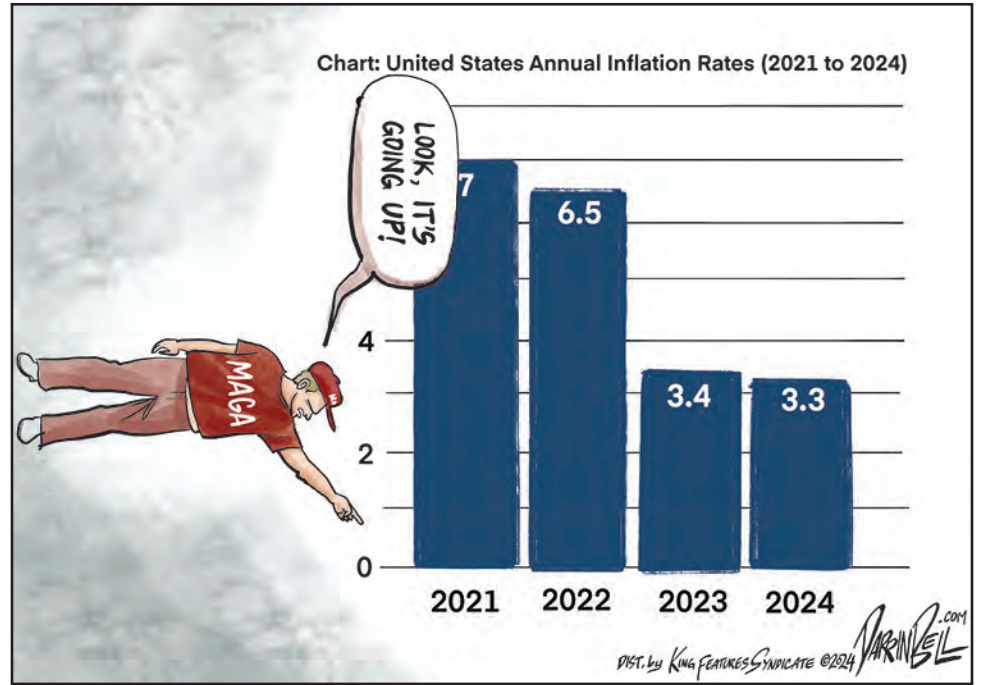
what happened until later. This time around, though, a couple of important reports were published, giving us an idea of where the economy is and appears to be going. Light vehicle sales were down, which normally would not be a good sign, but the reason seems to be that there was a cyberattack on the main supplier of dealer software systems and, like much else in our lives, without the software, it was difficult for the dealers to sell their wares. Then, another snapshot looked unpleasant. The Institute for Supply Management (ISM) reported that the "nonmanufacturing" side of our economy dropped from last month's reading of 53.8 on a scale where numbers above 50 indicate expansion and below 50, contraction, to a surprising 48.8! If such a dramatic slowing of services business had occurred, it would be reasonable to see some other evidence, but a diligent search reveals nothing. Better to look at the average reading over the last 8 months or so, 51.6. The anecdotal reports suggest that recent weather events may be the culprit.

Then we received a real "meat and potatoes" report from the Census Bureau: The Value of Manufacturers' New Orders. In short order, things became clear. Yes, new orders slowed slightly between April and May, but all the slowing was in the nondurable goods category. In the important harbinger of the future, durable goods industries, orders increased! Industrial machinery, transportation, and materials handling equipment were among the fastest-growing areas. Those are the places where

companies invest for the long term because they believe business volume will increase over the next year or more. The evidence suggests a reduced economic growth rate in the near future but a return to a faster rate over the longer term.

The last piece of evidence in this shortened week was the Employment Situation Report from (logically enough) the Labor Department. First, the household survey found that the unemployment rate inched upward from May's 4.0% to June's 4.1%. The number of unemployed people searching for job openings rose to 6.8 million, but the percentage of the population in that category is the same as it was a year ago. In the same report was the news that the total nonfarm employment increased by 206,000 in June, well above the number theoretically needed to maintain employment percentages. So, what gives? Once more, the issue is that the number of available workers increased, causing the unemployment percentage to rise. Wages were up 3.9% from a year ago, while the PCE inflation index only rose 2.7% for the same period. In other words, more workers are making more money, which is very good for the economy.

We are fully aware that our economic summaries are repetitive, but the facts clearly support our view that the U.S. economy is extremely strong and likely to stay that way for the foreseeable future. The future is always uncertain, but our economic momentum is more than a little impressive.



