BCESD #1 proposes \$.098277 tax rate

Bell County Emergency Services District #1 will hold a public hearing 6 p.m. Sept. 19 at the Salado Fire Department, 3520 FM 2484 for a proposed tax rate of \$0.098277 per \$100 valuation.

The proposed tax rate is not greater than the voter-approval tax rate. As a result, Bell County E.S.D. No. 1 is not required to hold an election at which voters may accept or reject the proposed tax rate.

The no-new-revenue tax rate is \$0.077610 per \$100 valuation. The no-new-revenue tax rate is the tax rate for the 2024 tax year that will raise the same amount of property tax revenue for Bell County E.S.D. No. 1 from the same properties in both the 2023 tax year and the 2024 tax year.

Commissioners Mark McGraw, Mark Huppert, Toby Hatton and Steve Malace voted in favor of the proposed tax rate. Commissioner Kim Bird was absent.

The proposed tax rate will fund an operating budget of \$1.36 million for fire department operations. Of that, \$1.16 million will be for salaries and benefits. The budget will fund the hiring of six full-time firefighters to allow the department to have two firefighters at the station for 24 hour protection.

E.S.D. administration costs are \$181,615.00.

Capital expenditures are \$425,000, including \$275,000 for a pumper, \$25,000 for turnout equipment and \$125,000 for other equipment.

The debt service fund will include \$379,105.18 in capital lease payments.

PID hearing set Oct. 3

The Village of Salado will hold a public hearing regarding the creation of the Mustang Springs Municipal Improvement District at 6:30 p.m. Oct. 3 at the Municipal Building, 301 N. Stagecoach Rd. in Salado.

The estimated cost to design, acquire and construct the authorized improvements, together with bond issuance costs, legal and financial fees, and other eligible costs is \$65 million,

Mustang Springs PID is proposed to include 1,105.07 acres of land located north of FM 2843 and northwest of the current intersection of Mustang Creek Rd. and FM 2843, approximately 5.4 miles west of I-35.

The Village shall levy

assessments on each parcel within the District in a manner that results in imposing equal shares of the costs on property similarly benefited.

Aldermen, at their Sept. 5 meeting, voted unanimously to set the public hearing for the creation of the Public Improvement District.

The property was annexed into the Village on May 18, 2023.

Mustang Springs at Salado will be high-end residential and mixed use development with houses valued at \$1 million or more.

The development will be in three phases. Phase One will be 352.29 acres with 134 single family residential estate lots (two acre minimum lot size). Phase One

will be on septic systems, while the other two phases will be served by a sewer system.

Phase Two will be 377.59 acres with 151 single family residential lots of one to two acres in size. In addition, 27.46 acres will be zoned for mixed use, 31.41 acres for multi-family mixed use, 20.16 acres for commercial use, 15.13 acres for public school, 2.82 acres for public facilities (water storage), 1.851 acres for a ranch head-quarters and 5.75 acres for existing ranch use.

Phase Three will be 375.44 acres with 314 single family residential estate lots of one acre in size along with an amenity center on 1.57 acres.

Aldermen mull through lease, other agreements

Salado aldermen, at their Sept. 5 meeting, discussed three separate lease/insurance agreements, acting on one and tabling the other two until they can get more information on insurance is-

The board, on a 3-1 vote, approved extending the lease agreement with the Salado Chamber of Commerce for the visitor's center and tourism offices at 423 S. Main St.

During her monthly report, Tourism Marketing Manager Deanna Whitson told aldermen, "We do a lot of collaboration and creativity there. We have the Chamber right next to us. They are gracious to work with us and introduce us to businesses. Tourism had brought businesses to Chamber. In the museum, I have office space that allows us to do our work and collaborate on ideas. We have the proper tools and it helps us make sure we are meeting our needs."

She added that she meets with businesses for round-tables to further collaborate on promoting tourism Salado.