Jack Smith should go away

EVEN THE DEMOCRATIC DEUS EX MACHINA IS HAVING A BAD STRETCH.

NO MATTER HOW FAVORABLE THE PRESIDENTIAL RACE HAS LOOKED FOR DONALD TRUMP, THERE'S ALWAYS BEEN THE POSSIBILITY THAT SPECIAL COUNSEL JACK SMITH WOULD GET TO TRIAL WITH HIS JAN. 6 CASE BEFORE THE ELECTION AND, AT THE VERY LEAST, DOMINATE THE NEWS CYCLE FOR WEEKS AND, IN ALL LIKELIHOOD, CONVICT TRUMP IN A CASE INVOLVING MORE SERIOUS MATTERS THAN HUSH MONEY TO A PORN STAR.

Now that President Joe Biden stumbled so badly in the first presidential debate, lawfare is more important than ever to Democrats, but Jack Smith's J6 case is hanging by a thread.

Democrats blame the Supreme Court, which has undercut Smith in two new decisions. In the belief that what the situation requires is a futile and stupid gesture, Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez says she's going to file articles of impeachment against conservative justices.

Yet, it is Smith who has forced novel and sensitive legal issues to the fore. The Biden Justice Department and Democrats may believe that it's the role of the Supreme Court to expedite a politically motivated, legally dubious prosecution of a major-party presidential candidate prior to a national election, but it's not.

Because what Smith is doing is unprecedented, it has raised questions that haven't been answered before -- such as, you know, whether a former president of the United States can be prosecuted at all.

If the Biden Justice Department wanted such questions decided well before the 2024 election, it needed

to indict Trump earlier than August 2023.

As it is, Jack Smith has been in a race against the clock because the political usefulness of his prosecution disappears after Election Day 2024, and if Trump wins, the prosecution itself goes away. This means that Smith, against Justice Department guidelines, is conducting his prosecution on a political timetable.

The Supreme Court just made Smith's hope to get the case to a jury sometime soon much harder by concluding that presidents have immunity for their official acts, and some of the Jan. 6 charges, indeed, involve official acts. The obvious play for Jack Smith would be to strip his case down to charges involving private acts, such as the so-called fake electors scheme. Since the Supreme Court majority said even that isn't clear-cut, though, the way would be open for Trump to appeal -- with its attendant delays -- an even more minimal case.

The majority opinion, written by Chief Justice John Roberts, is not unassailable, but neither is it wildly unreasonable or going to lead to future presidents droning their political opponents with impunity.

Meanwhile, two of Smith's charges rely on a provision passed as part of the Sarbanes-Oxley Act af-

ter the 2001 Enron scandal that doesn't obviously have applicability to the events of Jan. 6. Last week, a majority of the Supreme Court -- in a decision joined by Justice Ketanji Brown Jackson, by the way -- adopted a narrow reading of the law, further complicating Smith's task.

It would be better if these matters of law were being decided as abstract questions without knowing who will be affected one way or the other before a national election, but Jack Smith has made that impossible. A more modest prosecutor never would have gotten himself or the country in this fix.

It is very fitting that Smith's appointment as special counsel may itself be constitutionally defective, and is under serious challenge in the classified documents case he is pursuing in Florida.

By rights, he should go away. Smith represents the worst tendency of the law-enforcement and national-security establishment since Trump's rise to prominence in 2016. The basic idea has been that it's OK to stretch or break norms as long as it's in the cause of opposing Trump. Showing remarkably poor judgment, Smith assumed that everyone, including the Supreme Court of the United States, would go along.

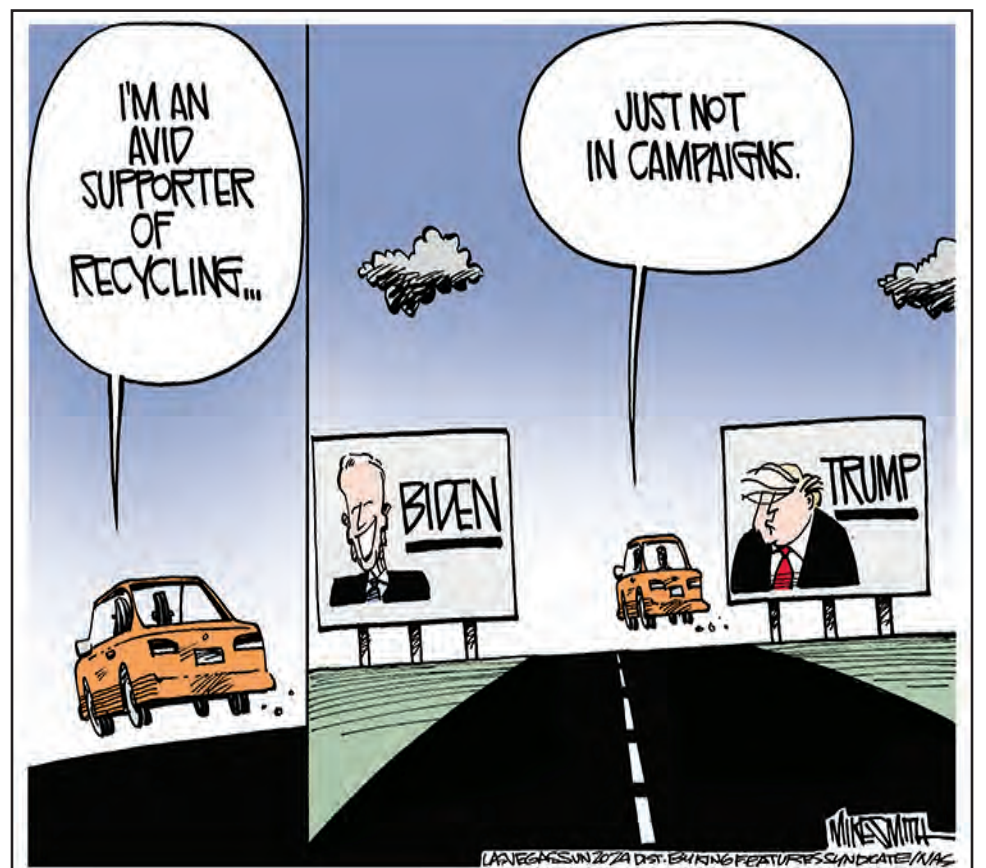
Now that it hasn't, he's poorly positioned to assist Joe Biden when he needs it most.

Wadford receives Golden Trowel

The Golden Trowel is the highest honor that a Lodge can bestow upon a Brother.

"The Golden Trowel is the Lodge's formal recognition of a Brother for his devoted service to Masonic principles in general or to his Lodge," said Chris Fowler, Worshipful Master of Salado Masonic Lodge #296, during the ceremony. "It is intended for the Brother who, year after year, quietly, but actively demonstrates his devotion to the teachings of Masonry without thought of recognition or special honors."

Wadford affiliated with Salado Masonic Lodge #296 in 2009 after retiring as a career submariner and immediately went to work in the Lodge.

He was Senior Deacon 2010-11; Junior Warden 2011-13 (two terms); Senior Warden 2013-14; Worshipful Master 2014-2015; Senior Warden 2016-17; Worshipful Master 2017-18 and Junior Steward 2020-2021. He served as District Dep-

uty Grand Master in 2019.

"But it is not what he did in offices that sets him out as a worthy recipient of the Golden Trowel," said Chris Fowler, Worshipful Master of the Lodge. "As a Past Master, he has served the brethren by cooking breakfasts for the Lodge and working tirelessly on the refurbishment of our 140-year old building, installing floors, overseeing the residing of our historic structure and many other improvements to the building."

"He has also had one of the largest of our flag routes, with more than 90 flags delivered six times a year," Fowler said. He also repairs and replaces flags throughout the year, using his workshop at his Sala-

do home to do so. The flag program allows the Lodge to give scholarships to Salado graduating seniors, purchase back-to-school kits for economically disadvantaged students in Salado ISD, buy bikes at Christmas time for Salado children and support the Salado Senior Center, among other projects.

"For Art, the quarries of Masonry are outside the walls of the Lodge," Fowler said. "He gives to his community, family and friends without hope of reward or recognition."

Robert Glenn Allamon, better known as Bobby or Bubba to his family and friends, passed away on June 28, 2024, in Boerne, TX. Bobby was born on July 29, 1938, in Belton, TX to Guy and Florence Allamon. Bobby was the second youngest of his three siblings, Lanita, Donny and Betty. Bobby attended Salado High School. After high school, he began working at Western Electric before joining the Army in 1958.