The monthly lease is \$1,517. On a motion by alderman Jasen Graham and a second by Zach Hurst, the board approved the renewal of the lease 3-1 with Mayor Pro Tem Rodney Bell joining Graham and Hurst and Alderman Michael Mac-Donald voting against.

"We have great synergy with tourism, the Chamber, and the Salado Museum," Graham said.

Aldermen tabled action on a lease agreement between the Village of Salado and the Presbyterian Church of Salado and Salado Storage, LLC for the Sculpture Garden. The Village provides insurance for the sculptures placed there. De La Rosa told aldermen that there are issues concerning insuring those sculptures.

Aldermen tabled an item concerning providing property and/or liability insurance on the log cabins and 1908 Church building on the grounds of the Salado Civic Center. The property is owned by Salado ISD and leased long-term to Salado Historical Society, which owns the cabins. According to De La Rosa, the Village is currently insuring buildings it does not own or lease on property that it does not own or lease.

De La Rosa told aldermen that there needed to be some type of either ownership of the items (sculptures or buildings) or lease agreements in place in order for there to be valid insurance.

Aldermen unanimously approved a Conditional Use

Permit to allow mixed beverage sales at #2 Peddler's Alley, which is in the Historic District, for a business that will be called Bourbon Speaks.

The board unanimously approved an inter-local agreement with Bell County Emergency Services District #1 to provide inspection and review services to the Vil-

The board approved an independent contractor agreement with Media 2 Social for management of the Tourism website.

The board accepted roads at Salado Center.

An item concerning a request from Legacy CTX that the walking bridge between Barrow Brewing Co. and Pace Park be removed/retracted during the Oct. 5 Sirena Fest was removed from the agenda.

According to Mayor Bert Henry, "I have spoken with both parties involved on either side of bridge. They have come to an agreement."

Henry said that Barrow Brewing Co. will provide staffing at the bridge to assure that alcohol is not carried into Pace Park during Sirena Fest.

Johnny Hornbeck began work in the Public Works department on Sept. 9. Village administrator Manny De La Rosa announced his hire at the Sept. 5 meeting.

Grant funds digital literacy classes to begin at Salado Senior Center

Despite Sept. doldrums, **S&P 500 up 13.39**% in '24, 21.12% since '23

It is September. That should come as no surprise, but for a host of reasons, stock traders seem to be often surprised as the ninth month arrives. That could be because the month's name literally means "the seventh." It has become a tradition for September to start with a stock selloff. Contributing to the event is the myth that bad things happen more often in September than in other months. Add the Presidential election effect in which the media is saturated with negativity every four years, and a down market in early September becomes a thing. The S&P 500 (SPX) declined 4.25% in the first week of the downer month to close at 5408.42, leaving it up a mere 13.39% this year and 21.12% higher than last year. The other Index we follow to get what may be a better picture of the central part of the market, the CRSP US Mid Cap Value Index, fell 2.78% to 2753.36, up 9.83% this year and over 17% from a year ago. What reason did the pundits give for this decline? The reports we read blamed it on a poor manufacturing forecast and rising unemployment, which were both better than last month's numbers. We think the real reason was that September caught the traders by

The benchmark U.S. Treasury 10-year note ended the week yielding 3.72%, about 5% lower than last week. This sparked a rise in the bond market that nearly but not quite erased this year's losses there. The 30year T-bond rate dropped to 4.03%, while the annualized one-month rate stayed above 5% at 5.28%. West Texas Intermediate crude oil (WTI) joined in the swoon, declining 7.30% to \$68.18 per bar-

prime problem that has faced the economy all year, that of overheating and reigniting inflation. It is important to note that the economy's "slowing" headlines are misleading. Instead, we are seeing a reduction in the growth rate of the U.S. economy. Globally, there are worrisome signs of stagnation and even contraction, and most of that is because China, the second-largest importer of goods and services, appears to have a contraction underway. In the United States, manufacturing makes up about 10.3% of our Gross Domestic Product (GDP), while in China, manufacturing is about 26.18%, according to the World Bank. The U.S. economy is far more dependent on consumer spending for its growth. China has actively been trying to make consumer spending a significant part of its economy but with a serious real estate contraction and declining home prices, Chinese consumers are retrenching. That economic contraction in China affects the whole world, including us. Fortunately, our economy appears to have plenty of momentum to carry it through what looks more and more like the "soft landing" the Federal Reserve has been aiming for.

The Institute for Supply Management (ISM) U.S. Manufacturing Purchasing Manager's Index (PMI) rose from last month's 46.8 to 47.2 on a scale where 50 is the assumed divider between growth and contraction, however; ISM commentary noted that sentiment played a large role in their survey and recently any reading above 42.5 indicates expansion in the econ-

Real consumer spending in the U.S. posted its third straight month of healthy to strong growth in July. Real spending (after subtracting inflation) grew 0.4% in the month after rising 0.3% in June and appears to be stabilizing at a strong clip. More importantly, one of the strongest elements in that spending growth was durable goods, indicating buyers have confidence in their near future income and employment.

According to the Census Bureau, construction spending in the U.S. declined 0.3% in July. Still, the report noted that construction companies are working through backlogs, and spending was 6.7% higher than in July 2023. At the same time, the monthly Job Openings and Labor Turnover Survey (JOLTS) report from the Bureau of Labor Statistics noted that job openings, layoffs, and hires changed very little in July, but construction hiring was up. Meanwhile, the Labor Department reported that unemployment fell from 4.3% in July to 4.2% in August as employers hired a net 142,000 employees, about the number it takes to maintain a healthy employment situation.

What does all this mean? First, it is evidence that it was hot in August. Construction and some manufacturing slow down when it is hot. Second, it indicates that a lot of people take vacations in August. Third, and most importantly, it suggests that those areas have reached a reasonable, sustainable growth rate.

When it's time to take a

hard look at our public officials and decide which ones to re-elect - or reject - we need information.

A major source of that information is the government itself. Access to public records and meetings is essential for us to know the facts and speak out about how government is run, during election season or any time.

Among the tools at our disposal are the Texas Public Information Act, the Texas Open Meetings Act and the federal Freedom of Information Act along with transparency provisions in other Texas laws and the state constitution.

As strong as these tools are, we must be vigilant about keeping them sharp.

Our information laws at times require legislative updates to reflect how records are created, stored and used in the modern world. For example, providing easy-tofind online information and searchable-sortable spreadsheet data when it exists, instead of old-fashioned copies, should be the norm. Unfortunately, not all governments do this voluntari-

Just as important is the need to overcome barriers some governments intentionally use to block information access. Loopholes in the laws must closed. Enforcement should be fine-

The nonprofit Freedom of Information Foundation

of Texas will explore these transparency issues and protection of First Amendment rights at its annual conference Friday, Sept. 13, in Austin. Conference registration is available to all who

Keep information laws working

are interested. The FOI Foundation also hosts regional training sessions to help Texans learn to use the Public Information Act and Open Meetings Act. The next seminar is Oct. 16 in Edinburg in the Rio Grande Valley.

Open records and meetings allow us to go beyond government officials' spoken words or spin and let us to see how decisions are truly made and how governing is carried out.

How is taxpayer money spent? Are contractors who are building roads and bridges meeting deadlines and ensuring safety? Do school districts, cities and counties effectively manage programs and budgets?

Government information belongs to the people, and in almost all cases it needs to flow freely, without delay.

The "public's right to know does not depend on the whims of officials, elected or non-elected," former Texas Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, who held office when the state's open records law was enacted in 1973, once explained at an FOI Foundation gathering.

"Winning an election or getting a government job doesn't make anybody smarter than they were before, or less subject to the law. In fact, public officials not only have to obey the

as intended to help all Texans law like everybody else, they have an even higher duty," he said.

> The Texas Public Information Act presumes documents are open unless there's an exception in the law to releasing the record. Even then, in most instances a governmental entity must ask the Texas attorney general's office for permission to withhold it. That's a safeguard that provides oversight and can deter the entity from acting in bad faith toward a requestor.