As the years progressed and the kids grew up, "Bubba" and "Nati" s passion for travel became more apparent. They traveled the world a bit before selling their treasured home in Boerne, TX and moving to Lake Tahoe, Nevada in 1995. After a year in Nevada, they purchased a motor home to finish their travel of the continental US. Biloxi, Mississippi would go on to become one of their favorite resting spots in the wintertime. In the summers, they would always make it a point to visit family and friends at the RV Park in Boerne or the annual reunions in Stonewall, TX. 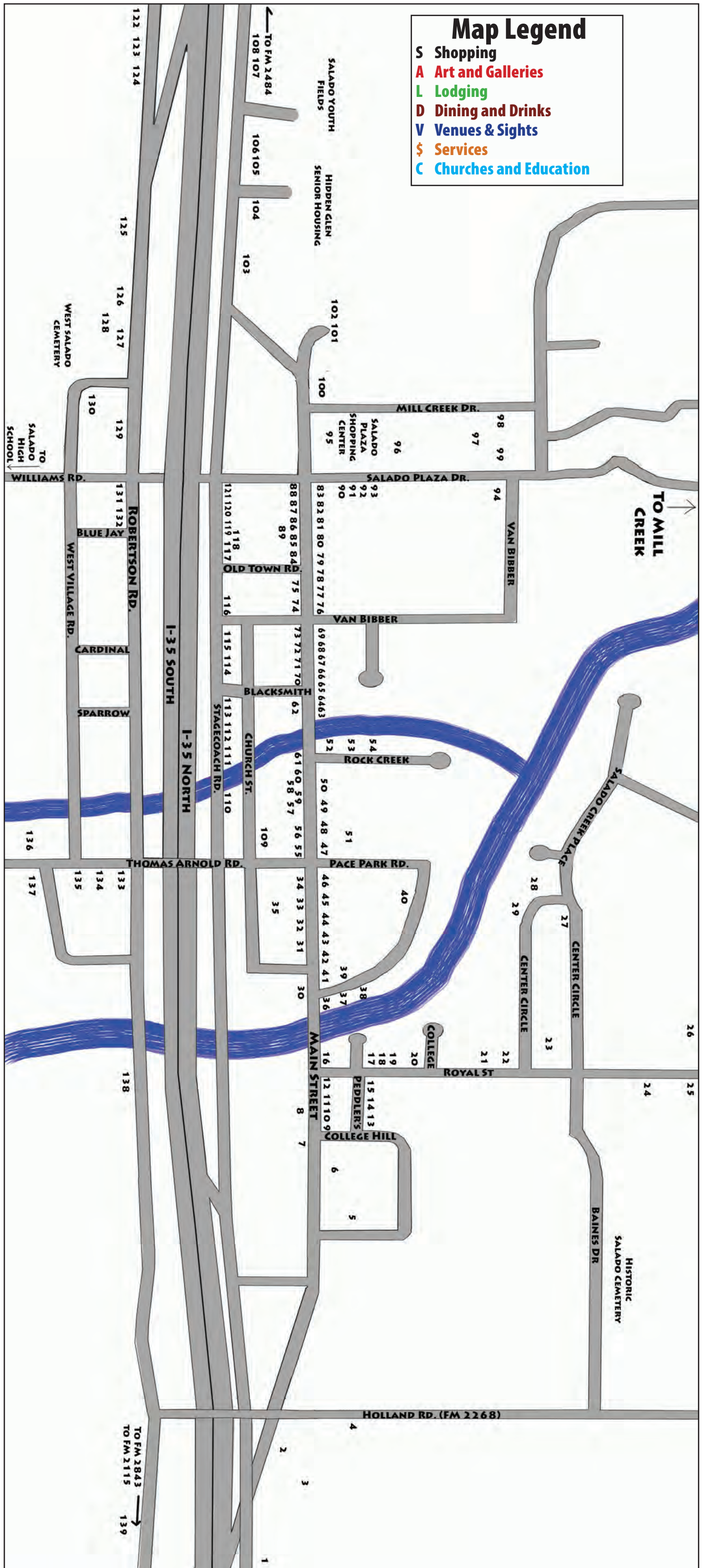

Texas Tuition Fund deadline July 31

Texas families have through July 31 to enroll their newborns at 2023-24 prices in the Texas Tuition Promise Fund®, the state's prepaid college tuition plan. Newborns are children younger than 1 year of age at the time of enrollment.