> The Open Meetings Act, meanwhile, makes the meetings of many governmental bodies open to everyone unless there's a specific exception allowing a closed session, such as deliberation on a pending real estate transaction or personnel matter. But no action can be taken behind closed doors; the public has a right to know about and observe the body's decision-making.

These major transparency laws place power in the hands of the people. That's something we should treasure and use.

Making this state and nation a better place is our responsibility as Texans and Americans. Demanding change when necessary and soaking up all the information we can along the way – helps get the job done.

MIT begins to discriminate less

Supreme Court decision.'

The indications are that a historically oppressed minority group in America is finally going to get discriminated against less.

Cue the rejoicing? No, because the group is Asian Americans and the discrimination has happened in the realm of college admissions.

MIT has released its first post-affirmative action admissions numbers for the incoming class of 2028, and the percentage of Asian American students increased markedly from 40% percent to 47%. Black students dropped from 15 to 5%, and Hispanic students from 16 to 11%, while the percentage of white students stayed roughly the same, dropping one percentage point.

There are two possible interpretations of these numbers. Either the MIT admissions office has been somehow infiltrated by racists who want to exclude as many black and Hispanic students as possible (while, bizarrely, boosting Asian Americans), or the affirmative-action regime that the Supreme Court ruled against last year was working to keep out meritorious Asian American appli-

It's the latter, of course. Although we still need to see the returns from other top schools, the MIT numbers are the first hard post-Supreme Court evidence that the critics were -- unsurprisingly -- right that affirmative action was a form of systemic discrimination against high-achieving Asian Amer-

icans. president Sally Kornbluth basically admitted as much when she said the changed composition of the school's entering class is "a consequence of last year's

The MIT figures aren't so different from Duke scholar Peter Arcidiacono's estimate of what Harvard's admissions would look like without affirmative action. Arcidiacono, an expert witness for Students for Fair Admissions in its case against Harvard and the University of North Carolina that went to the Supreme Court, forecast a big increase in Asian American students, a moderate gain for white students, and a substantial drop in Black and Hispanic admissions.

This was the experience in California when the state passed the anti-affirmative Proposition 209 in 1996. Asian Americans went from 37% of freshmen at U.C. Berkeley in 1995 to 43% in 2022. (White students declined from 30% to 20.)

Supporters of affirmative action consider this kind of change a blow against "diversity," although this is a superficial, racially reductive perspective.

There isn't a giant factory somewhere that is manufacturing generic "Asian-Americans" who all have the same backgrounds and attitudes. The category of Asian American, like other big racial classifications, does more to obscure than illuminate.

The category includes people from countries that have ancient enmities, and people from countries that have little to do with one another (China, India or the Philippines, for instance). Chinese and Japanese students might come from families that have been here

since the 19th century, while others are immigrants. Some Asian Americans are affluent, others working class, some woke, some conservative, and so on.

What unites all of them is that they have convincingly demonstrated that they belong at MIT. Rather than regretting that there are now "too many" of them, we should be proud of what they have achieved, and recognize that they are individuals who, as a matter of basic fairness and American ideals, should be treated as such.

One of the problems with affirmative action is that, in its obsession with racial categories, it might perversely give preferential treatment to an African American kid whose father is a prominent lawyer and whose mother is a college professor over an Asian American applicant whose parents were refugees from Burma. No one is reducible to race.

The new MIT admissions regime should also remove any doubt that Black and Hispanic students are there based solely on merit, too. As for the students who would have been admitted under the old highly racialized system, it's not as though they will have no future if they end up at a good state school somewhere.

One would think that less discrimination would be considered ipso facto a good thing, but for supporters of affirmative action, it's all about who is being discriminated against, and in what cause.

Bad snaps and turnovers plagued the Salado Eagles in their 49-30 loss to the visiting Lampasas Badgers Sept. 6. The loss drops Salado to 0-2.

The Badgers scored on their first possession, driving 70 yards in nine plays, with Reed Jerome scoring on a 23-yard run with 8:52 left in the first. Zimri Vergara toed the extra point for a 7-0 lead.

A bad snap over Lincoln Hossfeld's head gave Lampasas the ball at the Salado 13, setting up a touchdown run by Damian Rivas.

After Lampasas recovered a Salado fumble at the Badger 37, Kenneth Angel intercepted a Jerome pass and returned it to the Badger 42.

The teams swapped punts, with the Eagles taking possession at their own 13 with 21 seconds left in the first. A bad snap left the Eagles at their own 1. Hossfeld hit Brendan Wilson in stride for a 99-yard touchdown reception with 10:58. Townes Sather converted the point-after for Salado to trail 14-7.

Following the ensuing kick, Lampasas drove 68 yards in nine plays, with Jerome scoring from the 8. Vergara's kick made it 21-7.

Salado drove from their own 28 to the Badger 15, where they stalled. Sather toed a 32 yard field goal to close the gap to 21-10 with 2:13 left in the half.

Lampasas closed the half on the Eagle side of their field where Mason Olson intercepted a Jerome pass at the Eagle 15.

Salado got within four early in the third, driving 67 yards in nine plays. Hossfeld ran behind 6'7" tackle Daniel Flas for a 15-yard TD with 8:44 left in the third. Sather made it 21-17.

The Eagles forced Lampasas to a three-and-out series, but the Badgers took advantage of a fumbled punt to recover the ball at the Salado 17.

Rivas scored from there and Vergara made it 28-17 with 7:08 left in the third.

The Eagles answered, driving 67 yards in six plays. Hossfeld ran a 10 yard touchdown with 5:10 left in the third. Sather kicked the PAT to close the score to 28-24.

Lampasas recovered the onside kick and drove 53 yards, scoring on a 29-yard pass from Jerome to Bryson Roberts. Vergara kicked the extra point to give Lampasas a 35-24 lead with 3:57 left in the third.

Lampasas had a 52-yard scoring drive, topped by an 8-yard run by Jerome with 15 seconds left in the third and a 42-24 lead.

After stopping the Eagles on a fourth down try, the Badgers scored on a 24-yard Jerome pass to Ty Johnson and Vergara kick for a 49-24 lead with 9:54 left to play.

Salado answered with a 60-yard drive, that was almost stopped dead in its tracks when Jaden McElwan intercepted a Hossfeld pass. They interception was overruled by a roughing the passer call, giving Salado a fresh set of downs. A pass

The bidding: East South West North 2 NT* Pass Pass 3 NT 4 🏚 *at least 5-5 in the minors. Opening lead — king of clubs.

It might seem that if the number of losers declarer has is added to the number of winners he has, they ought to add up to 13. However, sometimes they don't.

Consider this case where South is in four spades. West leads the king of clubs, which is allowed to hold, and then the queen of clubs, taken by South with the ace.

Declarer counts his likely losers, and they appear to be one club, two diamonds and one or two trump

tricks, so it seems he will go down one or two depending on how the trumps are divided. But South's prospects are actually much better than that.

After winning the second club lead, declarer plays the A-K of trump, learning that the opposing trumps are divided 4-1, which is not surprising in view of West's bid. This development confirms that South has five losers, but it does not necessarily mean that he can't make the contract.

Declarer continues by cashing the A-K of hearts and ruffing a heart. He then proceeds merrily along, trumping a club in dummy, ruffing another heart, leading a diamond to the ace and ruffing dummy's last heart.

The upshot of all this is that South has accumulated 10 tricks consisting of the A-K of spades, A-K of hearts, ace of diamonds and ace of clubs, plus three heart ruffs in his own hand and a club ruff in dummy.

So, despite starting with five losers, South finishes with 10 tricks. The explanation of this anomaly is that, after 11 tricks have been played, South's Q-9 of diamonds simultaneously succumb to West's K-J of diamonds and East's Q-J of trump on the last two tricks. Four of his apparent losers are thus compressed into two actual losers, which allows South to get home safely with his contract.