"I know what it's like to be the parent of newborns, and paying for college was not always at the top of my mind," Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar said. "That's why we're reminding new parents to take advantage of the opportunity to lock in this year's rates and lay the foundation for their children's future educational opportunities."

With the Texas Tuition Promise Fund, participants can purchase tuition units and lock in the costs of undergraduate resident tuition and schoolwide required fees at Texas public colleges and universities, excluding

medical and dental institutions, based on today's prices.

For additional flexibility, the plan also can be used at Texas medical and dental institutions, Texas private colleges and universities, out-of-state colleges and universities, career schools and registered apprenticeship programs, where tuition is not locked in, and the benefits and payouts would be based on the Transfer Value.

Enrollment at 2023-24 prices closed on Feb. 28 for children 1 year of age and older. The next annual enrollment period begins on Sept. 1, with new contract prices based on Texas public college tuition and schoolwide required fees costs for the 2024-25 school year.

Complete plan information, including the plan description and agreement, current sales prices, enroll-

ment forms and more, is available at TuitionPromise.org or by calling 800-445-GRAD (4723), Option 5.

The plan's outreach team also offers free webinars that provide an overview of the plan and discuss the different tuition unit types and payment options, as well as provide information about Texas Match the Promise Foundation matching scholarship opportunities.

Residency restrictions, age requirements, eligibility criteria, household income restrictions, and contribution requirements apply. Match the Promise Foundation scholarships can only be used at Texas public colleges and universities, and Transfer Value cannot be utilized.

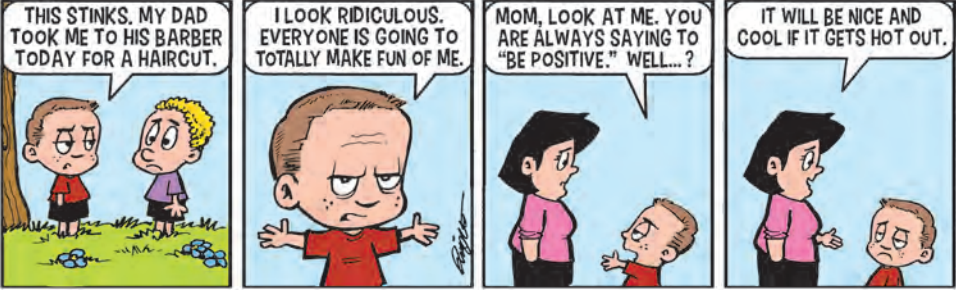

Assume you're in seven notrump and West leads a heart. Certainly, the contract is sound, since you have 12 tricks on top and several chances for a 13th. For starters, either minor suit could be divided 3-3, in which case you are already certain to get home safely.

Or you could make the grand slam by a squeeze if one defender had four or more cards in both minor suits. In that case, when you cashed three

hearts and three spades, your unhappy victim would have to relinquish his stopper in one minor suit or the other.

There is, however, another possibility. The opposition might make a mistake if given the opportunity, and this possibility should not be ignored. The best way to begin, after winning the heart with the jack, is to cash the A-K-Q of diamonds. Since dummy has four diamonds in plain view, this can do no harm, as neither defender holding four diamonds would part with one of them if forced to discard on another suit.

In the actual case, West would show out on the third diamond and discard a heart. But when you next cashed the A-K of hearts, West would find himself in an excruciating position. He would have to choose between discarding a spade or a club, holding the 10-8-4-2 of each suit.

West might find the right discard — he has essentially a 50-50 chance of guessing right — but at least you have given yourself an additional chance to make the contract.

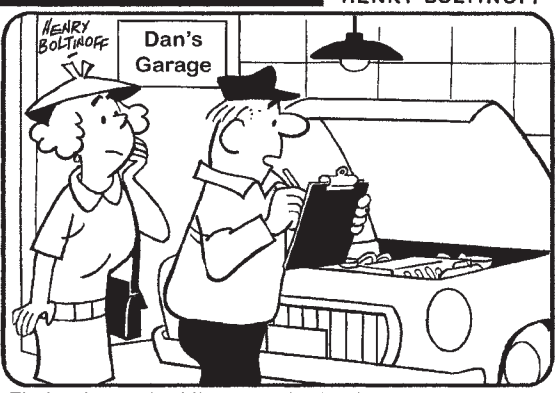
Note also that this method of play maintains the possibility of a squeeze if either defender started with four or more cards in both minor suits.