Pursuant to Chapter 372 of the Texas Local Government Code, as amended (the "Act"), notice is hereby given that the Village Board of the Village of Salado, Texas ("Village"), will hold a public hearing to accept public comments and consider the establishment by the Village of a public improvement district pursuant to a petition (the "Petition"), filed by certain property owners within the city limits of the Village (the "Petitioners"), requesting that the Village create Mustang Springs Public Improvement District (the "District") to include property owned by the Petitioners.

Time and Place of the Hearing. The public hearing will be held at 6:30 p.m. on October 3, 2024, at the Village Hall Board Chambers located at 301 N. Stagecoach Road, Salado, TX 76571.

General Nature of the Proposed Authorized Improvements. The general nature of the proposed public improvements (collectively, the "Authorized Improvements") may include: (i) street and roadway improvements, including related sidewalks, drainage, utility relocation, signalization, landscaping, lighting, signage, off-street parking, right-of-way, and land acquisition; (ii) establishment or improvement of parks and open space, together with the design, construction and maintenance of any ancillary structures, features or amenities such as trails, playgrounds, walkways, lighting and any similar items located therein; (iii) sidewalks and landscaping, including entry monuments and features, fountains, lighting and signage; (iv) acquisition, construction, and improvement of water, wastewater and drainage improvements and facilities; (v) projects similar to those listed in subsections (i) - (iv) above authorized by the Act, including similar off-site projects that provide a benefit to the property within the District; (vi) special supplemental services for improvement and promotion of the district; (vii) payment of costs associated with operating and maintaining the public improvements listed in subparagraphs (i) - (vii) above; and (viii) payment of costs associated with developing and financing the public improvements listed in subparagraphs (i) - (vii) above, and costs of establishing, administering and operating the District. These Authorized Improvements shall promote the interests of the Village and confer a special benefit upon the Property.

Estimated Cost of the Authorized Improvements. The estimated cost to design, acquire, and construct the Authorized Improvements, together with bond issuance costs (including but not limited to the funding of any capitalized interest and reserve funds), eligible legal and financial fees, eligible credit enhancement costs and eligible costs incurred in the establishment administration and operation of the District, is Sixty-Five Million Dollars (\$65,000,000.00) plus the annual cost of supplemental services and operation and maintenance costs, if any. The Village will pay none of the costs of the Authorized Improvements, supplemental services or operation and maintenance costs from funds other than assessments levied on property within the District The remaining costs of the proposed improvements will be paid from sources other than the Village or assessments on property within the District, including funds from a Tax Increment Financing Zone, if any.

Proposed District Boundaries. The District is proposed to include approximately 1,105.07 acres of land generally located north of FM 2843 and northwest of the current intersection of Mustang Creek Rd. and FM 2843 and is approximately 5.40 miles west of I-35 on FM 2843, on the north side of the road. The District's location is more particularly described by a metes and bounds description available at Salado Village Offices and available for public inspection at the location described above.

Proposed Method of Assessment. The Village shall levy assessments on each parcel within the District in a manner that results in imposing equal shares of the costs on property similarly benefited. The proposed method of assessment shall be based upon (i) an equal apportionment per lot, per front foot, or per square foot of property benefiting from the Authorized Improvements, as determined by the Village, (ii) the ad valorem taxable value of the property benefiting from the Authorized Improvements, with or without regard to improvements on the property, or (iii) in any manner that results in imposing equal shares of the cost on property similarly benefitted.

Proposed Apportionment of Cost between the District and the Village. The Village will not be obligated to provide any funds to finance the Authorized Improvements, except for public improvement district assessments levied on real property within the District, if any. All of the costs of the Authorized Improvements will be paid from assessments and from other sources of funds, if any, available to the Petitioners.

All interested persons are invited to attend such public hearing to express their views with respect to the creation of the PID and the Authorized Improvements to be made therein.

This Notice of Public Hearing is given, and the public hearing is being held pursuant to the requirements of the Act.
